

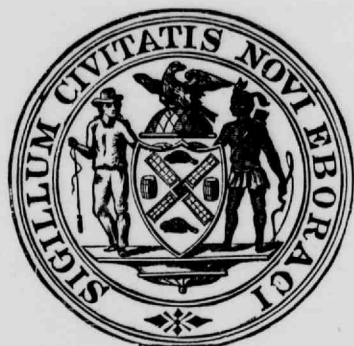

Whereas, The Sanitary Superintendent has certified to this Board that the building situated on lot No. 215 Fifth street has become dangerous to life by reason of want of repairs;

Ordered, That all persons in said building situated on lot No. 215 Fifth street, be required to vacate said building on or before the 28th day of August, 1880, for the reason that said building is dangerous to life, by reason of want of repairs; and further, that this order be affixed conspicuously on the front of said building, and be served as the law requires, under the direction of the Sanitary Superintendent; and further that said building be not again used as a human habitation without a written permit from this Board.

Action of the Board on Tenement-house Plans.

Resolved, That the plan (No. 591-2) for light and ventilation of two tenement-houses, each 25 feet by 52 feet and four stories high, arranged for two families on each floor, proposed to be built on lots each 25 feet by 100 feet, on the north side of One Hundred and Thirteenth street, beginning 95 feet east of First avenue, submitted to this Board by James Duffy, under Laws of 1867, chapter 908, as amended by Laws of 1879, chapter 504, and Laws of 1880, chapter 399, on condition that each of the shafts to light and ventilate the inside rooms of said houses be made not less than 16 square feet in area, and at least 2 feet wide, inside measurement, be and the said plan is hereby approved.

Resolved, That the plan (No. 597-3) for light and ventilation of the four-story tenement-house, 31 feet front and 30 feet rear, by 53 feet deep, proposed to be built on a lot 46 feet front and 39 feet rear by 112 feet 5 inches deep, on the south side of One Hundred and Sixty-ninth street, 165 feet west of Franklin avenue, submitted to this Board by Julius Kastner, under Laws of 1867, chapter 908, as amended by Laws of 1879, chapter 504, and Laws of 1880, chapter 399, on condition that when a sewer is constructed in One Hundred and Sixty-ninth street, a school sink or water-closets be substituted for the privy vault in the yard, be and the said plan is hereby approved.

Resolved, That the plan (No. 621-3) for light and ventilation of the tenement-house, 24 feet 8 inches by 40 feet, and four stories high, proposed to be built on a lot 25 feet by 50 feet, at No. 332 West Sixteenth street, submitted to this Board by J. J. Campion, under Laws of 1867, chapter 908, as amended by Laws of 1879, chapter 504, and Laws of 1880, chapter 399, be and is hereby approved.

Plans 633-2 and 635-2 were laid on the table for further consideration.
Resolved, That the plan (No. 643) for light and ventilation of the story proposed to be added to the three-story tenement-house, No. 75 East Fourth street, submitted to this Board by William Jose, under Laws of 1867, chapter 908, as amended by Laws of 1879, chapter 504, and Laws of 1880, chapter 399, be and is hereby approved.

Resolved, That the plan (No. 644-2) for light and ventilation of the four-story tenement-house proposed to be built at No. 252 Delancey street, on the front of the lot, submitted to this Board by F. W. Klumpt, under Laws of 1867, chapter 908, as amended by Laws of 1879, chapter 504, and Laws of 1880, chapter 399, on condition that at least 23 feet of the lot by the full width thereof be left clear between the said proposed house and the rear house on the same lot, be and the said plan is hereby approved.

Plans 645 and 646 were tabled for further consideration.

Resolved, That the plan (No. 647) for light and ventilation of the three tenement-houses, each 25 feet by 55 feet and four stories high, proposed to be built on lots each 75 feet by 100 feet on the north side of One Hundred and Fourth street, beginning 200 feet east of Second avenue, submitted to this Board by Joseph Mayer, under Laws of 1867, chapter 908, as amended by Laws of 1879, chapter 504, and Laws of 1880, chapter 399, on condition that each of the shafts to light and ventilate the inside rooms in said houses be made at least 16 square feet in area and not less than 2 feet wide, inside measurement, be and the said plan is hereby approved.

Resolved, That the plan (No. 648) for light and ventilation of thirteen tenement-houses, each six stories high, proposed to be built as follows: three on the north side of Seventy-first street, and three on the south side of Seventy-second street, beginning about 96 feet west of First avenue, one on the north side of Seventy-first street, and one on the south side of Seventy-second street, each 56 feet west of First avenue, and five on the west side of First avenue, occupying the whole of the block between Seventy-first and Seventy-second streets, submitted to this Board for the Improved Dwelling Association, by Vaux & Radford, under Laws of 1867, chapter 908, as amended by Laws of 1879, chapter 504, and Laws of 1880, chapter 399, be and is hereby approved.

Plans 649 and 650 were tabled for inspection and report.

Resolved, That the plan (No. 651) for light and ventilation of the story proposed to be added to the lodging-house No. 6 Greenwich street, submitted to this Board by William B. Mitchell, under Laws of 1867, chapter 908, as amended by Laws of 1879, chapter 504, and Laws of 1880, chapter 399, on condition that a proper school sink or hopper closets be provided in the yard of said house in place of the privy vault, be and the said plan is hereby approved.

Resolved, That the plan (No. 652) for light and ventilation of two tenement-houses, each four stories high and 18 feet 9 inches by 65 feet, with an extension 12 feet deep and 10 feet 6 inches wide, proposed to be built on a lot 18 feet 9 inches by 99 feet 11 inches, on the north side of One Hundred and Twenty-seventh street, 208 feet east of Fifth avenue, submitted to this Board by James E. Ray, under Laws of 1867, chapter 908, as amended by Laws of 1879, chapter 504, and Laws of 1880, chapter 399, be and is hereby approved.

Plan No. 653 was tabled for an inspection and report.

Sanitary Bureau.

The following is a record of the work performed in the Sanitary Bureau for the week ending August 21, 1880. The total number of inspections made by the Sanitary and Assistant Sanitary Inspectors was 1,735, as follows, viz.:

2 public buildings, 683 tenement-houses, 102 private dwellings, 121 other dwellings, 10 manufactories and workshops, 12 stores and warehouses, 39 stables, 14 slaughter-houses, 1 lime-kiln, 2 manure dumps, 1 garbage dump, 1 pond, 1 swamp, 1 market, 1 dye house, 40 sunken and vacant lots, 1 roadway, 1 stream, 83 yards, courts, and areas, 102 cellars and basements, 130 waste pipes and drains, 257 privies and water-closets, 41 streets, gutters, and sidewalks, 8 dangerous stairways, 2 cess-pools, 2 piggeries, 2 smoky chimneys, 14 other nuisances, together with 61 visits of the Sanitary Inspectors to cases of contagious diseases.

The number of reports thereon received from the Inspectors was 615.

During the past week 125 complaints were received from citizens, and referred to the Sanitary Inspectors for investigation and report.

Permits were issued to the consignees of 130 vessels to discharge cargoes, on vouchers from the Health Officer of the Port.

134 permits were granted scavengers to empty, clean, and disinfect privy sinks.

The Disinfecting Corps have visited 48 premises where contagious diseases were found, and have disinfected and fumigated 45 houses, 45 privy sinks, together with clothing, bedding, etc.

Four cases of contagious disease were removed to hospital by the ambulance corps.
The Special Disinfecting Corps have disinfected 4,117 privies, 200 yards, 175 cellars, and 148 garbage boxes and 88 miles of street gutters.

Bureau of Vital Statistics.

The certificates of 539 births, 41 still-births, 139 marriages, and 601 deaths, reported to have taken place in this city, were received by this Bureau during the week ending Saturday, August 21, 1880; this shows an increase of 24 births and 4 marriages and a decrease of 3 still-births, and 26 deaths when compared with the number received during the preceding week, but when compared with the corresponding week of the year 1879, there was an increase of 75 births, 5 still-births, 25 marriages, and 118 deaths. Compared with the mortality reported during the preceding week, the deaths from scarlatina decreased 1; erysipelas, 1; typhoid fever, 1; puerperal diseases, 3; diarrhoeal diseases, 9; alcoholism, 3; cancer, 4; phthisis pulmonalis, 20; heart diseases, 4; marasmus, tabes mesenterica, and scrofula, 4; convulsions, 13; direct effect of solar heat, 3; apoplexy, 5; all diseases of the brain and nervous system, 15; Bright's disease and nephritis, 4; suicide, 3; and drowning 5. While the deaths from measles increased 2; diphtheria, 11; croup, 4; whooping cough, 1; cerebro-spinal fever, 2; malarial fevers, 2; inanition, 11; bronchitis, 1; pneumonia, 3; hydrocephalus and tubercular meningitis, 1; cirrhosis and hepatitis, 1. The number of deaths from rheumatism and gout, aneurism, meningitis and encephalitis, gastritis, enteritis and peritonitis, cyanosis and atelectasis, and premature and preterm births, was the same in the two successive weeks.

Deaths from the principal Zymotic Diseases, Phthisis Pulmonalis, Pneumonia, Bronchitis, and Children under five years of age, reported during the week and compared with the three preceding weeks.

The ages of 200 of the persons who died during the week were reported to be under one year; 255 under two years; 304 under five years, and 30 seventy years and over, which shows that the deaths of children under five years of age was 6 less than the number reported during last week, and represent 50.58 per cent. of the total weekly mortality.

Of the total number of deaths reported for the week, 105 were in institutions, 344 in tenement houses, 142 in houses containing three families or less, 3 in hotels and boarding-houses, 7 in rivers, streets, boats, etc.; 4 were on the basement floor, 135 on the first, 154 on the second, 114 on the third, 63 on the fourth, 19 on the fifth, 0 on the sixth; 600 were stated to be residents of New York City and 1 non-resident; 60 were stated to be single, 120 married, 54 widowed, and the condition of 367 was not stated; these were children who had not attained a marriageable age.

The total number of burial permits issued during the week are as follows, viz.: City deaths, 601; still-births, 41; bodies in transitu, 23; of the total burial permits issued for city deaths and still-births 57 were upon certificates received from the Coroners; 539 births, 139 marriages, 41 still-births, 601 deaths, 23 applications for transit permits were recorded, indexed and tabulated; 41 searches of the registers of births, marriages and deaths were made, and 3 transcripts of the birth record, 5 of marriage, and 29 of death were issued during the week.

The mean temperature for the week ending August 21, 1880, was 71.2 degrees Fahr., the mean reading of the barometer was 29.955, the mean humidity was 72, saturation being 100, the number of miles traveled by the wind was 1010, and the total amount of rain-fall was 0.97 inches depth of water, as reported by D. Draper, Director of the New York Meteorological Observatory, Central Park.

The disposition of 552 deaths and still-births, or 85.98 per cent. of the total number reported, was in the following 14 cemeteries: Bayside (Jewish), 15; Calvary (Roman Catholic), 236; City pauper burial-ground (undenominational), 62; Greenwood (undenominational), 30; Lutheran (undenominational), 95; Cypress Hills (undenominational), 15; Evergreen (undenominational), 41; Woodlawn (undenominational), 15; St. Michael's (Protestant Episcopal), 9; Union (Methodist Protestant), 4; Holy Cross (Roman Catholic), 10; Machpelah, L. I. (Jewish), 9; St. Raymond's (Roman Catholic), 3; Washington (undenominational), 8.

The distribution of deaths (actual mortality) for the week ending August 14, 1880, was in the following Wards, viz.: First, 10; Second, 0; Third, 2; Fourth, 7; Fifth, 8; Sixth, 8; Seventh, 29; Eighth, 29; Ninth, 22; Tenth, 29; Eleventh, 33; Twelfth, 45; Thirteenth, 26; Fourteenth, 18; Fifteenth, 10; Sixteenth, 15; Seventeenth, 50; Eighteenth, 36; Nineteenth, 94; Twentieth, 40; Twenty-first, 58; Twenty-second, 58; Twenty-third, 10; Twenty-fourth, 5.

The actual mortality for the week ending August 14, 1880, was 642; this is 149 more than the number that occurred during the corresponding week of the year 1879, and 42.4 more than the average of the corresponding weeks of the past five years, and represents an annual death-rate of 27.50 per 1,000 persons living, the population estimated at 1,213,981.

SIR—There were 601 deaths reported to have occurred in this city during the week ending Saturday, August 21, 1880, which is a decrease of 26, as compared with the number reported the preceding week, and 118 more than were reported during the corresponding week of the year 1879. The actual mortality for the week ending August 14, 1880, was 642, which is 42.4 above the average for the corresponding week of the past five years, and represents an annual death-rate of 27.50 per 1,000 persons living, the population estimated at 1,213,981.

any person liable therefor may pay the amount of any

York, confirmed prior to the passage of said act, and
remaining unpaid with interest at the rate of seven per
centum per annum, and after said first day of September,
and before the first day of December, 1880, any such
assessment may be paid as aforesaid with interest at the
rate of nine per centum per annum, from the date of con-
firmation to the date of payment thereof.

If any such assessment shall not be paid before the first
day of December, 1880, the rate of interest thereon will be
twelve per centum per annum thereafter, as provided by
law, from the date of confirmation to the date of payment.

CHAPTER 195.
AN ACT in relation to the payment of assessments for
local improvements in the City of New York.

Passed May 7, 1880; three-fifths being present.
The People of the State of New York, represented in
Senate and Assembly, do enact as follows:

Section 1. At any time before the first day of Septem-
ber, eighteen hundred and eighty, any person liable there-
for may pay, to the officer authorized to receive the same,
the amount of any assessment for any local improvement
in the City of New York, heretofore confirmed and now
unpaid, with interest thereon at the rate of seven per
centum per annum from the date of confirmation to the
date of payment and at any time on or after said first day
of September, and before the first day of December, 1880,
any such assessment may be paid as aforesaid with interest at the
rate of nine per centum per annum from the date of confirma-
tion to the date of payment.

Sec. 2. Where any installment or installments of any
assessments have been paid under the provisions of chap-
ter one hundred and three of the laws of eighteen hundred
and seventy-six, or of chapter one hundred and fifty-nine
of the laws of eighteen hundred and seventy-seven, or of
chapter two hundred and fifty-five of the laws of eighteen
hundred and seventy-eight, the amount of such assess-
ment or assessments remaining unpaid may be paid within
the same periods prescribed in the first section of this act
and upon the same terms and conditions therein pre-
scribed.

Sec. 3. Upon such payment in full, as hereinbefore
provided, such assessment or assessments shall cease to be
a lien upon the property, and shall be deemed fully paid,
satisfied and discharged; and there shall be no further
interest or penalty by reason of such assessment or assess-
ments not having been paid within the time heretofore re-
quired by law, or by reason of any statute heretofore re-
quiring the payment of any penalty or interest over
the rate hereinbefore provided for upon any unpaid assess-
ment.

Sec. 4. No provision of this act hereinbefore contained
shall be construed as applicable to or affecting any assess-
ment for the collection of which assessment the property
has been sold.

Sec. 5. This act shall take effect immediately.

ARREARS OF TAXES.

NOTICE TO TAXPAYERS.

THE COMPTROLLER OF THE CITY OF NEW
York hereby gives notice to owners of Real Estate in
said city, that, as provided by chapter 123 of the Laws of
1880, they may now pay any arrears of taxes and Croton
water rents levied prior to the year 1877, with interest
thereon at the rate of seven per cent. per annum. If how-
ever, such taxes and Croton water rents are not paid be-
fore the first day of October next, the property on which
they are due will be sold for taxes immediately thereafter,
with the addition of accrued interest thereon at the rate
of 12 per cent. per annum from the respective dates on
which they were levied.

Lists for such sale are now being prepared by the
Clerk of Arrears.

The time of payment of taxes for the years 1877, 1878,
and 1879, with interest thereon at the rate of seven per
cent. per annum, is extended to the first day of April, 1881,
and if not paid before that date, interest will be payable at
the rate of twelve per cent. per annum.

CHAPTER 123.

AN ACT in relation to arrears of taxes in the City of New
York, and to provide for the reissuing of revenue
bonds in anticipation of such taxes.

Passed April 15, 1880; three-fifths being present.
The People of the State of New York, represented in
Senate and Assembly, do enact as follows:

Section 1. At any time after the passage of this act, and
before the first day of October, eighteen hundred and
eighty, any person may pay to the Comptroller of the
City of New York the amount of any tax upon real prop-
erty belonging to such person, heretofore laid or imposed
and now remaining unpaid, together with interest thereon
at the rate of seven per centum per annum, to be calculated
from the time that such tax was imposed to the time of such
payment, provided, also, that the time when such payment
may be made on the amount of any such tax laid or imposed
in the years eighteen hundred and seventy-seven, eighteen
hundred and seventy-eight, and eighteen hundred
and seventy-nine shall extend to the first day of April,
eighteen hundred and eighty-one. The comptroller shall
make and deliver to the person making any such payment
a receipt therefor, and shall forthwith cancel the record
of any such tax on the books of the finance department; and
upon such payment being made such tax shall cease to be
a lien upon the property and shall be deemed fully
paid, satisfied and discharged, and there shall be no right
to any further interest or penalty by reason of such tax
not having been paid within the time heretofore required
by law, or by reason of any statute passed requiring the
payment heretofore of any penalty or interest over seven
per centum per annum upon any unpaid tax.

Sec. 2. Any revenue bond heretofore issued in anticipa-
tion of the taxes in the first section specified which may
fall due and become payable before said taxes are collect-
ed, may be reissued by the comptroller of said city, in
whole or in part, for such period as he may determine,
not exceeding one year.

Sec. 3. This act shall take effect immediately.
