



HEALTH DEPARTMENT OF THE CITY OF NEW YORK,  
NEW YORK, January 6, 1880.

The Board of Health met this day.

#### Reports.

Conditional permit granted for premises No. 2162 First avenue:

Whereas, There exists an open space on the southerly side thereof not likely to be occupied by buildings, and also a strip of land fourteen inches wide, which strip is claimed by the owner of said property and is not built upon; therefore, on application made to this Board by said owner, be it

Resolved, That the plan (No. 348-2) for light and ventilation of the tenement house proposed to be built at No. 14 Fifth avenue, submitted to this Board under Laws 1867, chapter 908, and Laws 1879, chapter 504, by William H. Hume, be and is hereby approved.

Resolved, That the plan (No. 351) for light and ventilation of the tenement house proposed to be built at No. 317 Bowery, submitted to this Board under Laws 1867, chapter 908, and Laws 1879, chapter 504, by F. W. Klempt, be and is hereby disapproved.

Resolved, That the plan (No. 352) for light and ventilation of the tenement house proposed to be built on the south side of West Fifty-second street, 200 feet east of Ninth avenue, submitted to this Board under Laws 1867, chapter 908 and Laws 1879, chapter 504, by William Kuhles, be and is hereby approved.

Resolved, That the plan (No. 353) for light and ventilation of two tenement houses proposed to be built at Nos. 224 and 226 East Fifteenth street, submitted to this Board under Laws 1867, chapter 908, and Laws 1879, chapter 504, by Thom & Wilson, be and is hereby approved.

Resolved, That the plan (No. 354) for light and ventilation of the tenement house proposed to be built on the east side of Ninth avenue, 75 feet south of Sixtieth street, submitted to this Board under Laws 1867, chapter 908, and Laws 1879, chapter 504, by Waterbury Jefferson, be and is hereby approved.

Resolved, That the plan (No. 355) for light and ventilation of five tenement houses proposed to be built on the east side of Lexington avenue, commencing on the northeast corner of One Hundred and Tenth street, submitted to this Board under Laws 1867, chapter 908, and Laws 1879, chapter 504, by H. Meehan, provided that a ventilating shaft two feet wide and at least twelve square feet area be constructed in each of the inside houses to light and ventilate the bed-rooms, and a ventilating shaft of four square feet area in the clear be constructed for the water-closets in each of said five houses, be and the said plan is hereby approved.

#### Sanitary Bureau.

The following is a report of the work performed by the Sanitary Bureau for the week ending January 3, 1880:

The total number of inspections made by the Sanitary and Assistant Sanitary Inspectors was 1,543, as follows, viz.: 797 tenement houses, 50 private dwellings, 44 other dwellings, 11 manufacturing and workshops, 19 stores and warehouses, 39 stables, 14 slaughter-houses, 1 lime-kiln, 2 manure dumps, 1 garbage dump, 1 glycerine works, 1 dangerous building, 17 sunken and vacant lots, 1 bone-house, 59 yards, courts, and areas, 60 cellars and basements, 77 waste-pipes and drains, 191 privies and water-closets, 53 street gutters and sidewalks, 17 dangerous stairways, 1 cesspool, 5 smoky chimneys, 1 piggery, 34 other nuisances, together with 57 visits of the Sanitary Inspectors to cases of contagious disease.

The number of reports thereon received from the Inspectors was 779.

During the past week 55 complaints were received from citizens, and referred to the Sanitary Inspectors for investigation and report.

Permits were issued to the consignees of 50 vessels to discharge cargoes, on vouchers from the Health Officer of the Port.

69 permits were granted scavengers to empty, clean, and disinfect privy sinks.

The Disinfecting Corps have visited 53 premises where contagious diseases were found, and have disinfected and fumigated 40 houses, 40 privy sinks, together with clothing, bedding, etc.

Two cases of contagious disease were removed to Hospital by the Ambulance Corps.

#### Bureau of Vital Statistics.

The certificates of 533 births, 43 still-births, 137 marriages, and 508 deaths, reported to have taken place in this city, were received by this Bureau during the week ending Saturday, January 3, 1880. This shows an increase of 60 births, and a decrease of 10 still-births, 49 marriages, and 3 deaths, when compared with the number received during the preceding week, but when compared with the corresponding week of the year 1879, there was an increase of 121 births and 9 still-births, and a decrease of 66 marriages, and 47 deaths. Compared with the mortality reported during the preceding week, the deaths from measles decreased 10; scarlatina, 2; diphtheria, 5; croup, 7; malarial fevers, 4; cancer, 7; marasmus, tabes mesenterica and scrofula, 2; apoplexy, 7; gastritis, enteritis, and peritonitis, 6; Bright's disease and nephritis, 13; suicide, 1; while the deaths from whooping cough increased 4; erysipelas, 1; typhoid fever, 1; cerebro-spinal fever, 1; puerperal diseases, 2; diarrhoeal diseases, 2; inanition, 6; phthisis pulmonalis, 10; bronchitis, 2; pneumonia, 7; heart diseases, 7; aneurism, 3; hydrocephalus and tubercular meningitis, 1; meningitis and encephalitis, 11; convulsions, 3; all diseases of the brain and nervous system, 13; cirrhosis and hepatitis, 5; cyanosis and atelectasis, 2; premature and preterm births, 4; drowning, 1. The number of deaths from alcoholism and rheumatism and gout was the same as that reported for the past week.

Deaths from the principal Zymotic Diseases, Phthisis Pulmonalis, Pneumonia, Bronchitis, and Children under five years of age, reported during the week and compared with the three preceding weeks.

The ages of 114 of the persons who died during the week were reported to be under one year; 157 under two years; 196 under five years, and 45 seventy years and over, which shows that the deaths of children under five years of age was 6 less than the number reported during last week, and represent 38.58 per cent. of the total weekly mortality.

Of the total number of deaths reported for the week, 93 were in institutions, 287 in tenement-houses, 119 in houses containing 3 families or less, 6 in hotels and boarding-houses, 2 in rivers, streets, boats, etc.; 7 were on the basement floor, 97 on the first, 127 on the second, 113 on the third, 54 on the fourth, 1 on the fifth, 1 on the sixth. 505 were stated to be residents of New York City, and 3 non-residents. 60 were stated to be single, 141 married, 59 widowed, and the condition of 248 was not stated; these were children who had not attained a marriageable age.

The total number of burial permits issued during the week are as follows, viz.: City deaths, 508; still-births, 43; bodies in transit, 21. Of the total burial permits issued for city deaths and still-births 53 were upon certificates received from the Coroners. 533 births, 137 marriages, 43 still-births, 508 deaths, 21 applications for transit permits were recorded, indexed, and tabulated. 34 searches of the registers of births, marriages, and deaths were made, and 3 transcripts of the birth record, 6 of marriage, and 14 of death were issued during the week.

The mean temperature for the week ending January 3, 1880, was 36.5 degrees Fahr., the mean reading of the barometer was 30.105, the mean humidity was 80, saturation being 100, the number of miles traveled by the wind was 1,166, and the total amount of rain-fall was 0.29 inch depth of water, as reported by D. Draper, Director of the New York Meteorological Observatory, Central Park.

The disposition of 491 deaths and still-births, or 89.11 per cent. of the total number reported, was in the following 14 cemeteries: Bayside (Jewish), 11; Calvary (Roman Catholic), 224; City (pauper burial ground—undenominational), 60; Greenwood (undenominational), 40; Lutheran, (undenominational), 64; Cypress Hills (undenominational), 17; Evergreen (undenominational), 38; Woodlawn (undenominational), 14; St. Michael's (Protestant Episcopal), 8; Union (Methodist Protestant), 1; Holy Cross (Roman Catholic), 5; Machpelah, L. I. (Jewish), 4; St. Raymond's (Roman Catholic), 2; Washington (undenominational), 3.

The distribution of deaths (actual mortality) for the week ending December 27, 1879, was in the following wards, viz.: First, 18; Second, 0; Third, 3; Fourth, 13; Fifth, 7; Sixth, 5; Seventh, 21; Eighth, 17; Ninth, 19; Tenth, 25; Eleventh, 31; Twelfth, 49; Thirteenth, 18; Fourteenth, 13; Fifteenth, 5; Sixteenth, 22; Seventeenth, 33; Eighteenth, 26; Nineteenth, 68; Twentieth, 38; Twenty-first, 45; Twenty-second, 30; Twenty-third, 9; Twenty-fourth, 7.

The actual mortality for the week ending December 27, 1879, was 522; this is 9 less than the number that occurred during the corresponding week of the year 1878, and 7 more than the average of the corresponding weeks of the past five years, and represents an annual death-rate of 24.57 per 1,000 persons living, the population estimated at 1,104,595.

The annual death-rate per 1,000 persons living, of the estimated or enumerated population, according to the most recent weekly returns, of Philadelphia was 15.92; Brooklyn, 19.26; Baltimore, 18.08; New Orleans, 20.30; Charleston, 30.10; Erie, 11.14; Lowell, 21.46; Worcester, 17.83; Cambridge, 22.88; Fall River, 26.80; Lawrence, 8.17; Lynn, 24.12; Springfield, 13.21. Monthly returns—Washington, 19.55; Petersburg, 34.20; St. Paul, 17.37. Foreign cities, weekly returns—London, 30.7; Liverpool, 41.4; Birmingham, 33.4; Manchester, 26.5; Glasgow, 38.2; Edinburgh, 24.1; Dundee, 36.1; Dublin, 44.3; Belfast, 35; Cork, 40; Brussels, 31.6; Antwerp, 31.6; Ghent, 28.4; Buda Pesth, 26.6; Paris, 28.1; Turin, 26; Berlin, 22; Copenhagen, 35; Stockholm, 20.4; Christiania, 30; Amsterdam, 25.2; Rotterdam, 20; The Hague, 23.4; Calcutta, 25.5; Bombay, 31.2; Madras, 34.2; Geneva (with suburbs), 25.4; Basel, 34.1; Bern, 42.4;
