Bellevue and Allied Hospitals.

A regular meeting of the Board of Trustees of Bellevue and Allied Hospitals was held on Thursday, Aug. 30, 1917, at 2 p.m.

Present—Mr. O'Keeffe, as Acting President, in the chair; Messrs. Paulding, Farley and Stern, Trustees, and Mr. Kingsbury, Commissioner of Public Charities. Excused: Dr. Brannan, Mr. Sachs and Mr. Robbins, Trustees.

The minutes of the meeting of Aug. 16, a copy of which had been sent to each member, were held as read and approved.

Dr. O'Hanlon, the General Medical Superintendent, reported as follows:

On account of the frequent changes occurring among the members of the interne staff of the various hospitals, the older men being called for military duty and their substitutes not having had six months' hospital experience required, it has been necessary, and will continue to be necessary during the period of war, to place internees on ambulance service and in the admitting office who do not meet the present qualifications, that is, will not have had six months in the hospital as a regular appointee. Your approval of the abrogation of this rule during the period of the war is requested.

Mr. Witschien, Purchasing Agent, has been ill for several days and has been ordered by his physician to take his vacation for one month at the present time, and he will therefore be absent from the hospital in September.

The hospital has been prominently mentioned in the last week or two in connection with the confusion of babies sent to the Sea Cliff Convalescent Home by Lebanon and Bellevue Hospitals. Full reports from the Bellevue Social Service Workers who had to do with the case would indicate that no blame whatever could be attached to the hospital. Miss Hilliard, of the Training School, states that as a result of the publicity the parents on the East Side are very reluctant to send their children to the hospital, and this feeling has been largely induced by a statement appearing in the press from Mr. Goldstein alleging that gross carelessness exists in hospitals concerning the marking of babies. As this statement is not founded on fact, so far as Bellevue is concerned, the Social Service Bureau asks, through Miss Hilliard, if some statement can be made from the Board of Trustees which would be reassuring to the mothers and fathers of the East Side who must send their babies to us.

Special nurses have been provided, at the expense of the City, for nurses, doctors and various patients whose condition required constant nursing attention, upon the requisition of the attending physician or surgeon. For several years this service was limited to Bellevue. About three years ago it was extended to the allied hospitals. There are a large number of accident cases, particularly automobile, coming to Harlem and Fordham Hospitals, who are well able to pay for their own nurses and as a measure of economy to the City have been allowed to do so. This practice, however, is growing, and the nurses are apparently kept on longer than is necessary. I believe it desirable to limit the use of special nurses to 24-hour period, the attending physician or surgeon renewing the request in writing, if necessary, subject to the approval of the Superintendent of the hospital and the General Medical Superintendent.

Dr. Gregory's plan for covering the Psychopathic Service during his absence on military duty is incorporated in his statement presented herewith.

On separate motion, duly seconded and carried in each instance, action was taken upon the report of the General Medical Superintendent as follows:

The rule requiring six months' hospital service before Internes can be assigned to ambulance duty or in the admitting office was abrogated for the period of the war.

The leave of absence of Mr. Witschien, Purchasing Agent, for one month was approved.

After consideration, the General Medical Superintendent was instructed to give to the public through the press such statements as may be necessary to reassure

the mothers and fathers of the East Side regarding the care of babies at Bellevue; this statement to be made at an opportune time if it is considered wise.

The recommendation was approved in regard to limiting the use of Special Nurses to 24-hour periods and if further service is necessary, the visiting physician or surgeon to renew their request in writing, the appointing of Special Nurses being further subject to the approval of the Superintendent of the hospital and the General Medical Superintendent.

The plan of Dr. Gregory for covering the Psychopathic Service during his absence on military duty and his request for that absence were considered and approved.

COMMITTEE REPORTS.

The bids received at Bellevue Hospital on Aug. 27 for the following food supplies were considered: Meats and poultry, stock fruits and vegetables, bread and rolls, butter and cheese, canned goods and groceries.

On the recommendation of the Committee on Supplies, premised on a report from the Purchasing Agent to the General Medical Superintendent dated Aug. 29, contracts were awarded to the low formal bidders on all lines with the following exceptions. Butter and cheese: Lines 1 and 2 rejected on account of the high prices and the receipt of only one bid. Stock fruits and vegetables for Gouverneur Hospital rejected as the low bidders put in an informal bid; department to purchase articles in the open market. Canned goods and groceries: Lines 1, 4 and 22 were rejected on account of the high prices. Lines 14 and 64 were also rejected as there were "tie" bids; goods to be purchased in the open market. Stock fruits and vegetables: Lines 23 and 24 were rejected on account of the difficulty in obtaining a good quality of dried apples at this time. Line 35 was rejected on account of an error made on this item by the department. Bids for butter and cheese to be readvertised as the sum exceeds \$1,000.

The following bids were received at Bellevue Hospital on Aug. 27 for the alteration to the boat "Huddleston": Victor B. Hess, \$7,378; Mendel Osserman, \$4,105.

A report dated Aug. 29 from the Supervising Engineer to the General Medical Superintendent relating thereto was presented. After consideration, the contract was awarded to the low bidder. Mendel Osserman, in the sum of \$4,105.

The following list of bids received at Bellevue Hospital on Aug. 27, for painting the new building for the Out Patient Department of Gouverneur Hospital, was considered: Louis Oslan, \$2,489; M. Leven Decorating Co., \$2,375; Paul Gilman, \$2,373; Weinstein Bros., \$1,869; Mendel Osserman, \$1,425; Lewis Nelson, \$1,270. After consideration, on the recommendation of the Building Committee, it was moved, seconded and carried, in the best interests of the City, to reject all bids and readvertise.

It was reported on behalf of Dr. Brannan that he was in Washington, D. C., to confer with representatives of the National Administration regarding the shortage of Internes and prospective Internes for hospital service due to the draft law and men entering the Medical Reserve Corps, and the need of taking steps to relieve the situation. After discussion, it was moved, seconded and carried to refer this subject to Dr. Brannan with power.

Mr. Stern reported progress in regard to finding a place for the open air school formerly conducted on the boat "Hudson."

Mr. Farley referred to the bridge to be built from Gouverneur Hospital to the new building for the Out Patient Department, and recommended, upon Dr. Brannan's suggestion, that it would be desirable to have the bridge go directly to the roof of the new building. After discussion, it was moved, seconded and carried to instruct the architects to prepare plans in accordance with this suggestion if it can be carried out without too great expense.

The Chairman of the Building Committee reported that he had considered the application of D. Davis for payment of the retained 2 per cent, amounting to \$133.50, on his contract for painting pavilions 1 and K of Bellevue Hospital, and presented

reports from McKim, Mead and White dated August 21, and from the General Inspector of Construction dated Aug. 23, relating thereto. On the recommendation of the Building Committee and the architects, it was moved, seconded and carried to authorize the payment.

Reference was made to a report dated Aug. 10, from the Department of Docks and Ferries, on an examination of the boat "Southfield" setting forth that it appeared to be in good condition and that the repairs necessary to the superstructure and guards would cost about \$2,005. No funds are available, and after discussion on the desirability of making a request for special revenue bonds or making provision in the departmental estimate for 1918, it was

Resolved, To include it in the budget for 1918.

The Building Committee reported that it had considered two letters dated Aug. 23 and Aug. 29, from R. F. Almirall, recommending in view of the condition of the building trades, that the Building Committee give consideration to the selection of a contractor to furnish materials and labor for the roof ward at Fordham Hospital on a commission basis, providing considerable latitude to the Building Committee in the way of omissions and changes. After consideration, it was moved, seconded and carried to inform the architects that the Trustees do not consider the suggestion feasible as the Charter provision will not permit the awarding of contracts in this form and that the Building Committee reported that they believe that they can come to a conclusion as to the type of roof ward which will not require subsequent changes in the plans.

A communication dated Aug. 21 was presented from J. H. Freedlander, recommending the acceptance of the work under the contract of W. H. Jamouneau Company on condition that an allowance of \$92.25 be retained for work not completed in accordance with the terms of the contract and specification. He further reports that the work was substantially completed on April 15, 1916. After consideration, on the recommendation of the Building Committee, it was moved, seconded and carried to accept this work with the provision that \$92.25 be deducted for work not completed in accordance with the specification in order to close the contract, and further to request the contractor, W. H. Jamouneau Company, to show cause why liquidated damages should not be assessed in accordance with clause "S" of the contract.

The Chairman of the Building Committee reported on the advisability of sending a communication to the Corporation Counsel in regard to reforming the contract of W. H. Jamouneau Company to bring the liquidated damages from \$30 to \$5 a day. The contract as originally prepared for the installation of apparatus and equipment at Harlem Hospital, provided for one contract in nine sections made up under the assumption that the contract would be let in a lump sum at an estimated cost of \$30,000. Later this was changed to permit the making of awards in nine different contracts. In effecting this change, however, the liquidated damages called for in clause "S" remained in the original amount of \$30 a day. The schedule adopted by the department many years ago provides that contracts from \$1,000 to \$5,000 call for liquidated damages at \$5 a day. Whereas, This Board has made inquiry as to the money value of the franchise or right applied for by The Staten Island Rapid Transit Railway Company, and the adequacy of the compensation proposed to be paid therefor; now, therefore, it is

Resolved, That the following form of the resolution for the grant of the franchise or right applied for by The Staten Island Rapid Transit Railway Company, containing the form of proposed contract for the grant of such franchise or right, be hereby introduced and entered in the minutes of this Board, as follows:

Section 1. Section 2, subdivisions Seventh and Seventeenth of said contract, as heretofore amended, are hereby amended to read as follows:

"Seventeenth—If the conduit line as herein described shall not be constructed and in actual operation in all the streets and avenues described upon all the routes herein described on May 1, 1920, all rights herein given shall be thereupon forthwith and immediately forfeited, without judicial or other proceedings, unless at least fifty (50) per cent. of the conduit line shall then be constructed and in operation, when in such case the forfeiture shall affect only the Company's rights, privileges and franchises on such portion of the conduit line hereby authorized as may be unconstructed on the said date."

Resolved, That the following form of the resolution for the grant of the franchise or right applied for by The Staten Island Rapid Transit Railway Company, containing the form of proposed contract for the grant of such franchise or right, be hereby introduced and entered in the minutes of this Board, as follows:

Resolved, That the Board of Estimate and Apportionment hereby grants to The Staten Island Rapid Transit Railway Company the franchise or right fully set out and described in the following form of proposed contract for the grant thereof, embodying all of the terms and conditions in said contract and in said proposed form of contract contained, and that the Mayor of The City of New York be and he hereby is authorized to execute and deliver such contract in the name and on behalf of The City of New York, as follows:

THIS CONTRACT, made and executed in duplicate this day of 1917, by and between THE CITY OF NEW YORK (hereinafter called the City), party of the first part, by the Mayor of said City, acting for and in the name of said City, under and in pursuance of the authority of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment of said City (hereinafter called the Board) and THE STATE ISLAND RAPID TRANSIT RAILWAY COMPANY (hereinafter called the Company), party of the second part, WITNESSETH:

In consideration of the mutual covenants and agreements herein contained, the parties hereto do hereby covenant and agree as follows:

SECTION 1. The City hereby grants to the Company, subject to the conditions and provisions hereinabove set forth, the right and privilege to construct, maintain and operate five (5) standard gauge railroad tracks over and across Western Avenue, in the Third Ward, Borough of Richmond, the center line of the northerly four of which said five tracks to be approximately one thousand five hundred and thirty (1,530) feet northerly from the center line of Washington Avenue; said five tracks to connect the terminal yard of the Company, located on either side of Western Avenue, as follows, to wit:

"Map showing proposed tracks across Western Ave., Third Ward, Borough of Richmond, City of New York, to accompany the petition of April 25th, 1917—The Staten Island Rapid Transit Ry. Co. to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment."

signed by W. H. Averell, General Manager, and Wm. B. Redgrave, District Engineer; which map is attached to and made a part of this contract.

SECTION 2. The grant of this right and privilege is subject to the following conditions, which shall be complied with by the Company.

First—The said right and privilege to construct, maintain and operate said railroad tracks shall be held and enjoyed by the Company from the date on which this contract is signed by the Mayor to and until October 28, 1934, with the privilege of renewal of said contract for the further period of twenty-five (25) years, upon a fair revaluation of such right and privilege.

If the Company shall determine to exercise its privilege of renewal it shall make application to the Board at any time not earlier than two (2) years and not later than one (1) year before the expiration of the original term of this contract. The time within which such application for renewal must be made is the essence of this contract, and a failure of the Company to present its application within the time fixed shall be considered as an election on the part of the Company not to take advantage of the renewal privilege and as a relinquishment of its right to such renewal, in which event the franchise shall terminate on the last day of the original term of this contract.

If the Company and the Board shall not reach such agreement on or before the day nine (9) months before the expiration of the original term of this contract, then the parties hereby agree that the annual rate for the renewal term shall be determined by three disinterested persons selected in the following manner:

One disinterested person shall be chosen by the Board, one disinterested person shall be chosen by the Company; these two shall choose a third disinterested person, and the three so chosen shall act as appraisers, and shall make the revaluation aforesaid. Such appraisers shall be chosen at least six (6) months prior to the expiration of the original term of this contract, and their report shall be filed with the Board within three (3) months after they are chosen. They shall act as appraisers and not as arbitrators. They may base their judgment upon their own experience and upon such information as they may obtain by inquiries and investigation, without the presence of either party. They shall have the right to examine any of the books of the Company and its officers under oath. The valuation so ascertained and agreed to by any two of such appraisers shall be conclusive upon both, but no annual sum shall, in any event be less than the sum required to be paid for the last year of the original term of this contract. If in any case the annual rate shall not be fixed prior to the termination of the original term of this contract, then the Company shall pay the annual rate theretofore prevailing until the new rate shall be determined, and shall then make up to the City the amount of any excess of the annual rate then determined over the previous annual rate. The entire expense of such appraisal shall be borne jointly by the City and the Company, each paying one-half thereof.

(a) The sum of one thousand dollars (\$1,000) in cash within three (3) months after the date on which this contract is signed by the Mayor and before anything is done in exercise of the privilege hereby granted.

(b) From the date when the annual charges commence as hereinabove provided until October 28, 1924, the annual sum of five hundred dollars (\$500).

During the succeeding term of five (5) years, the annual sum of seven hundred and fifty dollars (\$750).

During the last term of five (5) years the annual sum of one thousand dollars (\$1,000).

The annual charges shall commence on the date upon which the Company obtains the permission and approval of the Public Service Commission, as required by Section 53 of the Public Service Commission Law. The Company hereby agrees to file its application with the Public Service Commission for such permission and approval within ten (10) days from the date upon which this contract is signed by the Mayor.

The annual charges as above shall be paid into the treasury of the City on November 1 of each year, and shall be for the amount due to September 30 next preceding; provided that the first annual payment shall be only for that proportion of the first annual charge as the time between the date when the annual charges commence as hereinabove provided and September 30 following shall bear to the whole of one year.

Any and all payments to be made by the terms of this contract to the City by the Company shall not be considered in any manner in the nature of a tax, but such payments shall be made in addition to any and all taxes of whatsoever kind or description, now or hereafter required to be paid by any ordinance of the City, or resolution of the Board, or any law of the State of New York.

Third.—The annual charges or payments herein provided for shall continue throughout the whole term of this contract, notwithstanding any clause in any statute or in the charter of any railroad or railway company providing for payment for railroad or railway rights or franchises at a different rate.

Fourth.—The rights and privileges hereby granted shall not be assigned or transferred, either in whole or in part, whether by consolidation, merger, reorganization or otherwise, or leased or sublet in any manner, either in whole or in part, without the consent of the City, acting by the Board, evidenced by an instrument under seal, anything herein contained to the contrary thereof in any wise notwithstanding, and the granting, giving or waiving of any one or more of such consents shall not render unnecessary any subsequent consent or consents, nor shall the title thereto, or right, interest or property therein pass to or vest in any other person or corporation whatsoever, either by the act of the Company or by operation of law, whether under the provisions of the statutes relating to the consolidation, merger or reorganization of corporations or otherwise, unless, in addition to obtaining the above consent of the Board, the proposed successor in title to the rights of the Company shall file with the Board an instrument under seal, agreeing to assume and be bound by each and all of the terms and conditions of this contract and agreeing to waive any more favorable conditions created by its charter or any statute relating to the consolidation, merger, or reorganization of corporations or otherwise. The filing of such agreement shall constitute a condition precedent to the passing to or vesting in such proposed successor in title to the rights of the Company of the rights and privileges hereby granted, or of any portion thereof, or of any right, interest or property therein. In case of the failure of such proposed successor in title to the rights of the Company to file such agreement within sixty (60) days after the date on which such succession in title is to take effect, the right and privilege hereby granted may be forfeited, or the consent of the City provided for herein may be revoked by resolution of the Board.

Fifth.—Upon the termination of the original term of this contract, or if the same be renewed, then at the termination of the said renewal term, or upon the termination or forfeiture of the right and privilege hereby granted for any cause, or upon the dissolution of the Company before such termination, the tracks and other property of the Company constructed or existing pursuant to this contract within the streets shall become the property of the City without cost, and the same may be used or disposed of by the City for any purpose whatsoever, or the same may be leased to any company or individual.

If, however, at any time preceding the date upon which this contract shall terminate, the Board shall so order by resolution and give notice to the Company, the Company shall, upon the termination of this contract, remove any and all of its tracks and other property constructed or existing pursuant to this contract and the said streets shall be restored to their original condition at the sole cost and expense of the Company.

Sixth.—The Company shall commence and complete the construction of the tracks and appurtenances herein authorized within three (3) years from the date upon which this contract is signed by the Mayor, otherwise this right and privilege shall cease.

Seventh.—The tracks hereby authorized shall be constructed and maintained across Western avenue upon a bridge or viaduct. The Company shall pay the entire cost of the construction and maintenance of such tracks and bridge or viaduct and in addition shall pay the following:

(a) The cost of the protection of all surface and subsurface structures which shall be in any way disturbed by the construction, reconstruction, repair or removal of such tracks, and the bridge or viaduct.

(b) All changes in sewer or other subsurface structures made necessary by the construction, reconstruction, repair or removal of the said tracks and the bridge or viaduct including the laying or relaying of pipes, conduits, sewers or other structures.

(c) The replacing or restoring the pavement in said street which may be disturbed during the construction, reconstruction, repair or removal of the tracks, and the bridge or viaduct.

(d) The inspection of all work during the construction, reconstruction, repair or removal of the tracks, and the bridge or viaduct, as herein provided, which may be required by the President of the Borough of Richmond and the Commissioner of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity.

Eighth.—Before the work of construction, reconstruction, repair or removal shall be begun the Company shall obtain permits to do the work from the President of the Borough of Richmond and from the Commissioner of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity. The Company shall perform all the duties which may be imposed upon it by these officials, as conditions of such permits, provided such conditions are not inconsistent with the provisions of this contract. The Company shall submit to these officials working plans, which shall include and show in detail the method of construction, reconstruction, repair or removal of said railroad tracks and the bridge or viaduct, and the mode of protection of or changes in all subsurface structures required by such construction, reconstruction, repair or removal.

Ninth.—The bridge or viaduct to be constructed under this contract shall, subject to the approval of the President of the Borough of Richmond, be constructed in a single span from house-line

to house-line, and there shall not be any supporting columns erected in the street. Such bridge or viaduct shall have a vertical clearance of not less than sixteen (16) feet above the surface of said street at the center line thereof and shall have drip pans placed under the same for the entire width of the street. The said tracks and bridge or viaduct shall be constructed, maintained and operated at the expense of the Company, subject to the supervision, control and inspection of the proper authorities of the City who have jurisdiction over such matters under the Charter of the City or under this contract.

Tenth.—Should the grade or lines of Western avenue be changed at any time during the term of this contract, whether original or renewal, the Company shall, at its own cost and expense, change or reconstruct the said bridge or viaduct under the supervision of the proper authorities of the city so that there shall be at all times a vertical clearance of not less than sixteen (16) feet above the surface of the street at the center line thereof, and that no portion of the piers or abutments of said bridge or viaduct shall encroach within the lines of said street as changed. Should Western avenue be widened, the Company shall make no claim for, nor shall it be entitled, as against the City, to any compensation or damages by reason of the taking of any portion of the piers or abutments of the bridge or viaduct in condemnation proceedings.

Eleventh.—Free and uninterrupted access to and passage over Western avenue shall be maintained at all times, both during construction and thereafter, unless otherwise directed by the President of the Borough of Richmond, and no cars shall be allowed to stand upon said railroad tracks within the limits of said street.

Twelfth.—This right and privilege is granted on the further and express condition that all laws or ordinances now in force, or which may hereafter be adopted, shall be strictly complied with.

Thirteenth.—This grant is upon the express condition that the Company, within thirty (30) days after the signing of this contract by the Mayor, and before anything is done in exercise of the rights and privileges hereby granted, shall deposit with the Comptroller of the City the sum of two thousand dollars (\$2,000), either in money or securities to be approved by the Comptroller, which fund shall be security for the performance by the Company of all the terms and conditions of this contract and for its compliance with all the orders of the Board and of the officials of the City acting under the powers herein reserved. From the said fund deductions may be made as hereinabove provided.

(a) Should the Company, within such time after notice as may be herein prescribed, or, where no time is prescribed, within such time as the Board or the proper official of the City may hereafter prescribe, fail to comply with the provisions of this contract or with the orders of the Board or of the officials of the City herein named or referred to, relating to

Paving and repairing of the streets,

Protecting the City's structures during the construction, reconstruction, repair or removal of the tracks and bridge or viaduct hereby authorized,

Protecting the Company's tracks, appurtenances or other structures during the performance of any public work or as may be required on account of the changing of the lines or grades of the streets,

Or, for any other provision of this contract which may affect the repair, protection and maintenance of the streets or of the City's structures within the streets,

the City shall have the right to cause the work to be done or the defect remedied and to reimburse itself for the cost of such work by deducting the cost, with interest, from the security fund hereinabove provided for. Such deduction shall be made by the Comptroller upon the direction of the Board.

(b) Should the Company, within ten (10) days after the demand has been made upon it, fail to pay to the City the cost of any alterations to the sewerage or drainage systems occasioned by the construction, maintenance or operation of the tracks and bridge or viaduct hereby authorized, or fail to repay to the City any damages caused to persons or property which the City shall be compelled to pay by reason of the construction, maintenance or operation of the said tracks and bridge or viaduct, or by reason of any acts or defaults of the Company in connection therewith, the City shall have the right to collect such costs or damages, with interest, by deducting the amount of the same, with interest, from the security fund hereinabove provided for. Such deduction shall be made by the Comptroller without further direction of the Board.

(c) Should the Company fail to pay to the City the annual charges required to be paid by this contract, within the time fixed for the payment thereof, the City shall have the right to collect the amount of such charges, with interest, by deducting the same from the security fund hereinabove provided for. Such deduction shall be made by the Comptroller without further direction.

(d) Should the Company fail to comply with the provisions of this contract, or with the orders of the Board or of the officials of the City herein named or referred to, then the Company may be required to pay to the City, as liquidated damages for each breach or violation, the following sums:

For failure to maintain the tracks and bridge or viaduct in good condition throughout the whole term of this contract, the sum of two hundred and fifty dollars (\$250) for each day during which such defect or breach remains. For failure to comply with any other provision of this contract as to which liquidated damages are not fixed herein, the sum of fifty dollars (\$50) per day for each day during which such failure or default shall continue.

All of such sums may be collected by deducting the same from the security fund hereinabove provided for.

The procedure for the collection of such liquidated damages shall be as follows:

Whenever the Board shall have knowledge of any such breach or violation on the part of the Company, the Board shall give notice to the Company, specifying the nature of such breach or violation and the amount of liquidated damages which it is proposed to collect therefrom, and directing its President or other officer to appear before the Board on a certain day not less than ten (10) days after the service of such notice, to show cause why the Company should not be required to pay such liquidated damages in accordance with the foregoing provisions.

Section 5. The Company promises, covenants and agrees to conform to and abide by and perform all the terms, conditions and requirements in this contract fixed and contained,
