

Report for the Quarter ending September 30, 1879.

To the Honorable EDWARD COOPER,

Mayor of the City of New York :

SIR-I have the honor herewith to submit my report of the transactions of this Department for the three months ending September 30, 1879.

NEW BUILDINGS.

The number of plans and specifications submitted for new buildings was 199, and the number of buildings embraced therein was 413.

Of these plans 164 were, upon examination, approved, 15 were rejected, but subsequently amended and approved, and 20 were wholly rejected.

The estimated cost of the erection of these buildings was \$6,018,110.

The number of new buildings commenced during the quarter was 519, the number completed 393, and 1,078 are now in process of erection.

Of the foregoing buildings 342 were to be erected in that portion of the city north of Fortieth street.

ALTERATIONS TO BUILDINGS.

The number of plans and specifications submitted for alterations to buildings was 262, and the number of buildings embraced therein was 275.

Of these plans 202 were, upon examination, approved; 30 were rejected, but subsequently amended and approved, and 30 were wholly rejected.

53 were to be increased in height, 110 extended, 54 altered internally, and 148 externally. The estimated cost of the alteration of these buildings was \$808,852.

The number of alterations commenced during the quarter was 248, the number completed 341, and 144 are now in process of alteration.

UNSAFE BUILDINGS.

The number pending on June 30, 1879, was 97, and the number since reported was 194, making

a total of 291.

Of this number 11 have been taken down and entirely removed, 157 have been repaired and

made safe, and 123 are in process of removal or repair.

During the quarter, legal surveys have been held in 4 cases, the proper parties having neglected or refused to comply with the law.

VIOLATIONS.

The number of violations of the law reported during the quarter was 157, and in 96 of these cases the law has been complied with, and 52 violations reported prior to and pending on July 1st, have been removed, making the total number removed during the quarter 148.

COMPLAINTS.

Received from the public during the quarter, 107; in 36 cases no cause for complaint was found; 3 were removed upon verbal notification given by the examining Inspector; 47 proved unsafe buildings; and 21 violations of the various provisions of the law, of which the owners were duly notified.

FIRE ESCAPES.

The number of buildings reported as requiring means of escape in case of fire during the quarter was 194. Of these 72 were made to conform to the law upon notice, and 122 are now under process. The number of cases of this class reported prior to and pending on July 1st, and since removed, is 107, making a total of 179 cases in which buildings were provided with means of escape in case of

IRON WORK.

Arch girders tested during the quarter, 72; iron beams, 167; and iron lintels, 12; all of which were approved, having been found, on a proper test, to be capable of sustaining the weight proposed to be imposed thereon, except 3 arch girders.

LEGAL BRANCH.

During the quarter 74 cases have been sent to the Attorney for prosecution, 29 of which were for insufficient means of escape in case of fire, iron shutters and unprotected hoistways, 7 for unsafe buildings, and 38 for violations of various provisions of the law.

The number of notices and notes issued and served during the quarter was 3,108. Of this number 642 were for additional means of escape in case of fire, iron shutters and unprotected hoistways, and elevator openings, 457 for various other violations of the law, 700 were for unsafe buildings, and the balance 1,309, miscellaneous.

CONCLUSION.

I again beg leave to call your careful attention to the foregoing comparative statements, evidencing a very large and growing advancement in the building interests of the city during the present year, being far in excess of all other years since 1873, both in the number of buildings and cost of the same.

TRANSACTIONS OF THE BOARD OF EXAMINERS.

(Created under the provisions of section 31, chapter 625, Laws of 1871, as amended by section 8, chapter 547, Laws of 1874.)

During the quarter ending September 30, 1879, six meetings of the Board were held.
64 petitions were filed to modify the law relative to the erection of buildings, of which 57 were granted and 7 denied; 38 petitions were filed to modify the law relative to the alteration of buildings, 32 of which were granted and 6 denied; and 6 applicants were examined as to their qualifications to fill the position of Inspector of Buildings; also 11 petitions were filed to modify the law relative to iron shutters, 9 of which were granted and 2 denied.

Sixteen thousand three hundred and sixty dollars (\$16,360) were expended by the parties in interest in securing and repairing the foregoing buildings under the orders of the Department. Seven (7) cases of unsafe buildings were sent to the Attorney of the Department for prosecution during the quarter, and in four (4) cases it was necessary to hold surveys on the buildings, the proper parties having failed to secure the buildings within the time prescribed.

Seven hundred (700) notices of unsafe buildings, consisting of "cautionary or first notices," "second notices," and "notices and summonses," were issued and served during the last three

Six hundred and forty-two (642) notices for fire escapes, hoistways, iron shutters, etc., consisting of "cautionary or first notices" and "second notices," were issued and served during the last three months, and twenty-nine (29) cases have been sent to the Attorney for prosecution.

Six hundred and ninety-six (696) buildings have been examined by the Inspectors of this Bureau, and except those reported, have been found provided with all the requirements of the law.

By referring to Exhibit "I" it will be noticed that there are two hundred and four (204) cases for additional means of escape in case of fire still in process of removal, for many of which contracts are out and the proper work is being done. Of these cases in process of removal fifty-eight (58) are in the hands of the Attorney for prosecution; in addition to which the Attorney also has three (3) cases for repairs to hoistways and five (5) cases for iron shutters.
