

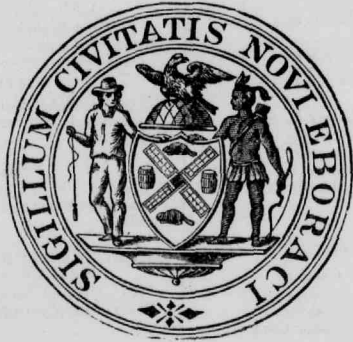

BOARD OF ESTIMATE AND APPORTIONMENT.

BOARD OF ESTIMATE AND APPORTIONMENT—CITY OF NEW YORK,
MAYOR'S OFFICE, CITY HALL,
MONDAY, October 27, 1879—1 o'clock P.M.

The Board met in pursuance of an adjournment.

Present, all the members, viz.: Edward Cooper, the Mayor of the City of New York; John Kelly, the Comptroller of the City of New York; Jordan L. Mott, the President of the Board of Aldermen; John Wheeler, the President of the Department of Taxes and Assessments.

The minutes of the meeting held October 23, 1879, were read and approved.

The Chairman presented the following communication:

Memorandum in reference to Transfers of Appropriations.

Six hundred dollars from "Salaries, Boulevard, Roads, and Avenues—Maintenance," to "Boulevard, Roads, and Avenue—Maintenance."

By strict economy the Department has been able to save this amount in the salaries for the supervision of these works. The roadways require a great deal of sprinkling, and some necessary repairs had to be put off because the appropriations have been less than the Department estimate. It is very desirable that the amount thus saved on salaries be applied to the necessary labor and materials to maintain the roadways.

Three thousand dollars from "Bridge across Fourth avenue, at One Hundred and Sixteenth street," to "Repairs and Renewal of Pavements."

The cost of this bridge is to be borne in equal parts by the City and the N. Y. and Harlem R. R. Co. It has been put under contract, and work on it commenced, so that a full estimate of its cost can easily be made. Allowing for all possible contingencies, there will be a surplus of three thousand in the City's appropriation.

The work of repairing street pavements should be continued with all the means that can be made available. The complaints of bad pavements and demands for repairs continue, though the entire original appropriation has been used up. Many of the places now complained of may soon become dangerous to travel, and may involve the City in suits for damages or injuries. The Department should not be left without the means to prevent this by timely repairs so long as moneys are available for that purpose.
