## DEPARTMENT OF FINANCE.

## Banking Commission.

The quarterly meeting of the officers to designate city depositories, in accordance with section 196, chapter 466, Laws of 1901, was held on Tuesday, August 1, 1916. Present-Hon. John Purroy Mitchel, Mayor; Hon. Milo R. Maltbie, Chamberlain, and Alexander Brough, Deputy Comptroller.

The Chamberlain offered the following: 'Resolved, That Edward F. Barrett be appointed Secretary of the Banking

Which was unanimously adopted.

The Chamberlain reported sending the following letter to the city depositories: "July 20, 1916. Gentlemen-Pursuant to law, the Mayor, the Comptroller and the Chamberlain, constituting the Banking Commission, will meet on the 1st day of August for the purpose of designating city depositories and fixing the rate of interest for the three months succeeding. The Charter requires that the rate must be fixed 'according to the current rate of interest upon like balances deposited in banks and trust companies in the City of New York by private persons and corporations.'

The method heretofore followed will be modified for the quarter from August to October 31, 1916, in certain respects. Instead of having all of the money belonging to the City of New York on deposit with banks and trust companies in a single class, a considerable sum, somewhere between \$10,000,000 and \$20,000,000, will be separated from the remainder of the money, and, for the sake of convenience, will be called 'Class A,' i. e., inactive deposits. The remainder will be treated as all deposits have been treated in the past, and, for convenience, will be called 'Class B, . e., active deposits.

The amount of money set aside as inactive deposits for the coming quarter will be fixed at a sum considerably below the lowest amount which the City has had on leposit with banks and trust companies for many years. A study of this phase of the matter has been made, and it has been found that only once in several years has the City had on deposit less than \$20,000,000, and usually considerably more. For the coming quarter, the total inactive deposits will not be allowed to exceed \$12,000,000 or \$15,000,000, in order that one may be reasonably certain that none of the Class A deposits will be called upon. Of course, no guarantee can be or will be given to this effect, as under the Charter all City deposits must be considered subject to call. But Class A deposits will not be called during the coming quarter 1 inless and until the demands for City money have exhausted other deposits and a part of Class A deposits is needed.

It follows that Class A deposits will not be fluctuating accounts, and, if one may udge from the experience of past years, there will be no withdrawal of any of these deposits during the coming quarter, but, of course, no pledge can be made to this

Inasmuch as Class A deposits will be even more desirable than City deposits have been, I wish to be advised what rate of interest you will agree to pay on Class 10 A deposits placed in your institution during the three months ending October 31st, 916, and what rate you will pay on Class B deposits. In your reply, will you please specify whether you wish a Class A or a Class B deposit, or both Class A and Class

I shall be glad to confer with anyone who wishes further information regarding 10 the practical operation of this plan any time from the 24th to the 26th of July, inclusive. We are desirous of receiving all replies before July 28, 1916.

Very sincerely yours, The Chamberlain reported that the banks replied to the above letter as follows: 10 Class A Deposits-39 banks agreed to pay 3 per cent. or more, 7 banks agreed

to pay 2\\( 2\) per cent., 38 banks agreed to pay 2\\( \sqrt{2} \) per cent., 17 banks agreed to pay 2

Class B Deposits—1 bank agreed to pay 2½ per cent., 32 banks agreed to pay 2½ per cent., 4 banks agreed to pay 2½ per cent., 55 banks agreed to pay 2 per cent.

Nine banks not bidding for this class of deposits. The Chamberlain offered the following:

"Resolved, That the present city depositories be redesignated." Which was unanimously adopted.

The Chamberlain offered the following:

"Resolved, That the minimum rate of interest on deposits be fixed at two (2) per cent., that the Chamberlain be empowered, wherever he may do so in his best judgment, to enter into contract for such higher rate of interest as may be obtained." Which was unanimously adopted.

On motion, the meeting adjourned.

Each bid or estimate shall contain the name and place of residence of the person making the same, and names of all persons interested with him therein, and, if no other person be so interested, it shall distinctly state that fact; also, that it is made without any connection with any other person making an estimate for the same purpose, and is in all respects fair and without collusion or fraud and that no member of the Board of Aldermen, head of a department, chief of a bureau, deputy thereof, or clerk therein, or other officer of The City of New York is, shall be or become interested, directly or indirectly, as contracting party, partner, stockholder, surety or otherwise in or in the performance of the contract, or in the supplies, work or business to which it relates, or in any portion of the profits thereof. The bid or estimate must be verified by the oath, in writing, of the party or parties making the estimate that the several matters stated herein are in all respects true.

No bid or estimate will be considered unless as a condition precedent to the reception or consideration of any proposal, it be accompanied by a certified check upon one of the State or National banks of The City of New York, drawn to the order of the Comptroller, or money or corporate stock or certificates of indebtedness of any nature issued by The City of New York, which the Comptroller shall approve as of equal value with the security required in the advertisement to the amount of not less than three nor more than five per centum of the amount of the bend required, as provided in section 420 of the Greater New York Charter.

The amount shall be as specified in the proposals or instructions to bidders and shall not be

in excess of 5 per cent.

The certified check or money should not be inclosed in the envelope containing the bid or estimate, but should be either inclosed in a separate envelope addressed to the head of the Department, President or Board, or submitted personally upon the presentation of the bid or estimate.

For particulars as to the quantity and quality of the supplies, or the nature and extent of the work, reference must be made to the specifications, schedules, plans, etc., on file in the said office of the President, Board or Department.

No bid shall be accepted from or contract awarded to any person who is in arrears to The City of New York upon debt or contract, or who is a defaulter, as surety or otherwise, upon any obligation of the City.

The contract must be bid for separately.

The right is reserved in each case to reject all bids or estimates if it is deemed to be for the nterest of the City so to do.

Bidders will write out the amount of their bids or estimates in addition to inserting the same in

Bidders are requested to make their bids or estimates upon the blank forms prepared and furnished by the City, a copy of which, with the proper envelope in which to inclose the bid, together with a copy of the contract, including the specifications, in the form approved by the Corporation Counsel, can be obtained upon application therefor at the office of the Department for which the work is to be done. Plans and drawings of construction work may also be seen there.
