

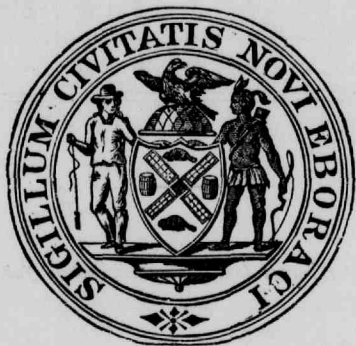

Action of the Board on Tenement House Plans.

Resolved, That the application to modify the permit on Plan No. 300 so far as to allow the erection of a two-story stable on the yards of the two tenement-houses on the east side of Fourth avenue, about 25 feet north of Sixty-third street, be and is hereby denied.

Resolved, That the plan (No. 413-2) for light and ventilation of the tenement-house on the southeast corner of Sixty-first street and First avenue, as proposed to be altered by making the extension two stories high instead of one, submitted to this Board by William Jose, under Laws of 1867, chapter 908, as amended by Laws of 1879, chapter 504, and Laws of 1880, chapter 399, on condition that a clear open space 4 feet by 21 feet in area be left clear between the said additional story and the rear line of the lot, be and the said plan is hereby approved.

Resolved, That the plan (No. 541) for light and ventilation of the tenement-house on the northeast corner of Third avenue and Thirty-fourth street, as proposed to be altered, submitted to this Board by James E. Ware, under Laws of 1867, chapter 908, as amended by Laws of 1879, chapter 504, and Laws of 1880, chapter 399, provided that a space 4 feet by 24 feet 9 inches in area be left clear above the first story, between the rear line of the house and the rear line of the lot, be and the said plan is hereby approved.

Resolved, That the plan (No. 555) for light and ventilation of the five-story tenement-house proposed to be built, 50 feet 5 inches by 100 feet, on a lot 50 feet 5 inches by 100 feet, on the southeast corner of Seventh avenue and Fifty-fifth street, submitted to this Board by H. J. Hardenbergh, under Laws of 1867, chapter 908, as amended by Laws of 1879, chapter 504, and Laws of 1880, chapter 399, on condition that in the rear of the Seventh avenue front there shall be a clear open space 4 feet by 50 feet 5 inches in area above the first story, between the house and the rear line of the lot, be and the said plan is hereby approved.

Resolved, That the plan (No. 565) for light and ventilation of the four-story tenement-house, 20 feet by 57 feet 6 inches, with an extension 15 feet 6 inches wide by 21 feet 4 inches deep, proposed to be built on a lot 20 feet by 90 feet, on the west side of Lexington avenue, 55 feet south of Fifty-sixth street, submitted to this Board by Emanuel Gandolf, under Laws of 1867, chapter 908, as amended by Laws of 1879, chapter 504, and Laws of 1880, chapter 399, provided that not less than 12 feet of the lot be left clear in the rear of the extension, be and the said plan is hereby approved.

Resolved, That the plan (No. 572) for light and ventilation of the tenement-house proposed to be built 25 feet by 80 feet, with an extension 11 feet deep by 7 feet 6 inches wide, on a lot 25 feet by 100 feet, on the north side of One Hundred and Twenty-fourth street, 210 feet east of Fifth avenue, submitted to this Board by Julius Kastner, under Laws of 1867, chapter 908, as amended by Laws of 1879, chapter 504, and Laws of 1880, chapter 399, provided the extension be so reduced in depth as to leave a clear open space of 10 feet between the rear thereof and the rear line of the lot, be and the said plan is hereby approved.

Resolved, That the plan (No. 573) for light and ventilation of the portion of the tenement-house No. 556 Greenwich street, proposed to be altered, by changing the top floor, submitted to this Board by Joseph Niepert, under Laws of 1867, chapter 908, as amended by Laws of 1879, chapter 504, and Laws of 1880, chapter 399, on condition that a skylight, not less than 12 square feet in area, be constructed to light and ventilate the middle room of the top floor, and so arranged as to be readily opened, be and the said plan is hereby approved.

Sanitary Bureau.

The following is a record of the work performed in the Sanitary Bureau for the week ending July 3, 1880. The total number of inspections made by the Sanitary and Assistant Sanitary Inspectors was 1,860, as follows, viz.:

2 public buildings, 761 tenement houses, 93 private dwellings, 105 other dwellings, 12 manufacturing and workshops, 23 stores and warehouses, 50 stables, 14 slaughter-houses, 1 lime-kiln, 2 manure dumps, 1 garbage dump, 5 lodging houses, 3 public sewers, 26 sunken and vacant lots, 2 lard rendering establishments, 1 foundry, 90 yards, courts, and areas, 113 cellars and basements, 124 waste pipes and drains, 285 privies and water-closets, 29 streets, gutters, and sidewalks, 12 dangerous stairways, 5 cesspools, 6 smoky chimneys, 1 piggery, 21 other nuisances, together with 73 visits of the Sanitary Inspectors to cases of contagious disease.

The number of reports thereon received from the Inspectors was 765.

During the past week 203 complaints were received from citizens, and referred to the Sanitary and Assistant Sanitary Inspectors for investigation and report.

Permits were issued to the consignees of 114 vessels to discharge cargoes, on vouchers from the Health Officer of the Port.

124 permits were granted scavengers to empty, clean, and disinfect privy sinks.

The Disinfecting Corps have visited 55 premises where contagious diseases were found, and have disinfected and fumigated 53 houses, 53 privy sinks, together with clothing, bedding, etc.

Bureau of Vital Statistics.

The certificates of 533 births, 48 still-births, 129 marriages, and 1,297 deaths, reported to have taken place in this city, were received by this Bureau during the week ending Saturday, July 3, 1880; this shows a decrease of 14 births, 6 still-births, and 259 deaths, and a decrease of 41 marriages, when compared with the number received during the preceding week, but when compared with the corresponding week of the year 1879, there was a decrease of 199 births, 3 still-births, and 545 deaths, and a decrease of 22 marriages. Compared with the mortality reported during the preceding week, the deaths from measles decreased 4; croup, 7; malarial fevers, 3; phthisis pulmonalis, 3; bronchitis, 5; pneumonia, 3; hydrocephalus and tubercular meningitis, 2; meningitis and encephalitis, 1; apoplexy, 2; Bright's disease and nephritis, 3; cyanosis and atelectasis, 6; suicide, 4; while the deaths from scarlatina increased 3; diphtheria, 2; whooping cough, 5; erysipelas, 3; cerebro-spinal fever, 4; puerperal diseases, 1; diarrhoeal diseases, 186; inanition, 3; alcoholism, 1; cancer, 5; aneurism, 1; convulsions, 7; direct effect of solar heat, 29; all diseases of the brain and nervous system, 44; cirrhosis and hepatitis, 3; enteritis, gastritis, and peritonitis, 10; drowning, 1. The number of deaths from typhoid fever, rheumatism and gout, heart diseases, marasmus, tabes mesenterica, and scrofula, premature and preterm births, and surgical operations was the same in the two successive weeks.

Deaths from the principal Zymotic Diseases, Phthisis Pulmonalis, Pneumonia, Bronchitis, and Children under five years of age, reported during the week and compared with the three preceding weeks.

The ages of 635 of the persons who died during the week were reported to be under one year; 804 under two years; 863 under five years, and 43 seventy years and over, which shows that the number of deaths of children under five years of age was 150 more than the number reported during last week, and represent 66.54 per cent. of the total weekly mortality.

SIR—There were 1,297 deaths reported to have occurred in this city during the week ending Saturday, July 3, 1880, which is an increase of 259, as compared with the number reported the preceding week, and 545 more than were reported during the corresponding week of the year 1879. The actual mortality for the week ending June 26, 1880, was 1,195, which is 648.2 above the average for the corresponding week of the past five years, and represents an annual death-rate of 51.78 per 1,000 persons living, the population estimated at 1,200,000.

Sanitary Bureau.

Following is a record of the work performed in the Sanitary Bureau for the week ending July 3, 1880. The total number of inspections made by the Sanitary and Assistant Sanitary Inspectors was 1,860, as follows, viz.:

public buildings, 761 tenement houses, 93 private dwellings, 105 other dwellings, 12 manufacturing and workshops, 23 stores and warehouses, 50 stables, 14 slaughter-houses, 1 lime-kiln, 5 dumps, 1 garbage dump, 5 lodging houses, 3 public sewers, 26 sunken and vacant and rendering establishments, 1 foundry, 90 yards, courts, and areas, 113 cellars and basements, 24 waste pipes and drains, 285 privies and water-closets, 29 streets, gutters, and sidewalks, 22 dangerous stairways, 5 cesspools, 6 smoky chimneys, 1 piggery, 21 other nuisances, and with 73 visits of the Sanitary Inspectors to cases of contagious disease.

The number of reports thereon received from the Inspectors was 765.

During the past week 203 complaints were received from citizens, and referred to the Sanitary Inspectors for investigation and report.

Permits were issued to the consignees of 114 vessels to discharge cargoes, on vouchers from the Officer of the Port.

Permits were granted scavengers to empty, clean, and disinfect privy sinks.

Disinfecting Corps have visited 55 premises where contagious diseases were found, and have disinfected 53 houses, 53 privy sinks, together with clothing, bedding, etc.

Bureau of Vital Statistics.

Certificates of 533 births, 48 still-births, 129 marriages, and 1,297 deaths, reported to have occurred in this city, were received by this Bureau during the week ending Saturday, July 3, 1880. This shows an increase of 14 births, 6 still-births, and 259 deaths, and a decrease of 41 marriages, when compared with the number received during the preceding week, but when compared with the corresponding week of the year 1879, there was an increase of 199 births, 3 still-births, and 545 deaths, and a decrease of 22 marriages. Compared with the mortality reported in the preceding week, the deaths from measles decreased 4; croup, 7; malarial fevers, 3; pulmonary, 3; bronchitis, 5; pneumonia, 3; hydrocephalus and tubercular meningitis, 2; diphtheria, 1; apoplexy, 2; Bright's disease and nephritis, 3; cyanosis and atelectasis, 4; while the deaths from scarlatina increased 3; diphtheria, 2; whooping cough, 5; cerebro-spinal fever, 4; puerperal diseases, 1; diarrhoeal diseases, 186; inanition, 3; cancer, 1; aneurism, 1; convulsions, 7; direct effect of solar heat, 29; all diseases of the brain and nervous system, 44; cirrhosis and hepatitis, 3; enteritis, gastritis, and peritonitis, 10; tuberculosis, 1. The number of deaths from typhoid fever, rheumatism and gout, heart diseases, tuberculosis, tabes mesenterica, and scrofula, premature and preterm births, and surgical operations was the same in the two successive weeks.

Of the total number of deaths reported for the week, 163 were in institutions, 776 in tenement houses, 313 in houses containing three families or less, 5 in hotels and boarding-houses, 39 in rivers, streets, boats, etc.; 14 were on the basement floor, 269 on the first, 350 on the second, 258 on the third, 162 on the fourth, 36 on the fifth, 6 on the sixth; 85 were stated to be single, 176 married, 80 widowed, and the condition of 956 was not stated; these were children who had not attained a marriageable age.

The total number of burial permits issued during the week are as follows, viz.: City deaths, 1,297; still-births, 48; bodies in transitu, 44; of the total burial permits issued for city deaths and still-births 138 were upon certificates received from the Coroners; 533 burials, 129 marriages, 44 still-births, 1,297 deaths, 44 applications for transit permits were recorded, indexed and tabulated; 38 searches of the registers of births, marriages and deaths were made, and 2 transcripts of the birth record, 8 of marriage, and 27 of death were issued during the week.

The mean temperature for the week ending July 3, 1880, was 78.2 degrees Fahr., the mean reading of the barometer was 29.792, the mean humidity was 64, saturation being 100, the number of miles traveled by the wind was 1,134, and the total amount of rain-fall was .72 inch depth of water, as reported by D. Draper, Director of the New York Meteorological Observatory, Central Park.

LAWS OF NEW YORK, 1880.

CHAPTER 489.

AN ACT to amend chapter four hundred and sixty-one of the laws of eighteen hundred and sixty-nine, entitled "An act to incorporate the Chapin Home for the Aged and Infirm in the City of New York."

Passed May 28, 1880.

The People of the State of New York, represented in Senate and Assembly, do enact as follows:

Section 1. Section four of chapter four hundred and sixty-one of the laws of eighteen hundred and sixty-nine, entitled "An act to incorporate the Chapin Home for the Aged and Infirm in the City of New York," is hereby amended so as to read as follows:

§ 4. The business of said corporation shall be managed by a board of trustees, which board shall be composed of thirty members to be elected by the members of the corporation by ballot. At the first election of trustees held after the passage of this act, ten trustees shall be elected for one year, ten for two years and ten for three years, and all trustees elected thereafter shall be elected for the full term of three years.

Sec. 2. This act shall take effect immediately.

CHAPTER 498.

AN ACT to provide for leasing wharf property necessary for ferry purposes along with the franchise of a ferry within the city of New York.

Passed May 28, 1880.

The People of the State of New York, represented in the Senate and Assembly, do enact as follows:

Section 1. The commissioners of the sinking fund of the city of New York shall hereafter possess the power, and they are hereby authorized to lease, in the manner provided by law, along with the franchise of a ferry within said city, such wharf property, including wharves, piers, bulk-heads and structures thereon, and slips, docks, and water fronts adjacent thereto, used or required for the purposes of such ferry, now owned or possessed, or which may be hereafter owned or acquired by said city, or to which the corporation of said city is or may become entitled, or of which it may become possessed.

Sec. 2. All acts and parts of acts inconsistent with the provisions of this act are hereby repealed. Nothing in this act contained shall be held to apply to that portion of the East river which has, by law, been exclusively set apart for the use of canal boats engaged in the transportation of freights in the Hudson river, coming to tide-water from the canals of the state.

Sec. 3. This act shall take effect immediately.

CHAPTER 502.

AN ACT to amend chapter two hundred and seventy-two of the laws of eighteen hundred and thirty-seven, entitled "An act to incorporate the Society for the Relief of Half Orphan and Destitute Children in the City of New York."

Passed May 20, 1880; three-fifths being present.

The People of the State of New York, represented in Senate and Assembly, do enact as follows:

Section 1. Section eleven of chapter two hundred and seventy-two of the laws of eighteen hundred and thirty-seven, entitled "An act to incorporate the Society for the Relief of Half Orphan and Destitute Children, in the City of New York," is hereby amended so as to read as follows:

Sec. 11. The corporation hereby created may receive, take, and hold, as well by devise or bequest as otherwise, any real or personal estate for the uses and purposes contemplated by this act, whether the same be devised, bequeathed or conveyed directly to such corporation or to the board of trustees above mentioned, or otherwise, for the use of the society.

Sec. 2. This act shall take effect immediately.

CHAPTER 123.

AN Act in relation to arrears of taxes in the City of New York, and to provide for the reissuing of revenue bonds in anticipation of such taxes.

Passed April 15, 1880; three-fifths being present.
The People of the State of New York, represented in Senate and Assembly, do enact as follows:

Section 1. At any time after the passage of this act, and before the first day of October, eighteen hundred and eighty, any person may pay to the Comptroller of the City of New York the amount of any tax upon real property belonging to such person, heretofore laid or imposed and now remaining unpaid, together with interest thereon at the rate of seven per centum per annum, to be calculated from the time that such tax was imposed to the time of such payment, provided, also, that the time when such payment may be made on the amount of any such tax laid or imposed in the years eighteen hundred and seventy-seven, eighteen hundred and seventy-eight, and eighteen hundred and seventy-nine shall extend to the first day of April, eighteen hundred and eighty-one. The Comptroller shall make and deliver to the person making any such payment a receipt therefor, and shall forthwith cancel the record of any such tax on the books of the finance department; and upon such payment being made such tax shall cease to be a lien upon the property and shall be deemed fully paid, satisfied and discharged, and there shall be no right to any further interest or penalty by reason of such tax not having been paid within the time heretofore required by law, or by reason of any statute passed requiring the payment heretofore of any penalty or interest over seven per centum per annum upon any unpaid tax.

Sec. 2. Any revenue bond heretofore issued in anticipation of the taxes in the first section specified which may fall due and become payable before said taxes are collected, may be reissued by the Comptroller of said city, in whole or in part, for such period as he may determine, not exceeding one year.

Sec. 3. This act shall take effect immediately.
