MESSAGES FROM HIS HONOR THE MAYOR.

The Vice-Chairman laid before the Board the following message from his Honor the Mayor:

No. 1072.

City of New York, Office of the Mayor,
September 16, 1902.

To the Honorable the Board of Aldermen of The City of New York:

I return herewith, without my approval, the resolution suspending the ordinance relating to the discharge of fireworks so far as it relates to the parade and festival of the Marici Montevergine Society in the streets, avenues and thoroughfares of the Eighth Assembly District, Borough of Brooklyn, on September 15, 16 and 17, 1902, adopted by your Board September 4, 1902.

My objection to this resolution, and to others like it, is that they permit the discharge of fireworks without sufficient safeguards against injury to persons and property. Complaints and protests against granting such permits have been received by me, and your Committee on Laws and Legislation has reported to your Honorable Board that these complaints of citizens had foundation in fact. The Fire Commissioner has reported to me that such suspensions of the ordinance in relation to fireworks have led to increased fire hazard and consequent increased insurance rates.

It seems to me highly desirable that your Honorable Board regulate this matter by general ordinance, which shall in all cases impose proper safeguards against injury to persons and property.

Resolved, That the ordinance relating to the discharge of fireworks be and the same is hereby suspended so far as it relates to the parade and festival of the Marici Montevergine Society in the streets, avenues and thoroughfares of the Eighth Assembly District, County of Kings, Borough of Brooklyn, on September 15, 16 and 17, 1902, under the direction of the Commissioner of Police, such suspension to continue only for the place and dates above mentioned.

Preamble and Resolutions Relating to the Pennsylvania Railroad Company's Proposed Franchise Adopted at a Meeting of the Board of Directors, Manufacturers' Association, September 8, 1902.

Whereas, The Pennsylvania Railroad Company has made application to the City for a franchise granting it the privilege of extending its lines into and making a terminal in the City, and

Whereas, This is a project that would be of incalculable advantage to the City as well as to that railroad, and we believe this proposal has been made in due form of law and on a basis of liberality and fair dealing on the part of the railroad corporation; therefore be it

Resolved, That we urge on the Mayor and other City officials concerned, on the Board of Aldermen and on the Rapid Transit Commission, that they should meet the proposal in a like broad-minded spirit, and should offer every facility consistent with the interests of the City for the carrying out of this great work, and

Resolved, That there should be no insistence on the insertion of extraneous stipulations, such as those concerning hours of work or wages, for we believe it would be a public calamity if such should be allowed to defer or defeat a measure of such far-reaching and great benefit; and we regard with disapproval any endeavor to introduce such in this proposed contract, being in our judgment inimical at once to the best interests of the City and of labor.

Dear Sir—I have received your letter of September 11, 1902, inclosing me a copy of that portion of the minutes of the meeting of the Board of Aldermen, held on September 9, 1902, which relates to a resolution numbered 994, providing for an issue of Corporate Stock for the new stock or plant of the Department of Street Cleaning. Your letter also inclosed a copy of the resolution of Alderman Goodman

which was adopted by the Board, instructing the Clerk "to supply the Corporation Counsel with an extract of the minutes covering the question of the vote upon the rejection of the resolution for Corporate Stock for the purchase of stock or plant for the Street Cleaning Department, numbered 994, and to request his opinion as to whether this matter comes under the provisions of sections 47 and 48 of the Charter."

The provisions of sections 47 and 48 of the Charter of The City of New York do not apply to the resolution numbered 994 referred to in your letter. The purchase, acquisition or construction of new stock or plant for the Department of Street Cleaning are not included among the objects set forth in section 47, for which the Board of Aldermen may provide funds by ordinance directing the issue of Corporate Stock. As the provisions of section 48 apply only to cases arising under section 47, and to certain franchises or rights to use the streets, avenues, waters, parkways or highways of the City, they do not apply to the matter under consideration. The Board of Aldermen must act upon the resolution in the usual way and no inference as to its approval of it can be drawn from its failure to adopt or reject it within six weeks of its receipt.

Dear Sir—The following communication has been received from the Corporation Counsel relative to your application to the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund for the assignment of rooms in the old Town Hall, Jamaica, Borough of Queens, for use as a Borough Headquarters and as a Station-house for the Seventy-eighth Police Precinct:

"Hon. EDWARD M. GROUT, Comptroller:

"Sir—I am in receipt of a letter of J. W. Stevenson, Deputy Comptroller, advising me that the Police Department has made application to the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund for the assignment of rooms in the old Town Hall, Jamaica, Borough of Queens, for use as Borough Headquarters and as a Station-house for the Seventy-eighth Police Precinct, and requesting my opinion as to whether the power to assign rooms in this particular building lies with the Board of Aldermen or the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund.

"It is stated in the letter referred to that the rooms in this building, some of which have been taken possession of by various City Departments since consolidation, have never been formally assigned to any particular Department.

"In my letter to you of May 3, 1902, concerning the powers of the Board of Aldermen and the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, respecting the assignment of rooms for Public Officers and City Departments, I wrote as follows:

"After a careful consideration of the application of this portion of section 205 I have arrived at the conclusion that the action of the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund is limited to such cases where the Department having control thereof has found that such City property, or portion thereof, is no longer required by said Department."

"It is my opinion, therefore, that the power to assign rooms for public officers and departments was formerly vested in the former Board of Aldermen and the Municipal Assembly, and that, as to any space never before assigned, it is now vested in the Board of Aldermen of The City of New York."

"If, however, after any such assignment it is found by the officer or department having control thereof that the property, or any portion of it, is no longer required for the purposes to which it was formerly assigned, then the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund may assign such property or such portion thereof to use for any public purpose."

"These conclusions fully answer the present inquiry, since the rooms for which application is made are not surrendered from the control of any public officer or City Department by virtue of some former assignment for a purpose for which they are no longer required, the power to assign them is vested in the Board of Aldermen alone."

It therefore becomes necessary for you to make application for such assignment to the Board of Aldermen.

Whereas, Examinations of persons alleged to be insane cannot be conducted in the absence of the Examiners; and

Whereas, Physicians fully capable of conducting these examinations are in constant attendance at the hospital in the persons of the Resident Physician in charge of the Pavilion for the Reception of the Insane and his assistant; and

Whereas, The making use of their services in place of those of the present Examiners in Lunacy will result in some saving to the City; therefore be it

Resolved, That the positions of Examiners in Lunacy now held by Doctors Allen Fitch and Valentine Wildman be and they hereby are abolished as unnecessary and that the duties heretofore performed by Doctors Fitch and Wildman be hereafter performed by the Resident Physicians in the Pavilion for Insane, this resolution to take effect on the 15th of October, 1902.

Gentlemen—In accordance with the instructions of the Board of Trustees I beg

to call the attention of your Board to the resolutions (a copy of which is inclosed) which were passed at a special meeting of the Board held August 28, 1902.

In addition to the facts referred to in the above resolution I beg to state the expense of the present method of administration in the Department for the Insane at Bellevue Hospital to be as follows:

Pursuant to the resolutions and in reference to the expenses just mentioned, I would request the Board to permit the following changes to be made:

- 1st. The abolition of the position of Examiner in Lunacy. This will remove the item of \$3,300 per annum.
- 2d. Increase in the salary of the Resident Physician to \$3,500 per annum.
- 3d. The raising of the salary of the Assistant Resident Physician to \$1,500.
- 4th. The making of a new position, Second Assistant Resident Physician, at \$1,500.

The total expense for salaries will then be \$6,500, as against \$6,900 now paid. In order to cut down expenses by October 15, the date on which the Board wishes to make this change effective, it is respectfully requested that your Board give this matter immediate attention.

This Department was advised as to this figure, which included the salary of two Assistant Superintendents of Parks at \$2,500 per annum each. The Department received no formal notice, however, of the amount actually appropriated until several weeks after the action of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, and it was then learned that although it had been the intent of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment to appropriate the amount above named, and provision had been made, in fixing salaries, to expend that amount, through a clerical error, the \$5,000 for two Assistant Superintendents of Parks had not been added to the fund. This reduced the appropriation..... 5,000 00

Or left it..... \$28,280 00

This amount would have been insufficient to meet the salaries charged against the fund for a year, but because the two Assistant Superintendents were not appointed until the latter part of May, it was possible to meet the salaries chargeable against the fund for the balance of the year by leaving the position of Superintendent of Parks, at \$4,000 per annum, unfilled. The error was a most unfortunate one for the Department as the office of Superintendent of Parks is one of the most important in the service and the need for a Superintendent has been keenly felt throughout the year.

The revised estimate for 1902 was made up on the basis of the estimate prepared in 1901, with necessary reductions to meet the conditions presented. After this revised estimate had been passed upon, it was found that a clerical payroll aggregating some \$7,020 per annum had been for years charged against "Labor, Maintenance and Supplies." It is believed that this payroll, for services purely clerical in character, should be transferred from the Labor, Maintenance and Supplies Fund to that of "Administration," and in this estimate the transfer is so made, and the Labor, Maintenance and Supplies estimate decreased accordingly from what it would otherwise have been.

The increase in salaries item is made up as follows:

Chief Bookkeeper, \$200. This official has had charge of the accounts of the Department for many years. He has been in its employ for twenty-four years, and his services have been always of a most satisfactory nature. His salary is below that paid in other departments for similar work, and the small amount added, it is believed, is well earned and should be allowed.

Stenographer and Typewriter, \$120. This lady has been in the employ of the Department some six years, and her salary is now below that paid in other departments for similar work. It is believed that \$1,200 is a fair compensation for her services.

Entomologist, \$300. The Entomologist's duties in this Department have greatly increased within the past few years, and the importance of his work in the parks cannot be overestimated. His salary has been far below that generally paid for such expert services. He is a gentleman of recognized reputation and ability in his profession, and it is believed that, with the added amount, his salary will be less than another equally competent would accept for the work. Professor Southwick has been in the employ of the Department since 1883.

Chief Engineer, \$800. The Chief Engineer of this Department has been receiving much less salary than is paid in other City Departments for the same services. Owing to the large increase in park areas in the boroughs of Manhattan and Richmond, and the amount of construction work on hand, his duties have increased in importance and in quantity very materially, and it is believed that his present salary is altogether inadequate. His services are entirely satisfactory, and the Department believes that his salary should be fixed at the amount asked for the purpose, that amount being below that paid in the other City Departments for work of the

character performed by this official. He was appointed in this Department in 1872, and his long experience has fitted him especially well for the duties which he is called upon to perform.

Purchasing Agent, \$500. This amount is offset by a decrease in the salary of the Superintendent of Supplies and Repairs. The work of these two officials is similar in character and equal in importance, and, it is believed, after nearly a year's experiment, that the salaries should be equally divided.

This fund was found to be altogether inadequate, and the working forces had to be reduced in the early spring to a very low figure. It has been found to be absolutely impossible to maintain the parks in the manner desired by the public with the amount allowed in the revised estimate for 1902.

In addition to the inadequate force for 1902 there will be several new parks to be maintained in 1903, viz.: William H. Seward Park, DeWitt Clinton Park and Thomas Jefferson Park.

New public comfort stations are being built as follows:

- Morningside Park, for men and women.
- North Meadow, Central Park, for women.
- Battery Park, for men.
- Stuyvesant Square, for men.
- Washington Park, for men.
- Riverside Park, at Ninety-sixth street, for men and women.
- Conservatory Lake, Central Park, for men.
- Seward Park, for men and women.
- DeWitt Clinton Park, for men and women.
- Thomas Jefferson Park, for men and women.

The maintenance of these public comfort stations will require the services of sixteen male Attendants at \$540 per annum and ten female Attendants at \$420 per annum.

These comfort stations are imperatively necessary and demanded by the public, and provision must be made for their maintenance as they are built from time to time.

The increase in the item of supplies is in proportion to the increase in park area, the number of cottages, etc. The amount will be expended approximately as follows:

The salary of the Director of the Central Park Menagerie was reduced in 1902 from \$3,000 to \$2,500, the total Zoological appropriation being reduced from the estimate prepared in 1901 by \$2,000.

The Menagerie has received very careful supervision during the year 1902, and by a rearrangement of the work so as to obtain the best possible results from the forces employed, it is believed that with a decrease in the amount allowed for 1902 of \$160, the appropriation will still be sufficient to permit of the restoration of the Director's salary to its former figure, \$3,000.

The Director of the Menagerie, Mr. John W. Smith, has been employed in that position for some ten years. He devotes seven days a week to the work, taking no vacation or holidays, and his hours are longer than any other official of the Department. The Menagerie is kept in a clean and attractive condition, and the mortality of the collection is very low.

Owing to the work of improvement in Hudson Park during the summer of 1902 but four concerts were given there, the balance being distributed in other parks. It is desired to make the number twelve for 1903.

Seward Park was also improved during the summer of 1902 and but six concerts could be given there. It is desired to give the full number of twelve there in 1903.

Thomas Jefferson Park was first opened for public use in 1902 and two concerts were given there, in place of two which would have been given in Hudson Park if work there would have permitted. It is very desirable that a full quota of twelve concerts should be given there in 1903.

DeWitt Clinton Park, Twelfth avenue and Fifty-second street, will be in condition to hold the first concerts there in 1903. It is desired to provide for the full number of twelve concerts.

At the Staten Island parks (recently improved) no concerts have ever been given. The Department has been urged to provide them in 1903 and the necessary amount to provide twelve is asked.

The amount appropriated for ten concerts in Morningside Park for 1902 was \$50 less than the cost of ten concerts at \$125 each. This amount has accordingly been added to make the fund balance.

With the above schedule at least \$250 will be required additional for calcium lights and other incidental expenses.

One of the most attractive features of the public parks is the concerts given in them during the summer months. These concerts, rendered by bands capable of producing high-class concert music, give great pleasure to the people, and probably no money expended by the City is better appreciated by the whole community. On the Mall, Central Park, in Madison Square, and in Mulberry Bend and "Little Italy," equal enjoyment is obtained from the music, and it is believed that its effect upon the people is elevating as well as recreative, and that the money spent in this way produces beneficial results second to no fund provided by the City.

The number of parks which will be available for concerts in 1903 will be increased by Thomas Jefferson Park, DeWitt Clinton Park, William H. Seward Park and the small parks on Staten Island. To furnish music in these new parks, the appropriation must be increased from year to year as they are improved. Urgent requests have been made by residents in the several vicinities for concerts for next year and the Department strongly recommends that the entire amount asked for music for 1903 will be allowed.

It is believed that the number of concerts given in some district should be increased in number, to permit of their being given during a longer season, but as the number of parks has materially increased, the additional amount asked is only sufficient to cover these new parks at the usual ratio of concerts.

The amount allowed for 1902 was \$1,500 less than that appropriated in 1900 for this purpose. The increase of \$500 asked for 1903 is needed for additional materials for resurfacing all of the walks and the approach from One Hundred and Fifty-fifth street. This work is urgently required.

This is the amount that has been appropriated for this purpose for several years, and it is expended in the salary of the Ambulance Attendant.

CARE OF GRANT'S TOMB.

Pursuant to chapter 670, Laws of 1897, the City entered into a contract with the Grant Monument Association for the care and preservation of the tomb of General Grant on Riverside Park. This contract runs for twenty-one years. The association serves without compensation and the City agrees to pay the expenses, not exceeding \$5,000 per year, which is the amount allowed last year and asked for 1903.

BUREAU FOR THE CARE AND PRESERVATION OF STREET TREES.

To be organized under the provisions of chapter 453, Laws of 1902... \$60,150 00

Under the act referred to "all trees and other forms of vegetation * * * shall be under the exclusive care and cultivation of the Commissioner of Parks, etc."

This act had no sooner become a law than this Department was deluged with applications from all over the city to remove dead trees, replace those that were dead or missing, or plant new ones. There being no fund for this work but little attention could be given to it on any streets but parkways.

Mr. Samuel Parsons, Jr., Landscape Architect, has given very careful consideration to the necessities in the boroughs of Manhattan and Richmond, and has prepared an estimate of the amount required for the year 1903.

The amount asked will be needed for the care of street trees now standing (including the destruction of insects and fungus pests), proper pruning, fertilizing, etc., and the replacing of trees upon avenues where they were set out by the City but have died through neglect. Some four thousand trees have been set out by the City in this way upon the broad avenues such as Lenox, Seventh and St. Nicholas avenues, as will be seen by the accompanying list.

Force of Park Keepers..... \$44,347 50

The system of policing the smaller city parks since the consolidation of the Park Police Force with the Municipal Force has been very unsatisfactory, and the parks have suffered in consequence. The former Park Police Force was organized as a force of Park Keepers, and the men were trained to a high state of efficiency for park work. Such work is distinct in character from that of the men on the Municipal Force. The Park Keeper, while authorized to protect property and maintain order, at the same time acts more as a watchman or attendant than a member of the Municipal Force is expected to in the streets. A Park Keeper's duties are wholly within the parks, and experience has shown, both in this and other cities, that the best results are obtained by the employment of men for park work alone.

To care for the downtown parks it is believed that 54 Park Keepers will be required. These men can be secured at \$2.25 per day, or \$44,347.50 per annum, as against \$75,600 for an equal number of Patrolmen if they were assigned to the work. In other words, it is believed that at a saving of \$31,253 to the City better service can be obtained in the downtown parks by the employment of Park Keepers. In this way the services of the Policemen who now do duty in the downtown parks could be spared to the outside streets, and several small parks, which now receive little or no attention at the hands of the Police, could be more diligently cared for.

It is believed that a system of Park Keepers is urgently needed if the parks are to be preserved from damage and disorder, and that the amount asked should be allowed for reasons of economy as well as proper maintenance of the parks.

MAINTENANCE OF ASPHALT.

Central and City parks..... \$8,000 00

The guaranty having expired on a number of pieces of asphalt pavement in the parks, it is necessary for this Department to make the necessary repairs, and it is estimated that \$8,000 will be required for this purpose for 1903.

Repairs to cement pavement around Tomb of General Grant..... \$12,000 00

The pavement around General Grant's tomb, laid during the winter of 1896-1897, is badly cracked and settled. Some of the walls supporting the surrounding coping have settled badly and should be taken up and rebuilt, and most of the granite work in the coping, steps, etc., requires repointing. It is estimated that the work required will consist of 52,400 square feet of Portland cement sidewalk to be relaid, and the necessary repairs to all masonry, pointing of granite, etc., which will cost \$12,000, the amount asked.

Repairs to drainage, Central Park..... \$2,000 00

This amount will be required for taking up existing defective drains, repairing basins and relaying new pipe at Sixty-sixth street and West drive; from Bridge No. 26, up to and around circle to block-house at Eighty-first street and East drive, and at Ninety-sixth street and West drive.

Repairs to retaining wall, Riverside drive..... \$15,000 00

It is found that the dry rubble retaining wall on the westerly side of Riverside drive is bulged in places and settled in others. These defects should be remedied at once to prevent damage to park property and settlements in roadway of drive. An estimate of cost of taking down and re-erecting this wall and restoring the pavement and sod shows that it will cost \$15,000.

Repairs to Sheepfold, Central Park..... \$10,000 00

This building has been neglected for many years and largely used for purposes for which it was never intended. It is now proposed to restore it as a sheepfold, to properly house the flock maintained by the Department, and to this end repairs, including repairs to roof, painting, masonry work, etc., will cost \$10,000.

CLEANING CENTRAL PARK LAKES.

This item has been included in the Departmental Estimate for several years past, but no appropriations has been made for this very urgent work. This Department has been in receipt of many complaints from citizens regarding the unhealthful condition of the park lakes, and has very recently been served with a notice from the Health Department that they are not in a sanitary condition, and that something must be done toward cleaning them. They should be cleaned, new concrete bottom laid, side walls should be reconstructed and a proper circuit of water introduced. In order to reconstruct the system of lakes, ponds, pools, etc., in Central Park, it is believed that it will be necessary to provide \$300,000. The work, however, can be taken up in sections, and it is believed that \$50,000 should be appropriated for 1903 to eliminate the most obnoxious features in the system.

CUSTODIAN FOR SOLDIERS AND SAILORS' MONUMENT.

The Soldiers and Sailors' Monument, situated on Riverside Park, at Eighty-

ninth street and Riverside Drive, is nearly completed, and about to be turned over to this Department for care and maintenance.

The services of a custodian at \$1,080 per annum will be required.

Inclosing structure for Hippopotamus Tank, Central Park..... \$6,000 00

There are now in the Central Park Menagerie three hippopotami, without doubt the most valuable collection of these animals in the world. Experts state that it would be almost impossible to place a proper value upon the male specimen in Central Park. These animals are rapidly becoming extinct and more difficult to procure, and the Central Park Menagerie has been more successful in breeding them in captivity than any other similar institution in the world. As at present arranged, it is necessary to remove these animals from the outdoor tank constructed for them to the winter quarters in the lion house. These quarters are very inadequate, being neither large enough for the purpose nor suited in other ways; and the removal to the winter quarters in the fall and to the summer quarters in the spring is done with more or less danger to the public and at considerable cost to the Department. It is believed that this most interesting and valuable collection is entitled to proper housing, and it is desired to erect an ornamental structure over the present winter quarters, including the necessary heating apparatus. It is estimated that such a structure will cost \$6,000, the amount asked.

For resurfacing Harlem River Driveway..... \$1,400 00

The condition of the roadway of the Harlem River Driveway is such that it will be absolutely necessary to resurface the same in the spring of 1903. The Assistant Superintendent who supervises the Speedway and other roadways reports that the roadbed of the Speedway is worn out and cannot be kept in a satisfactory condition unless new material is spread to a proper depth. The roadbed of the Speedway is laid upon made ground, and this makes it more difficult to maintain it in proper condition. It is estimated that the proper material can be obtained for \$1 a yard, and that 14,000 yards will be required, making the amount asked.

Maintenance of Playgrounds and Kindergartens in the Public Parks.... \$14,560 00

The work of improving the following named parks will be in progress the present year, and in each park a playground and kindergarten feature is included. The work will be pushed to completion, and it is believed that the playgrounds, etc., will be ready for public use not later than May 1, 1903. The following staff will be required to maintain this feature of park work in 1903:

Maintenance of Public Bath-houses in Hamilton Fish and William H. Seward Parks \$2,560 00

It is expected that the bath houses in these parks will be opened to the public by May 1, 1903. The amount required to operate them eight months of 1903 is as follows, not counting the cost of heating and other supplies:

Maintenance of Public Comfort Station, City Hall Park..... \$2,880 00

The public comfort station in City Hall Park has been maintained by the Department of Highways and its successor. In an opinion dated December 21, 1893, to the President of the Park Board, the Corporation Counsel stated as follows:

"In my opinion your Department has jurisdiction over the public urinals recently completed in the City Hall Park."

The force necessary to maintain this station is as follows:

This comfort station is clearly within the jurisdiction of the Department of Parks, as set forth in the Charter. If the Department of Parks is to maintain it, with other structures of a similar character in the parks, an appropriation must be made as indicated.

As will be noted upon the payroll, Chief Engineer's force, hereto attached, it is proposed to increase the salaries of members of the Architectural and Engineering Corps, as follows:

Mr. J. R. Munckwitz, Jr., Architect, is at present drawing a salary of but \$2,000 per annum, an amount out of all proportion to the value of the services rendered by him. His services of twenty-five years in the Department, during which time he has always been faithful and industrious, and his work satisfactory, has made him a very valuable official, with an accurate knowledge of the parks and park works. Much of his time is given to passing upon work done under contract with the Department of an architectural character, such as work upon the buildings of the American Museum of Natural History, the Museum of Art, the Public Library and other structures of that character. His decisions upon technical questions of an architectural character have always been highly regarded, and the work upon the park buildings done under his supervision has been of a commendable character. It is earnestly hoped that the increase asked will be allowed.

The other increases indicated are for the purpose of bringing the salaries up to those paid other employees for the same work. As will be seen, the men have all of them been employed in the Department for years, and the increases in their salaries are strongly urged by the Chief Engineer and the Commissioner.

The above salaries are charged to construction account generally, and will not appear elsewhere in the estimate than the payroll referred to. The action to be

taken upon them, therefore, is simply to fix the amounts and not to appropriate funds for the same.

EXPLANATION OF PAYROLLS.

Administration—Boroughs of Manhattan and Richmond.

As is explained on page 5 of the Departmental Estimate, the increase in this payroll is largely made up by the addition of a clerical force for many years paid from the appropriation for labor, maintenance and supplies and which, it is believed, should be charged to administration. Also by the addition of \$5,000 in payment of the salaries of two Assistant Superintendents of Parks omitted in error from the amount made available for 1902.

Chief Engineer's Force.

It is impossible to make a comparative statement of the total allowed for 1902 and the estimated amount required for 1903. This payroll is charged almost entirely to construction accounts, and the size of the payrolls necessarily depends upon the amount of money made available for construction work. It is impossible to make a comparison between the rate for any one month and the amount that will be required for the following year.

Harlem River Driveway.

This payroll depends entirely upon weather conditions, and varies throughout the year according to such conditions. It is impossible, therefore, to make a comparison that would be of any value between the rate for July, 1902, and the rate for the entire year 1903.

Labor, Maintenance and Supplies.

This payroll varies greatly throughout the different months, altogether dependent upon the conditions of the weather, the amount available for repairs, etc. It is generally at its maximum in July, and it is impossible to make a comparison between the rate for July, 1902, and the amount that will be required for the following year.

In the above items, \$10,000 is asked for machinery and tools, which are very much needed. I have found the Department absolutely without any machinery for road making, and a stone crusher is very much needed, which will cost \$3,500, and will save a great deal of money to the Department, in place of buying the crushed stone.

Another steam roller is needed, there being only one roller for the immense area covered by this Department.

Derricks, ploughs, and a steam lawn-mower for the golf links, are very much needed, and the amount asked for will not begin to provide the number of tools that are actually necessary for the proper conduct of this Department.

Third—Resurfacing Walks.

The walks in St. Mary's and nearly all the other parks were built of ashes and cinders, mostly, and at every heavy rain the top surface is washed completely from the path into the lawns, and it is time that these walks were treated the same as the walks in the other parks that are developed—asphalted; and it will require at least 150,000 square feet of asphalt walks, which would cost \$30,000.

Fourth—Cleaning Van Cortlandt Lake.

This very much needed improvement to the parks has been before the Board of Estimate for the past two years. During this time of waiting, the evil complained of in the past has been largely augmented; so much so, that in the summertime the lake looks more like a wild swamp, filled with weeds, than it does like a lake, and it is reported that the condition of this lake is very unhealthy.

Hundreds of people visit the immediate vicinity of the lake daily, all summer, in playing golf, and it would add, also, very much to the appearance of Van Cortlandt Park, which is becoming very popular, if this very much needed improvement could be carried out during the coming year.

The estimate for this work of the Engineer is the removal of 60,000 yards of excavation, at an expense of 50 cents a yard, \$30,000.

Fifth—Colonial Garden.

For the completion of the Colonial Garden, which, during the present year, has been put in shape of development, will require at least the purchase of 4,000 cubic yards of top-soil before any planting can be done. This will cost \$4,000.

Sixth—Forestry Work.

Previous to the present year no work has been done or money expended in the care of trees in the parks of The Bronx; no pruning or cleaning up of any kind, and it is absolutely necessary for the preservation of some of the old and ancient trees in these parks, of which we have over 2,000 acres of forest, that they should be attended to, the dead limbs removed and proper pruning done, so that the trees will improve, in place of deteriorating, in the future.

To do this work will require at least the services of thirty men continually during the year, which would cost at least, including supervision.....

There should also be at least 2,000 trees planted in the parkways and parks during the coming year, so that the City will be deriving the benefit of their growth. Pelham parkway has been regulated and graded and used, for the last five years, for about two miles in extent through the centre thereof; but no trees have been planted, and two lines of trees can be planted upon the line of the roadway already developed, and should be at once.

Five hundred trees would be required for this parkway alone, for two lines of trees. The cost of these, well planted, with sufficient top soil and fertilizer, would be at least

Maintenance of Botanical Gardens.

I herewith submit detailed estimate, prepared by Dr. N. L. Britton, Director-in-Chief, under date of August 12, 1902, amounting to \$79,900.

I have examined the work necessary to be done during the coming year, and the statement of expenses submitted by Dr. Britton, which are, in my judgment,

necessary, and the full amount asked for during the coming year should be allowed; otherwise the good work being done by this institution will be, to a certain extent, impeded.

During the past year and at the present time large additions are being made to the roads and walks, all of which will require more expenditure for maintenance; also the completion of the contracts for conservatories and other improvements.

There will be a larger amount of land under cultivation, a great deal of unfinished lawns and banks will have been brought into use, and development will require more Gardeners and Laborers.

The allowance of \$65,000 for the past year was insufficient, and the Department reported that they have had to supplement the same very largely with their own funds.

Maintenance of Zoological Gardens.

In transmitting this estimate I desire especially to call the attention of the Board to the fact that, each year, thus far, since the organization of the Zoological Park, the Society has, from its own funds, been required to make good a deficiency in maintenance; that the amount asked for by them each year has represented only the actual requirements for the proper conduct of the institution, and each year there has been a cut made in the amount asked, and therefore left a deficiency for the Society to make good.

The amount asked for this year is very much in excess of that in previous years, but the same is absolutely essential to the proper maintenance of the buildings, collections and grounds of the Zoological Park.

Attention is called to the fact that there have been several new buildings and collections, and one hundred acres of additional park land brought under the control and care of the Society, but hitherto wholly unprovided for. About one hundred acres of land along the Bronx river, now being provided with walks and a boundary fence, in the future must be as fully guarded and cleaned as any other portion of the park. In the past nothing has been done that would require expense with this part of the park.

The opening of the new Lion House, Antelope House and also the Ostrich House will require large increase in the force and cost, and I earnestly hope that the full amount asked for will be granted.

The increased cost of food and fuel at the present time is far in excess of that estimated.

Music.

The revised estimate for music made and allowed for the current year was \$9,360. The same amount will be sufficient for the necessary concerts for the Department for the coming year—\$9,360.

Contingencies.

The amount of the appropriation for contingencies made for the past years has been \$1,500. This appropriation is designed to meet the cost of telephone service, petty cash disbursements, and various small expenses. As the telephone service alone costs over one-half this amount, I submit that the sum of \$1,500 should be allowed for this item.

Surveys, Maps and Plans.

This is an appropriation that has been allowed for several years for surveying, monumenting and grading the outlying and other parks of the borough; for the preparation of maps, plans and specifications; for the important works of contracts to be inaugurated during the year. The amount allowed for the past few years has been \$10,000 each year. As this work has been very much advanced, I think that \$7,500 would be ample to cover this item for the ensuing year—\$7,500.

Tree Planting on Public Highways and the Care of Said Trees.

Chapter 453 of the Laws of 1902 places the care of all the trees in the public streets in the Borough of The Bronx upon the hands of the Commissioner of Parks for said borough, as well as the planting of all new trees required upon the streets and avenues in said borough.

A very close estimate has been made by me, and I find that, for the care of the trees alone, it will require, at least, the following items, to wit:

For the planting of new trees, I find that section III. of the act reads as follows: "Whenever the President of the Borough shall request the Park Board to plant trees in any street in said borough, said Board shall comply, provided it shall be found available to plant trees."

The President of the Borough of The Bronx has already submitted to this Department a long list of avenues and streets that are being regulated and graded, which require the planting of trees early in the coming year, and the Engineer of said

Department says that it will take about 4,000 trees to supply the streets upon the list already submitted, which is as follows:

Monroe avenue, between Belmont street and Tremont avenue.
One Hundred and Sixty-fourth street, Summit and Anderson avenues.
One Hundred and Eighty-second street, between Arthur avenue and Boston road.

One Hundred and Eighty-fourth street, Park avenue and Third avenue.

In addition to the above avenues and streets, the Engineer submits that there will be others coming along during the year that will require at least 2,000 more trees, so that a close estimate of the wants of this Department for the coming year for the planting of new trees alone, will be 6,000 new trees, and the most conservative estimate that can be made for the planting of the same, in a proper and efficient manner, is \$8 per tree, amounting to \$48,000.

In order to preserve the trees, after planted, and protect them from destruction from horses, a large number of them—at least one-half of those set out upon streets—should be protected by some suitable tree-guard; otherwise the expense of planting the tree is very likely to be wasted.

Where the streets are improved and built upon, all of the tradespeople come in front of the houses and leave their horses standing where they can gnaw the bark from the tree, and in all such cases as this tree-guards are absolutely necessary.

The price of tree-guards varies so, that it is hard to say exactly what this cost should be—running anywhere from \$2 or \$3 to \$15—but a good, substantial tree-guard could not be obtained for less than \$5 a tree. Three thousand of these would cost \$15,000.

Note No. 1—July payroll did not include the Messenger, who had already been laid off, and so the Administration list will not show the decrease mentioned in the appropriation.

Note No. 2—This is the amount making the increase mentioned in the appropriation for Administration for 1903.

ART COMMISSION OF THE CITY OF NEW YORK.

Hon. CHARLES V. FORNES, President Board of Aldermen, City Hall, New York:

Dear Sir—Through some error, probably unavoidable, the Art Commission did not receive until yesterday afternoon a copy of the circular regarding "departmental estimates for the year 1903," which the Comptroller evidently intended to send us late in July. I hasten to comply with the request which it contains, and trust that the delay may not inconvenience you.

The Art Commission begs to submit the following estimate of expenditures for the year 1903, and in parallel column will be found the estimated appropriations for the present year.

The appropriations authorized during 1902 were only for a part of a year—ten months, instead of twelve. To afford a true comparison for each twelve months it was necessary, therefore, to increase by 20 per cent. the items authorized in 1902, which has been done in this column. The total appropriations for ten months in 1902 were \$6,000; for twelve months they would have been \$7,200 if continued at the same rate.

Comparing the expenditures for the two years it is evident that there are changes in only two items, namely, "incidental expenses" and "salary of Clerk and Messenger." The increase in the former is \$400, and the latter is a new employee.

In this connection permit me to say that, with the inauguration of the present charter, the functions of the Art Commission were very greatly increased, and at present, either by direct reference or upon request of the Mayor or the Board of Aldermen, almost all public structures come before the Art Commission for approval. The number of submissions has increased so steadily that a large amount of work has been imposed upon members of the Commission, and the future promises to add still further to their duties and obligations. In many instances, owing to the limited staff at present assigned to the Commission, the members have been obliged to do many things which might properly be referred to a clerk. It is proposed, therefore, to add to the staff an employee who could make measurements, take photographs, investigate the more simple questions, and thus save the members of the Commission from attending to matters of routine and of detail. This employee could also act as confidential messenger, and owing to the increasing importance of the plans submitted to the Commission it is quite necessary that the messenger having in charge such valuable plans and designs should be an employee of the Commission and directly responsible to it.

In view of the increasing demands made upon the Commission the increase in the estimate for incidental expenses seems fully justified. The Commission has frequently been called upon for suggestions both by City departments and Architects designing for the City as to the most fitting designs for public buildings and structures of all sorts. While the Commission cannot formally suggest what is best to be done, it does feel that, not only to assist its own members in preparing reports upon matters coming before the Commission, but also to serve City officials and architects most effectively, a collection of photographs, prints and works containing the best instances of public art should be made as quickly as possible, and to this purpose the added expenditure will be devoted.

In view of these facts, and that the members of the Commission serve without pay, it is believed that the estimate for 1903 will meet with your full and complete approval.

the honor to submit the following departmental estimate of the amount necessary to conduct the business of the office of District Attorney for the County of New York for the year 1903, with a detailed statement of the objects of such expenditure and a statement of the salaries of each of the officials, clerks and other employees of said office, as follows:

The amount requested for salaries for the ensuing year is on the basis of the present payroll under appropriations duly made by your Board, with an increase only of \$5,100, sufficient to permit the continuance of the recent proper and reasonable readjustment of salaries of the professional and administrative staff. These increases are in recognition of the exceptionally valuable services rendered by these gentlemen, the work performed by each of them being of such a character that they should in justice receive higher compensation.

The creation of the "Complaint and Preparation Bureau" in this office some seven months ago has entailed greatly increased labor upon this office, requiring the constant attention of several Deputy Assistant District Attorneys and other employees to keep pace with the large and ever-increasing volume of business devolving upon that bureau, which has proven a valuable addition to the public service at the same time that it is maintained without additional cost to the county by reason of the large saving effected in dispensing with the use of certified copies of indictments, etc., which certifications formerly cost the county at least \$7,500 annually.

The amount requested for "Supplies and Contingencies, including Arrearages," for the year 1903 is \$75,000. It has been customary for your Honorable Board to appropriate the sum of \$30,000 annually for "Supplies and Contingencies, including Arrearages," which sum is totally inadequate to meet even the ordinary expenses of this office. The policy of appropriating \$30,000 for "Supplies and Contingencies, including Arrearages," when it has been conclusively shown that for many years the said sum is insufficient to meet the demands on that account, I believe to be a very unwise one, for the reason that owing to the small appropriation allowed, my predecessors were compelled to hold such claims as amounted to several hundred dollars or so until the close of each year and then forward same to the Comptroller with a certification to the effect that the services, etc., specified in the claims had been rendered, and that the claimants proposed to file claims and bring action to recover. Such claims were eventually paid by the Comptroller from the "Revenue Bond Fund for Claims" or out of the "Judgment Fund," and consequently this office avoided paying the amounts out of the "Contingent Fund" of this office. This procedure occasioned considerable delay and injustice to the claimants and resulted in great loss, by reason of the county having finally to pay not only the original claim, but in addition the cost of the actions, including interest, etc.

Owing to these conditions and in order to avoid a recurrence, I requested your Honorable Board to grant \$50,000 for "Supplies and Contingencies, including Arrearages," for the current year, but, unfortunately, only \$30,000 was allowed. From this amount the sum of \$5,602.25 has been disbursed as "Arrearages" for contingent expenses incurred by my predecessor, Hon. Eugene A. Philbin; consequently the contingent expenses for the year 1901 under his administration amounted to \$57,602.25, instead of \$52,000, and these "Arrearages" of \$5,602.25 being payable out of our "Contingencies" for 1902—\$30,000—left us actually \$24,397.75 available for said account for this year.

The above mentioned \$57,602.25 expended for contingent expenses incurred during the year 1901 does not include a number of large claims paid by the Comptroller from the "Judgment Fund" and the "Revenue Bond Fund for Claims," nor does it include large claims for services of medical experts in the case of the People vs. Albert T. Patrick, which were paid from a special appropriation granted May 23, 1902.

During the current year the demands on the "Contingent" account of this office have been unusually heavy, owing to the extraordinary expenses incurred in cases of great importance to the community. Many homicide and other criminal cases of great difficulty were tried, requiring the employment of experts in medicine and chemistry, also in cases of lunacy inquiries, etc. These cases also required the attendance of important witnesses from all parts of the country, and their maintenance while attending trials, at great expense, especially so in the cases relating to the police and other public departments, particularly the former, where it was found necessary to employ a number of special officers and to provide for the maintenance of important witnesses who are kept under constant surveillance, it being necessary to send these witnesses out of town in the custody of such special officers, all of whom had to be provided with transportation and hotel accommodation, and the witnesses furnished with clothing, etc., and medical attendance. A heavy outlay was also incurred in locating the whereabouts of witnesses who were induced to leave the jurisdiction of the State, and in bringing them back.

Heavy expenses were also incurred in procuring the arrest and extradition of prisoners from other States and countries, including an expensive proceeding in extradition now pending wherein it has been necessary to engage special counsel and send representatives of this office to the State of Ohio. It has been customary in the past, owing to the limited appropriation granted, for this office to make an agreement with the complainants to pay a portion of the expense incurred in various extradition proceedings, in some instances this office paying one-third and the complainants the balance. These agreements are not only illegal, but wrong in principle, for when a proper case is presented for extradition the county should defray the expense of same.

Large expenditures were incurred in making urgent and necessary improvements in the rooms assigned for the use of the professional staff and other attaches of this office, said rooms having been in a deplorable condition, and it was necessary to furnish desks, chairs, office tables, cabinets, wardrobes, carpets, etc., and have the rooms properly equipped for the transaction of public business. The cost of these furnishings was an additional drain upon our "Contingent" account, as no provision had been made in the departmental estimate for the same, for the reason that supplies of that character were formerly procured on requisition through the Department of Public Buildings and Supplies.

Owing to the foregoing exceptional expenditures, our appropriation for "Contingencies" is practically exhausted, and on August 21, 1902, pursuant to section 1542 of the Greater New York Charter, I sent to your Honorable Board a communication certifying that the sum of \$20,000 was urgently required for the proper conduct of criminal actions, including that against John D. Herlihy and others, and I requested that this additional appropriation be granted at your earliest convenience, as it should be available at the present moment.

The special appropriation of \$70,000, granted by your Honorable Board as per

resolution adopted May 23, 1902, for expenses in conducting criminal actions against Albert T. Patrick, David L. Short, Morris Meyers and Roland B. Molineux, I believe will be ample for the purposes indicated.

I desire to state to your Honorable Board that when I entered upon the administration of this office on January 1, 1902, there were 826 indictments pending, and I am pleased to inform you that, notwithstanding the unusual demands made upon this office since then, that number has been reduced about 50 per cent., in addition to keeping abreast of a volume of criminal business greater than that disposed of in a corresponding period during any previous year.

I am informed that the number of prisoners confined in the City Prison awaiting trial in the Court of General Sessions has been the lowest in many years, and that it was usual during the summer months to have an average number of twenty-eight prisoners confined in the prison charged with homicide, whereas during the present summer months the number of prisoners confined there charged with homicide has been reduced to fifteen.

During the period commencing January 1, 1902, and ending August 1, 1902, there were disposed of by this office 3,382 cases, exceeding the number disposed of in the same period of the previous year, 1901, in which the volume of business transacted was greater than in any similar period prior to that time.

In addition to this, it is necessary that this office be represented in the Court of Special Sessions, which court during the first seven months of this year disposed of 3,637 cases.

With the constantly increasing population in this county, the business devolving upon this office naturally increases also, and I accordingly can see no way of making any reductions, other than those which I have already made, either in the professional or administrative staff, or in the expense account.

BELLEVUE AND ALLIED HOSPITALS.

Bellevue and Allied Hospitals,

Hon. CHARLES V. FORNES, President of the Board of Aldermen, No. 11 City Hall, New York City:

Sir—In compliance with section 226 of the Greater New York Charter I transmit herewith the estimates of expenditure of the Department of Bellevue and Allied Hospitals for the year 1903. These estimates, pursuant to a circular letter of the Honorable Comptroller, dated July 23, 1902, state specifically the objects and purposes of all the appropriations necessary, in our opinion, to pay the expense of conducting the public business of this Department for the year 1903.

The total amount of appropriations required for 1903 is \$633,011.78, which is \$10,035.46 in excess of the sum asked for and granted for 1902, making allowance for the fact that the appropriation for the current year covers only the period of eleven months beginning with February 1, 1902. This excess is due to the increased estimate for salaries. In all other items of expense we have asked for a less appropriation than that allowed for 1902, or have limited ourselves to the amounts estimated to be sufficient for the present year.

Of the increased estimate for salaries, \$8,370 is required in order that we may comply with the "Eight-hour Law" and "The Prevailing Rate of Wages Law," which regulate respectively the hours of labor and the rate of wages of licensed Engineers and Firemen (stokers), of whom we have sixteen in the service of the hospitals. These employees will hereafter provide their own board and lodging outside of the Department, which will thus effect a saving that will offset to a considerable extent the increased expense in salaries.

The sum of \$9,816 is asked for to enable us to increase the wages of the "Hospital Helpers" in all the hospitals of the Department to an amount sufficient to enable us to obtain respectable and trustworthy men and women to perform the important work that falls to this class of employees. These people are brought into very close relations with the patients; the men assist in the reception room, and carry the patients on stretchers to the wards, or from the wards to the operating room, the women are engaged in keeping the wards clean and aid the nurses in caring for the patients. The rate of wages, \$20 a month for the men and \$15 a month for the women, is the same that prevails in well conducted private hospitals of the City, and is even more necessary in Bellevue and its dependent hospitals than in the private hospitals, because of the dark and unsanitary dormitories in which we are compelled to lodge this grade of employees of the Department. In Gouverneur, Harlem and Fordham Hospitals, in which the number of helpers is comparatively small, the wages of all have been raised to the figures given above. In Bellevue, we have increased the wages of only about one-half, as it would be difficult to obtain more than this number of really efficient persons, even at increased wages, until we are able to offer them better quarters.

An increase of \$1,050 is needed in order that the salaries of the Apothecaries of the various hospitals may be raised to \$750 a year, their present salaries varying from \$500 to \$600. This increase was approved, at our request, by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment on June 6, 1902, and later by the Board of Aldermen, because it had been found impossible to obtain properly qualified Apothecaries for a less amount.

The remaining \$2,603 of the increased estimate for salaries is to be applied to making the pay of certain positions more nearly the equivalent of the service rendered, as in the case of the Superintendent of Training Schools, the Housekeeper, and a few other employees who under the title of Hospital Orderly or Hospital Helper perform duties calling for expert knowledge and experience.

The estimate for supplies is made out in the form prescribed by the Commissioners of Accounts, except that in the case of Bellevue Hospital it is based on the expectation of the same census in 1903 as in 1902. The average number of patients in this hospital has been somewhat less this year than last year; in fact, it has been less than at any time during the past five years. There has, however, been no gradual diminution during this period, and it is not believed that there will be a further reduction in 1903. There have probably been especial causes at work, such as the mildness of the spring and winter of 1902. Last year also there was a large number of cases of sunstroke during the summer, which increased the census considerably. An item of 10 per cent. has been added to the estimate to cover the probable increased cost of food supplies and coal. The total estimate for supplies shows a decrease of \$7,838.58, as compared with the amount allowed for 1902. This decrease is largely due to the fact that this year it was necessary to provide for a working inventory to add to the amounts required for actual consumption; there will be no such necessity next year.

The estimate for alterations, additions and repairs does not vary materially from the amount allowed for the current year. We should be impelled to ask for a much larger sum did we not believe that our occupation of Bellevue, Harlem, and Fordham Hospitals is only for a few years at most. The conditions in these hospitals were

set forth in detail in our departmental report of July 1, 1902. They are such as can be remedied only by the construction of new buildings. We have, therefore, recommended only such alterations and repairs as are absolutely necessary in order to render the present buildings habitable for the inmates. The estimates for other purposes do not call for especial mention, their object being sufficiently indicated by their title.

My Dear Alderman—At your request I have inquired into the matter before the Finance Committee relating to the appropriation for the purpose of making surveys for an outlet sewer and a change in the Webster avenue sewer system in The Bronx.

The situation is that the Bronx valley above Bronx Park is very much in need of sewer outlet facilities and the Chief Engineer is at work upon the problem, and in order to reach a conclusion it is necessary that a certain amount of surveying should be done to determine upon the most practicable place for such an outlet. The situation with reference to the Webster avenue sewer is that the sewer is inadequate and is greatly overtaxed at present, which has resulted in the flooding of cellars in the vicinity and consequent damages to the property owners, for which suits have been begun against the City. The Chief Engineer is anxious to remedy this and desires to do considerable field work for the purpose of determining how best to relieve this sewer from its over supply. I am told by the Chief Engineer that these matters are both urgent.

I have asked the Chief Engineer to be present at the meeting of the Board tomorrow afternoon, in order that he may personally put you in possession of the facts, and he has promised to do so if possible.

As you will observe, the average price in Manhattan for semi-bituminous coal has been \$4.43 per ton, and for anthracite coal \$7.75 per ton. In Brooklyn for semi-bituminous coal \$4.88 per ton, and in Queens for semi-bituminous coal \$4.95 per ton.

Assuming that the same prices can subsequently be obtained by this Department while the coal strike lasts, the 1,400 tons per week required by this Department, at the lowest possible estimate will cost in the aggregate \$7,000.

Understanding that you desire to report the resolution amending it by substituting for 1,400 tons per week the amount of probable cost of that amount of coal, I shall gladly consent to any such amendment, and shall appreciate highly the assist-

ance of your committee and of the Board of Aldermen in enabling me to pass the present crisis in the coal trade.

That, having examined the subject, they believe that the authorization should be granted. The steamboat "Edson," with a small naphtha launch, forms the entire floating equipment of the Health Department, and is the sole available vessel for the transportation of contagious disease cases between the various boroughs and North Brother Island. This boat has long been in need of repair. The Health Department requested a new boat from the Board of Estimate. This the Board of Estimate did not grant, but did provide, by an appropriation approved by this Board, for repairs to the present steamboat. While the repairs are being made it will be necessary for the Health Department to lease a lighter and build thereon a temporary structure divided into the necessary number of wards for patients. This lighter will be towed back and forth between various points and North Brother Island, but will be very unsatisfactory for use in case the number of patients is large or the weather severe. Your Committee are informed that the Department has had some difficulty in obtaining the proper lighter, inasmuch as owners of fit lighters are afraid of infection if their boats are taken by the Department for transporting contagious diseases, but that the Department has about arranged for a lighter. The autumn brings usually an increasing number of contagious disease cases, and the temporary structure which will be built on the lighter, while a sufficient makeshift in warm weather, will be a poor one in cold weather. About a month's time will be saved, and the cold and more stormy weather avoided if the authority requested is granted. Your Committee are informed by the Department that at least three bidders will submit estimates for the repairs, and that the Department will probably obtain as low a figure as if the required form of advertising was followed. Your Committee, while averse to authorizing contracts without public letting except in exceptional cases, regard this as an exceptional case, and consider that the duty of the City towards those suffering from contagious diseases who must be segregated in North Brother Island requires that the repairs be made as speedily as possible and that consequently the extra time which the regular advertising will consume be avoided.

We therefore recommend that the following resolution be adopted:

Hon. F. W. LONGFELLOW:

Dear Sir—I am in receipt of your communication of the 13th instant with reference to the desirability of locating a park between Fulton street, Lewis and Stuyvesant avenues, in the Twenty-fifth Ward, Borough of Brooklyn, and beg to say in answer thereto, that I appeared before the Board of Estimate and Apportionment and approved the selection of this site for a park owing to the fact, first, that there is no park in the immediate vicinity, none within nearly a mile, and I think a park in that vicinity is desirable. It is surrounded by a large population. There is no park on the entire length of Fulton street which is possibly seven miles long, except a small gore at Cumberland street, and the location of a park here would be an attractive feature. The buildings on the land it is proposed to acquire are mostly of an inferior character, and the more pretentious are not of great value. I do not, however, know the assessed valuation, or what it would cost to acquire it, but on the principle that small parks in sections of the City where the population is great are desirable, I have favored and still favor the acquirement of the property.

AN ORDINANCE to Amend an Ordinance in Relation to Car Transfers in The City of New York.

(New matter is underscored and old matter, to be omitted, is bracketed.)

Be it Ordained by the Board of Aldermen of The City of New York, as follows: Section 1. Section 1 of an ordinance entitled "An Ordinance in relation to car transfers in The City of New York," adopted by the Board of Aldermen April 29, 1902, and approved by the Mayor, May 6, 1902, is hereby amended to read as follows:

Every surface road or street railway company owning, operating, managing, running or controlling street railway cars in the streets or highways of The City of New York, shall cause to be placed in a conspicuous place upon the outside of each and every one of said cars so operated [on leaving company's depot or on reaching end of its route or destination] a signboard or placard upon which shall appear the name of the destination or point to which said car is to be run. Such signboard or placard shall be placed in position on each of said cars before it leaves any point of departure, and shall not be removed, nor shall any signboard or placard be substituted for it until the car reaches the destination designated thereby. The term point of departure, as employed in this ordinance in reference to each of said cars, is hereby restricted to the company's depot or car barn, and the point or place indicated as the destination by the signboard or placard displayed upon said car during its last previous run. Every company as aforesaid is and shall be, on and after the passage of this ordinance, obliged to carry for a single fare upon such car without change therefrom each and every passenger so desiring to the destination so indicated upon the said signboard or placard; and for every violation of the ordinance there shall be recoverable against the said company so offending a penalty of one hundred dollars, and the action to recover such penalty shall be brought in the name of The City of New York.

Sec. 2. This ordinance shall not be deemed to affect, prohibit or apply to transfers to any other line, or leased line, going in another direction from that in which such car may be going, nor shall any such company as aforesaid be deemed to have violated the provisions of this ordinance where, through any accident, compliance with the said ordinance is rendered impossible.

Sec. 3. This ordinance shall take effect immediately.

The contract has been executed for the final disposition of garbage in the Borough of Brooklyn for a term of five (5) years from the first day of September, 1902, and this proposed contract is for the work of house to house collection of the garbage for the purpose of delivering the same to the other contractor.

The Department is not in possession of equipment of horses, carts and stables and the necessary drivers to undertake this work for the present.

SIR—Hon. John McGaw Woodbury, Commissioner of the Department of Street Cleaning, in communication to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment July 29, 1902, transmits for the "approval of the Board of the terms and conditions pursuant to section 544 of the Greater New York Charter form of contract, in triplicate, for the collection and removal of garbage in the Borough of Brooklyn for a period of one (1) year from September 1, 1902."

He states that the contract has been executed for the final disposition of garbage in the borough for a term of five years from the first of September, 1902, and the proposed contract is for the work of house to house collection of the garbage for the purpose of delivering the same to the other contractor, the Department not being in possession of equipment of horses, carts and stables and necessary drivers to undertake the work for the present.

It is stated in the "Proposals for Bids" that the maximum daily amount of garbage to be collected and removed is estimated at six hundred and fifty (650) tons. The average daily amount is estimated at three hundred and fifty tons.

The period of the work under the contract is one year, beginning on the first of September, 1902.

The amount of security required is twenty thousand dollars (\$20,000), the compensation to be paid the contractor to be stated at a price per calendar month; the contract, if awarded, to be awarded to the lowest bidder.

The contract requires that the contractor shall collect and remove all the garbage and kindred refuse of the Borough of Brooklyn, and deliver the same in accordance with the specifications.

That he shall perform the work so as to comply with all the laws of the State of New York, the Sanitary Code of the City, the orders, rules and regulations of the Board of Health, the ordinances of the Common Council of the City of Brooklyn, as constituted prior to the first day of January, 1898, and of the Municipal Assembly of The City of New York and the Board of Aldermen of The City of New York as now constituted, so far as they are in force and relate to the work of this contract, and so as not to create any obligation, etc., or to furnish any just ground for any action, etc., against the City or the Department of Street Cleaning.

The specifications are drawn with minuteness and care.

Specification 1 defines the words "garbage and kindred refuse" to mean refuse of an organic nature, not including street sweepings, nor containing more than five per cent. by weight of other refuse.

Specification 2: To remove all such garbage as may be required by the Department of Docks.

Specification 3: To collect and remove daily from hotels, restaurants, grocery stores, boarding houses, lodging and club houses and such places as may be designated by Commissioner, and from all other buildings on each of three days in a week.

Specification 4: Collection to be made promptly, and notice given occupants of hour in day when collection shall be made.

Specification 5: Trucks to be constructed of iron and to be water tight; sample to be submitted.

Specification 6: Each vehicle to be maintained in water-tight and closed condition; to be cleaned daily and painted with name of contractor and number of the vehicle.

Specification 7: All vehicles to be under the supervision of a foreman, who shall wear a badge.

Specification 8: Any untrustworthy person to be discharged.

Specification 9: Receptacles containing garbage to be carefully handled.

Specification 10: That the garbage collected from receptacles be placed in contractor's vehicles in as cleanly a manner as possible, and without spilling, etc.

Specification 11: That contractor shall collect and remove all kitchen and other garbage which may be on the sidewalk or street.

Specification 12: Garbage shall not be collected from houses earlier than 6.30 a. m. except when agreed upon.

Specification 13: That contractor shall cause to be printed, at his own expense, a schedule of collection of garbage for reasons as set forth.

Specification 14: That contractor shall be ready at any time to execute any order of the Commissioner to remove garbage from any building, or whenever it is necessary for public health.

Specification 15: That in case contractor shall neglect to collect and remove any garbage required the Commissioner may cause such collection or removal to be made, cost to be deducted from contractor.

Specification 17: That the garbage collected be promptly removed and delivered at dumps or place of deposit provided by the New York Sanitary Utilization Company under its contract with the City for the final disposition of garbage for Borough of Brooklyn, located as follows: Gowanus Bay, foot of Sixth street, and that another place or places may be substituted or added on written notice by Commissioner.

Specification 18: That contractor is not to use the slips adjacent to dumping places for the purpose of conducting any business relating to any garbage or material other than required by the terms of contract.

Specification 19: That no money, reward, fee or other valuable consideration other than provided by contract shall be charged, received or taken by the contractor or his agents for doing or failing to do any part of work required under the contract.

Specification 20: The entire work to be at all times subject to inspection by the Commissioner.

Specification 21: That no place other than specified is to be used by contractor for discharge or handling except by special written permission of Commissioner.

Specification 22: That Commissioner is to repair all damages by contractor to any dump at the cost and expense of the contractor.

Specification 23: That the contractor is to pay to the telephone companies for telephone service at the usual rate, and be prepared to receive orders at all times of

day or night from the main office of Department of Street Cleaning, and from office of the Department in Borough of Brooklyn.

The contract and specifications have been approved as to form by the Corporation Counsel. I have no objections to offer, and believe the Board of Estimate and Apportionment may properly give its approval, as requested by the Commissioner, to the terms and conditions thereof.

SIR—Hon. James P. Keating, in communication dated December 18, 1901, requests the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, pursuant to the provisions of chapter 211 of the Laws of 1897, to provide the necessary funds for the construction of a bridge to extend East One Hundred and Eighty-ninth street over the New York and Harlem Railroad. The Commissioner's estimate of the cost is \$19,000.

In reply, I would report that the bridge is a simple girder and truss bridge, 80 feet in width, with two roadways, each 22 feet 6 inches wide, and two sidewalks 17 feet 6 inches each, on the sides of the bridge.

The plans and specifications do not call for an elaborate bridge, only a good and substantial structure, and no better than is required for the purpose.

One Hundred and eighty-ninth street, from Webster avenue to Third avenue, is being regulated and graded by contract dated April 24, 1900; hence a bridge at the proposed location will be necessary to make a continuous street.

I would therefore recommend that the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, pursuant to chapter 211 of the Laws of 1897, and the provisions of chapter 169 of the Greater New York Charter, authorize the Comptroller to issue Corporate Stock to the amount of \$19,000, to provide for the construction of a bridge to extend East One Hundred and Eighty-ninth street over the New York and Harlem Railroad.

LAWS OF NEW YORK—BY AUTHORITY.

[Every law, unless a different time shall be prescribed therein, shall not take effect until the twentieth day after it shall have become a law. Section 43, article II., chapter 8, General Laws]

Chapter 395.

AN ACT to Encourage the Development of Art in the Cities of the State.
Became a law April 21, 1898, with the approval of the Governor. Passed, three-fifths being present.

The People of the State of New York, represented in Senate and Assembly, do enact as follows:

Section 1. Cities of the first and second class in the State are hereby authorized, in the discretion of those officers or bodies of such cities that have charge of the appropriation of the public funds, to purchase works of art, which must be the production of professional artists who are citizens of the United States, and the said works of art must have been executed in the United States. The word "productions" shall be held to include mural paintings or decorations which artists may be employed to put on the walls of the public buildings of such cities, mosaic and stained or painted glass. Cities of the first class may expend under this act any amount not to exceed fifty thousand dollars annually. Cities of the second class may expend under this act not to exceed ten thousand dollars annually.

Sec. 2. Where no provision is now made by law for an Art Commission for any city of the first or second class, the Mayors of such city shall, as soon as any city decides to expend any moneys under this act, appoint Art Commissioners for such cities. Such Commissioners may include women, and shall not contain more than a bare majority of persons selected from any one political party. It shall be composed of persons who are experts in art matters.

STATE OF NEW YORK.

No. 2536 (Int. 1724).

In Assembly, April 7, 1897.

Introduced by MR. BRENNAN—read once and referred to the Committee on Affairs of Cities.

AN ACT for the erection of a monument and statue of the late General Edward B. Fowler, in the City of Brooklyn, New York, and providing for payment thereof.

The People of the State of New York, represented in Senate and Assembly, do enact as follows:

Section 1. The Mayor of the City of Brooklyn, Christian T. Christenson, Seth Low, James McLeer, James Jourdan, Theodore B. Gates, Harry W. Michel, Andrew D. Baird, Herbert C. Gunnison, William C. Bryant, John W. Eason, Cornelius J. Mahoney, Alfred Cranston, Bernard Peters, A. A. Low, Thomas G. Sherman and Felix Campbell are hereby appointed Commissioners and authorized to contract for and erect and locate in the City of Brooklyn, New York, on whatsoever site shall to them see fit, a statue in bronze of the late General Edward B. Fowler, and for this purpose and for the entire expense for pedestal of the monument with foundation and base, at an expense not to exceed seven thousand dollars.

Sec. 2. For the purpose of carrying out the provisions of section 1 of this act, the Mayor and Comptroller of said city are hereby authorized to issue bonds of the City of Brooklyn, to be known as Memorial Bonds, to be signed, sealed and countersigned as other bonds of said city. None of such bonds shall be sold at less than par, and they shall be issued in such series and be made payable at such times as said Mayor and Comptroller may determine. The proceeds from the sale of said bonds, including any premium which may be obtained thereon, shall be paid into the City Treasury, to be expended from time to time as may be required for the purpose of this act, upon the certification of said Mayor.

Sec. 3. The money hereby appropriated shall be paid by the Treasurer upon the warrant of the Comptroller, on proper vouchers thereof, to be approved by a majority of said Commissioners, and certified by the presiding officer of said Commissioners.

Sec. 4. This act shall take effect immediately.

The People of the State of New York, represented in Senate and Assembly, do enact as follows:

Section 1. President of the Borough of Brooklyn, City of New York; President of the Fourteenth Regiment War Veteran Association, Colonel Bertram T. Clayton, commanding the Fourteenth Regiment, National Guard, State of New York; James W. Ridgway, John W. Eason, Alfred Cranston, Herbert C. Gunnison, Theodore B. Gates, James Whitlock, Andrew D. Baird and James D. Rankin are hereby appointed Commissioners in the place and stead of those named in the 1st section of chapter 533 of the Laws of 1897, and are hereby authorized and empowered to perform any and all acts which said former Commissioners were, by the provisions of chapter 533 of the Laws of 1897, authorized and empowered to perform.

Amend section 2 by striking out all after the word "Act" in the next to last line thereof.

Sec. 3. This act shall take effect immediately.

GENTLEMEN—I am in receipt of the communication of Deputy Comptroller Stevenson dated June 11, 1902, which reads as follows:

"At a meeting of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, held June 6, 1902, the inclosed communication from C. J. Mahoney, President of the General Edward B. Fowler Monument Commission, requesting an appropriation of \$1,550 for expenses incurred in the erection of said monument, was presented and referred to you for an opinion as to the power of this Board, either by itself or in conjunction with the Board of Aldermen, to take any further steps to make an additional appropriation."

Chapter 533 of the Laws of 1897 provides that certain Commissioners therein named were authorized to contract for and erect a statue in bronze of the late General Edward B. Fowler, and "for this purpose and for the entire expense for pedestal of the monument with foundation and base, at an expense not to exceed seven thousand dollars."

From the further communication of Deputy Comptroller Stevenson, dated June 25, 1902, it appears that "the \$7,000 either has already been expended or bills have been incurred which will require that amount," and that "The Fowler Monument Commission asks for this amount in addition to the \$7,000 authorized to be expended by the act of the Legislature."

Section 47 of the Greater New York Charter provides that "The Board of Aldermen shall have power to provide by ordinance * * * for the acquisition and construction of parks, parkways, boulevards and driveways * * * but no bonds or other evidences of indebtedness shall be issued under the authority of this section unless the proposition for creating such debt, shall first be approved by a majority vote of the whole Board of Estimate and Apportionment, entered on the minutes of record of such board."

The monument in question is situated in Fort Greene Park, and constitutes, I assume, an added ornament to that park. I think the power to provide for the "construction" of parks implies the power to provide for adding from time to time to their attractions by the erection of statuary or otherwise.

I am, therefore, of the opinion that under the above section, your Board, in conjunction with the Board of Aldermen, has power to provide for the payment of an additional sum of \$1,500 incurred in the completion of the monument.

The Secretary presented a communication from the President of the Borough of Brooklyn, dated July 30, 1902, containing a report upon the request of Audley Clarke, representing the Committee on Piers and Bridges of the South Brooklyn Board of Trade, for an appropriation of \$160,000 for the construction of a new bridge on the Gowanus canal, at Hamilton avenue, Borough of Brooklyn.

Which was laid over until September.

On motion the Board adjourned to meet on Thursday, August 7, 1902, at 2 o'clock p. m.

(The meeting of this Board was continued for the consideration of Public Improvement matters, the record of which will appear in separate minutes of this date.)

GENERAL INSTRUCTIONS TO BIDDERS.

The person or persons making a bid or estimate for any services, work, materials or supplies for The City of New York, or for any of its departments, bureaus or offices, shall furnish the same in a sealed envelope indorsed with the title of the supplies, materials, work or services for which the bid or estimate is made, with his or their name or names and the date of presentation to the President or Board or to the head of the department at his or its office, on or before the date and hour named in the advertisement for the same, at which time and place the estimates received will be publicly opened by the President or Board or head of said department, and read, and the award of the contract made according to law as soon thereafter as practicable.

Each bid or estimate shall contain the name and place of residence of the person making the same, the names of all persons interested with him therein, and, if no other person be so interested, it shall distinctly state that fact; also, that it is made without any connection with any other person making an estimate for the same purpose, and is in all respects fair and without collusion or fraud, and that no member of the board of aldermen, head of a department, chief of a bureau, deputy thereof, or clerk therein, or other officer of The City of New York is, shall be or become interested, directly or indirectly, as contracting party, partner, stockholder, surety or otherwise in or in the performance of the contract, or in the supplies, work or business to which it relates, or in any portion of the profits thereof. The bid or estimate must be verified by the oath, in writing, of the party or parties making the estimate that the several matters stated herein are in all respects true.

Each bid or estimate shall be accompanied by the consent, in writing, of two householders or freeholders in The City of New York, or of a guaranty or surety company duly authorized by law to act as surety, and shall contain the matters set forth in the blank forms mentioned below. No bid or estimate will be considered unless accompanied by a certified check upon one of the State or National banks of The City of New York, drawn to the order of the Comptroller, or money to the amount of five per centum of the amount of the bond required, as provided in section 420 of the Greater New York Charter.
