SANITARY BUREAU.

Summary of Work.

The following is a summary of the operations of the Sanitary Bureau, which is charged with the duty of inspecting and reporting in proper form all nuisances or causes of danger to the public health, with the execution of the orders of the Board, and with the care of contagious diseases, for the quarter ending March 31, 1887:

The number of inspections made by the Sanitary Inspectors was 78,648.

The number of causes of complaints returned was 6,580.

The number of complaints received from citizens was 3,113, all of which were referred to the Sanitary Inspectors for investigation and report.

The Sanitary Superintendent during the same period, under instruction and authority of the Board, granted 459 permits to discharge cargoes, upon proper vouchers from the Health Officer of the Port; 481 permits to scavengers to empty privies; 61 permits to land rags (in bulk) under bonds; 15 permits to remove manure from stables in the city; and 84 miscellaneous permits under the Sanitary Code.

During the three months ending March 31, 1887, nine thousand seven hundred and twenty-two (9,722) permits were granted for burials. During the same period one hundred and sixty (160) applications for transit permits were received and permits granted; seven hundred and forty-eight (748) permits were granted for the burial of still-born children; nine hundred and eighty (980) Coroners' certificates were received and recorded; one thousand eight hundred and sixty-six (1,866) searches of the records of births, marriages and deaths were made; and one thousand one

hundred and seventy-five (1,175) transcripts of the records of deaths, one hundred and nine (109) of marriages, and one hundred and twenty-six (126) of births from said records were issued. There were six thousand two hundred and eighteen (6,218) persons registered as married during the quarter, and eight thousand one hundred and seventy-four (8,174) children were born during the same period.

OFFICE OF THE SECRETARY—NOTICES OF THE BOARD.

The notices of the Board for the abatement of nuisances are issued upon the facts and evidence contained in the written reports of the Sanitary Inspectors, the result of personal inspection of premises complained of. During the three months ending March 31, 1887, the number of notices issued by the Board was 3,872. These notices call the attention of owners, lessees and agents to violations of the Sanitary Code in each case, and require the necessary alteration, repair, cleaning, and improvement of the premises named within five days from the receipt of the notice. If, upon re-inspection, it is found that the requirements of the notice have not been complied with, a suit for penalty is commenced against the delinquents under section 82, chapter 335, Laws of 1873.

DEPARTMENT OF DOCKS.

At a special meeting of the Board of Docks, held May 26, 1887.

Present—Commissioners Stark, Matthews and Marshall.

The minutes of the meeting held May 25, 1887, were read and approved.

A communication from the Engineer-in-Chief, requesting three additional Inspectors of dumping of dredged material, was,

On motion, referred to executive session.

The report of the Engineer-in-Chief on Secretary's Order No. 6573, respecting the scale office erected on the bulkhead south of West Twenty-second street, North river, by Archibald Scott, was,

On motion, laid on the table.

The following communications were received, read and

On motion, ordered to be placed on file, action being taken where necessary, as stated, to wit: From J. M. Goetchius—Requesting permission to cut a gangway in string-piece on the outer end of Pier foot of West Thirty-fifth street, North river. Permission granted, provided the written consent of the Pennsylvania Railroad Company is first filed in this Department; the work to be done under the direction and supervision of the Engineer-in-Chief.

From H. L. Herbert & Co.—Requesting permission to replace fender piles at Pier near the foot of East Fifty-third street, East river. Permission granted, the work to be done under the direction and supervision of the Engineer-in-Chief.

From Old Dominion Steamship Company—Requesting permission to erect four awning-posts in front of shed on Pier, new 26, North river, to remain during the months of June and July. Permission granted, the said awning-posts to be placed thereat under the direction and supervision of the Engineer-in-Chief of this Department, and to be and remain during the months of June and July, unless otherwise ordered by the Board.

From F. P. Eastman—Reporting that the upper corner of dumping-board foot of Sixty-fourth street, East river, overhangs the trench dug for sewer. The action of the President in directing the Engineer-in-Chief to take the necessary action to protect said dumping-board was approved.

From Engineer-in-Chief:

1st. Reporting repairs required to Pier foot of Thirty-third street, East river. The President authorized to notify the East River Ferry Company, lessees, to make the repairs required, in accordance with the terms and conditions of the lease, and under the direction and supervision of the Engineer-in-Chief of this Department.

2d. Report on Secretary's Order No. 6600, respecting the damage done to Pier 51, East river. The action of the President directing the New York, New Haven and Hartford Railroad Company, lessees, to repair, under the direction and supervision of the Engineer-in-Chief, was approved.

3d. Reporting repairs required to Pier 14, North river. The President authorized to notify the Central Railroad Company of New Jersey, lessees, to repair, under the direction and supervision of the Engineer-in-Chief of this Department.

4th. Report on Secretary's Order No. 6555, in reference to the application of Capt. Theo. F. Kane, commanding U. S. S. "Minnesota," requesting repairs and Croton water supply on Pier, new 57, North river.

On motion, the Engineer-in-Chief was directed to repair the sheathing on the deck, and the steps at the south side of the Pier, as recommended in his report, at a cost of about \$210, and the remainder of the application was denied.

The report of the Engineer-in-Chief on Secretary's Order No. 6557, respecting the application of the East River Bathing Company, requesting permission to berth floating bath in front of the bulkhead between Water and Cherry streets, East river, was,

On motion, ordered to be placed on file. Permission granted to berth bath at the said bulkhead, to remain during the will of the Board, provided a space of forty feet is maintained between the bath and the southerly side of Pier 55, East river.

The application of Frank E. Bean for use of bulkhead foot of Forty-second street, East river, with permission to erect ice-bridge thereat, was,

On motion, ordered to be placed on file. Permission granted, to be and remain thereat only during the will of the Board, at a compensation of \$3 per day for each and every day, payable weekly in advance to the Dock Master of the District, the work of erecting the ice-bridge to be done under the direction and supervision of the Engineer-in-Chief of this Department.

The following preambles and resolutions were,

On motion, adopted.

Whereas, This Board did, on the 6th day of April, 1887, adopt a resolution requesting the Hon. Chauncey M. Depew, President of the West Shore and Ontario Terminal, the West Shore Railroad Company, and the New York Central and Hudson River Railroad Company, to inform the Board at what price the owners of one-half of Pier No. 33, old number, North river, and of one-half of Pier No. 34, old number, North river, and the bulkhead between said piers, would convey a clear title to the said property to the Corporation of the City of New York; and

Whereas, On the 26th day of May, 1887, the Board received a communication from the Hon. Chauncey M. Depew, President, stating that the owners of one-half of Pier No. 33, old number, North river, and one-half of Pier No. 34, old number, North river, and of the bulkhead between the said piers, do not desire to sell the same, or any part thereof, and therefore respectfully decline to agree upon a price for the purchase thereof; and

Whereas, This Department deems it proper to acquire, and is desirous of acquiring, in the name and for the benefit of the Corporation of the City of New York, the title and possession of one-half of Pier, old No. 33, North river, and one-half of Pier, old No. 34, North river, and the bulkhead between, together with all the rights, terms, easements and privileges pertaining thereto or connected therewith; and

Whereas, No price can be agreed upon between the owners of said property and this Department for the purchase thereof; therefore, be it

Resolved, That the Counsel to the Corporation of the City of New York be and he is hereby directed to take legal proceedings to acquire said property rights, terms, easements and privileges for the Mayor, Aldermen and Commonalty of said city, as required by law in such cases made and provided.

Resolved, That the permit issued on the 4th day of May, 1887, to James H. Caulfield, agent of the Haverstraw Brick Company, to use and occupy the Pier foot of West Seventeenth street, North river, be and hereby is revoked, to take effect May 31, 1887, and the Dock Master of the District be and hereby is directed to take charge of and collect all wharfage that may accrue thereat after that date.

Resolved, That the compensation for the use of bulkhead foot of East Fourteenth street, East river, under permit issued to Peter McCullough on the 16th day of April, 1887, be and hereby is increased to \$5 per week, payable weekly to the Dock Master of the District, to take effect from and after Monday, May 30, 1887.

AT A MEETING OF THE BOARD OF HEALTH of the Health Department of the City of New York, held at its office, No. 301 Mott street, May 19, 1887, the following resolution was adopted:

Resolved, That section 95 of the Sanitary Code be and is hereby amended so as to read as follows:

Section 95. That it shall be the duty of every owner, tenant, lessee and occupant of any and every building, or place of business in the generally built-up portions of the City of New York, forthwith to provide or cause to be provided, and at all times thereafter to keep and cause to be kept and provided, within such building or place of business, suitable and sufficient boxes, barrels or tubs for receiving and holding without leakage, and without being filled to within four inches of the top thereof all the ashes, rubbish, garbage, and liquid substances, of whatever kind, that may accumulate during thirty-six hours, from said building or place of business, or the portion thereof of which such person may be the owner, tenant, lessee or occupant; and every such box, barrel and

tub designed to hold ashes shall be made of or lined with some suitable metal. That a separate vessel shall be provided for ashes and rubbish, and another for garbage and liquid substances; and all ashes, rubbish, garbage and liquid substances that should be removed from such buildings and place of business, or from that part for which said receptacles were provided, and none other (without the proper consent) shall be placed therein, and no such box, barrel or tub, before or after it is emptied, shall be placed or permitted to remain upon the open sidewalk between the curb and the area or stoop-line, or in any other public place, but may be kept within and between the stoop or area-line and the house-line of the premises to which it belongs, until removed therefrom for emptying by the authorized employees of the Department of Street Cleaning, and by them returned to the place whence it was taken.

NOTICE TO CROTON WATER CONSUMERS.

NUMEROUS APPLICATIONS HAVE BEEN made to this Department by citizens claiming reductions or rebates on bills for water supplied through meters, on the alleged ground of leakage caused by defective plumbing and worn-out service pipes, or by willful waste of water by tenants allowing the faucets to be turned on in full force in water-closets, sinks, etc., without the knowledge or consent of the owners of the premises.

The main object of the use of water-meters is to enable this Department to detect and check the useless and unwarrantable waste of an element so valuable and essential to the health and comfort of all the citizens, and this object can only be accomplished by enforcing payment for the water wasted.

Under the law all charges for water supplied through meters are a lien against the respective premises, and the law therefore holds the owner of the premises responsible for the amount of water used or wasted.

Notice is therefore given to all householders that, in all further applications for reduction of water rents, no allowance will be made on account of waste of water occurring through leaks, from defective service pipes or plumbing, or wasteful use of water by tenants or occupants of buildings, though such leakage or waste may have occurred without the knowledge or consent of the owners of the buildings.

House-owners are further notified that whenever their premises become vacant, and are likely to remain vacant, they must notify this Department in writing, and that unless this requirement is complied with no deductions in extra water rents will be allowed for any portion of one year.

APPLICATIONS FOR EXEMPTIONS WILL BE heard here, from 9 to 4 daily, from all persons hitherto liable or recently serving who have become exempt, and all needed information will be given.

Those who have not answered as to their liability, or proved permanent exemption, will receive a "jury enrollment notice," requiring them to appear before me this year. Whether liable or not, such notices must be answered (in person, if possible, and at this office only) under severe penalties. If exempt, the party must bring proof of exemption; if liable, he must also answer in person, giving full and correct name, residence, etc. etc. No attention paid to letters.

Persons "enrolled" as liable must serve when called or pay their fines. No mere excuse will be allowed or interference permitted. The fines if unpaid will be entered as judgments upon the property of the delinquents.

All good citizens will aid the course of justice, and secure reliable and respectable juries, and equalize their duty by serving promptly when summoned, allowing their clerks or subordinates to serve, reporting to me any attempt at bribery or evasion, and suggesting names for enrollment. Persons between sixty and seventy years of age, summer absentees, persons temporarily ill, and United States and District Court jurors are not exempt.

Every man must attend to his own notice. It is a misdemeanor to give any jury paper to another to answer. It is also punishable by fine or imprisonment to give or receive any present or bribe, directly or indirectly, in relation to a jury service, or to withhold any paper or make any false statement, and every case will be fully prosecuted.
