Resolved, That the heads of the several departments of the Government of The City of New York be and they are hereby requested to close their offices on Saturday, December 26, 1903, and Saturday, January 2, 1904, and all other offices not by law required to be kept open for public business to be kept closed on the said days.

## AQUEDUCT COMMISSION.

Minutes of Stated Meeting of the Aqueduct Commissioners, Held at Their Office, No. 280 Broadway, New York City, on Tuesday, December 15, 1903, at 11 a. m.

Present—Commissioners Ten Eyck (President), Ryan, Windolph, Curtis and Chief Engineer Smith.

Minutes of meetings of December 8 and 10, 1903, were read and approved.

The Chairman of the Committee on Finance and Audit reported the examination and audit of bills contained in Vouchers Nos. 15768 to 15799, inclusive, amounting to \$1,091.37.

Which were approved and certified to the Comptroller by the following vote:

Affirmative—Commissioners Ten Eyck, Ryan, Windolph and Curtis—4.

The President verbally reported that on December 14, 1903, he received from the Commissioner of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity form of proposal, contract, bond and specifications for constructing a highway or road near Titicus Reservoir, in the Town of North Salem, Westchester County, N. Y., and had transmitted same to the Corporation Counsel for his approval as to form.

The President further reported that, pursuant to the authorization of the Commissioners, he had engaged F. M. Gill to index the minutes for the year 1903, and the following resolution was thereupon offered:

Resolved, That the action of the President in engaging F. M. Gill to prepare the index to the minutes of the Aqueduct Commissioners for the year 1903, for the sum of \$150, be and hereby is approved and the expenditure authorized.

Which was adopted by the following vote:

Affirmative—Commissioners Ten Eyck, Ryan, Windolph and Curtis—4.

Progress report of the Chief Engineer for the week ending December 10, 1903, was received and referred to the Construction Committee.

The following report to the Mayor for the week ending December 10, 1903, was received and the President directed to transmit same to the Mayor:

NEW YORK, December 14, 1903.

Hon. WILLIAM H. TEN EYCK, President, Aqueduct Commission:

DEAR SIR—In regard to the work done on the New Croton Dam and Jerome Park Reservoir Divisions for the week ending Thursday, December 10, 1903, I would report as follows:

New Croton Dam Division.

At the dam the excavation of rock and hard-pan, 1,100 cubic yards, continued at the extension foundation site. One gang was at work laying masonry in extension bottom south of Station 3-1-50 and a total of 540 cubic yards were laid. On the main dam and spillway 375 cubic yards of masonry were laid.

On Old Aqueduct reconstruction work was in progress at Bailey's Brook Loop and at four stretches along the line.

Basin clearing work continued.

Work was in progress on Road Lines Nos. 6 and 18, and also at Bridge C. The average force employed by the contractors, Messrs. Coleman, Breuchaud & Coleman, was 573 men, being 25 men less than the week previous. The work on this division has been interfered with by the cold weather.

### Jerome Park Reservoir Division.

On the west side excavation progressed in Sections "B," "J" and "K," and Gate House No. 7. Masonry was laid in Aqueduct Division Wall, Face Wall and Shaft No. 21 Connection.

On the east side excavation was in progress in Sections "G," "H" and "L."

On Aqueduct North some excavation and laying concrete was done. The average force employed was 703 men, being 91 men less than the week previous.

Communication from the Mayor, dated December 12, 1903, acknowledging receipt of report for the week ending December 3, 1903, was received and ordered filed.

Schmidtke to the position of Inspector of Pipes and Pipe Laying, and Report No. 854 of the Chief Engineer, dated December 11, 1903, recommending such transfer, were received and the following resolution offered:

Resolved. That, upon the recommendation of the Chief Engineer, Carl W. Schmidtke, Superintendent of Dam Construction at Jerome Park Reservoir, be transferred to the position of Inspector of Pipes and Pipe Laying, and the Secretary is directed to transmit a copy of this resolution to the Municipal Civil Service Commission and request its authorization of said transfer.

Which was adopted by the following vote:

Affirmative—Commissioners Ten Eyck, Ryan, Windolph and Curtis—4.

Report No. 850 of the Chief Engineer, dated December 10, 1903, submitting bill of Samuel Gilbert, dated December 7, 1903, for \$19 for transportation expenses in connection with the inspection of work at New Croton Dam and Katonah, was received and approved, and the Secretary directed to prepare the necessary voucher therefor.

Report No. 851 of the Chief Engineer, dated December 11, 1903, submitting copy of report from Professors J. J. Stevenson and J. F. Kemp, dated December 9, 1903, in regard to the improved condition of the exposed rock in the bottom of the excavation for the masonry extension at the south end of the New Croton Dam and stating that it was now safe to build upon it, was received, approved and ordered filed; and the President was directed to transmit a copy to the Mayor and to furnish copies to the public press.

Report No. 852 of the Chief Engineer, dated December 11, 1903, recommending that application be made to the Municipal Civil Service Commission for the classification of two General Inspectors in the exempt class, was received and the President directed to communicate with the Municipal Civil Service Commission accordingly.

Report No. 853 of the Chief Engineer, dated December 11, 1903, inclosing copy of letter from the Pneumatic Engineering Company, dated December 7, 1903, asking for an extension of the time within which to complete their contract for installing pumping plant at Shaft No. 25, New Croton Aqueduct, and recommending that an extension of sixty days from December 31, 1903, be granted, was received and referred to the Construction Committee.

Report No. 855 of the Chief Engineer, dated December 11, 1903, recommending that the work of repairing the invert of the Old Croton Aqueduct be prosecuted during the winter, and that the Commissioners authorize an expenditure of \$2,000 or any part thereof for the extra work due to laying concrete masonry during the winter months, was received.

The Comptroller, being now in attendance, consulted with the Commissioners and the Chief Engineer on the foregoing recommendation, and the following resolution was thereupon offered:

Resolved, That the Chief Engineer be and hereby is authorized to expend the sum of \$2,000, or any part thereof, for extra work due to the laying of concrete masonry during the winter months in the repairing of the invert of the Old Croton Aqueduct, in accordance with the recommendation of his report, No. 855, dated December 11, 1903.

Which was adopted by the following vote:

Affirmative—The Comptroller, Commissioners Ten Eyck, Ryan, Windolph and Curtis—5.

Report No. 856 of the Chief Engineer, dated December 14, 1903, in relation to communication of H. M. Barrett, dated October 13, 1903, regarding removal of pipes of the Katonah Water Company to grade Road No. 27, was received and referred to the Construction Committee.

Report No. 857 of the Chief Engineer, dated December 14, 1903, regarding drainage and blow-off pipe line from Gate House No. 6, Jerome Park Reservoir, and stating that the modifications suggested by the President of the Borough of The Bronx, under date of December 1, 1903, have been embodied in the plans and specifications for said work, was received and approved and authority to print the plans granted to the Chief Engineer; and the President was directed to notify the President of the Borough of The Bronx of this action and transmit draft of the plans and specifications to the Corporation Counsel for his approval as to form.

Communication from the Corporation Counsel, dated December 14, 1903, returning and approving as to form advertisement for proposals for constructing an overflow and blow-off pipe line from Gate House No. 2, Jerome Park Reservoir, and for furnishing and erecting sluice gates at Muscoot Dam Gate House, was received and ordered filed.

Resolution from the Board of Aldermen, approved by the Mayor December 9, 1903, requesting that the City departments be closed on Saturday, December 26, 1903, and Saturday, January 2, 1904, was received and referred to the Secretary and the Chief Engineer, with directions to comply therewith, as far as practicable.

Report No. 858 of the Chief Engineer and the Secretary, dated December 15, 1903, regarding the proposal of the Library Bureau, dated December 4, 1903, for furnishing vertical file cabinets, etc., and indexing records in the office of the Engineer and the offices of the Commissioners, was received and approved and the following resolution offered:

Resolved, That the proposal of the Library Bureau, dated December 4, 1903, for furnishing necessary vertical file cabinets, index cabinets, cards, guides, folders and two copying machines, with material necessary to inaugurate the vertical filing system, indexed and filed numerically, for the sum of \$565, be and hereby is accepted and the expenditure authorized.

Which was adopted by the following vote:

## AQUEDUCT COMMISSION.

Minutes of Adiourned Meeting of the Aqueduct Commissioners, Held at Their Office, No. 280 Broadway, New York City, on Friday, December 18, 1903, at 2 p. m.

Present—Commissioners Ten Eyck (President), Ryan, Windolph, Curtis and Chief Engineer Smith.

Minutes of meeting of December 15, 1903, were read and approved.

The Construction Committee returned to the Commissioners Report No. 853 of the Chief Engineer, dated December 11, 1903, inclosing copy of letter from the Pneumatic Engineering Company, dated December 7, 1903, asking for an extension of the time within which to complete their contract for installing pumping plant at Shaft No. 25,

New Croton Aqueduct, with the recommendation that the report be approved and the accompanying preamble and resolution adopted.

The recommendation of the Committee was adopted and the following preamble and resolution offered:

Whereas, Application has been made by the Pneumatic Engineering Company for an extension of time of sixty days from December 31, 1903, in which to complete its contract for building a pumping plant in the engine room at Shaft No. 25 of the New Croton Aqueduct, and the Chief Engineer having recommended in Report No. 853 that the extension asked for be granted; therefore

Resolved, That an extension of time to March 1, 1904, be and it hereby is granted to the Pneumatic Engineering Company in which to complete its contract with this Commission for building a pumping plant in the engine room at Shaft No. 25 of the New Croton Aqueduct, providing its bondsmen shall, on or before December 31, 1903, enter into stipulations continuing their obligations for and during said extension of time.



**First—**All plans for the construction of the railway across city property hereby leased, shall be approved by the Commissioner of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity, before such construction is commenced.
