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DEPARTMENT OF HEALTH.

Notice of Public Hearing.

Section 117, Sanitary Code.

PUBLIC NOTICE IS HEREBY GIVEN to all persons interested in the operation of that portion of the Sanitary Code of the City of New York, under Section 117 of Article VIII, Drugs and Chemicals, and reading as follows:

Sec. 117. REGULATING THE SALE OF PROPRIETARY AND PATENT MEDICINES—No proprietary or patent medicine manufactured, prepared, or intended, for internal human use, shall be held, offered for sale, sold or given away, in the City of New York, until the following requirements shall, in each instance, have been met:

The names of the ingredients of every such medicine shall be registered in the Department of Health in such manner as the Regulations of the Board of Health may prescribe.

The expression "proprietary or patent medicine," for the purposes of this section, shall be taken to mean and include every medicine or medicinal compound, manufactured, prepared, or intended, for internal human use, the name, composition, or definition of which is not to be found in the United States Pharmacopoeia or National Formulary, or which does not bear the name of each ingredient conspicuously, clearly, and legibly set forth, in English, on the outside of each bottle, box, or package in which the said medicine or medicinal compound is held, offered for sale, sold, or given away.

The provisions of this section shall not, however, apply to any medicine or medicinal compound, sold or given away upon the written prescription of a duly licensed physician, provided such medicine or medicinal compound be sold or given away to or for the use of the person for whom it shall have been prescribed, and provided, also, that the said prescription shall have been filed at the establishment or place where such medicine or medicinal compound is sold or given away, in chronological order according to the date of the receipt of such prescription at such establishment or place.

Every such prescription shall remain so filed for a period of five years. The names of the ingredients of proprietary and patent medicines, registered in accordance with the terms of this section, and all information relating thereto or connected therewith, shall be regarded as confidential, and shall not be open to inspection by the public or any person other than the official custodian of such records in the Department of Health, such persons as may be authorized by law to inspect such records, and those duly authorized to prosecute or enforce the Federal Statutes, the Laws of the State of New York, both criminal and civil, and the Ordinances of the City of New York, but only for the purpose of such prosecution or enforcement.

This section shall take effect December 31, 1915.

DEPARTMENT OF PUBLIC CHARITIES.**REPORT FOR THE QUARTER ENDED SEPTEMBER 30, 1914.****Departmental Estimate for 1915.**

The estimate of this Department for the year 1915 was sent to His Honor the Mayor on September 10, 1914. The total amount requested for next year was \$4,014,983.36, being \$292,000 in excess of the amount allowed to run this Department for 1914.

Free Transportation.

The free transportation allowed by the Interborough Rapid Transit Company to Bronx and Van Courtlandt Parks for indigent mothers and their children began on June 9 and ended September 15, 1914, and was taken advantage of by 653 churches, societies and associations throughout the city. The total number transported was 50,006, consisting of 2,638 mothers, 44,250 children and 3,118 attendants.

In General.

During the quarter 3,734 changes occurred among an average of 3,509 paid employees, as follows: Appointments, 1,967; promotions, 150; resignations, 877; transfers, 57; dismissals, 683.

Bureau of Audit and Accounts.

There were 2,473 orders registered during the quarter, amounting to \$416,327.82. There were 3,403 invoices registered during the same period, classified as follows: Affecting appropriations amounting to \$501,416.78; affecting corporate stock funds amounting to \$204,272.17; affecting revenue bond funds amounting to \$3,504. Total, \$709,192.95.

2,556 vouchers were also registered, amounting to \$1,152,143.16.

Operations of Storehouse.

Receipts, \$133,259.42. Disbursements, \$161,111.32.

Departmental Dietitian.**Dietaries.**

The new dietaries for tubercular patients at Sea View Hospital and Metropolitan Hospital, and the children's dietary at the New York City Children's Hospital, and schools, went into effect on July 6th. The new food forms for controlling food within the institutions have been distributed and are now in use.

Food Budget.

The Food Budget for the year 1915 has been completed and submitted. From this budget the cost of feeding the different classes of employees and patients has been arrived at, the different costs daily per capita being as follows: Employees, 35 cents; patients, 20 cents; children, 23 cents; inmates, 13 cents; lodgers, 3 cents; T. B. patients, 32 cents; fireman, 25 cents.

Employment Bureau.

Total number of personal and referred applications received at this office, 1,032; number found eligible and placed in hospitals, institutions and asylums, under the Department of Public Charities, 412; placed in various hospitals, institutions, mercantile houses and for general contract work, 250; number reinstated in the Department of

Public Charities, 19; number advised and directed for employment, 271; number found undesirable, 56; number unable to furnish citizen papers, 21; number of calls to hospitals, homes, institutions, societies, charitable organizations and employment agencies, 218.

Regular and special requisitions for medical and surgical supplies have been filed for the following institutions: City Hospital, B. I., \$5,073.79; N. Y. C. Home for the Aged and Infirm, B. I., \$1,499.08; Metropolitan Hospital, B. I., \$4,897.30; Randalls Island Hospitals, R. I., \$1,230.98; Kings County Hospital, \$6,402.81; Bradford Street Hospital, \$16.23; Coney Island Hospital, \$850.81; Cumberland Street Hospital, \$1,180.42; N. Y. C. Farm Colony, S. I., \$172.56; Sea View Hospital, S. I., \$2,605.08; Municipal Lodging House, \$143.64; minor institutions, \$36.10. Total, \$24,108.80.

The preparation of sterilized catgut for the hospitals has been continued, and the Manufacturing Department has turned out a great variety of pharmaceutical preparations. These comprise 596 gallons fluid extracts and tinctures, 643 gallons elixirs and syrups, 1,267 gallons liniments, 559 gallons mixtures and solutions, 723 pounds ointments, 100 pounds powders, and various other articles.

The Bureau of Disinfectants has manufactured for the various city departments 1,375 gallons Phenol Disinfectant and 200 pounds roach powder.

Numerous analyses have been made of supplies received and of materials submitted by the General Storekeeper and the heads of institutions.

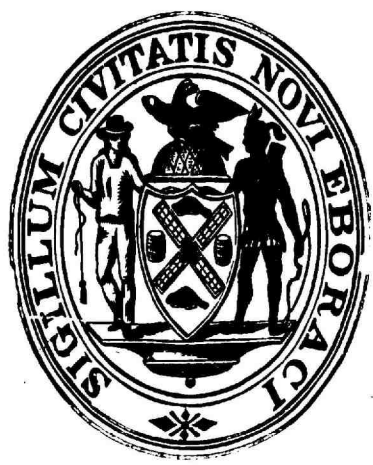

The certified check or money should not be inclosed in the envelope containing the bid or estimate, but should be either inclosed in a separate envelope addressed to the head of the Department, President or Board, or submitted personally upon the presentation of the bid or estimate.

For particulars as to the quantity and quality of the supplies, or the nature and extent of the work, reference must be made to the specifications, schedules, plans, etc., on file in the said office of the President, Board or Department.

No bid shall be accepted from or contract awarded to any person who is in arrears to The City of New York upon debt or contract, or who is a defaulter, as surety or otherwise, upon any obligation to the City.

The contract must be made separately. The right is reserved in each case to reject all bids or estimates if it is deemed to be for the interest of the City so to do.

Bidders will write out the amount of their bids or estimates in addition to inserting the same in figures.

Bidders are requested to make their bids or estimates upon the blank forms prepared and furnished by the City, a copy of which, with the proper envelope in which to inclose the bid, together with a copy of the contract, including the specifications, in the form approved by the Corporation Counsel, can be obtained upon application therefor at the office of the Department for which the work is to be done. Plans and drawings of construction work may also be seen there.
