

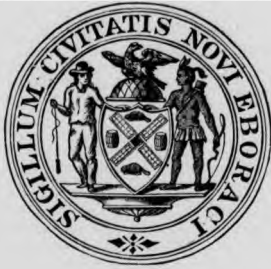

On motion of Alderman Masterson, the reading of the minutes of the last meeting was dispensed with.

#### REPORTS.

The Committee on County Affairs, to whom was referred the petition of the Stone Cutters' Association of the City and County of New York, relative to the construction of a bridge over the Harlem river, after the most careful consideration, and being fully impressed with the importance of the question involved, most respectfully report to your Honorable Body, that

Whereas, For a number of years the contracts for building the greater portion of the public buildings, bridges, docks, etc., of the State and County of New York have been awarded to contractors who have had the work performed outside the limits of the State; and

Whereas, The workmen, who are the producers and therefore the taxpayers, have suffered great injury by reason of the greater portion of the work necessary for the construction of our public buildings, bridges, docks, etc., being executed outside of our city and county, and in many instances, outside of the State itself, while thousands of our resident mechanics and laborers were and are unable to obtain employment.

Resolved, That the Board of Aldermen of the City of New York recommend and request that the Commissioners appointed to provide for the construction of a bridge over the Harlem river insert a clause in the contract or contracts for said bridge, that the stone-cutting and other work necessary for such construction must be executed within the limits of the City of New York.

Alderman Van Rensselaer further stated that the Committee, after a full meeting, would present its report to the Board, or he would request that the Committee be discharged from the further consideration of the subject, and directed that a meeting of the Committee be called for Friday, the 12th instant, at two o'clock P. M.

The minutes of the meeting held February 1, 1886, were read and approved.

The Comptroller presented the following:

CITY OF NEW YORK—DEPARTMENT OF PUBLIC PARKS,  
No. 36 UNION SQUARE, February 4, 1886.

To the Board of Estimate and Apportionment:

GENTLEMEN—In pursuance of a resolution adopted by the Board governing this Department, held on 3d inst., application is hereby made for the transfer of the sum of seven hundred and twenty-seven dollars from the unexpended balance of the appropriation made for "Police," 1885, to the appropriation for the improvement and maintenance of Riverside Park and avenue for the same year.

In explanation of the above request, I desire to state that it is based on the following facts: It having become necessary for the Department to establish a police sub-station on Riverside Park, a room was selected in the basement of the building known as Claremont (with the consent of the lessee), for that purpose, and the amount mentioned was expended in fitting it up, and charged to the appropriation for police salaries and supplies, which to the Commissioners seemed proper. The bills for the work were forwarded to the Finance Department for payment, and have been since returned by the Comptroller with the request that the same be charged against the appropriation for Riverside Park and avenue, to which account he claims the expenditure properly belongs.

In order to comply with the requirement of the Comptroller, the Commissioners, although still of the opinion that the expenditure should be paid from the police appropriation, find it necessary to apply for the transfer as the appropriation for the improvement, etc., of Riverside Park and avenue for last year is exhausted.

SIR—I am in receipt of your communication under date of February 3, 1886, asking whether a transfer can be made from the appropriation for the Bureau of Permits, recently abolished, to the Bureau of Licenses, under charge of the Mayor's Marshal, recently created to discharge the functions heretofore exercised by the Bureau of Permits.

I know of no reason why the transfer cannot be made. It is not a diversion of an appropriation made for a specific purpose, to a new purpose, not included in the objects of expense provided for when the purpose was adopted. The case submitted is, rather, analogous to one where the title of an office is changed by act of the Legislature. In such an event the moneys given to the Department by its first title might be by action of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, placed at the disposal of the Department by its new title.

Extract from the minutes.

JOHN DAVENPORT, Esq., Acting Clerk of the Board of Education:

SIR—I have received from you a copy of the following resolution, adopted by the Board of Education on the 20th ultimo, to be found on page 34 of the minutes:

"Resolved, That the Counsel to the Board of Education be and hereby is requested to report to this Board, at its next stated meeting, his opinion as to the legal right of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment to order this Board to submit all plans and specifications for school buildings, and to obtain the approval of said Board of Estimate and Apportionment of such plans and specifications before any appropriation can be applied (see 'note' on page 16 of the Journal)."

The "note" referred to in said resolution is appended to the Final Estimate for the Board of Education for the year 1886, adopted by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment on the 31st day of December, 1885, and is as follows:

"[NOTE.—The plans and specifications for the above-mentioned buildings for the Board of Education must be submitted to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, and by them approved before the appropriations therefor can be applied.]"

Certain buildings are mentioned in said Final Estimate, and the sums appropriated therefor and for all other purposes are stated, but no reference is made to any plans or specifications except in the said "note," which follows after said Final Estimate is fully completed.

The powers of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment are defined and its duties prescribed by statute.

Section 189 of the New York City Consolidation Act of 1882 (page 9 of the Manual), provides that "The said Board shall, annually, between the first day of August and the first day of November, meet, and, by the affirmative vote of all the members, make a provisional estimate of the amounts required to pay the expenses of conducting the public business of the City and County of New York, in each department and branch thereof, and of the Board of Education, for the then next ensuing financial year." "Such provisional estimate shall be prepared in such detail as to the aggregate sum allowed to each department and bureau as the said Board of Apportionment shall deem advisable. For the purpose of making said provisional estimate, the heads of Departments and the Board of Education shall, at least thirty days before the said provisional estimate is required to be made, as herein provided, send to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, an estimate in writing, herein called a departmental estimate of the amount of expenditure, specifying in detail the objects thereof, required in their respective departments, including a statement of each of the salaries of their officers, clerks, employees and subordinates. The same statement as to salaries and expenditures shall be made by all other officers, persons, and boards having power to fix or authorize them. A duplicate of these departmental estimates and statements shall be made at the same time to the Board of Aldermen. The Board of Estimate and Apportionment shall consider such departmental estimates and other statements in making the provisional estimates herein provided, and in approving the salaries of the officers, clerks and other persons before-named." After such provisional estimate is made it is to be submitted to the Board of Aldermen, who are to consider it and return it to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, with any objections or rectifications which they may have made thereto, and the Board of Estimate and Apportionment are to consider such objections or rectifications and "make a final estimate," before making which tax-payers are to be heard. "After the final estimate is made in accordance herewith, it shall be signed by the members, and when so signed, the said several sums shall be and become appropriated to the several purposes and departments therein named."

The Board of Education is specially mentioned in said section because it is not and has not been since the charter of 1873 a department of the City government.

Under the provisions of that section the powers of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, in relation to the estimate to be made by said Board, seems to be limited to a statement of the sums of money to be appropriated as therein provided. I do not find that, in said section, or in any statute, power has been conferred upon said Board to impose any condition or restriction upon the application of the money appropriated for the Board of Education to the several purposes named in said estimate. If any such power is claimed it must be by implication, the foundation of which, if any, I have failed to discover; and if had, it was not, in my opinion, exercised as to said plans and specifications by the "note" above mentioned. The estimate of the sums of money to be appropriated was fully made and completed without reference to any plans or specifications, and such "note" must, I think, be regarded, in either case, as surplusage and of no effect.

Certainly there is no law which, in terms, confers upon the Board of Estimate and Apportionment any power to require the plans and specifications for school buildings to be submitted to, or to be approved by that Board.

On the contrary, special provision is made by statute for the approval of the Board of Education of such plans and specifications, and for the making of contracts for school buildings consented to and for which appropriations shall be made by said Board (see sections 1029 and 1037 of said Consolidation Act, pages 23 and 29 of the Manual); and it may be assumed, I think, that this special provision cannot be affected except by direct legislation in regard thereto.
