Hon. WM. H. WICKHAM, Mayor of the City of New York:

SIR—In pursuance of section 27, chapter 335, Laws of 1873, I have the honor herewith to submit the Quarterly Report of the transactions of this Department for the quarter ending September 30, 1875.

By an examination of the annexed exhibits it will be seen that 161 plans for the proposed erection of 297 new buildings have been submitted to the Department for examination and approval during the last three months. Of these plans 157 were approved and 4 rejected. The classification of the same is as follows:

The estimated cost of the foregoing new buildings is \$3,198,870.

The number of new buildings commenced is 301; the number completed, 374; and the number in progress on September 30, 1875, 746.

In addition to the new buildings proposed during the quarter, there were 252 plans for alterations, comprising 260 buildings, offered for approval, and of these 241 were approved and 11 rejected.

There were 232 alterations commenced, and 367 completed, and 198 are now in progress.

The estimated cost of the alterations proposed is \$718,485, which, together with \$3,198,870 proposed to be expended in new buildings, makes a sum total of \$3,917,355 proposed to be expended in new buildings and alterations.

UNSAFE BUILDINGS.

The number pending on July 1, 1875, was 204, and the number reported since July 1 was 338; of this number 25 were taken down, 384 repaired and made safe, and 133 are in process of removal or repair.

FIRE-ESCAPES.

The number of buildings reported as requiring fire-escapes was 399; of these 173 were made to conform to the law upon notice, and 226 are now in process. The number of this class reported prior to July 1, and since removed, is 351—making a total of 524 fire-escapes provided during the quarter.

COMPLAINTS

received from the public during the quarter, 110; in 38 cases were found no cause, and therefore dismissed; 3 were removed upon verbal notice given by the examining Inspector; 51 proved unsafe buildings, and 18 violations of the various provisions of law, of which the proper parties were notified.

VIOLATIONS.

The number of violations reported during the quarter was 236; of which 187 were removed upon notice; 57 violations reported prior to and pending on July 1st, have been removed, making the total number removed during the quarter 244; 136 cases are now in the hands of the Attorney for prosecution.

IRON WORK.

Arch-girders tested during the quarter, 80; iron beams, 182; and iron lintels, 31. All of which, upon a proper test, were found capable of sustaining the weight proposed to be imposed thereon. For further details of the foregoing facts and figures, I refer to the annexed appendices.

One hundred and twenty-nine thousand two hundred and sixty-three dollars (\$129,263) were expended by the parties in interest in securing and repairing the foregoing buildings. In consequence of the neglect or refusal of the proper parties to comply with the orders of the Department within the time prescribed, it has been necessary to order and hold legal surveys in fourteen (14) cases.

Seven hundred and seven (707) notices of unsafe buildings, consisting of “cautionary or first notices,” “second notices,” “notices and summonses,” etc., were issued and served during the last three months. The location and disposition of the unsafe buildings reported may be found by reference to Exhibit “H,” appended.

BUREAU OF FIRE-ESCAPES AND IRON WORK.

SIR—I herewith respectfully submit a report of the operations of this Bureau for the three months ending September 30, 1875.

The number of buildings reported as requiring fire-escapes was three hundred and ninety-nine (399). Of these one hundred and seventy-three (173) were made to conform to the law upon notice, and two hundred and twenty-six (226) are now under process.

The cases of this class reported prior to July 1, 1875, and since removed, is three hundred and fifty-one (351).

During the quarter seventy cases have been sent to the Attorney for prosecution, and one thousand three hundred and ninety-four (1,394) notices issued. The excess of notices issued over the number of cases reported may be accounted for by the fact that the agent or lessee, in addition to the owner, have to be notified; and when the proper parties are not found, or are non-residents, notices are mailed to their address, if known, and copies posted on the buildings.

By referring to Exhibit “I,” it will be noticed that there are five hundred and one (501) cases still in progress of removal. Most of these are cases for which contracts are out and fire-escapes being made, and also cases which require painting and repairing. A large number of cases are yet in litigation.

In addition to the three hundred and ninety-nine (399) buildings reported for fire-escapes, eighty-nine (89) churches have been reported during the quarter as requiring the doors thereof to be so

altered as to open outward, making a total of three hundred and sixty-nine (369) churches in all, reported for this purpose during the year; of which one hundred and eighty-five (185) have complied with the requirements of the Department, leaving a balance of one hundred and eighty-four cases of this class still in process of removal.

During the quarter six thousand seven hundred and twenty-seven (6,727) buildings have been examined by the Inspectors of this Bureau, and, except those reported, have been found to be provided with fire-escapes, or not requiring any additional means of escape in case of fire.

No. 7. Both sides of Sixty-sixth street, between the Boulevard and Tenth avenue.

No. 8. Both sides of Fifty-third street, between First avenue and East river; and on westerly side of Avenue A, between Fifty-third and Fifty-fourth streets.

No. 9. Both sides of Sixtieth street, between Tenth and Eleventh avenues; and on westerly side of Tenth avenue, between Sixtieth and Sixty-first streets; and the easterly side of Eleventh avenue, between Fifty-ninth and Sixty-first streets.

No. 10. Both sides of Ninety-first street, between Fourth and Madison avenues; and on westerly side of Fourth avenue, between Ninetieth and Ninety-second streets.

No. 11. Both sides of Mangin street, between Delancey and Rivington streets.

No. 12. Both sides of Twenty-fourth street, between Second and Third avenues.

No. 13. Both sides of One Hundred and Twenty-fourth street, between Sixth and Seventh avenues.

No. 14. On the north side of Twentieth street, between Tenth and Eleventh avenues, and on the west side of Tenth avenue, and east side of Eleventh avenue, between Twentieth and Twenty-first streets.
