Hon. O. GRANT ESTERBROOK, President, Board of Aldermen, City Hall, Manhattan:

Dear Mr. Esterbrook—If you will get out the CITY RECORD of December 16 and look on page 11717 you will note under section 101 that a private garage, where gasoline is kept in a single storage tank, must pay \$15.

Last year the tax was \$5. I do not think that the Aldermen in passing this section understood the case. Gasoline purchased in bulk costs 17 cents per gallon. Most garages are selling gasoline to-day for 20 cents per gallon. It would, therefore, be necessary for an owner to use 500 gallons in order to make a saving of \$15. This is a larger quantity of gasoline than the average private owner consumes, and if this ordinance is not repealed it will result in a large number of owners sealing up their gasoline tanks and purchasing the fuel directly from public garages.

I consider the increase from \$5 to \$15 entirely unwarranted and I respectfully request you to have a resolution introduced putting back the expense to private owners where it was last year, namely, \$5 for a single automobile, with an additional fee of \$2 for each additional automobile.

It is a mistaken notion to suppose that only the wealthy people are operating motor cars to-day. A great many people of very moderate means have automobiles with small garages in the outlying sections of the city, and they do not wish to be forced out of keeping these garages by excessive taxation.

I am sure you will find a great many protestants unless this ordinance is repealed. Yours very truly,

Bellevue and Allied Hospitals, Office of the Board of Trustees, 1st Avenue and 26th Street, New York, December 16, 1913.

Hon. O. GRANT ESTERBROOK, Acting President, Board of Aldermen, City Hall, New York City:

Sir—On September 5 the Trustees requested the Board of Aldermen for an issue of revenue bonds in the amount of \$68,663.50 to meet the anticipated deficit in the appropriations of this department for the year 1913. An issue of \$45,400 was granted. In spite of many curtailments in the expenditures, it will be necessary for the Trustees to petition your Board to authorize a further issue of special revenue bonds, the exact amount of which has not yet been determined but will be approximately \$20,000. In the meantime all other City departments have been requested to inform the trustees whether they will have any unencumbered balances which could be transferred to the appropriations of this department in order to decrease the deficit.

Department of Public Charities of the City of New York, Foot of East 26th Street, New York, December 19, 1913.

Hon. O. GRANT ESTERBROOK, Acting Chairman, Board of Aldermen:

Sir—Request is hereby made for the issuance of special revenue bonds to the amount of Twenty-seven hundred dollars (\$2,700), to provide the means to employ three Trained Nurses at \$600 each and three Hospital Helpers at \$300 each during the year 1914, at the new Bradford Street Hospital Dispensary, East New York, under the jurisdiction of the Department of Public Charities.

At present this department maintains a small emergency hospital with limited dispensary facilities, which has been overcrowded and inadequate for years. We have just succeeded in renting an adjoining building to this Hospital for a term of three (3) years, which will be altered into a dispensary, so that the facilities of the hospital for dispensary purposes will be largely increased, thus making it possible to take care of all applicants. To do this, however, requires additional help, as above mentioned.

Hon. O. GRANT ESTERBROOK, Acting Chairman, Board of Aldermen:

Dear Sir—We would respectfully request that special revenue bonds to the amount of \$6,022.50 be issued to provide the means to employ three additional Licensed Firemen, at \$3 per diem each, and three Coal Passers, at \$2.50 per diem each, at the Sea View Hospital, S. I., during the year 1914.

We have at present at this institution three Engineers and three Oilers allowed for 1913 and 1914. Our Supervising Engineer reports that it will be a physical impossibility to run this plant with the present allowance of help. This plan has not been run by this Department in cold weather, as the Hospital was only opened for the reception of patients in November. We are at present operating three boilers, aggregating 1,000 horsepower. There are two Firemen on each watch, whose duty it is to tend water, fire, clean fires, wheel out ashes, trim coal and blow tubes, and we are preparing to put in commission another 350-horsepower unit, and with the increasing cold and the additional buildings added, I think it will be necessary to have the remaining boiler in operation next week.

The buildings now being heated are eight ward pavilions, kitchen, dining room and administration building, Nurses' home, staff house, laundry and garage. The only thing not in operation as far as steam is concerned are the generators, and they will be ready very soon, and we are soon to operate our dynamos so as to have light and power. That will be an additional cause for the necessary help.

Hoping that these special revenue bonds will be granted, I remain respectfully yours,

Whereas, By opinions of the Corporation Counsel as of June 28 and 30, 1910, the Comptroller was advised that the payment of salaries of Janitors in the Department of Education was illegal unless such salary shall have been established under the provisions of section 56 of the Greater New York Charter; and,

Whereas, The Special Committee on Janitorial Compensation and the Committee on School Inquiry, Board of Estimate and Apportionment, submitted a joint report on March 27, 1913, which contained detailed suggestions and recommendations for the reorganization of the janitorial force of the Board of Education; therefore be it

Resolved, That, pursuant to the provisions of section 56 of the Charter, the Board of Estimate and Apportionment hereby recommends to the Board of Aldermen, pending action by the Board of Education on the aforesaid report, the compensation of Janitors in the Department of Education be fixed temporarily and until further modified in accordance with the following list:

To the Board of Estimate and Apportionment:

Gentlemen—On November 26, 1913, the Board of Education requested the establishment of rates of compensation for Janitors of sundry public schools, pursuant to the provisions of section 56 of the Greater New York Charter. In connection therewith we report as follows:

For Public School 37, Queens, a rate corresponding to the existing rate, less \$221 for rent allowance, is requested for a temporary assignment to fill a vacancy. For Public School 72, Manhattan, the rate is to be increased from \$2,604 to \$3,288 per annum on account of the opening of the new addition. A rate of \$10 per month is requested for the Janitor of Public School 95, Manhattan, for the care of the classroom on the roof of the Carmine Street Bath. Rates are also requested for the employment of one Fireman, at \$1 per session, and one Cleaner, at 75 cents per session, for the Curtis High School.

We recommend that the request be granted by the adoption of the attached resolution.

Gentlemen—On November 20, 1913, the Executive Committee of the Bricklayers' and Masons' Union of Greater New York requested the Comptroller to notify all City departments that the rate of wages for Bricklayers will be 75 cents per hour, or \$6 per diem, on and after January 1, 1914. In connection therewith we report as follows:

The cost of increasing wages of Bricklayers in City departments from \$5.60 to \$6 per diem, or 40 cents a day, for the year 1914, will be as follows:

The Mason Builders' Association is a branch of the Building Trades Employers' Association, and its membership includes 98 construction companies, firms and individuals. The Mason Contractors' Association, with 35 employers, and the Stone Mason Contractors' Association, with 48 employers, are affiliated with the Mason Builders' Association. The members of these three Associations employ 80 per cent. of the Bricklayers and Mason Bricklayers in Greater New York.

The agreement between the Mason Builders' Association and the Bricklayers' Unions is signed by the following:

Mason Builders' Association—Arthur G. Stone, Chairman; F. J. Ashfield, P. J. Brennan, William Crawford, Otto M. Eidlitz, D. H. Mapes, C. C. Woodruff, F. T. Youngs, Ely Greenblatt, Daniel J. Lahey, M. C. Rosenbaum, N. Conforti, Frank E. Conover.

Bricklayers' Unions—No. 34, Sam Tomley, Chairman; No. 1, William J. Gardner, Jr.; No. 9, Henry J. Kuntz; No. 34, John Lynch, Alexander Porter, Thomas Darcy; No. 37, Thomas A. Smith, Fred Riley; No. 41, John Bartley.

The signed agreement provides as follows:

"1. That the wages of the Bricklayers from January 1, 1912, to January 1, 1914, be 70 cents per hour; from January 1, 1914, to January 1, 1916, the wages shall be 75 cents per hour; the hours of labor to be from 8 a. m. to 5 p. m., exclusive of the noon hour, except on Saturdays, when the hours of labor shall be from 8 a. m. to 12 m. This agreement shall expire on January 1, 1916."

Mr. Arthur G. Stone, Chairman of the Committee of the Mason Builders' Association stated as follows:

"The agreement to pay the Bricklayers 75 cents an hour after January 1, 1914, was entered into with the representatives of the unions two years ago. At that time our Committee had quite a controversy with the men before arriving at a rate. It was finally agreed that the rate for 1912 and 1913 should be 70 cents an hour, with the understanding that for two years, beginning January 1, 1914, we should pay 75 cents an hour. We had formerly made agreements with the men for one or two years, but as a compromise agreed upon the rates fixed for the four years, 1912 to 1915, inclusive.

"The members of our Associations intend to keep faith with the Bricklayers, and we shall pay 75 cents an hour on and after January 1, 1914."

The Secretary of the Building Trades Employers' Association stated as follows:

"Ninety per cent. of the Bricklayers in Greater New York are members of the unions. Our experience has been that a Bricklayer will not work on a job where the rate agreed upon with the Employers' Association is not paid, or other stipulations fulfilled.

"Bricklayers in private employ average about 200 days' work in the year, owing to weather conditions or the uncertainty of construction work.

"Bricklayers employed by members of the Stone Mason Contractors' Association on foundation work receive the regular rate paid to other Bricklayers."

Provision is made in the 1914 Budget for the full year for the majority of Bricklayers in City departments. When they are not employed, accruals from their wages revert to the General Fund for the Reduction of Taxation. Of the 9,691 days provided for in 1914 schedules, 1,580 days are for Bricklayers temporarily employed.

It appears that the prevailing rate for Bricklayers, on and after January 1, 1914, will be 75 cents per hour, or \$6 per diem.

We therefore recommend the adoption of the attached resolutions approving the \$6 rate, and requesting the heads of City Departments to provide for the increase.

It is proposed that the position of Private Secretary be retained and that the incumbent of the new position of Legislative Secretary devote his time chiefly to work relating to the Board of Aldermen. The proposed position of Clerk, at \$1,500, will supplant a present position of Clerk at \$480. The position of Stenographer at \$1,800 is requested in place of existing position of Stenographer at \$1,500. It is also proposed to establish the position of Clerk and Messenger at \$1,650, to permit of the transfer to that position of the incumbent of a similar position in the office of the President of the Borough of Manhattan.



The President of the Borough of Manhattan states that the proposed new grades of positions in the office of the President of the Board of Aldermen are necessary to put the office on an efficient working basis, and that with the exception of the retention of the present Private Secretary, who is to be transferred to the new position of Legislative Secretary, there will be no net addition to the office force. The Auctioneer's Process Server, now employed in the office of the President of the Board, will, if the request is granted, divide his duties between that office and the offices of Vice-Chairman and Chairman of the Board of Aldermen.

The Vice-Chairman laid before the Board the following communication from the Commissioner of Street Cleaning:

No. 5186.

Office of the Commissioner of Street Cleaning, New York City, December 19, 1913.

Hon. O. GRANT ESTERBROOK, President of the Board of Aldermen:

Dear Sir—Numerous complaints have reached me during the present year from citizens and householders whose buildings extend to the extreme front of the lot upon which they are built that the police have been enforcing that portion of section 108 of the Sanitary Code which reads as follows:

"and such receptacles, as well as any light refuse or rubbish to be removed, shall be kept within the premises until the proper time for removal and shall then be placed in the area or within the stoop line, fence or other enclosure in front of any building, and not upon the sidewalk, and shall there remain until such materials or substances are removed by the Department of Street Cleaning, but in no case shall such receptacles be placed where they shall be or become a nuisance."

In recent years many buildings have been erected in this City so that there is no area, stoop line, fence or other enclosure in front of them. In other words, they are built out to the stoop line. The police have insisted that in such cases the householder shall keep his ashes and garbage receptacles and refuse and rubbish within the premises and not upon the sidewalk. This would necessitate our Drivers entering the premises, which is against the rules of this Department and to which we have the gravest objection.

I have requested the Commissioner of Health to consent to an amendment to section 108 of the Sanitary Code in order to relieve the situation, and he has replied declining to do the same because of the fact that such amendment is a sidewalk regulation and not a sanitary regulation, and he points out that under subdivision 2 of section 534 of the Greater New York Charter I, as Commissioner of Street Cleaning, have cognizance and control of the framing of regulations controlling the use of sidewalks and gutters by abutting owners and occupants for the disposition of sweepings, refuse, garbage or light rubbish, within the Boroughs of Manhattan, The Bronx and Brooklyn, and which regulations, when so framed and approved by the Board of Aldermen, shall be published in like manner as City Ordinances, and shall be enforced by the Police Department in the same manner and to the same extent as such ordinances.

I have accordingly prepared a resolution, which is hereto annexed, and which I hereby submit to your Board for its approval. In this connection I would like to draw your attention to section 405 of the General Ordinances, chapter 9, entitled "Cleaning Streets and Sidewalks," which seems to contemplate the placing of receptacles for ashes and garbage in front of houses or lots and which seems to be inconsistent with section 108 of the Sanitary Code above mentioned. The Commissioner of Health further stated in his letter that if your Board will pass such a resolution he would then proceed to amend section 108 of the Sanitary Code to conform to this resolution, and in this way obviate the contradiction. All receptacles containing ashes, garbage, refuse, rubbish or liquid substances, as well as any light refuse or rubbish not contained in receptacles, to be removed, shall be kept within the premises until the proper time for removal, and shall then be placed in the area or within the stoop line, fence or other enclosure, in front of any building and not upon the sidewalk, except where the building extends to the

extreme front of the lot upon which it is built, or where it extends to the stoop line, or where there are no areas, fences or other enclosures in front of the building, such receptacles and light refuse and rubbish shall be placed upon the sidewalk in front of the said building and as close thereto as possible. Such receptacles and light refuse and rubbish shall there remain until removed by the Department of Street Cleaning, but in no case shall such receptacles, light refuse or rubbish be placed where they shall be or become a nuisance.

Supplemental Report of Special Committee on Investigation of Police Department. New York, N. Y., December 23, 1913.

The undersigned members of the special committee appointed on August 5, 1912, by the Board of Aldermen of New York City to investigate the Police Department, submit the following supplemental report upon the subject of Police Pensions:

Early in the work of your committee it became apparent that Police Pensions urgently required a thorough and scientific investigation. Police Pension demands have been mounting upward with startling rapidity, the administration of the Police Pension Fund has been imposed upon a Police Commissioner already overburdened with other problems, and no effort seems to have been made by anyone to make a scientific study of the history, present conditions, and future development of this most important subject. Realizing that the first essential was to secure a careful study of the present condition of Police Pensions, your committee more than a year ago secured through the Bureau of Municipal Research the assistance of Expert Actuaries, Accountants, Attorneys and Clerks, who have made the first thorough, scientific study of the history and present condition of the Police Pension Fund of New York City. The results of their year's work has been consolidated into the exhaustive report made to us which we append herewith. This report has been limited to an accurate, critical survey of the history and present condition of Police Pensions in New York City. The lax and thoroughly unscientific methods of administration of this fund are pointed out. The need for radical reforms is shown. Our experts have not attempted at this time constructive recommendations inasmuch as the critical work has just been completed. This critical survey represents an analysis and study and research never before attempted. With the facts thus disclosed as a basis, the proper authorities will be in a position to work out for New York City a scientific pensions system for the Police Department which may be used as a model for other Departments, and be of incalculable value to the city.

When a member of the Police Force or Fire Department shall have been dismissed or reduced, after trial by the Police Commissioner or Fire Commissioner, or shall have resigned, from the position or rank theretofore held by him, the person aggrieved or the person who shall have resigned may make written application to the Mayor, setting forth the reason for demanding a rehearing of the charges upon which he was dismissed or reduced, or giving reasons why a resignation should be reviewed, and provided that such dismissed or reduced member of such force or department shall waive in writing all claim against The City of New York for back pay, the Mayor may, in writing, consent to such rehearing, stating the reasons why such charges should be reheard, or why such resignation should be reviewed.

Such application for a rehearing shall be made within one year after this enactment, or within one year from the date of the dismissal or reduction, if such dismissal or reduction occurs after this act takes effect.

Such rehearing or review shall be had by and before the Police Commissioner of The City of New York, if the applicant be a member of the Police Department, and before the Fire Commissioner, if the applicant be a member of the Fire Department, and if such Commissioner shall determine that such member has been illegally or unjustly dismissed or reduced, or has resigned from his position or rank, such Commissioner may restore him to the position or rank from which he was dismissed or reduced, or from which he has resigned, and allow him the whole of his time since any such dismissal or reduction or resignation to be applied on his time of service in such department, or for such other or further relief as such Commissioner may determine just, or affirm the dismissal or reduction, as he may determine from the evidence.

Sec. 2. This ordinance shall take effect immediately.

The Vice-Chairman laid before the Board the following communication from the Commissioner of Jurors, Borough of Brooklyn:

Annual Report of the Commissioner of Jurors, 1913.

Office of the Commissioner of Jurors, No. 381-387 Fulton Street, Borough of Brooklyn, N. Y., December 22, 1913.

To the Honorable Board of Aldermen:

Gentlemen—In compliance with the requirements of the laws of the State of New York (article 2, title 4, chapter 10), chapter 48, I have the honor to submit the following report of the business of this Department from September 1, 1912, to August 31, 1913, both inclusive.

The Department of Taxes and Assessments of The City of New York, whose duty it is to furnish the names of persons for jury duty, residing within the County limits, selected 650 persons to be examined.

The Commissioner of Jurors, according to chapter 1135, laws of 1881, of the State of New York, selected 60,957 persons, all of whom, in conjunction with those selected by the Department of Taxes and Assessments, were examined under chapter 601, laws of New York.

After examination and corrections as to their qualities, etc., the following will show the disposition of those examined:

Under chapter 257, laws of 1904, there were submitted to the Board for the selection of Grand Jurors a list of 24,872 persons, who had qualified to act as Jurors during the ensuing year. From this list the Board selected and returned to this Department the names of 760 persons as being suitable for service as Grand Jurors.

During the year covered by this report, September 1, 1912, to August 31, 1913, both inclusive, there have been drawn from this list 24,872 who qualified—21,244 Trial Jurors and 480 Grand Jurors—all of whom have been summoned to the several Courts held in the County during the interval referred to above.

The number of Jurors drawn, the Courts to which they were summoned, the number of persons fined, etc., are shown in the following statement:

For the Supreme Court of the State of New York there were drawn 350 Jurors from the Special Jury Panel, and 9,920 Trial Jurors. Out of this number 640 drawn to serve were recalled by an order from the Justices presiding at the various Terms of the several Parts of said Court.

For the Kings County Court there were drawn 9,650 Trial Jurors and 480 Grand Jurors.

For the Municipal Courts of the First, Second, Third, Fourth, Fifth, Sixth and Seventh Districts of the Borough of Brooklyn there were drawn 1,674 Trial Jurors, making a total of 22,074 Jurors drawn for all Courts.

By referring to the returns made to this Department by the Clerks of the Supreme, County and Municipal Courts, it will be seen that out of a total of 22,074 persons summoned as Jurors, the following number

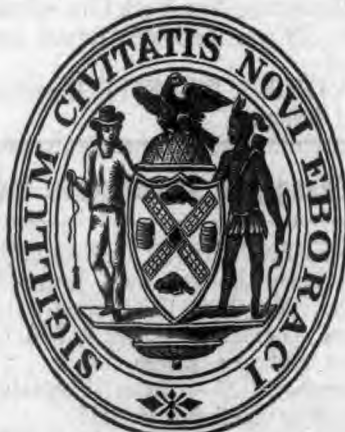

No bid or estimate will be considered unless as a condition precedent to the reception or consideration of any proposal, it be accompanied by a certified check upon one of the State or National banks of The City of New York, drawn to the order of the Comptroller, or money or corporate stock or certificates of indebtedness of any nature issued by The City of New York, which the Comptroller shall approve as of equal value with the security required in the advertisement, to the amount of not less than three nor more than five per centum of the amount of the bond required, as provided in section 420 of the Greater New York Charter.

The amount shall be as specified in the proposals or instructions to bidders and shall not be in excess of 5 per cent.

The certified check or money should not be inclosed in the envelope containing the bid or estimate, but should be either inclosed in a separate envelope addressed to the head of the Department, President or Board, or submitted personally upon the presentation of the bid or estimate.

For particulars as to the quantity and quality of the supplies, or the nature and extent of the work, reference must be made to the specifications, schedules, plans, etc., on file in the said office of the President, Board or Department.

No bid shall be accepted from or contract awarded to any person who is in arrears to The City of New York upon debt or contract, or who is a defaulter, as surety or otherwise, upon any obligation to the City.

The contract must be bid separately.

The right is reserved in each case to reject all bids or estimates if it is deemed to be for the interest of the City so to do.

Bidders will write out the amount of their bids or estimates in addition to inserting the same in figures.

Bidders are requested to make their bids or estimates upon the blank forms prepared and furnished by the City, a copy of which, with the proper envelope in which to inclose the bid, together with a copy of the contract, including the specifications, in the form approved by the Corporation Counsel can be obtained upon application therefor at the office of the Department for which the work is to be done. Plans and drawings of construction work may also be seen there.
