

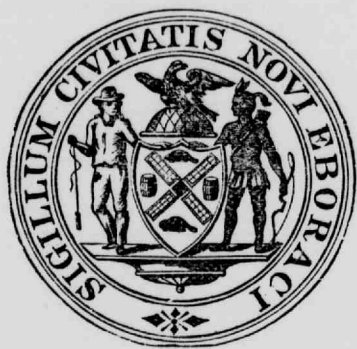

SIR—717 deaths were reported to have occurred in this city during the week ending Saturday, July 28, which is a decrease of 37 as compared with the number reported the preceding week, and 27 less than were reported during the corresponding week of the year 1876. The actual mortality for the week ending July 21, was 756, which is 144.6 below the average for the corresponding week of the past 5 years, and represents an annual death-rate of 36.46 per 1,000 persons living, the population estimated at 1,078,102.

The deaths of children under five years of age, and of persons who were suffering from diarrhoeal diseases showed a further decline during the past week, the mortality of the former being 67, and the latter 63 less than the mortality for the previous week, notwithstanding the mean temperature was 2.3 degrees Fahr. higher.

The deaths in tenement houses were 29 less, but the institutions showed an increase of 18. The vigorous efforts of the extra corps of physicians employed by the Board in visiting the dwellings of the poor and prescribing for the sick are now showing beneficial results. The highest temperature during the week was on Thursday, July 26, at 4 P. M., when the thermometer indicated 92 degrees, and the greatest humidity was on Monday, July 23, at 7 A. M., when there was complete saturation.

The proportion of deaths from diarrhoeal diseases to the total mortality was 37.38 per cent., or 1 to every 2.67 deaths, of children under 5 years 60.39 per cent., or 1 to every 1.65 deaths, and of those who died in tenement-houses 55.23 per cent., or 1 to every 1.81 deaths. This proportion to the total mortality, although excessive, differs but slightly from the mortality of the large American cities at this season of the year. It is noticeable, however, that in the wards of this city which contain a small area and a large tenement-house population the death-rate is higher to the number of inhabitants than in the wards where there is a larger area and smaller tenement-house population, viz.: During the week ending July 21, in the Fourteenth Ward, with an area in acres of 96 and a population of 26,471, there were 22 deaths, of which 10 were from diarrhoeal diseases, and in the Fifteenth Ward, with an area of 198 acres and a population of 25,543, there were but 9 deaths, of which 4 were from diarrhoeal diseases, or, with an excess in population of but 928 persons there were more than twice the number of deaths in the Fourteenth than in the Fifteenth.

The diseases which showed an increase during the past compared with the preceding week were the following: Measles, 1; whooping-cough, 3; typhoid fever, 6; puerperal diseases, 3; alcoholism, 2; cancer, 2; phthisis pulmonalis, 4; bronchitis, 1; pneumonia, 2; marasmus and scrofula, 19; sun-stroke, 4; diseases of the brain and nervous system, 12; Bright's disease and nephritis, 21; and those that showed a decrease were: Scarletina, 5; membranous croup, 6; typhus fever, 1; diarrhoeal diseases, 63 (of which 59 were children under 5 years); diseases of the heart, 4; hydrocephalus and tubercular meningitis, 4; and deaths by drowning, 6.

There were 3,281 deaths, 213 still-births, and 510 marriages during the month of July, 1877, against 4,172 deaths, 190 still-births, 471 marriages, and 1,986 births reported during the corresponding month of 1876.

Of the total number of deaths reported for the week, 106 were in institutions, 396 in tenement-houses, 202 in houses containing 3 families and less, 5 in hotels and boarding-houses, 7 in rivers, boats, streets, etc.; 11 were on the basement floor, 159 on the first, 207 on the second, 136 on the third, 78 on the fourth, 10 on the fifth; 712 were stated to be residents of New York City, and 5 non-residents; 60 were stated as single, 130 married, and 40 widowed, and the condition of 487 was not stated, these were children who had not attained a marriageable age; 325 deaths were of children under 1 year, 387 under 2 years, 433 under 5 years, and 25 were of persons 70 years old and over.

The disposition of 691 deaths and still-births, or 90.32 per cent. of the total number reported, were in the following 14 cemeteries, which are in the vicinity of this city, viz.: Bayside (Jewish) 15, Calvary (Roman Catholic) 292, City (pauper burial ground, undenominational) 89, Greenwood (undenominational) 45, Lutheran (undenominational) 129, Cypress Hills (undenominational) 27, Evergreen (undenominational) 37, Woodlawn (undenominational) 27, St. Michael's (Protestant Episcopal) 4, Union (Methodist Protestant) 9, Holy Cross (Roman Catholic) 5, Machpelah, L. I. (Jewish) 5, St. Raymond's (Roman Catholic) 4, Washington (undenominational) 3.

The mean temperature for the week ending July 28 was 77.9 degrees Fahr., the mean humidity was 72, saturation being 100, the mean pressure was 29.950, the number of miles traveled by the wind was 531, and the total amount of rain-fall was 0.05 inch, as reported by D. Draper, Director of the New York Meteorological Observatory, Central Park.

The distribution of the deaths for the week ending July 21 was in the following wards, viz.: First, 10; Second, 0; Third, 4; Fourth, 16; Fifth, 16; Sixth, 5; Seventh, 30; Eighth, 40; Ninth, 39; Tenth, 26; Eleventh, 46; Twelfth, 78; Thirteenth, 21; Fourteenth, 22; Fifteenth, 9; Sixteenth, 22; Seventeenth, 49; Eighteenth, 35; Nineteenth, 105; Twentieth, 46; Twenty-first, 39; Twenty-second, 62; Twenty-third, 20, and Twenty-fourth, 12.
