My Dear Mr. Whitney—The Committee on Streets of the Women's Municipal League is strongly in favor of the movement to require street cars to stop at the near crossing. We believe it will prevent accidents. Many streets now are "fire streets" and cars stop at the near crossing, and it is quite difficult to know when a street is a "fire street" and when it is not. Besides, when cars are passing each other between crossings, the danger of being run over by those passing behind the near car is exceedingly great.

COMMUNICATIONS FROM CITY, COUNTY AND BOROUGH OFFICERS.

The President laid before the Board the following communication from the Department of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity:

The City of New York, Department of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity, Commissioner's Office, Municipal Building, May 5, 1914.

Hon. GEORGE McANENY, President, Board of Aldermen:

Dear Sir—We are about to fit up a water meter testing station at the North Portland Avenue Yard, Borough of Brooklyn, for which funds have recently been provided.

The principal apparatus is the meter tester, which will cost approximately \$2,100. The only manufacturer of such a machine is the Mueller Manufacturing Company, that furnished the apparatus now in use at the testing station in the 24th Street Yard, Manhattan. Nothing, therefore, would be gained by advertising for bids for a contract for the furnishing of such a machine.

I therefore respectfully request that your Honorable Board authorize the purchase, without public advertising, of a meter tester at an expense not to exceed \$2,100.

The President laid before the Board the following communication from the Corporation Counsel:

City of New York, Law Department, Office of the Corporation Counsel, New York, May 7th, 1914.

To the Honorable the Board of Aldermen, City of New York:

Sirs—This Department is prosecuting an original action in the Supreme Court of the United States entitled the State of New York vs. State of New Jersey and Passaic Valley Sewerage Commission. This suit is now No. 3 on the Docket of Original Actions for the present term of the Supreme Court of the United States.

The record in this case has been completed and consists in over one and one-half million typewritten words, and in addition thereto there are two hundred and twenty exhibits, comprising maps, charts, diagrams, tabulations and voluminous data. This extensive record, together with the exhibits therein, is now in the custody of the Clerk of the Supreme Court of the United States, awaiting an order from this Department to be printed and prepared for submission and argument to the aforesaid tribunal.

The records of cases before the Supreme Court of the United States are printed in Washington, D. C., under the supervision of the Clerk of that Court.

This Department is in receipt of a communication from Mr. James D. Maher, Clerk of the Supreme Court of the United States, in which is set forth the printer's estimate for the printing of this record and the reproduction of the various maps, charts, diagrams, etc., as follows:

"I have had the printer make an estimate of the amount necessary to be advanced by the complainant to cover the Clerk's costs and cost of printing the record in the case of the State of New York vs. the State of New Jersey et al., No. 3 on the docket of original actions for the present term. The estimate is as follows: Clerk's costs, \$4,875, and for printing, \$13,300, making a total of \$18,175."

The amount, \$18,175, does not include the expenses incidental to the preparation and printing of a digest of this voluminous record for the use of the Court during the argument, nor does it include the expenses of the preparation and printing of a brief and a reply brief, all of which are printed under the supervision of the Clerk of the Supreme Court.

The approximate cost and expenditure necessary for all these items will be about \$26,000. The amount specified in the Clerk's letter must be deposited by check with the Clerk of the Supreme Court of the United States before the record in this suit can be printed and prepared for argument before that Court.

This suit was instituted by a bill of complaint praying for an injunction restraining the Passaic Valley Sewerage Commission from constructing and operating a trunk sewer, about twenty-eight miles in length, designed to collect the sewage and trade wastes from thirty-seven municipalities and townships along the Passaic Water Shed. The volume of this septic filth would be over three hundred and sixty million gallons per day discharged south of the Battery at the lower end of Manhattan Island. The daily addition to the present highly polluted waters of New York's Upper Bay of so vast a quantity of putrescent refuse in its most objectionable and injurious condition would menace alike the health and comfort of the citizens of New York, and strike fatally at the commercial pre-eminence of our great port of entry.

There is no appropriation to this Department from which the amount of \$26,000 could be paid for the foregoing purpose and I therefore request that your Honorable Board recommend to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment that the Comptroller be authorized to issue special revenue bonds to an amount sufficient to pay for this item. Dear Sir—I transmit with this a request received from the Fidelity Warehouse Company for a change of the name of that portion of East Street lying between Water and Grand Streets to Water Street.

By reference to the city map you will see that this portion of East Street is a direct continuation of Water Street, although at right angles to it. I think no inconvenience can result from the change of name suggested. The change will apparently be to the commercial advantage of the property owners on East Street, all of whom have joined in the request, and will also avoid embarrassment as to the official numbering of East Street, which at some time in the past has been numbered consecutively from Grand Street north, without leaving any numbers available for the portion of the street south of Grand Street.

The City of New York, Department of Parks, Borough of Queens, May 9, 1914.

The Honorable the Board of Aldermen, City Hall, New York:

Gentlemen—I respectfully request your Honorable Board to approve the issue of special revenue bonds to an amount of \$10,000 to provide for the wages of Laborers and Pruners and Climbers necessary to carry on the maintenance work of the department, which is sorely in need of additional help, and also to care for the transplanting and proper treatment of about forty thousand (40,000) trees in our nursery which have been neglected through lack of adequate help. Our pruning and climbing force consists of only twenty-one men who are kept constantly busy caring for street trees and parks.

Attached find statement of present condition and additional force required.

Pruners and Climbers in Detail—Trees in City streets, 21 men, entire force. Twenty additional men to care for nursery, which includes a stock of 40,000 trees that have to be transplanted, 2,000 of which will be ready to be placed in City streets within the coming year of 1915.

The appropriation of the \$4,500 asked for for the Forester will result in a profit of more than eight times its value, according to the estimates of the Forester. This sum applied to the labor necessary to care for the young trees and transplant them will yield the following result:

Plane—available for 1915—2,000 at \$4..... \$8,000 00
Norway maple, elm, available for 1915, 2,000 at \$5..... 10,000 00
Horse chestnut, available for 1915, 150 at \$5..... 750 00
Pines, Austrian and white, available for 1915, 6,000 at \$3..... 18,000 00

Total..... \$36,750 00

By appropriating \$5,000 a year for the labor necessary to care for the trees in this nursery for the next four years, the City will get a value of more than \$100,000. This yield will come from the delivery of trees of each proper planting size to other boroughs of the City. Under these conditions, it seems necessary, as a business proposition, that the money required by the Forester to care for this stock should be appropriated.

This department returned an unexpended balance of \$5,125.62 in last year's estimate.

The President laid before the Board the following communication from the Commissioner of Street Cleaning.

No. 604.

Office of Commissioner of Street Cleaning, New York City, May 8, 1914.

Hon. GEORGE McANENY, President of the Board of Aldermen:

Dear Sir—After the budget of this Department for the current year had been approved, a contract between the City and the Brooklyn Ash Removal Co., for the

final disposition of ashes, street sweepings and rubbish, in the Borough of Brooklyn, became effective on January 2, 1914. Under this contract a number of the locations of the ash receiving stations in that Borough were changed, and this resulted in an increased length of haul for many of our carts and materially increased the carting cost, the fund for which was fixed on the basis of the length of haul to the receiving stations of the Borough Development Company, which had the former contract. To meet this increased length of haul and to prevent a serious deficit in our carting fund, it is necessary that motor apparatus be employed to the greatest possible extent. Our Budget provides eighty-five hundred dollars (\$8,500) for the purchase of motor apparatus and incidental supplies.

On April 30, 1914, bids were opened for a contract for furnishing four semi-trailers, to be used in connection with three tractors already in our possession. The lowest bid received was \$3,352, and, as I deemed this price excessive, the bids were all rejected.

The Borough Development Company, of 186 Remsen st., Brooklyn, has offered to sell to the City part of the equipment formerly used by it, consisting of nineteen steel body 3-horse dumping trucks of 10 cubic yards capacity each, one 20-yard 2-wheel steel body dumping truck and one Knox-Martin gasoline tractor, consisting in all of 19 horse dumping trucks, one trailer and one tractor, for such price as may be fixed by this and the Finance Department. These trucks may be used either on horse drawn or motor vehicles. They are especially adapted and designed for hauling ashes and garbage.

Representatives of the Finance and Street Cleaning Departments have examined the above vehicles and have fixed the value of the same at the price of \$5,625. The tractor-trailer was built in 1912 and cost original \$5,758; the wagons are five years old and cost originally \$10,450. Instead, therefore, of purchasing four semi-trailers for \$3,352, the Department will be able to procure 20 semi-trailers, and, in addition, a tractor for the sum of \$5,625, or about one-third the original cost, and, besides, will make a considerable saving in the cost of carting.

For the foregoing reasons, I desire to make this purchase at this time in the open market, without public letting, and I hereby request your honorable Board to grant me the power and authority to purchase the said 19 steel body 3-horse dumping trucks, the one 20-yard two-wheel steel body dumping truck and one Knox-Martin gasoline tractor, in the market and without public letting, for the purposes herein stated, at a cost not to exceed, for the twenty-one (21) vehicles mentioned, the sum of fifty-six hundred and twenty-five dollars (\$5,625).

Gentlemen—On April 22, 1914, the Board of Education requested the establishment of rates of compensation for Janitors of five public schools, pursuant to the provisions of section 56 of the Greater New York Charter. In connection therewith we report as follows:

New Public Schools No. 99, Brooklyn, Coney Island and Elm aves., and No. 172, Brooklyn, 4th ave., 29th and 30th sts., are now entirely occupied for school purposes. The Board of Education therefore requests that the compensation of the position of Janitor be increased from the temporary rate of \$150 per month to \$2,952 per annum for No. 99 and \$3,108 per annum for No. 172, in each case the increase to take effect on March 1, 1914. These are the regular rates on the basis of the existing schedule.

New Public School 175, Brooklyn, Blake and Hopkinson aves. and Bristol st., which was occupied for school purposes on April 6th, is entirely filled. The Board of Education requests the fixing of the compensation of the position of Janitor thereof at \$3,984 per annum. This, also, is the regular rate on the basis of the existing schedule.

In Public School 24, Brooklyn, Beaver and Belvidere sts. and Arion place, the Janitor, who was receiving compensation of \$3,216 per annum, has resigned. The Board of Education has assigned Thomas W. Liebold temporarily at a compensation of \$130 per month, and requests the establishment of this rate.

In Public School No. 26, Richmond, Linoleumville, it is proposed to decrease the compensation attached to the position of Janitor from \$2,100 to \$2,032 per annum to take effect April 1, 1914, because of the removal of an electric drain pump.

We recommend the adoption of the attached resolutions granting the requests.

To the Board of Estimate and Apportionment:

Gentlemen—On April 10, 1914, the Commissioner of Docks requested establishment, pursuant to the provisions of section 56 of the Greater New York Charter, of the grade of position of Assistant Confidential Inspector, at \$2,250 per annum, for one incumbent. On April 28, 1914, the request was amended to provide for the establishment of the position of Confidential Inspector, at \$2,250 per annum, for two incumbents. The Bureau of Standards, under date of May 4, reports thereon as follows:

"The Budget of 1914 provides for the salary of two Assistant Confidential Inspectors at \$1,200 per annum each. It is proposed to consolidate the two positions into one at \$2,250 per annum. It is also proposed to change the title of the position of Chief Confidential Inspector, at \$2,250 per annum, to Confidential Inspector at the same rate. The Commissioner states that for the character of the work to be performed, which is confidential, he has not been able to obtain the services of capable men at the \$1,200 rate. He believes that better results can be obtained by the employment of a higher grade man. The Inspectors are to be employed in making special investigations under the immediate direction of the Commissioner and the First Deputy for the purpose of aiding the executive work of the Department. The Commissioner states that with the immense interests entrusted to his care and with the large number of employees under his direction, it is impossible to do without the services of experienced and confidential investigators who can examine into and report upon various details of departmental work. In addition, the Commissioner states he frequently finds it necessary or desirable to investigate conditions upon property held by lessees of the City and he also requires reports upon transportation and traffic conditions. The Inspectors are required to make independent investigations and reports that they may believe to be of importance for administrative purposes. The request for the change in title of the present position of Chief Confidential Inspector is made in order that both incumbents may be employed under the same title. The Commissioner states that if the two positions of Confidential Inspector, at \$2,250 per annum, are established, the positions of Chief Confidential Inspector, at \$2,250 per annum, for one incumbent, and Assistant Confidential Inspector, at \$1,200 per annum, for two incumbents, may be abolished. On the statement of the work to be performed the Bureau of Standards tentatively appraises the value of the services to be performed at, minimum, \$1,800 a year; maximum, \$2,400 a year."

In view of the foregoing facts we recommend the adoption of the attached resolution providing for the establishment of the position of Confidential Inspector, at \$2,250 per annum, for two incumbents, and abolishing the position of Chief Confidential Inspector, at \$2,250 per annum, for one incumbent, and Assistant Confidential Inspector, at \$1,200 per annum, for two incumbents. To the Board of Estimate and Apportionment:

Gentlemen—On March 17, 1914, the Commissioner of Street Cleaning requested modification of four salary schedules for his Department for 1914. On April 27, 1914, he requested a further modification of the same schedules. The Bureau of Standards reports thereon as follows:

"The purpose of the modification is to provide for a Deputy Commissioner at \$6,000 per annum and one Clerk at \$600 to replace one at \$300. To accomplish this it is proposed to abolish five vacant positions amounting to \$6,300.

"In Personal Service, Salaries, Regular Employees, General Administration, No. 2325, Executive, to change the lines Section Foreman, 2 at \$1,200, and Automobile Engineman, \$1,200, to read Deputy Commissioner, \$6,000, and Section Foreman, \$1,200. In Personal Service, Salaries, Regular Employees, General Administration, No. 2326, Audit and Accounts, to change the lines Clerk, \$300, and Clerk, 3 at \$600, to read Clerk, 4 at \$600. In Personal Service, Salaries, Regular Employees, Borough Administration, No. 2330, Brooklyn, to change the line Section Foreman, 36 at \$1,200, to read Section Foreman, 34 at \$1,200; and in Personal Service, Salaries, Regular Employees, Borough Administration, No. 2332, Maintenance of Buildings and Equipment, to change the line Foreman of Mechanics, 4 at \$1,500, to read Foreman of Mechanics, 3 at \$1,500.

"The Clerk at \$600 is to replace a Stableman at \$720 per annum now detailed in the Bureau of Audit and Accounts. There are at present four Stablemen detailed at

the office to perform clerical duties. The Commissioner states that owing to an insufficient force in the clerical staff he is required to detail Stablenmen to perform such duties to properly carry on the business of the office.

"It will be the duty of the Clerk to receive by telephone daily reports from the Foreman of each stable, giving the number of employees reported for duty, the number absent, ill or excused, and to tabulate them. He is also to receive and tabulate written daily reports of Section Foremen, to write out charges preferred against employees, to notify them of the date set for hearing and to keep a record of the disposition of such hearings. A tentative appraisal indicates a minimum of \$600 and a maximum of \$1,050 as proper compensation for the kind of work to be done.

"The request for the additional position of Deputy Commissioner at \$6,000 is in accord with a resolution adopted by your Board on March 13, 1914, concurred in by the Board of Aldermen on April 21, 1914, and approved by the Mayor on April 27, 1914, establishing the grade.

"The Commissioner states that all positions eliminated except that of Foreman of Mechanics will be again requested when sufficient funds can be found to meet the salaries. The Commissioner orally requested that the proposed changes be effective as of May 1, 1914."

In view of the above facts we recommend that the request be granted by the adoption of the attached resolution modifying the salary schedules and making the necessary transfer of funds. Respectfully,

To the Board of Estimate and Apportionment:

Gentlemen—On November 8, 1913, the International Brotherhood of Electrical Workers notified your Board that the wages of journeymen Electricians would be \$4.80 per diem on and after January 1, 1914. The Board could not be assured at that time that rates requested for 1914 would be paid by private employers, and no action was taken. On March 6, 1914, the United Board of Business Agents requested the establishment of the rate of \$4.80 per diem for all mechanics classified as Electricians, and the rate of \$5 per diem for all Machinists. The Bureau of Standards reports thereon as follows:

Matter of Electrical Workers.

"The Budgetary schedules of salaries for 1914 provide for Electrical Workers in fifteen City Departments under the Civil Service titles of 'Electrician,' 'Lineman-Electrician,' 'Wireman,' and 'Lineman.' In the Department of Bridges, where 29 of the 77 Electrical Workers are regularly employed, the title of the position is 'Wireman or Electrician.' In the Department of Docks and Ferries the workers are called 'Wiremen'; in the Department of Education, 'Wireman,' 'Electrician' and 'Lineman-Electrician'; in the Police Department, 'Lineman' and 'Wireman.' All of these employees are Electrical Workers. Many have retained the Civil Service title of 'Wireman' or 'Lineman' for years.

"The increase in the annual rate for Electrical Workers (Electrician, Wireman or Lineman) in City Departments from \$4.50 to \$4.80 per diem, on the basis of the number of days per annum at present allowed, would be as follows:

"Inquiry among private employers of this class of labor developed the following comments:

"Mr. J. P. Ryan, Secretary of the Electrical Contractors' Association of New York, stated as follows:

"The members of the Electrical Contractors' Association employ only union men. Many employers outside our association also pay the union rate. The business is greatly cut up on account of the large number of small employers. According to the list prepared by the Fire Underwriters, there are about 2,000 employers in the Greater City engaged in various lines of electrical work. Hundreds of those are small jobbers, who do repair work. Many of these jobbers are turned out from the manual training schools. When their work justifies it they employ others, who are sometimes helpers, or apprentices, who have served a year at the trade.

"Apprentices are paid \$1.50 per diem. After the first year they become helpers at \$2.20 a day. Each journeyman is supplied with a helper. The helper class is difficult of control, as before they have served full time many of them start out as Electrical Workers for such wages as they can get.

"The 36 members of the Electrical Contractors' Association employ on the average about 30 journeymen each, or nearly 1,100 men, which is a large percentage of the regular journeymen Electrical Workers in the city.

"There are probably not more than 75 electrical contractors in the City who can undertake a job in which much money is involved.

"Certain employers outside of our association who run open shops pay the union rate, when they require skilled men, or where labor conditions demand it.

"We do not now have an annual written agreement with the men, although in a general way we observe the rules of an agreement formerly in existence. The association last July agreed to pay journeymen Electrical Workers \$4.80 per diem, beginning January 1, 1914. The members of our association are paying that rate."

"Mr. C. A. Christesen, President of the Associated Electrical Contractors, stated as follows:

"Members of our association employ on the average about five journeymen each, and run open shops. The number of firms in New York City that employ all-around Electrical Workers is probably not over 800. Those do not include

employers that have electrical engineers and other specialists in various lines. Some of the firms employ only helpers. There are sixteen employers in our association, and they have a total of about 80 journeymen. Our members pay \$3.75 to \$4.50 a day."

"Mr. L. H. Woods, President of the Independent Electrical Contractors' Association, stated as follows:

"There are 25 employers in our association. There are probably not over 150 contractors in the City who may be considered of account in the sense that they regularly employ over two or three journeymen, and who can handle contracts of any size. I do not think the majority of Electrical Workers in Greater New York receive \$4.80 per day. The business is split up, and many employers pay \$3.50 or \$4 as a rule, but when they get a job requiring high class men they pay \$4.80 or more. I cannot state the number of employers in our association who pay \$4.80 a day, or the number of men each employs. Some of the members run open shops.

"I pay the rate of \$4.80 to Electrical Workers, for the reason that the class of work I have requires the best men I can find.

"To some of the 25 journeymen I employ on the average for the year I pay \$5, \$5.50, or \$6. While I pay \$4.80, I feel, of course, that probably 30 per cent. of those men are not worth that rate. This is a dull season, and I have many applications for work from men who are willing to accept \$3.50 or \$4, but I would not employ the majority of men of that class."

"Seventy-one employers outside of the Electrical Contractors' Association, taken at random from lists of electrical firms, replied to inquiries by the Examiner as follows:

The New York Edison Company, Duane Street—

"We employ about 100 wiremen, who are engaged generally at meter setting, but are also detailed to do special electrical work. About 50 per cent. of these men are competent to do all-round electrical work. We pay the men \$3 to \$3.50 per diem. Our men are steadily employed, which is not always the case elsewhere. If injured at their work, they are cared for, and the company offers other advantages not to be found on the outside. For those reasons, men are desirous of employment here, and we can get all the workers we want at the rates paid."

Warren Electric Company, Frankfort Street—

"We have one journeyman at present. We employ more men when we get the work. We always pay the union rate."

Electrical Contracting Company, West 14th Street—

"We have no Electrical Workers now. When work comes in we shall pay the union rate."

J. J. Bigelow Company, West Broadway—

"We employ eight or nine Electrical Workers. We pay \$3.50 to \$4 a day, and run an open shop."

Russell Electric Company, West 42d Street—

"We employ about 10 men on an average. We pay \$4.80 per diem to journeymen Electrical Workers."

R. A. Schoenberg & Co., 5th Avenue—

"We pay Electrical Workers \$3, \$4, \$5 or \$6 a day, according to grade of work done. We do not contract for work on new buildings. We do repair work and employ different classes of workmen. We run an open shop. Will not state the number of men employed here."

Fulton Electric Company, Fulton Street—

"We employ three to five men on the average. We pay Electrical Workers \$4.80 a day, the union rate."

Electrical Repair Company, West 23d Street—

"We pay \$3 to \$4 a day to Electrical Workers, and employ eight to ten men on the average."

James Reilly's Sons Company, Centre Street—

"We pay \$4.50 per diem. While our men are known as Electrical Workers, their work is different from that of the men employed by electrical contractors. Our men work at armatures and motors, and not housewiring. We employ 25 to 30 journeymen."

Franklin Electric Company, 7th Avenue—

"We employ from two to six Electrical Workers, according to the amount of work on hand. This is an open shop, and we pay the men \$3 to \$3.50 per day."

O. K. Electrical Construction Company, Broadway—

"We are paying \$4.50 to Electrical Workers, but will pay \$4.80 when we receive notice that that is the rate. We employ on an average from ten to fifteen journeymen."

Joseph Kircher, West 44th Street—

"I run an open shop, and employ one to four Electrical Workers, according to condition of business. I pay \$3 to \$4 a day to journeymen."

New York Electric Installation Company, West 27th Street—

"We have paid journeymen Electrical Workers \$4.50 per diem, and intend to pay \$4.80 in January, like other contractors. We employ on the average fifteen to twenty men."

Dominger Engineering Company, West 135th Street—

"We pay Electrical Workers \$3 to \$4.80 a day, according to their ability. We run an open shop, and employ three men."

Ideal Electric Contracting Company, East 23rd Street—

"We employ on an average five to ten Electrical Workers. We pay the union rate, which is \$4.80 a day."

Edward May, Broadway—

"I pay Electrical Workers \$3 to \$4 a day. I employ from 10 to 12 men on the average."

L. H. Woods, Jerome Avenue—

"I employ on an average 25 journeymen Electrical Workers. The general rate I pay is \$4.80 a day. Some of my men are paid \$5, \$5.30 or \$6 a day, if the kind of work justifies it."

Great Eastern Electric Company, East 59th Street—

"We pay Electrical Workers \$4.25 a day. We employ on an average about three journeymen."

B. Goldberg, East Broadway—

"I employ six Electrical Workers, and pay them \$3.50 a day."

I. Levinson, West 29th Street—

"I employ three men. This is a union shop. I have been paying \$4.50 a day to Electrical Workers, and will pay \$4.80 when that rate is fixed."

L. Koehler, West 100th Street—

"I employ from three to five Electrical Workers, and pay from \$3 to \$3.50 a day, according to the class of work done."

Peerless Engineering Company, West 27th Street—

"We employ 10 Electrical Workers. We have been paying \$4.50 per diem, but will pay \$4.80 a day, the same as other reputable employers."

Halpern Brothers, West 20th Street—

"We pay Electrical Workers \$3.50 a day, and employ three men."

Thomas C. Miller, Bible House—

"I employ eight to ten Electrical Workers. I have paid \$4.50 a day, but will pay \$4.80 when properly notified that that is the union rate."

George E. Valley and Brother, 9th Avenue—

"We pay all-round Electrical Workers \$4.50 a day, and employ seven or eight journeymen."

Carroll Mulliken, Madison Avenue—

"I employ four men on the average, and pay Electrical Workers \$2.50 up to \$4.50 a day."

Makstein Brothers, Grand Street—

"We employ only helpers; no journeymen Electrical Workers."

"I do not employ journeymen Electrical Workers. I have one helper."

A. D. Standard Utility Company, Bond Street—

"We have no Electrical Workers at present. When we employ any we pay them \$4 a day."

Star Electric Company, 4th Avenue—

"We have one Electrical Worker and one helper. We pay the journeymen \$3.75 a day."

C. C. Bohn Electric Company, 6th Avenue—

"We employ six Electrical Workers on the average, and pay \$4.25 to \$4.50 a day."

A. Abrams, 8th Avenue—

"When I have the work I employ one or two Electrical Workers, and pay them \$4 a day. I have none at present. This is a dull season."

Nathan Klein and Company, Canal Street—

"We pay Electrical Workers \$3.75 a day. We employ four or five journeymen on the average."

T. J. Kaufman, 72nd Street—

"I pay \$4.25 and \$4.50 to journeymen. If the class of work to be done calls for it, we pay Electrical Workers \$4.80 per diem. I employ on the average seven or eight men."

Zenker and Siems, 6th Avenue—

"We employ on the average five Electrical Workers, and pay them \$4.80 per diem."

General Electric Inspection Company, Fulton Street—

"We have paid journeymen Electrical Workers \$4.80 per diem since January 1, 1914. We employ on the average 20 to 25 journeymen."

E. Craske, Columbus Avenue—

"I pay Electrical Workers \$3.50, \$4 and \$4.50 a day, and employ two men."

L. Freed, Jandous, E. E. Co., West 31st Street—

"We employ 20 to 25 Electrical Workers. We pay journeymen \$4.80 per diem."

Jordan Bros., Beckman Street—

"We pay journeymen \$4 to \$4.50 a day and employ six all-round Electrical Workers."

W. D. Munro, West 42nd Street—

"I have paid \$4.80 a day, the union rate, since January 1, 1914. I employ six journeymen Electrical Workers."

Morris Levin and Company, East 55th Street—

"We employ on the average three journeymen. We pay \$3.50 to \$4.80 a day, according to the class of work done."

A. Newberger Electric Company, Myrtle Avenue, Brooklyn—

"We pay \$4.80 per diem to Electrical Workers, and employ seven or eight journeymen on the average."

T. J. O'Rourke, Broadway, Brooklyn—

"I employ about 20 journeymen Electrical Workers on the average, and pay the men \$4.80 a day."

J. T. Whitehead, 6th Avenue—

"I pay Electrical Workers \$4.50 a day and employ six men."

A. Whiteley, John Street—

"I employ five or six journeymen on the average, and pay them \$4.80 per diem."

Guarantee Electric Company, Park Avenue—

"We pay Electrical Workers, \$4.80 a day. We employ four or five men on the average."

Fred C. Ross, Greenwich Street—

"I pay good, all-round Electrical Workers \$3.50 to \$4.50 per diem. I employ six journeymen."

Edward S. Eaton and Company, Hudson Street—

"We employ shopmen on machine work at \$3.50 a day, but all-round Electrical Workers we pay \$4.80. We have four of the latter class."

P. McGinnigle and Son, 6th Avenue—

"We pay from \$2.50 to \$4 a day, or more, if the class of work calls for it. We employ eight men."

Oncida Electric Company, West Broadway—

"We pay on the average \$3.50 a day; seldom higher than that rate. We employ six or seven journeymen."

H. Lauer and Company, 9th Avenue—

"We employ 10 Electrical Workers, and since January 1, 1914, have paid \$4.80 a day."

Muecke-Diegel Company, West Broadway—

"We pay on the average \$3.50 a day, and \$4.50 if the kind of work justifies it. We run an open shop, and employ three or four journeymen."

X. L. Machine and Electric Company, West Broadway—

"We employ 6 Electrical Workers and pay them \$3 per diem."

Dennis G. Brussel, West 38th Street—

"We employ on the average 30 journeymen Electrical Workers and pay \$4.80 per diem. We are not in the Electrical Contractors' Association, but we always pay the same rate as members of that association."

Robert Bernecker, West 45th Street—

"I pay \$3.75 to \$4 a day to Electrical Workers; no more. I employ on the average four men."

Manhattan Electrical Contracting Company, West 17th Street—

"This is an open shop. We pay non-union men \$2.75 to \$3.50 a day. If we have to employ union men on certain work we pay \$4.80. We employ five or six men."

William Truswell & Son, Cedar Street—

"We pay Electrical Workers \$4.80 per diem, and employ about 15 men on the average."

Hunt & Morgan, East 22d Street—

"We have paid journeymen \$4.80 a day since January 1, 1914. We employ 8 men."

Kimball Electric Construction Company, East 23d Street—

"This is a closed shop. We employ 10 to 15 Electrical Workers on the average, and pay them \$4.80 a day."

Stanley & Ruth, East 59th Street—

"We employ on an average about 3 journeymen and pay them \$3.50 to \$4.50 a day."

Mayer & Stern, East 125th Street—

"We employ on an average 40 journeymen, and pay them \$4.80 per diem."

Peter Jansen, East 125th Street—

"I employ one man at jobbing. I do much of the work myself. I pay \$3 to \$4.50, according to the kind of work done."

J. F. Bidstrup & Co., Frankfort Street—

"We pay Electrical Workers \$4.50 a day. We employ on an average 5 journeymen."

Edward B. Stott & Co., Fulton Street—

"We employ 25 journeymen, and since January 1, 1914, we have paid them \$4.80 a day."

Frise & Jantzer, Lexington Avenue—

"We pay journeymen \$4.50 a day, and employ 4 or 5 men on the average."

J. E. Wolfe, Lexington Avenue—

"I pay \$3 a day to journeymen, and employ 4 men on the average."

Henry C. Griffin & Co., Varick Street—

"We employ 8 to 10 Electrical Workers on the average. We pay them \$3.50 to \$4.50 per diem, according to class of work done."

Edwin C. Gee, Wall Street—

"I pay \$4.50 a day now to journeymen, but intend to pay \$4.80, the union rate. I employ on the average 10 to 12 journeymen."

Kendelhardt & Morris, Lexington Avenue—

"We employ on an average 3 Electrical Workers, and pay \$4.80 a day."

M. Schwarzer & Son, 167th Street—

"We pay \$4.80 a day, and employ about 2 men on the average."

F. Sladek, Third Avenue—

"I employ 1 journeyman, and pay him \$4.80 a day."

"One hundred and fifteen employers, with 1,732 journeymen Electrical Workers, report rates of wages paid as follows:

"Matthew J. Horohan, representing the International Brotherhood of Electrical Workers, stated as follows:

"There are probably 600 to 800 small shops in the Greater City, in which locksmithing is combined with electric bell repairing. This class of workers cannot be classed as Electricians who could pass a Civil Service examination for City work. There may be 2,000 men in these shops who should be classed as 'helpers' rather than all-round Electrical Workers."

"In all the newspaper plants of the City, the rate paid is \$5 a day, or \$35 a week for seven days. The theatre managers pay Electricians \$5 a day. The rates vary at the hotels, some men receiving the union scale, while others get part maintenance."

"Outside of the union there are about 500 all-round journeymen Electricians, mostly employed by the Edison Company, the Interborough system, the City Railways system, the Brooklyn Rapid Transit system, the New York Telephone Company, the Western Union Telegraph Company. In these corporations the foremen who direct the work are all-round Electricians, while the workers, as a rule, should be classed as helpers. They do not generally receive the union rate, being mostly men who were out of a job, and were appointed through outside influence."

"Department stores, as a rule, pay the union rate. In large office buildings the engineer usually attends to small breaks in the machinery. If there be a serious break an electrical contractor is called in to make the repairs."

"Paul McNally, representing the Inside Electrical Workers of Greater New York, exhibited to the examiner agreements with 100 electrical contractors of Greater New York whom he stated were paying the union rate of \$4.80 per diem to journeymen."

"Mr. McNally further stated that there are between 3,300 and 3,400 members of the Brotherhood of Electrical Workers in New York of whom over 2,000 are journeymen and the rest helpers."

Matter of Machinists.

"An advance in wages of Machinists in City departments from \$4.50 to \$5 per diem would result in increased annual cost as follows:

"The United Board of Business Agents presents a list of 63 firms which it is claimed 'are paying the prevailing rate of \$5 a day to machinists for an eight-hour workday.'

"The Examiner consulted representatives of 50 out of the 63 firms mentioned. The representatives stated as follows:

Westinghouse Electric and Manufacturing Company, Broadway, Manhattan—

"We employ one all round man in New York City at 45 cents an hour for a nine-hour day, or \$4.05 a day; four machinists at \$3 to \$3.50 a day, and one erector at \$3.50 a day."

American Laundry Machinery Company West 27th Street, Manhattan—

"We pay about six men \$5 a day setting up machinery, shafting, etc. We regard other men receiving a lower rate as helpers."

Ball Engine Company, Cortlandt Street, Manhattan—

"We employ two trained erectors assembling high speed engines for large buildings, and pay them \$5 a day. Helpers receive \$3 a day. We employ no other machinists in New York City."

Westinghouse, Church & Kerr Company, Wall Street, Manhattan—

"On a large contract we may employ a number of New York machinists, and we pay them \$5 a day. We have no shops in New York City. We have no machinists in our employ here at present. The number temporarily employed depends upon the size of the job."

Allis-Chalmers Manufacturing Company, Church Street, Manhattan—

"We have erecting engineers in New York City, but no machinists or machinist erectors. We employ machinists in our shops in the West."

Alvey-Ferguson Company, Church Street, Manhattan—

"We have no machinists at present. When we employ them we pay the union rate."

Ball-Wood Company, Church Street, Manhattan—

"When we have work in this City we employ one or two erectors to supervise the job. Our shop is in Passaic, N. J. We do not regularly employ machinists in New York City."

Exeter Machine Works, Church Street, Manhattan—

"In our business we rarely use machinists in New York City. We have had helpers at \$2.50 or \$3 a day. Steel workers do our class of city work at \$4.50 a day. Our works are in Pennsylvania."

Harrisburg Foundry and Machine Works, Liberty Street, Manhattan—

"We employ two men known by us as erecting engineers, who were originally machinists. We employ them by the month at a rate a little less than \$5 a day. Our shops are in Harrisburg, Pa."

Loomis-Manning Filter Company, 23d Street, Manhattan—

"We usually employ three machinist erectors in New York City, and pay them \$5 a day. Our factory is in Philadelphia."

Massachusetts Fan Company, Church Street, Manhattan—

"Our establishment is in Watertown, Mass. We do not employ machinists directly. We have our work done by contract."

Murphy Iron Works, Broadway, Manhattan—

"Our works are in Detroit, Mich. We run an open shop. We have employed as many as 25 of our erectors here, assisted by laborers. We have at

times employed union machinists, instead of laborers, to save our customers trouble. We have no machinists now in our employ."

James A. Murray, Church Street, Manhattan—
"We do not employ New York machinists. We do our own erection work. Our factory is in Cleveland."

Nordberg Manufacturing Company, Broadway, Manhattan—
"When we have machinery to set up in this city we arrange with a contractor to do the work. Our factory is in Wisconsin. We do not employ machinists in New York City."

Providence Engineering Works, Church Street, Manhattan—
"Our works are in Providence, R. I. We have our own men to assemble machinery in New York City. Occasionally we hire a New York machinist, and pay him \$5 a day."

Skinner Engine Company, Broadway, Manhattan—
"We pay \$5 a day to one union machinist in New York City. Our factory is in Erie, Pa."

Trenton Foundry and Machine Company, Broadway, Manhattan—
"We do not employ machinists in New York City. This is a sales office. Our works are at Trenton, N. J."

Yeager & Bolte, Cliff Street, Manhattan—
"We pay \$5 a day to six outside men on erection work, and \$4.50 a day to three all-round machinists working inside."

Terry Construction Company, West 60th Street, Manhattan—
"We have no machinists in our employ at present. When we have the work we pay the union rate. We have employed as many as 40 machinists at one time."

Fred. W. Wolf Company, Church Street, Manhattan—
"We pay the prevailing rate of wages if the men are all-round workmen. Our factory is in Chicago. We have no machinists now. Occasionally we employ five or six men."

American Ball Chain Works, Wooster Street, Manhattan—
"We employ about 6 machinists on the average for the year. We pay the men \$3 to \$3.50 a day."

American Engine Company, West Street, Manhattan—
"Our works are at Bound Brook, N. J. We employ one or two men for a few days at a time to assemble machinery in New York City. We pay the union rate."

Chelsea Iron Works, West 21st Street, Manhattan—
"We employ on the average 35 to 40 machinists. At times we have 60 men. We set up marine and stationary engines. We pay men on marine work \$3.50 to \$5 a day, and those on stationary work \$5 a day. Our men are all members of the International Association of Machinists."

Dexter Folder Company, Fifth Avenue, Manhattan—
"We employ on the average about 12 machinists in New York City. We pay the men \$4 a day and up, according to ability. We have only union men. Our shops are in Pearl River, Rockland County, New York."

Siegel Machine Company, Third Avenue, Manhattan—
"All-round machinists average about \$3.75 a day. Business is dull now, and as I work myself I get along with one man. When I am busy I employ four or five machinists inside and pay them \$4 a day. Occasionally I employ an erector for two or three weeks at \$5 a day."

Stevens Adamson Manufacturing Company, Church Street, Manhattan—
"Our works are at Aurora, Ill. We have no machinists or erectors now. When we have a job in New York City we have to pay the union rate."

Bottle Capping Machine Company, Broadway, Manhattan—
"We have no machinists in New York City. Our goods are manufactured by a Baltimore firm."

Cutler-Hammer Manufacturing Company, 144th Street, The Bronx—
"We pay machinists \$3 to \$3.25 a day, and employ about 6 men on the average."

Lock Stubb Check Company, 36th Street, Brooklyn—
"We have employed no machinists since last year."

Taylor Stoker Company, Broadway, Manhattan—
"This is a sales office. Our works are in Philadelphia. We employ no machinists in New York City. When we have erecting work the men are paid from the Philadelphia office. I do not know the rate of wages paid."

Troy Laundry Machinery Company, Warren Street, Manhattan—
"We shall have to decline to give the information desired."

F. Wesel Manufacturing Company, Spruce Street, Manhattan—
"We employ approximately 150 men on the average. We pay machinists on inside work \$3.25 and on outside work \$4 per diem."

The Lamson Company, Madison Square, Manhattan—
"We pay machinists \$5 a day, and employ two men on the average the year round."

Ostrander-Seymour Company, Park Row, Manhattan—
"Our factory is in Chicago. We employ no machinists in New York City. If we should have assembling to do here we engage another firm to do the work."

Gitzendammer-Muller Company, Vandewater Street, Manhattan—
"We employ on the average 15 to 20 machinists. We pay \$3.50 to \$5 or \$6 a day, according to ability."

Walter E. Hindle, Franklin Street, Manhattan—
"We pay machinists \$4.50 a day and employ about 15 men on the average."

R. Hoe & Co., Grand Street, Manhattan—
"We employ about 800 machinists. We pay inside men 41 cents an hour, or \$3.28 a day, and outside men 48 cents an hour, or \$3.84 per diem."

Hall Printing Press Company, Church Street, Manhattan—
"Our shops are in New Jersey. When we have work to be done in New York City we employ machinist erectors at \$5 a day."

Johnson & Crowley, Centre Street, Manhattan—
"We pay inside and outside men \$3 to \$3.50 per diem. We employ on the average two or three men."

Kidder Press Company, Broadway, Manhattan—
"Our works are in Dover, N. H. We employ no machinists in New York City. When we have assembling to do here the work is done by another firm."

Lake & Nelson, East 25th Street, Manhattan—
"We pay the union rate of \$4.50 per diem, and employ two or three men on the average."

New York Evening Journal, William Street, Manhattan—
"We have had no machinists for three or four years. We engage with an outside firm to do the work."

New York Times, West 43d Street, Manhattan—
"We pay \$5 per diem to machinists, and employ three men."

A. Peters & Co., Putnam Avenue, Brooklyn—
"We do not employ machinists."

Potter & Johnson Machinery Company, Church Street, Manhattan—
"This is our sales department. Our shop is at Pawtucket, R. I. We do not employ machinists or erectors in New York City."

William J. Ramsaier, Vandewater Street, Manhattan—
"I pay machinists \$3 to \$3.75 a day, and employ three men."

Gus. Ramsaier, William Street, Manhattan—
"I employ two men, and pay them \$22 a week, or \$4 a day."

Seybold Machine Company, Duane Street, Manhattan—
"We decline to give the information desired."

Leonard Scott Publishing Company, West 13th Street, Manhattan—
"We do not employ machinists."

Van Allen & Boughton, Rose Street, Manhattan—
"We employ 15 men on the average. We pay machinists on the outside \$4.25 per diem, and on the inside \$3.50 up."

"The Secretary of the National Metal Trades Association has on record rates of wages paid by other employers, as follows:

James Shewan & Sons, Foot of 27th Street, Brooklyn—
"All round machinists, \$3.25 per diem; number of men employed, 15; 54 hours a week."

Staten Island Shipbuilding Company, Richmond Terrace—
"Number of men employed, 110; 53 hours in shop; 48 hours a week at repair work; average rate, 35 cents an hour; maximum, 39 cents an hour; average per diem, \$3.25."

Delavergne Machine Company, 138th Street, The Bronx—
"Number of men employed, 165; rate of wages paid, \$2.50 to \$3.50 per diem; 5 to 10 men are employed on outside work at \$5 per diem."

M. T. Davidson Company, Nassau Street, Manhattan—
"Number of men employed, 36; rate paid, \$3.50 to \$4 per diem."

Otis Elevator Company, West 26th Street, Manhattan—
"Number of men employed, 53; rate for inside men specialized, \$3 to \$3.25; if a machinist is sent to outside work he receives \$5 a day by arrangement."

Lidgerwood Manufacturing Company, foot of Dikeman Street, Brooklyn—
"Number of men employed, 183; rate paid, \$3 to \$3.25; two erectors, \$3.50 to \$4."

"Other employers with whom the Examiner talked stated as follows:

John N. Robins Company, Beard Street, Brooklyn—
"We employ from 700 to 800 men, and pay \$2.75 to \$3.75 per diem."

Morse Dry Dock and Repair Company, Foot of 56th Street, Brooklyn—
"We pay machinists \$3.25 per diem. We employ 50 to 100 men."

Charles L. Seabury & Co., Morris Heights, Manhattan—
"We employ on the average about 200 machinists. We pay the men \$2.50 to \$4.50, according to ability."

Quintard Iron Works Company, East 12th Street, Manhattan—
"We pay \$2.50 to \$3.50 a day to machinists; nine hours in the shop; eight hours on the outside. We average about 50 men employed."

"Of the 50 employers named by the United Board of Business Agents who responded to the inquiries of the Examiner, 24 firms have their shops or factories outside of New York City. Those who have work at present employ about 40 erectors to assemble machinery brought from a distance. Fourteen out of the 50 employers have no machinists now; seven have their work done by contract, and two out-of-town firms do their own work here.

"A total of about 100 machinists or erectors now employed by those consulted receive \$5 per diem. In busy times the number may reach 200 men.

"Employers named by the Board of Business Agents state that they pay \$3.50 to \$5 a day to 52 men and from \$3 to \$4.50 a day to 1,025 men, a total of 1,077 machinists. Other employers consulted by the Examiner pay rates as follows:

"To 700 men, \$2.75 to \$3.75 per diem; to 236 men, \$3 to \$3.25; to 215 men, \$2.50 to \$3.50; to 200 men, \$3.25; to 200 men, \$2.50 to \$4.50; to 36 men, \$3.50 to \$4; a total of 1,587 machinists.

"Forty per cent. of the machinists employed by the City are in the Department of Docks and Ferries. They do repair work on municipal ferryboats, engines, derricks, and other machinery used by the department.

"While the number of machinists or machinist erectors in Greater New York who receive \$5 per diem may at times reach 200, an offset is here shown of 2,600 men who are paid \$2.50 to \$4.50 a day. The claim that \$5 per diem is the prevailing rate paid to machinists in New York City does not seem to have been substantiated. The present rate of \$4.50 a day paid in the City departments appears to be fair compensation."

Your Board denied a similar request from Electricians and Machinists on November 26, 1913, with a proviso, as follows:

"If it be demonstrated after January 1, 1914, that the rates suggested are being paid by private employers to the majority of electricians and machinists in Greater New York, consideration may then be given to a request for increase in rates for Electricians from \$4.50 to \$4.80 and for Machinists from \$4.50 to \$5 per diem."

In order that an advance in wages of Electrical Workers in City employ may result in the increase of only five out of fifteen departmental appropriations for 1914, your Committee suggests to the Board that changes be made in the number of days scheduled for the year, fixing 278 days as a minimum, as follows:

AN ORDINANCE relating to coin-operating machines.
Be it Ordained by the Board of Aldermen of The City of New York as follows:
Section 1. Section 305 of article I, title II of chapter 7 of Part I of the Code of Ordinances of The City of New York is hereby amended to read as follows:

Sec. 305. The following business must be duly licensed as herein provided, namely, public cartmen, truckmen, hackmen, cabmen, expressmen, drivers, junk dealers, dealers in second-hand articles, hawkers, peddlers, vendors, coin-operating machines, ticket speculators, coal scalpers, common shows, motion picture theatres, open-air motion picture theatres, shooting galleries, bowling alleys, billiard tables, dirt carts, exterior hoists and stands within stoop-lines and under the stairs of the elevated railroad stations.

Sec. 2. Article III of chapter 7 of Part I of the Code of Ordinances of The City of New York is hereby amended by adding thereto a new subdivision to be numbered XVII, and to read as follows:

XVII. Coin-Operating Machines.
Sec. 360A. Any machine or mechanical device erected, located or maintained in any street, avenue, park or public place or places open to the public, operating or intended to be operated by the insertion of a coin or coins for the purpose of automatically weighing persons, exhibiting photographs or other pictures, playing music, supplying electricity, making photographs, or for the vending and sale of United States postage stamps, chewing gum, candy, peanuts, cigars, cigarettes, matches, toilet articles, food, drinks or other commodities, except vending machines supplying articles certified by the Board of Health as necessary for the protection of the public health, shall be deemed to be included within the terms of this ordinance, and for each such machine so erected, located and maintained there shall be paid an annual license fee of fifty cents. The Bureau of Licenses shall provide a license tag, or plate, for each machine or mechanical device licensed under the provisions of this ordinance, and such tags or plate shall plainly show the year for which the license was issued and shall be so constructed that it may be securely attached to the machine and readily seen and inspected at all times. The Chief of the Bureau of Licenses shall cause the removal from any street, public place, or places open to the public, or any subway or elevated railroad station or platform, of any machine included within the terms of this ordinance, to which a license tag or plate for the then current year is not attached. All machines included within the terms of this ordinance shall be so constructed that the commodities they purvey shall be fully exposed to view from the front of the machines, or that all coin-receiving devices thereof shall be automatically closed when the machine is empty or cannot be operated to deliver its contents by the insertion of the appropriate coin. The maintenance and operation of each and every machine included within the terms of this ordinance, and not licensed as provided in this section, shall constitute a separate and distinct violation hereof.

Sec. 3. This ordinance shall take effect October 1st, 1914.

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Sec. 360A. Any machine or mechanical device erected, located or maintained in any street, avenue, park or public place or place open to the public, operating or intended to be operated by the insertion therein of a coin or coins for the purpose of automatically weighing persons, exhibiting photographs or other pictures, playing music, supplying electricity, making photographs, furnishing opera glasses for temporary use, or for the vending and sale of postage stamps, chewing gum, candy, peanuts, cigars, cigarettes, matches, toilet articles, food, drinks or other commodities, shall be deemed to be included within the terms of this ordinance, and for each such machine so erected, located and maintained there shall be paid an annual license fee of one dollar. The Bureau of Licenses shall provide a license tag, or plate, for each machine or mechanical device licensed under the provisions of this ordinance, and such tag or plate shall plainly show the year for which the license was issued and shall be so constructed that it may be securely attached to the machine and readily seen and inspected at all times. The Chief of the Bureau of Licenses shall cause the removal from any street, public place, or place open to the public, or any subway or elevated railroad station or platform, of any machine, included within the terms of this ordinance, to which a license tag, or plate, for the then current year is not attached. The maintenance and operation of each and every machine included within the terms of this ordinance, and not licensed as provided in this section, shall constitute a separate and distinct violation hereof.

Section 3. This ordinance shall take effect June 1, 1914.

Every person to whom a license shall be granted to have and carry concealed a pistol or revolver in said city shall pay therefor an annual fee of \$2.50; provided, that no fee shall be charged or collected for a license to have and carry concealed a pistol or revolver which shall be issued upon the application of the Commissioner of Correction, or the warden or superintendent of any prison, penitentiary, workhouse or other institution for the detention of persons convicted or accused of crime or offense, or held as witnesses in criminal cases in The City of New York. The fees prescribed by this section shall be collected by the officials issuing the licenses referred to herein and shall be paid by them into the Police Pension Fund, and a return in detail shall be made monthly to the Comptroller by such officials of the fees so collected and paid over by them. [All persons to whom such permission shall be given are hereby declared to be individually responsible for their own acts or the consequences that may arise from the use of loaded pistols, revolvers or firearms carried under the permission obtained as provided in this ordinance.]

Sec. 2. This ordinance shall take effect immediately.

Section 1. Section 404 of chapter 9 of Part 1 of the Code of Ordinances of The City of New York is hereby amended to read as follows:

Section 404. No person or persons shall throw, cause or lay any ashes, offal, vegetables, garbage, dross, cinders, shells, straw, shavings, paper, dirt, filth, rubbish or refuse of any kind whatsoever in any street in The City of New York, either upon the roadway or sidewalk thereof, except that in the morning before 8 o'clock or before the first sweeping of the roadway by the Department of Street Cleaning, in the Boroughs of Manhattan, Brooklyn and The Bronx, dust from the sidewalk may be swept into the gutter, if there piled, but not otherwise, and at no other time; and the abutting owner, his lessee, tenant, or the occupant or other person in charge of any building shall not place or permit to be placed or to remain in any street, either upon the roadway or sidewalk thereof, any such article or thing, except as hereinbefore expressly excepted.

A person violating any of the provisions of this section shall be subject to a fine of not less than one dollar and not more than ten dollars, to be imposed by any City Magistrate, or by imprisonment for a term of not less than one nor more than five days.

Section 2. This ordinance shall take effect thirty days after its approval by his Honor the Mayor.

That a public hearing was held thereon, at which appeared advocates in favor of the proposition, but none in real opposition thereto. The trend of opinion was all for a suppression of the existing ticket speculating evil and those in attendance felt that the suggested ordinance will prove a remedy for and abate existing conditions. The ordinance herewith recommended contemplates agreements with licensees of places of public amusement and the Police Department, else no license will issue, and under the provisions of which a license shall become null and void for any infraction of said agreements.

The Committee believes this ordinance a direct step to the suppression of this long complained of infliction on the public and, therefore, recommends that the same be adopted.

AN ORDINANCE relating to places of public amusement.

Be it Ordained, by the Board of Aldermen of The City of New York, as follows:

Section 1. No license shall be granted for any or all of the purposes set forth in section 1472 of the Greater New York Charter unless an application therefor, subscribed by the person or corporation seeking said license, shall first be made to the Police Department upon a printed form of application to be furnished by said department, which said application shall contain plainly printed therein the following agreements on the part of the licensee, to wit:

First—That the price of each and every ticket of admission issued by or on behalf of the licensee herein shall be plainly and legibly printed on such ticket, and no price in excess of that so designated shall be asked or accepted by or on behalf of the licensee.

Second—That no ticket of admission shall be issued, sold or offered for sale by or on behalf of the licensee or by or on behalf of any manager, agent, servant or employee of the licensee at a price in excess to that designated thereon or with the knowledge, purpose or intention that such ticket is to be resold or offered for resale, and no licensee and no manager, officer, agent or employee of any licensee shall, directly or indirectly, receive any consideration of any nature whatsoever upon the sale of any such ticket beyond or in excess of the price designated thereon, or directly or indirectly enter into any arrangement, agreement or understanding for the receipt of any such consideration.

Third—This license shall be and become null and void upon the entry of a judgment for the penalty prescribed in section 3 of this ordinance for a violation of any of the foregoing agreements by such licensee, or his agents or employees.

Section 2. Every such license shall contain plainly printed therein the agreement on the part of the licensee prescribed in section 1 of this ordinance.

Section 3. In addition to any other penalty prescribed by law or ordinance, every person violating any of the provisions of the foregoing section of this ordinance shall be liable to a penalty of \$50 for each offense, to be recovered in an action to be brought therefor in the name of The City of New York.

Section 4. This ordinance shall take effect thirty days after approved by the Mayor.

Be it Ordained by the Board of Aldermen of The City of New York as follows:

Section 1. The executive heads of the various departments and bureaus thereof of The City of New York, including the Department of Education, shall grant to every employee of The City of New York for whom provision is made for continuous or yearly services, a vacation of not less than two calendar weeks in each year.

Section 2. Such vacation, except as provided by section 3 hereof, may be extended for such period of time as the duties, length of service and other qualifications of any employee may warrant.

Section 3. Vacations shall be granted to temporary or part time employees equal to one day for each thirty days and the major fraction thereof for which allowance for them may be or may have been made; but the provisions of section 2 hereof shall not apply to such temporary or part time employees.

Section 4. Such vacations, as provided by sections 1, 2 and 3 hereof, shall be granted at the discretion of the executive heads of the various departments and bureaus thereof.

Section 5. For all such vacations and for all additional time granted, as provided in section 2 hereof, the same compensation shall be allowed as if the recipient were actually employed.

Section 6. This ordinance shall take effect immediately.

REPORTS:

That the Committee has held a number of hearings on this subject, which have been largely attended by representatives of all the parties in interest. Objections,

were raised to several provisions, all of which have been satisfactorily met in the ordinance herewith submitted. Members of the Board engaged in this occupation have been consulted and have passed upon this ordinance favorably. It is believed that the regulations contained herein are in the public interest. The Committee recommends that the said ordinance be adopted.

AN ORDINANCE repealing sections 310, 311, 312, 313 and 314, relating to public carts and cartmen, and substituting a new ordinance in lieu thereof.

Be It Ordained by the Board of Aldermen of The City of New York as follows:

That sections 310, 311, 312, 313 and 314 of the Code of Ordinances be and the same hereby are repealed and the following ordinance substituted in lieu thereof:

Section 310. This shall be known as the Public Cart Ordinance, and shall apply to vehicles and persons as enumerated herein.

Every vehicle, of whatever construction, drawn by animal power or propelled by any motor power, kept for hire or used to carry merchandise, household or office furniture, or other bulky articles within The City of New York for pay, shall be deemed a Public Cart, and the owner thereof shall be deemed a Public Cartman.

The Mayor is hereby empowered to appoint such Inspectors as may be necessary to carry out the provisions of this ordinance and such Inspectors shall be paid such compensation as shall be fixed by law.

Public carts shall be divided into two classes, i. e., motor driven public carts and horse drawn public carts.

Horse drawn public carts shall be divided into two classes:

Class A—To include all public carts drawn by one horse and having an inside floor space of at least 40 square feet.

Class B—To include all public carts drawn by two or more horses and having an inside floor surface of at least 70 square feet.

Motor driven public carts shall be divided into two classes:

Class F—To include all motor driven public carts having an inside floor surface of at least 70 square feet.

Class G—To include all motor driven public carts having an inside floor surface of at least 90 square feet.

In all of the above four measurements, a variation of not more than 5 per cent. will be accepted.

The following license fees shall be paid:

All public carts in Class A shall pay a fee of.....	\$2 00
All public carts in Class B shall pay a fee of.....	2 00
All public carts in Class F shall pay a fee of.....	5 00
All public carts in Class G shall pay a fee of.....	5 00

Such license fees shall be in lieu of and not in addition to any fees heretofore established, and except as above provided, no charge shall be made.

Application for licenses for public carts shall be made by the owner upon blank forms furnished by the Bureau of Licenses and such application shall contain the full name and address of the owner and such other information in regard to the vehicle and its owner as the Chief of the Bureau of Licenses may deem advisable. Upon the payment of the license fee herein provided, said vehicle shall be licensed by delivering to the owner a form of license blank approved by the Chief of the Bureau of Licenses, together with a plate to be affixed to a conspicuous and indispensable part of such Public Cart, on which plate shall be clearly set forth the official number of the public cart with the words "Public Cart," and the design or color of this plate shall be changed at the beginning of each license year.

The Bureau of Licenses shall keep a register of the name and address of each person owning or operating a public cart under this ordinance, together with the license number of the same, description and necessary dimensions of such vehicle, and such record shall be open to the inspection of the public at reasonable times and shall be a public record, and extracts from it may be certified to by the Chief of the Bureau of Licenses or his Deputy, duly authorized for use as evidence.

Section 311. The amount to be charged for loading, transporting, or transmitting and unloading of merchandise, household or office furniture, or other bulky articles, made by a public cartman, may be agreed upon in advance and such contract or agreement shall control and regulate the employment. In every case where such agreement is entered into, it shall be the duty of the public cartman to furnish the person with whom he contracts a written memorandum, to be signed by both parties or their responsible and authorized representatives, setting forth clearly the terms of the contract. This memorandum shall be upon blanks to be approved by the Bureau of Licenses.

The legal rates for transporting merchandise, household or office furniture, or other bulk articles (other than pianos), including the loading and unloading thereof, unless otherwise agreed upon as set forth in the foregoing paragraph, shall be as follows:

Where a vehicle drawn by one horse, and having an inside floor surface of at least forty square feet (including the driver thereof), is used, \$1.25 per hour.

Where a vehicle drawn by two or more horses, and having an inside floor surface of at least seventy square feet (including the driver thereof), is used, \$1.50 per hour.

Where a motor-driven vehicle, having an inside floor surface of at least seventy square feet (including the driver thereof), is used, \$2 per hour;

Where a motor-driven vehicle, having an inside floor surface of at least ninety square feet (including the driver thereof), is used, \$2.75 per hour.

For the services of each man in addition to the operator or driver, 50 cents per hour.

The number of men to be engaged on any one job or operation is not to exceed four, including the driver, except when especially agreed upon by the person hiring the public cart.

In case any vehicle, while engaged in the transportation of merchandise, household or office furniture, or other bulky articles, should break down or become disabled through any cause, no charge shall be made for the period of such disability.

Where a piano is transported in the same public cart as other articles of household or office furniture, and is part of the same operation or job, an additional charge of not exceeding \$1.50 may be made for transporting it.

Where a piano is transported as a separate operation or job and the distance travelled is three miles or less, the charge therefor shall be \$3; for each additional mile or part thereof, 50 cents.

For transporting pianos either up or down one or more flights of stairs, 50 cents for each flight.

For transporting pianos up or down, by means of elevator, \$1 additional.

Where the handling of a piano involves the use of a hoist, tackle and rigging at either or both ends of the operator or job, a charge of not more than \$5 additional will be permitted.

Every public cartman shall be entitled to be paid the legal rate of compensation herein provided immediately after the transportation and before actual delivery, and in default of such payment to retain a load or part thereof sufficient to secure charges, and convey the same promptly to the Property Clerk of the Police Department, or to a convenient storage warehouse, in The City of New York, where the same may be left on storage, subject to all charges incurred, including cartage to place of deposit. A notice, in writing, with a brief statement of particulars, shall be sent at once by the public cartman to the Bureau of Licenses.

REPORTS:

That, having examined the subject with considerable care, and after consultation with former Superintendent of Buildings, Mr. Rudolph P. Miller, it presents the annexed substitute ordinance in lieu of the one referred. The substitute ordinance contemplates the work of review and decision in disputes between property owners shall be done by the respective Borough Presidents, whose offices are better equipped for this than the several members of the Board who may be called upon to perform it. It, therefore, recommends that the said substitute ordinance be adopted.

SUBSTITUTE.

AN ORDINANCE providing for the regulation of partition fences and retaining walls in the City of New York.

Be it Ordained by the Board of Aldermen of The City of New York as follows:

Section 1. All partition fences in the City of New York shall be made and maintained by the owners of the land on each side.

Sec. 2. When the regulation of a lot, in conformity with the street on which it is situated, shall require the ground of such lot to be raised and kept up higher than the ground of the adjoining lot or lots, and a retaining wall for supporting the same shall be necessary, such retaining wall shall be made and maintained jointly by the owners of the land on each side, and when the same can be equally divided each party shall make and keep in repair one-half part thereof.

Sec. 3. Where an excavation has been made on any lot, and the land adjoining it has no building or permanent structure thereon, other than frame sheds or structures of like character, and where a retaining wall shall be necessary to support the adjoining earth, such retaining wall shall be made and maintained jointly by the owners of the land on each side, and when the same can be equally divided each party shall make and keep in repair one-half part thereof. Such retaining wall shall be built in accordance with the provisions of the Building Code.

Sec. 4. The regulation of lots, in conformity with the street, shall be calculated not to exceed a descent of 2 inches on every 10 feet.

Sec. 5. Where any owner or owners shall insist on maintaining his, her or their ground higher than such regulation, the surplus retaining wall which may be necessary to support such height shall be made and maintained at the individual expense of such owner or owners.

Sec. 6. Where any such owner or owners shall insist on regulating his, her or their grounds with a descent less than 2 inches on every 10 feet, the surplus retaining wall necessary to support the ground on the adjoining lot, regulated in conformity with the preceding section shall, in like manner, be made and maintained at the individual expense of such owner or owners.

Sec. 7. When any partition fence or wall cannot be conveniently divided, the same shall be made and kept in repair at the joint and equal expense of the owners of the land on each side.

Sec. 8. If any person whose duty it may be to make or repair any partition fence or retaining wall, or any part thereof, in pursuance of the provisions of this ordinance, shall neglect so to do for six days after being requested, in writing, by the owner or occupant of the adjoining ground, it shall be lawful for such owner or occupant to make or repair such partition fence or retaining wall, or cause the same to be done, and to recover from such person the expense of making or repairing so much thereof as ought to have been made or repaired by him or her, together with costs of suit, in any court having cognizance thereof.

Sec. 9. In case of any dispute between the parties concerning the division of any such fence or wall, or as to what part or portion of it shall be made or repaired by each party, respectively, and in all cases of dispute concerning the sufficiency of any fence in the City of New York, the matter shall be determined by the President of the Borough in which such partition or other fence or wall may be situated, or by his duly authorized representative.

Sec. 10. All ordinances or parts of ordinances of the former municipal or public corporations consolidated into The City of New York inconsistent or conflicting with the provisions of this ordinance are hereby repealed, to wit: Sections 43 to 55, inclusive, of part 2; sections 30 to 42, inclusive, of part 3, and sections 28 to 39, inclusive, of part 4, of the Code of Ordinances of The City of New York.

Sec. 11. Any violation of the provisions of sections 2 and 3 of this ordinance shall make the parties responsible for the same liable to a penalty of not less than \$10 nor more than \$50 for each offense, and, in addition, \$1 for each and every day that such offense shall continue after due notice has been served on the offending party by the Borough President or his duly authorized representative.

Sec. 12. This ordinance shall take effect immediately.

ORIGINAL.

AN ORDINANCE providing for the regulation of Partition Fences and Retaining Walls in The City of New York.

Be It Ordained by the Board of Aldermen of The City of New York, as follows:

Section 1. All partition fences and retaining walls in The City of New York shall be made and maintained by the owners of the land on each side, and each party shall make and keep in repair one-half part thereof when it can be conveniently divided.

Sec. 2. In case of any dispute between the parties concerning the division of any such fence or wall, or as to what part or portion of it shall be made or repaired by each party, respectively, and in all cases of dispute concerning the sufficiency of any fence in The City of New York, the matter shall be determined by the Alderman for the time being of the district in which such partition or other fence may be situated.

Sec. 3. When any partition fence or retaining wall cannot be conveniently divided, the same shall be made and kept in repair at the joint and equal expense of the owners of the land on each side.

Sec. 4. When the regulation of a lot, in conformity with the street on which it is situated, shall require the ground of such lot to be raised and kept up higher than the ground of the adjoining lot or lots, and a partition fence or retaining wall for supporting the same shall be necessary, such partition fence or retaining wall shall be made and maintained by the owners, respectively, of the land on each side; and when the same can be equally divided each party shall make and keep in repair one-half part thereof.

Sec. 5. Where an excavation has been made on any lot, and the land adjoining it has no building or permanent structure thereon, other than frame sheds or structures of like character, and where a retaining wall shall be necessary to support the adjoining earth, such retaining wall shall be made and maintained by the owners, respectively, of the land on each side; and when the same can be equally divided each party shall make and keep in repair one-half part thereof. Such retaining wall shall be built in accordance with the provisions of section 22 of the Building Code.

Sec. 6. If any dispute shall arise concerning the division of such partition fence or retaining wall between the parties, or as to what part or portion of it should be made or repaired by each, respectively, or concerning the sufficiency of any such partition fence or retaining wall, the same shall be determined by the Alderman.

Sec. 7. Where any partition fence or retaining wall cannot conveniently be divided, the same shall be made and kept in repair at the joint and equal expense of the owners of the land on each side.

Sec. 8. The regulation of lots, in conformity with the street, shall be calculated not to exceed a descent of 2 inches on every 10 feet.

Sec. 9. Where any owner or owners shall insist on maintaining his, her or their ground higher than such regulation, the surplus partition wall which may be necessary to support such height shall be made and maintained at the individual expense of such owner or owners.

Sec. 10. Where any such owner or owners shall insist on regulating his, her or their grounds with a descent less than 2 inches on every 10 feet, the surplus partition fence or retaining wall necessary to support the ground on the adjoining lot, regulated in conformity with the preceding section shall, in like manner, be made and maintained at the individual expense of such owner or owners.

Sec. 11. If any person whose duty it may be to make or repair any partition fence or retaining wall, or any part thereof, in pursuance of the provisions of this

ordinance, shall neglect so to do for six days after being requested, in writing, by the owner or occupant of the adjoining ground, it shall be lawful for such owner or occupant to make or repair such partition fence or retaining wall, or cause the same to be done, and to recover from such person the expense of making or repairing so much thereof as ought to have been made or repaired by him or her, together with cost of suit, in any court having cognizance thereof.

Sec. 12. All outside and boundary fences and all fences erected on the line of any public road, street, line or avenue in The City of New York shall be at least 5 feet high, and shall be built of good and substantial materials, and sufficient in all respects to keep out and prevent the encroachment of cattle, sheep, hogs and other animals, and shall be kept in good repair and of the height above mentioned.

Sec. 13. The owner or owners, lessee or lessees, tenant or tenants of any lot, piece of ground or premises, upon which any fence not of the height, and that shall not be erected in the manner and maintained at the height mentioned in the preceding section, or who, having erected the same, shall not keep the same in good repair, shall not recover for any damage he, they or she may sustain from any cattle, sheep, hog or other animal doing damage upon his, their or her premises; nor shall any cattle, sheep or other animal be placed in pound for doing damage, unless such fence be erected and kept of the height and in the manner mentioned in the last preceding section.

Sec. 14. In case of any dispute between the parties concerning any fence or wall embraced within this article, or the sufficiency thereof, the matter shall be determined by the Alderman for the time being of the district in which such fence may be situated.

Sec. 15. All ordinances or parts of ordinances of the former municipal or public corporations consolidated into The City of New York inconsistent or conflicting with the provisions of this ordinance are hereby repealed: to wit, sections 43 to 55, inclusive, of Part 2, sections 30 to 43, inclusive, of Part 3, and sections 28 to 39, inclusive, of Part 4, of the Code of Ordinances of The City of New York.

Sec. 16. This ordinance shall take effect immediately.

AN ORDINANCE regulating fences, signs, billboards, roof signs, advertisements and other structures in the City of New York.

Be it ordained by the Board of Aldermen of The City of New York as follows:

Section 1. All fence, billboard and sign structures erected upon the ground and all roof sign structures shall be erected entirely within the building line and be properly secured, supported and braced and shall be so constructed as not to be or become dangerous.

Section 2. Ground Sign Structures—(1) No ground fence, bill board or sign structure within the fire limits of The City of New York as now or hereafter constituted, shall be at any point over twelve feet above the adjoining ground, except that when the face of any such structure, excepting the ornamental moulding thereof, shall be constructed entirely of metal or of wood covered on all sides with sheet metal, such structures shall not be at any point over twenty-four feet above the adjoining ground.

(2) Any person, firm or corporation that shall occupy any vacant lot or premises with a billboard or other advertising ground structure or device, shall be subject to the same duties and responsibility as the owner of such lot or premises with respect to keeping the same clean, sanitary, inoffensive and free and clear of all noxious substances in the vicinity of such billboard, structure or device; and with respect to the removal of snow from the sidewalk and curb in front thereof.

Section 3. Roof Sign Structures—(1) All roof sign structures shall be so constructed as to leave a clear space of at least seven feet between the roof level and the lowest part of such structure and at least five feet between the vertical supports thereof; such structures shall be set back at least six feet from the face of the front and rear walls and shall not interfere with any openings in the roof or with any fire escape. Such structures, excepting the ornamental surface moulding thereof,

shall be constructed entirely of metal, including the uprights, supports and braces for same, and shall be required to bear a wind pressure of not less than thirty pounds to the square foot of covered surface area.

(2) No roof sign structure having a tight, closed or solid surface shall be at any point over thirty-one feet above the roof level. Roof sign structures not having a tight, closed or solid surface may be erected upon fireproof buildings to a height not exceeding seventy-five feet above the roof level, and upon non-fireproof buildings to a height not exceeding fifty feet above the roof level, but the portions of such structures covered and exposed to wind pressure shall not exceed thirty-five per cent. of the total surface area.

Section 4. Signs on Walls of Buildings—(1) No sign shall be so erected as to cover the doors or windows of any building or otherwise prevent free ingress or egress to or from any window, door or fire escape on any building in The City of New York.

(2) No sign shall be erected upon the front, rear or side wall of any building so as to project above either the roof cornice or parapet wall or above the roof level where there is no cornice or parapet wall; except that a sign erected at a right angle to the building wall, the horizontal width of which sign parallel to such wall does not exceed two feet, may be erected to a height not exceeding two feet above the roof cornice or parapet wall or above the roof level where there is no cornice or parapet wall. A sign attached to a corner and parallel to the vertical line of such corner, shall be deemed erected at a right angle to the building wall.

(3) No electric sign as defined in the Electric Sign Ordinance approved July 24th, 1912, the horizontal width of which sign parallel to the building wall shall exceed two feet, and no part of or appendage to any such sign shall project more than three feet beyond the building line.

Section 5. Unlawful Structures.—Upon the adoption of this ordinance the fire department of the city of New York shall notify by registered mail the owner or lessees of any sign structure attached at other than a right angle to the wall of the building and extending outside the building line and projecting above the roof cornice or parapet wall or above the roof level where there is no cornice or parapet wall, and of any sign structure which shall be so erected as to prevent free ingress and egress to and from any door, window or fire escape of any building, to remove or alter such structures so as to comply with this ordinance. If such order is not complied with within sixty days, the city of New York shall remove such structure at the expense of such owner or lessee.

Section 6. Permits.—(1) No ground-sign or roof-sign structure shall be erected unless plans and specifications, showing the dimensions, material and details of construction, accompanied by the written consent of the owner or owners, lessee or lessees of the property upon which it is to be erected, shall have been filed with the Superintendent of Buildings having jurisdiction, nor until all of the provisions of Section 4 of the Building Code of the City of New York relating to such structures shall have been complied with, nor until a permit for its erection shall have been obtained from such Superintendent of Buildings. In the case of a sign structure illuminated by electricity, a certificate must also be procured from the Department of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity, certifying that the electric wiring and electric appliances of the proposed sign are in conformity with the rules and regulations of that department.

(2) Before any permit shall be issued under this ordinance, a permit fee shall be paid to the Bureau of Buildings as follows: For ground structures, \$2; for roof structures having a tight, closed or solid surface, \$5; for roof structures not having a tight, closed or solid surface, \$10. Every structure for which a permit is issued shall be inspected at least once in each calendar year by the Bureau of Buildings.

Section 7. Registration and Identification.—Every ground-sign and roof-sign structure shall be registered with the Bureau of Buildings of the Borough in which such structure is situated by the person, firm or corporation maintaining the same, and shall have displayed upon the front thereof the name and address of such person, firm or corporation, and the serial number of the permit issued for such structure. The Bureau of Buildings may issue permits in several series so as to distinguish between existing structures and new structures erected in conformity with this ordinance, or between various classes of structures, and may prescribe suitable regulations not inconsistent herewith concerning the form and contents of the applications for various classes of permits. Permits shall be issued for existing structures not conforming to the requirements of this ordinance, provided such structures were erected in conformity with the legal requirements in effect when they were erected, but no fees shall be charged for permits or registration for such existing structures.

Section 8. Unsafe Structures.—Should any fence, sign, bill board or roof-sign structure be or become insecure or in danger of falling or otherwise unsafe, in the opinion of the Bureau of Buildings, the owner thereof or the person maintaining the same shall upon notice from said bureau, immediately in case of immediate danger and in any case within ten days, secure the same under the supervision of and in the manner to be approved by said Bureau in conformity with the provisions of this ordinance.

Section 9. Alteration of Existing Sign Structures.—No existing fence, sign, bill-board or roof-sign structure shall be enlarged, rebuilt, structurally altered or relocated unless or until it shall comply with the provisions of this ordinance. This shall not apply to the relettering or rewiring of illuminated signs.

Section 10. Exceptions.—(1) No part of this ordinance shall apply to walls constructed wholly or principally of stone, marble, brick, terra cotta, concrete or other like material composing a masonry or monolithic wall, back yard fences on the ground in the interior of a court, picket fences and ornamental metal fences.

(2) No part of this ordinance except section 4 shall apply to signs, showbills and other boards permitted by and erected in compliance with section 260 of the General Ordinances of the city of New York or to electric signs permitted by and erected in compliance with the provisions of the Electric Sign Ordinance approved July 24th, 1912.

Section 11. Penalty and Abatement.—(1) No fence, sign, billboard or roof-sign structure shall be erected in the city of New York except as in this ordinance provided under a penalty of \$100 for each offense. No such structure shall be maintained in the city of New York contrary to the provisions of this ordinance under a penalty of \$10 for each day or part of a day the same shall be so maintained.

(2) In addition, any fence, sign, billboard or roof-sign structure erected or maintained in violation of this ordinance shall be subject, upon notice, to abatement by the Bureau of Buildings having jurisdiction.

Section 12. Except as expressly hereinbefore provided in section 5 hereof, this ordinance shall have no retroactive effect.

Section 13. All ordinances or parts of ordinances inconsistent or conflicting with the provisions of this ordinance are hereby repealed.

Section 14. This ordinance shall take effect immediately.

AN ORDINANCE relating to public carts and cartmen.

Be it ordained by the Board of Aldermen of The City of New York as follows:

That a new section be added to the Code of Ordinances known as section 313: Every public cartman shall keep a book or record of all transportations or removals made by him of such merchandise, household or office furniture, or other bulky articles, which shall contain (1) the name and address of such public cartman; (2) the name or names of the person, firm, corporation or association owning or claiming to own such goods, household or office furniture or other bulky articles and employing such public cartman for such transportation and removal; (3) the streets and house numbers of the respective premises from and to which such transportation or removal shall be made, and if such premises, or either of them, shall not be designated by a street number, such public cartman, in lieu thereof, shall otherwise clearly identify the same. Such book or record shall be upon a form approved by the Chief of the Bureau of Licenses.

A duplicate or true copy of such book or record of all such transportations or removals so made by such public cartman for the preceding month shall be filed on or before the 5th day of the succeeding month in the Precinct Station House of the Police Department of The City of New York in which the premises from which said transportation or removal shall be made are located, and such book or record shall be deemed a public document and open for public inspection between the hours of 9 a. m. and 4 p. m., except on Sundays and holidays.

Any public cartman, upon conviction before the Chief of the Bureau of Licenses for a violation of this section, shall be punished by suspension or revocation of his license or the imposition of a fine not to exceed ten dollars for each offense.

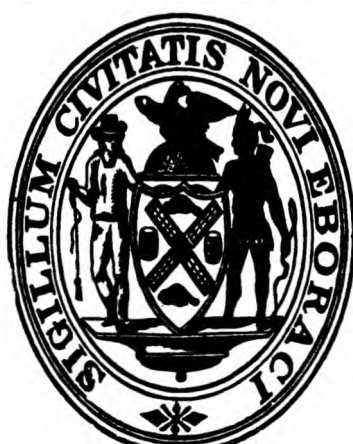

AT A MEETING OF THE BOARD OF Health of the Department of Health, held May 5, 1914, the following resolution was adopted:

Resolved, That Section 49b of the Sanitary Code be and the same is hereby adopted so as to read as follows:

Section 49b. All utensils used in the preparation, service and sale of any food or drink intended for human consumption shall be properly cleaned after being used, and no such utensil shall, under any circumstances, be used a second time unless it shall have been, after the previous use thereof, so cleaned. In such cleansing the use of water which has become insanitary by previous use is prohibited.

Resolved, That Section 49 of the Sanitary Code be and the same is hereby amended so as to read as follows:

Section 49. "Every person being the owner, lessee, occupant or in charge of any room, stall or place where any food or drink intended for human consumption shall be stored or kept, or shall be held or offered for sale, shall put and keep such room, stall and place, and its appurtenances, in a cleanly and wholesome condition; and every person having charge, or interested or engaged, whether as principal or agent in the care of or in respect to the custody or sale of any food or drink intended for human consumption, shall put and preserve the same in a cleanly and wholesome condition, and shall not allow the same, or any part thereof, to be poisoned, infected, or rendered unsafe or unwholesome for human food or drink."

AT A MEETING OF THE BOARD OF Health of the Department of Health, held May 5, 1914, the following resolution was adopted:

Resolved, That Section 140 of the Sanitary Code be and the same is hereby amended so as to read as follows:

Section 140. In every sanatorium, sanitarium, day nursery, convalescent home, home for children, reformatory, training school, boarding school, hospital, dispensary, or institution for the care or treatment of persons in The City of New York, there shall be provided and maintained a suitable room or rooms for the temporary isolation of persons suffering from any of the following infectious diseases,—measles, diphtheria (croup), scarlet fever, small pox, chicken pox, epidemic cholera, typhus fever, rubella (rotheln), plague, and whooping cough, and such persons shall be immediately isolated in such room or rooms. It shall be the duty of the physician or physicians, and the officers and managers of every institution herein specified to cause a report to be immediately made to the Department of Health of The City of New York of every person afflicted with any of the aforesaid infectious diseases who is in their care or who has come under their observation and to have such persons properly isolated from other persons; and shall also immediately report or cause to be reported to the said Department the name, age (so far as can be ascertained) and residence of every person received or treated thereat who is afflicted with puerperal septicemia or suppurative conjunctivitis and the name of the particular disease with which the person is so afflicted; and shall also report the name and address of the physician or midwife in at-

tendance at the time of the onset of the disease, which information it is hereby made the duty of every institution herein specified to obtain and record among its records.

THE BUILDINGS AND APPURTENANCES thereto will be sold to the highest bidder, who must pay cash or certified check, drawn to the order of the Comptroller of The City of New York, and must also give a certified check or cash in half the amount of the purchase price as security for the faithful performance of the terms and conditions of the sale. Where the amount of the purchase price does not equal or exceed the sum of \$50, the sum of \$50 shall be the amount of the security to be deposited. This security may at any time after the expiration of the contract period be applied by the City to the cost of completing any of the work required under the contract, but unfinished at the expiration of the contract period.

the street and the opening of the main sewer in street shall be properly closed in compliance with the directions of the Bureau of Sewers in the Borough in which the buildings are situated, and furnish the Department of Finance with a certificate from the Bureau of Sewers that the work has been properly performed.

The permit for all opening in the street to be obtained by and at the expense of the purchaser of the building.

Failure to remove said buildings, appurtenances, or any part thereof, within thirty days from the day of possession will work forfeiture of ownership of such buildings, appurtenances, or portion as shall then be left standing, together with all moneys paid by said purchaser on account thereof at the time of the sale, and the bidder's assent to the above conditions being understood to be implied by the act of bidding, and The City of New York will, without notice to the purchaser, cause the same to be removed, and the cost and expense thereof charged against the security above mentioned.

The work of removal must be carried on in every respect in a thorough and workmanlike manner, and must be completed within thirty days from the day of possession, and the successful bidder will provide and furnish all materials of labor and machinery necessary thereto, and will place proper and sufficient guards and fences and warning signs by day and night for the prevention of accidents, and will indemnify and save harmless The City of New York, its officers, agents and servants, and each of them, against any and all suits and actions, claims and demands of every name and description brought against it, them or any of them, and against and from all damage and costs to which it, they or any of them be put by reason of injury to the person or property of another, resulting from negligence or carelessness in the performance of the work, or in guarding the same, or from any improper or defective materials or machinery, implements or appliances used in the removal of said buildings.

Where party walls are found to exist between buildings purchased by different bidders, the materials of said party walls shall be understood to be equally divided between the separate purchasers.

Party walls and fences, when existing against adjacent property not sold, shall not be taken down. All furnishings, plaster, chimneys, projecting brick, etc., on the faces of such party walls are to be taken down and removed. The walls shall be made permanently self-supporting, beam-holes, etc., bricked up, and the wall pointed and made to exclude wind and rain and present a clean exterior. The roofs and adjacent buildings shall be properly flashed and painted and made watertight where they have been disturbed by the operations of the Contractor.

The Comptroller of The City of New York serves the right on the day of sale to withdraw from sale any of the buildings, parts of buildings and machinery included therein, or to reject any and all bids; and it is further

Resolved, That, while the said sale is held under the supervision of the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, the Comptroller is authorized to cause the sale to be advertised and to direct the sale thereof as financial officer of the City.

NOTICE TO CONTRACTORS.

GENERAL INSTRUCTIONS TO BIDDERS.

The person or persons making a bid or estimate for any services, work, materials or supplies for The City of New York, or for any of its departments, bureaus or offices, shall furnish the same in a sealed envelope, indorsed with the title of the supplies, materials work or services for which the bid or estimate is made, with his or their name or names and the date of presentation to the President or Board or to the head of the Department at his or its office, on or before the date and hour named in the advertisement for the same, at which time and place the estimates received will be publicly opened by the President or Board or head of said Department, and read, and the award of the contract made according to law as soon thereafter as practicable.

Each bid or estimate shall contain the name and place of residence of the person making the same, and names of all persons interested with him therein, and, if no other person be so interested, it shall distinctly state that fact; also, that it is made without any connection with any other person making an estimate for the same purpose, and is in all respects fair and without collusion or fraud, and that no member of the Board of Aldermen, head of a Department, chief of a Bureau, deputy thereof, or clerk therein, or other officer of The City of New York is, shall be or become interested, directly or indirectly, as contracting party, partner, stockholder, surety or otherwise in or in the performance of the contract, or in the supplies, work or business to which it relates, or in any portion of the profits thereof. The bid or estimate must be verified by the oath, in writing, of the party or parties making the estimate that the several matters stated herein are in all respects true.

No bid or estimate will be considered unless as a condition precedent to the reception or consideration of any proposal, it be accompanied by a certified check upon one of the State or National banks of The City of New York, drawn to the order of the Comptroller, or money or corporate stock or certificates of indebtedness of any nature issued by The City of New York, which the Comptroller shall approve as of equal value with the security required in the advertisement to the amount of not less than three nor more than five per centum of the amount of the bond required, as provided in section 420 of the Greater New York Charter.

The amount shall be as specified in the proposals or instructions to bidders and shall not be in excess of 5 per cent.

The certified check or money shall not be inclosed in the envelope containing the bid or estimate, but should be either inclosed in a separate envelope addressed to the head of the Department, President or Board, or submitted personally upon the presentation of the bid or estimate.

For particulars as to the quantity and quality of the supplies, or the nature and extent of the work, reference must be made to the specifications, schedules, plans, etc., on file in the said office of the President, Board or Department.

No bid shall be accepted from or contract awarded to any person who is in arrears to The City of New York upon debt or contract, or who is a defaulter, as surety or otherwise, upon any obligation to the City.

The contract must be bid for separately.

The right is reserved in each case to reject all bids or estimates if it is deemed to be for the interest of the City so to do.

Bidders will write out the amount of their bids or estimates in addition to inserting the same in figures.

Bidders are requested to make their bids or estimates upon the blank forms prepared and furnished by the City, a copy of which, with the proper envelope in which to inclose the bid, together with a copy of the contract, including the specifications, in the form approved by the Corporation Counsel can be obtained upon application therefor at the office of the Department for which the work is to be done. Plans and drawings of construction work may also be seen there.
