THE NEW YORK PUBLIC LIBRARY, ASTOR, LENOX AND TILDEN FOUNDATIONS.

Report for the Year Ending June 30, 1912.

New York, October 15, 1912.

Hon. WILLIAM J. GAYNOR, Mayor of The City of New York:

Sir—In accordance with the provisions of article six of the lease and agreement entered into between The City of New York and The New York Public Library, Astor, Lenox and Tilden Foundations, for the use and occupation of the library building in Bryant Park, bearing date of December 8, 1897, I have the honor to submit herewith a detailed report of the operations and transactions of the Library, and of all its receipts and payments for the year ending with the 30th day of June, 1912.

When this agreement was made the fiscal year ended June 30. This has since been changed so that the fiscal year coincides with the calendar year and the full report of the operations of the Library has been regularly made for the calendar year as it will be for the year 1912; for this reason it is believed that the following brief statement may be found sufficient.

In the reference department readers and visitors numbered 2,210,324; the number of readers was 377,142, and the number of volumes consulted by these readers 1,311,229. The number of volumes received was 42,369, and the number of pamphlets 57,429. The number of volumes accessioned was 34,238, and of pamphlets 2,087. There are thus available for readers 860,546 volumes and 303,853 pamphlets, an aggregate of 1,164,404 pieces. These, with the 878,089 volumes in the circulation department, give a net total of 2,042,493 volumes and pamphlets for the entire system. The print room contains in the neighborhood of 75,000 prints, the map room about 7,000 maps. There were catalogued 47,265 volumes and 34,710 pamphlets.

Periodicals currently received amount to nearly 7,000 titles. Readers of current periodicals numbered 84,832, and the periodicals consulted by them 169,834.

The printing office set 65,899 card titles, from which were run off 546,680 cards; in addition, 4,236,265 stationery forms and 252,895 single numbers of publications were printed. In the bindery 3,082 volumes were bound, 2,823 rebound, 141 repaired, and 4,964 miscellaneous pieces handled; making a total of 11,010 pieces from January 1 to June 30, 1912, the period during which the bindery has been in operation.

In the circulation department the number of branches remains at 40. The record of volumes in the department has increased from 858,574 to 878,089. The circulation for home use has increased from 7,725,945 to 7,969,160.

There are 976 persons in the employ of the Library; 409 in the reference department, and 567 in the circulation department.

The total expenditures for the year ending June 30, 1912, were \$1,134,020.71; of which \$461,058.01 was spent for the reference department, and \$672,962.70 for the circulation department.

Of the reference department expenditures \$74,171.97, or 16 per cent, went for books, binding, and periodicals; \$295,125.35, or 64 per cent, for salaries; \$91,760.69, or 20 per cent, for all other purposes.

Of the circulation department expenditures \$166,017.69, or 24.5 per cent, went for books, binding and periodicals; \$379,439.29, or 56.5 per cent, for salaries; \$127,505.72, or 19 per cent, for all other purposes. Of the expenditures for this department \$627,403.25 came from the City appropriation.
