Bull, President; John Bogart, Engineer, and H. C. Winchester, Secretary, under seal; "Map and profile of the amended route of the New York, Westchester and Boston Railway Company, section 2," adopted by the Board of Directors of the company on the 7th day of April, 1904, and signed by William L. Bull, President; John Bogart, Engineer, and Thomas W.
