## **CONFLICTS WORDLE SOLUTION**

The answer is TRUST, which relates to ethics in two ways:

First, trusts, as a financial instrument, are outlined in a few places in the law. Placing one's assets into a <u>blind trust</u>, for instance, permits a City employee to retain what would otherwise

be prohibited ownership interests (typically, a prospective high-level appointee with an extensive stock portfolio who doesn't wish to sell the stocks before taking the City position). And <u>legal defense trusts</u> provide the means for public servants with certain types of legal troubles to raise and spend money from private donors without running afoul of the conflicts of interest law's restrictions on valuable gifts and misuse of position.

Secondly, as many of you noted, the very first sentence of our law is the entire reason for there to even be a Chapter 68, and a COIB: *Public service is a public trust*.
