

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COMMISSIONERS OF ACCOUNTS.

OFFICE OF THE COMMISSIONERS OF ACCOUNTS, | NEW YORK, December 10, 1885.

Hon. WILLIAM R. GRACE, Mayor :

SIR—In accordance with your instructions we have made an examination covering the years 1882, 1883, 1884, and part of 1885, of the methods of conducting that part of the business of the Sheriff's Office for which an appropriation is annually made by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment. In connection therewith, we respectfully submit a series of tables, marked A, B, C and D, and call your attention to the several particulars therein mentioned.

The total amount asked for by the Sheriff for 1886 is \$77,800. One of the principal items of that sum is for conveying prisoners from the City Prison to the different courts, and after conviction to the Penitentiary and the House of Refuge. The Sheriff estimates that 12,082 persons will be carried as above in 1886. For this service he asks that a dollar and seventy-five cents per capita be appropriated. Allowance has been made at that rate heretofore by the Board of Aldermen in their capacity of Board of Supervisors of the County. Their power to regulate, establish or provide compensation for the Sheriff ceased on the 14th of May, 1884, except as to the Sheriff then in office, and chapter 297, Laws of 1884, vested in the Board of Estimate and Apportionment thereafter the power to provide such sums or fix such rates of payment to the Sheriff for all objects of expenditure connected with his office, which are by law made a charge upon the City or County, as said Board may deem necessary and sufficient. We have estimated the cost to the Sheriff at present, for conveying prisoners as above stated, at 61 cents per capita. He employs one van with two deputies, and two other deputies to take charge of prisoners committed to the Penitentiary and House of Refuge.

This force, in our opinion, is insufficient to perform the work properly. One van is not capable of carrying, with any degree of decency or comfort, the number of prisoners that the service requires. The van is built to hold twelve persons, but often fifteen or sixteen are crowded into it. Whenever it is found that one van cannot by any possibility convey all the prisoners needed in a day, a van is borrowed from the Commissioners of Charities and Correction, a practice which we think should be discontinued. Sufficient safeguards are not provided by the Sheriff. Two men on a van, and one of those with his attention fixed on driving the horses, do not constitute a sufficient guard even in an orderly and law-abiding part of the City. The Sheriff, however, generally prevails on some court officer or policeman to sit with the driver of the van on its trips to and from the prison, which does not seem to us to be a proper performance of duty. The Sheriff should provide suitable guards at his own expense to perform the work for which he is paid. In conveying prisoners to the Penitentiary and House of Refuge, instead of being taken in the van, they are conveyed to Twenty-sixth street and East river in public conveyances, a mode neither safe nor proper in other respects. The payment of this fee for conveying prisoners carries with it the supposition that the Sheriff does actually, by deputy, convey the prisoners. Such, however, is not always the case. It is of daily occurrence that court officers are sent to the prison to escort prisoners to court. When the District Attorney requires prisoners to be produced for trial, he gives a list of them to the Sheriff, who, on presentation thereof at the jail, receives the persons named. They are conveyed in the van. If the District Attorney finds that he can try one or two more besides those originally sent for, he adds the names, and a court officer is sent to the prison to fetch them. It is from this list that the Sheriff makes up his bill for conveying prisoners, and that list

The Sheriff's fee for conveying prisoners is a conspicuously liberal one, whilst the work performed is quite as conspicuously cheap and disgraceful. To do the work properly the Sheriff should have two vans, and there should be three deputies on each van. Even with the increased expenditure which that would involve, one dollar and a quarter per capita would, in our opinion, be a sufficient compensation to the Sheriff. We estimate that the actual cost of the work properly done would be about one dollar and three cents per capita.

For making returns to the Secretary of State of the convictions in the different courts in New York County, the Sheriff asks that he be allowed for 50,653 convictions at the rate of 50 cents each. The law under which the Sheriff makes the returns (R. S. III., 1035 and 1036, 6 ed.), requires him to report the sex, age, nativity, social condition, degree of instruction, degree of religious instruction, whether parents living or dead, whether before convicted of any crime, and whether temperate or intemperate. The statute prescribes that the information shall be obtained from the court records by making inquiries of the persons themselves before and after trial, by inquiring of the keepers of prisons where such are confined, and of all other persons who can furnish information. The Sheriff has heretofore been allowed 50 cents per capita for each conviction reported to the Secretary of State, and for that fee it was reasonably to be expected that he would faithfully report all the details called for by the statutes. Such, however, is not the case. In the blank form of report sent to the Secretary of State, the headings required by law are printed, but the information given by the Sheriff in regard to the convict's occupation, degree of instruction, religion, social condition, whether parents are living or dead, former offenses, temperate or intemperate, is rather a matter of fancy than of fact. It is hardly necessary to say that the returns, so far as they relate to the statistical information above mentioned, are practically worthless. These statistics cost the City about \$25,000 per annum. As a matter of fact, the force employed by the Sheriff on such statistical work is insufficient. He has two men to "collect" the statistics, when in

our opinion it would require at least four to do the work as it ought to be done. The present rate of compensation, as we have said, is 50 cents per capita. We believe that 25 cents per capita is a sufficient allowance to enable the Sheriff to do the work properly. We estimate that the present cost to the Sheriff is about 14 cents per capita, and that it would cost 18 cents per capita if it were efficiently done. The Board of Police Justices makes a report of ninety-nine per cent. of the same cases (Oyer and Terminer and General Sessions convictions being small in number), so that the Sheriff's return is of little value at best. A repeal of the law, which is mandatory upon the Sheriff to make such return, is respectfully recommended. The saving to the City thereby would be \$25,000 per annum.

In connection with this matter of reporting convictions, a question presents itself which perhaps it would be well to submit to the Counsel to the Corporation, and we recommend that it be so submitted. It is this: Large numbers of vagrants are committed to the Commissioners of Charities and Correction, on their own confession of vagrancy. As we understand it, the Police Justices do not commit them; their names are simply entered on the court record, and they are sent to the Commissioners of Charities and Correction, who commit them for a longer or shorter term, as they see fit. The law on the subject is as follows, section 412, Consolidation Act 1882: It shall be lawful for the Board of Public Charities and Correction to commit to any of the institutions under their charge other than penal, for a period not exceeding six months, any person or persons committed to their charge by any police magistrate of the City of New York, and such vagrants as ask for commitment." The question is, Does that commitment constitute a "conviction" in the sense that it entitles the Sheriff to a fee for reporting it to the Secretary of State?

In the matter of serving jury notices, a most unsatisfactory condition of affairs exists. The law prescribes that a majority of a panel of jurors drawn must be served personally or the Sheriffi is not entitled to any compensation for serving that panel. The Sheriff, we understand, employs four men at a salary of \$800 a year to serve these notices. Another clerk in the office makes out the notices and marks the return on the panel according to the report of the server as to whether the notice was served personally on the juror or left at his residence or place of business. Two thousand notices a month are served, on an average, and the service naturally requires the employment of intelligent, honest and active men. The proof of service is simply the word of the server. The Commissioner of Jurors is understood to have said that in a number of returns made of jurors as "personally served," he found that the persons alleged to have been served had been dead one and two years. Messrs, Boese and Jarvis, Clerks of the Superior and Common Pleas Courts, have filed a formal complaint in accordance with law as to the imperfect service of jurors in their respective courts.

There are hundreds of panels where less than sixty per cent. are shown as personally served. This trouble could be avoided if the Sherift would employ capable men and pay them fair salaries. If to secure a personal service it is necessary to make repeated attempts to find a juror, it is better to pay twenty cents for that service than to pay ten cents for leaving the notice at the house, which does not, of course, constitute a personal service and on which the person summoned is not responsible or liable to a fine for non-attendance. Another view of the matter is that the server should be paid such a reasonable compensation that he would not, from sheer poverty of pay, be tempted for a consideration to return a juror "not found," or "written service," when he had in fact served the notice personally. If the work be efficiently done and eighty-five or ninety per cent. of the notices personally served, a saving of expense would undoubtedly be effected.

It would probably require a force of four men to perform the work, and one to supervise them and make the necessary entries. Thirty-five cents per capita would, in our opinion, be a fair allowance to the Sheriff for this service.

For the execution of criminals the Sheriff asks that \$3,335 be appropriated for 1886. There were no executions in 1884 or 1885. In 1883 there were three, at a cost to the county of about \$1,100 each. We have estimated the cost to the Sheriff to be about \$655 for each execution, and he ought probably to get \$800 each. It is likely that there will be about six executions in 1886.

For the support of prisoners in the county jail the Sheriff asks \$15,000 for 1886. This includes the wages of cooks and cleaners, also a sum for supplies for the jail. The Sheriff's estimate calls for a per capita allowance of seventy-five cents a day. We have no figures as to the actual cost of board, etc., but seventy-five cents a day is probably as low as suitable food can be supplied, with even a small profit to the Sheriff. The wages paid to cooks and cleaners heretofore has aggregated \$2,052 per year; and supplies, such as coal, furniture, bedding, etc., have aggregated as much more. An estimate, based on the number of prisoners supported in 1885, makes it appear that there will probably be 1,100 prisoners an average of 12½ days in the jail next year. At the rate of seventy-five cents per day that would amount to \$10,002. The appropriation for 1885 was \$12,000, and there is a deficiency to date of nearly \$1,000. The salaries of Physician, Engineer and Assistant Engineer are to be added to the above amount.

For conveying prisoners to insane asylums the Sheriff asks an appropriation of \$1,000. The fee heretofore paid has been twenty cents per mile for transportation and \$1 a day for maintenance. As but nine prisoners were so transported in 1884, at a total cost of \$184.40, we think the Sheriff's estimate of \$1,000 rather too large. Four hundred dollars would probably be enough. Five were transported in 1882, at a total cost of \$246.85; and fourteen were transported in 1883 at a total cost of \$469.15; so that \$400 would be a fair average, allowing for natural increase.

For summoning Grand Jurors the Sheriff asks an appropriation of \$120. That is on a basis of twelve Grand Juries in 1886. The fee is \$10 each, which is fixed by Revised Statutes, p. 1053 of vol. III., 6th edition.

For attendance at drawing of Petit Juries the Sheriff asks \$300, on a basis of 300 juries in 1886, at \$1 each. There were but 214 in 1882; 182 in 1883, and 196 in 1884. So that, even allowing for the natural increase, \$300 is somewhat excessive. We think an estimate of 250 juries in 1886 will be enough. The service is authorized by section 1672, Consolidation Act 1882.

For serving notices of election on Supervisors the Sheriff asks \$25 for 1886. The law under which the Sheriff claims that this appropriation should be made is as follows: Section 1931, Con solidation Act of 1882, "The Sheriff or County Clerk of New York who shall receive a notice of an election, shall, without delay, deliver a copy of such notice to the Board of Aldermen, and each Alderman of said city * * * * ." No appropriation has ever been made for this purpose heretofore.

In making these estimates attention has been given to the fact that the Sheriff receives no salary for the performance of the duties imposed on him by law; and in view of the responsibilities of the office, the difference between the estimated cost and the amount recommended as a fair fee would seem to us to afford but an equitable compensation for the services for which the Board of Estimate and Apportionment are called upon to provide. The amount to be appropriated for 1886, as herein recommended, is \$50,000.
