

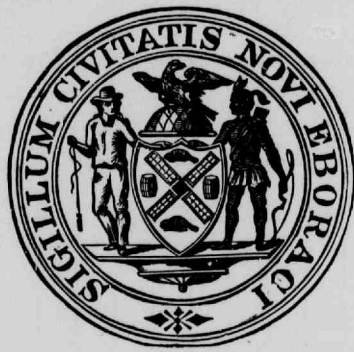

The Board of Health met this day.

Reports Received.

Sanitary Bureau.

The following is a record of the work performed in the Sanitary Bureau for the week ending March 23, 1878. The total number of inspections made by the Sanitary and Assistant Sanitary Inspectors was 1,724, as follows, viz.:

1 public building, 771 tenement-houses, 144 private dwellings, 106 other dwellings, 20 manufactories and workshops, 17 stores and warehouses, 49 stables, 37 slaughter-houses, 2 manure dumps, 1 garbage dump, 1 fat-rendering establishment, 1 stream, 27 sunken and vacant lots, 42 yards, courts, and areas, 65 cellars and basements, 190 waste-pipes and drains, 127 privies and water-closets, 21 streets, gutters, and sidewalks, 3 dangerous stairways, 10 cesspools, 3 smoky chimneys, 1 piggery, 8 other nuisances, together with 77 visits of the Sanitary Inspectors to cases of contagious diseases.

The number of reports thereon received from the Inspectors was 606.

During the past week 114 complaints were received from citizens and referred to the Sanitary and Assistant Sanitary Inspectors for investigation and report.

Permits were issued to the consignees of 53 vessels to discharge cargoes, on vouchers from the Health Officer of the Port.

90 permits were granted scavengers to empty, clean, and disinfect privy-sinks.

The Disinfecting Corps have visited 66 dwellings where contagious diseases were found, and have disinfected and fumigated 58 houses, 58 privy-sinks, together with clothing, bedding, etc.

2 persons sick with contagious disease were removed to the hospital by the Ambulance Corps.

During the week ending March 23, 1878, there were issued from this Bureau 567 burial permits for city deaths, 20 for bodies in transit, and 40 for the interment of still-born infants. There were recorded 567 deaths, 110 marriages, 507 births, 40 still-births, and 56 returns from cor-

oners. There were 25 searches of the registers of births, marriages, and deaths, and 3 transcripts of birth record, and 22 of death were issued from this Bureau.

SIR—567 deaths were reported to have occurred in this city during the week ending Saturday, March 23; this is an increase of 84 as compared with the preceding week, and 69 more than the number reported during the corresponding week of 1877. The actual mortality for the week ending March 16 was 520, which is 38.2 below the average for the corresponding weeks of the past five years, and represents an annual death-rate of 25.05 per 1,000 inhabitants, the population estimated at 1,079,221.

The principal increase of mortality during the past compared with the previous week was as follows: phthisis pulmonalis, 23; pneumonia, 12; diphtheria, 10; marasmus and scrofula, 9; cancer, 8; Bright's disease and nephritis, 7; measles, 6; scarlatina, 1; whooping cough, 2; erysipelas, 2; typhoid fever, 2; malarial fevers, 4; inanition, 4; rheumatism and gout, 1; bronchitis, 3; diseases of the heart, 4; aneurism, 1; hydrocephalus and tubercular meningitis, 4; enteritis, gastritis, and peritonitis, 1; premature and preterm births, 5; children under five years of age, 28; suicide, 4; while the following diseases showed a decrease, viz.: croup, 5; puerperal diseases, 3; diarrhoeal diseases, 3; alcoholism, 3; diseases of the brain and nervous system, 10; and drowning, 1.

The following 8 diseases were the most fatal during the past week; these, compared with the preceding week and the corresponding week of 1877, are as follows:

Of the total number of deaths reported for the week, 113 were in institutions, 264 in tenement houses, 180 in houses containing three families or less, 3 in hotels and boarding-houses, 7 in rivers, boats, streets, etc.; 7 were on the basement floor, 115 on the first, 98 on the second, 54 on the third, 15 on the fourth, 2 on the fifth; there were no deaths of non-residents during the week, 83 were stated to be single, 134 married, 55 widowed, and the condition of 248 was not stated, these were children who had not attained a marriageable age.

The disposition of 544 deaths and still-births, or 89.62 per cent. of the total number reported, was in the following 14 cemeteries: Bayside (Jewish), 9; Calvary (Roman Catholic), 218; City pauper burial-ground (undenominational), 86; Greenwood (undenominational), 54; Lutheran (undenominational), 81; Cypress Hills (undenominational), 20; Evergreen (undenominational), 32; Woodlawn (undenominational), 15; St. Michael's (Protestant Episcopal), 7; Union (Methodist Protestant), 6; Holy Cross (Roman Catholic), 2; Machpelah, L. I. (Jewish), 2; St. Raymond's (Roman Catholic), 5; Washington (undenominational), 7.

The distribution of deaths for the week ending March 16, was in the following wards, viz.: First, 3; Second, 0; Third, 0; Fourth, 9; Fifth, 8; Sixth, 12; Seventh, 22; Eighth, 16; Ninth, 21; Tenth, 24; Eleventh, 28; Twelfth, 43; Thirteenth, 9; Fourteenth, 14; Fifteenth, 19; Sixteenth, 22; Seventeenth, 37; Eighteenth, 30; Nineteenth, 77; Twentieth, 39; Twenty-first, 32; Twenty-second, 44; Twenty-third, 8; Twenty-fourth, 3.

The mean temperature for the week ending March 23, 1878, was 42.7 degrees Fahr., the mean reading of the barometer was 29.824, the mean humidity was 62, saturation being 100, the number of miles traveled by the wind was 1531, and the total amount of rain-fall was 0.84 inches depth of water, as reported by D. Draper, Director of the New York Meteorological Observatory, Central Park.
