

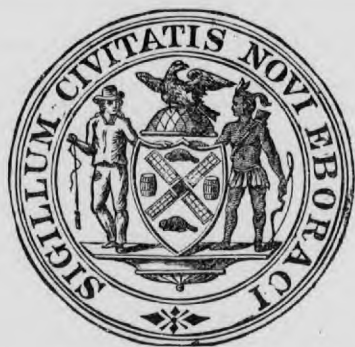

To the Board of Estimate and Apportionment:

The Board of Education, at the meeting of July 1, 1891, adopted a resolution requesting this Board to issue additional bonds to provide the funds necessary to meet the expenditure of one hundred and sixteen thousand two hundred and seven dollars (\$116,207) for the purpose of carrying out the provisions of a contract about to be entered into between the School Trustees of the Nineteenth Ward and P. Gallagher, for erecting a school building on the site on the northwest corner of Fifty-first street and First avenue, being one hundred feet on the street and ninety-five feet five inches on the avenue.

The Engineer of the Finance Department has examined the plans and specifications for this work, and reports that they have been carefully prepared; that bids were called for in the usual manner, and that seven were received, P. Gallagher's being the lowest at the price mentioned in the said resolution.

I offer the following preamble and resolutions for such action as this Board may deem advisable.

Resolved, That in accordance with the provisions of chapter 252 of the Laws of 1889, the Comptroller of the City of New York be and he hereby is requested to issue additional bonds for the purpose of providing the funds necessary to meet the expenditure of one hundred and sixteen thousand two hundred and seven dollars (\$116,207) for erecting a school building on the site on northwest corner of Fifty-first street and First avenue, and that the Board of Estimate and Apportionment be and it hereby is requested to approve of the same and the purposes for which such expenditure is to be made, and that said Board designate and appropriate this amount for such purpose; that the award of the contract by the Trustees for the Nineteenth Ward to P. Gallagher for the sum named is hereby approved, and the amount appropriated, and requisition therefor is hereby made upon the Comptroller; but no part of said money to be paid until the School Trustees for the Nineteenth Ward shall have duly filed the contract to be entered into by them with the contractor named, together with such security for the faithful performance of the work as shall be satisfactory to the Finance Committee; the rules of this Board as to the form of the contract and the payments to be made on account thereof to be complied with.

Hon. THEODORE W. MYERS, Comptroller:

SIR—The Board of Education, by resolution adopted July 1, 1891, requests the approval of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment of an appropriation of \$116,207 for the purpose of erecting a school building at the northwest corner of Fifty-first street and First avenue.

Proposals for this work were invited by advertisement, in the usual manner, and carefully prepared plans and specifications, and seven bids were received, the lowest being that of P. Gallagher, for \$116,207 to whom the award was made.

I see no reason why the appropriation should not be approved.

Whereas, The Board of Education adopted a resolution on July 1, 1891, requesting the issue of additional bonds for one hundred and sixteen thousand two hundred and seven dollars (\$116,207) for the purpose of providing the funds necessary for work to be done in connection with a contract to be entered into between the School Trustees of the Nineteenth Ward and P. Gallagher for the erection of a school building on the site on northwest corner of Fifty-first street and First avenue, subject to the approval of this Board; and

Whereas, The Engineer of the Finance Department reports the plans and specifications of the above work as being carefully prepared and recommends that the appropriation be made; therefore,

Resolved, That, this Board hereby approves of the action of the Board of Education in the above matter; and

Resolved, That, pursuant to the provisions of chapter 252 of the Laws of 1889, the Comptroller be and he is hereby authorized and directed to issue additional School-house Bonds in the name of the Mayor, Aldermen and Commonalty of the City of New York, to be known as Consolidated Stock of the City of New York, as provided by section 132 of the New York City Consolidation Act of 1882, to the amount of one hundred and sixteen thousand two hundred and seven dollars

(\$116,207), to run for such period as the Comptroller shall determine, not longer than twenty years from the date of issue, and at a rate of interest not exceeding three per cent. per annum, the proceeds of which bonds are to be applied to the purpose mentioned in said resolution; and

Resolved, That the said stock is hereby exempted from taxation by the City and County of New York, pursuant to an ordinance of the Common Council approved by the Mayor October 2, 1880, and the provisions of section 137 of the New York City Consolidation Act of 1882.

To the Board of Estimate and Apportionment:

The Board of Education, at the meeting of July 1, 1891, adopted a resolution requesting the issue of further additional bonds for the sum of sixteen thousand dollars (\$16,000) for the purchase as a site for school purposes of the parcel of land adjoining the site of Grammar School No. 14, in the Twenty-first Ward, on the southerly side of Twenty-eighth street, between Second and Third avenues. The lot is twenty-five feet front and rear and ninety-eight and nine-tenths feet deep.

The Engineer of the Finance Department reports that the acquisition of this property by the City is of great importance in view of its location to the site of Grammar School No. 14, and that the necessity of ownership would justify the price asked, although his estimate is fifteen thousand dollars.

I offer the following preamble and resolution for such action as this Board may deem advisable.

Resolved, That, subject to the approval of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, the sum of sixteen thousand dollars (\$16,000) be and is hereby appropriated from the proceeds of further additional bonds to be issued under and in pursuance of the provisions of the act, chapter 252 of the Laws of 1889, for the purchase, as a site for school purposes, of all that certain piece or parcel of land and premises situate, lying and being in the Twenty-first Ward of the City of New York, adjoining the site of Grammar School Number Fourteen, bounded and described as follows:

Beginning at a point on the southerly side of Twenty-eighth street distant about one hundred and seventy-five feet westerly from the corner formed by the intersection of the westerly side of Second avenue with the southerly side of Twenty-eighth street, and running thence westerly, along the southerly side of Twenty-eighth street, about twenty-five feet; thence southerly, parallel with Second avenue, about ninety-eight feet nine inches, to the centre line of the block between Twenty-seventh and Twenty-eighth streets; thence easterly, along said centre line, about twenty-five feet; thence northerly, parallel with Second avenue, about ninety-eight feet nine inches to the point or place of beginning, said premises being known by the street number 234 East Twenty-eighth street; that the Comptroller of the City of New York be and he is hereby requested to issue such further additional bonds, for the purpose of providing the funds to meet the expenditure necessary for the purchase of said site; and that the Board of Estimate and Apportionment be and is hereby requested to approve of the same and of the purpose for which such expenditure is to be made, and to designate and appropriate the amount necessary to be expended for such purpose, and that when so designated and appropriated the same be paid by said Comptroller out of the proceeds of said bonds when issued, requisition therefor being hereby made, for the said piece or parcel of land and premises above mentioned, upon the presentation to him of the deed or deeds for the same, together with the certificate of the Counsel to the Corporation that the title thereto is satisfactory and free from all incumbrances, and is vested in the Mayor, Aldermen and Commonalty of the City of New York.

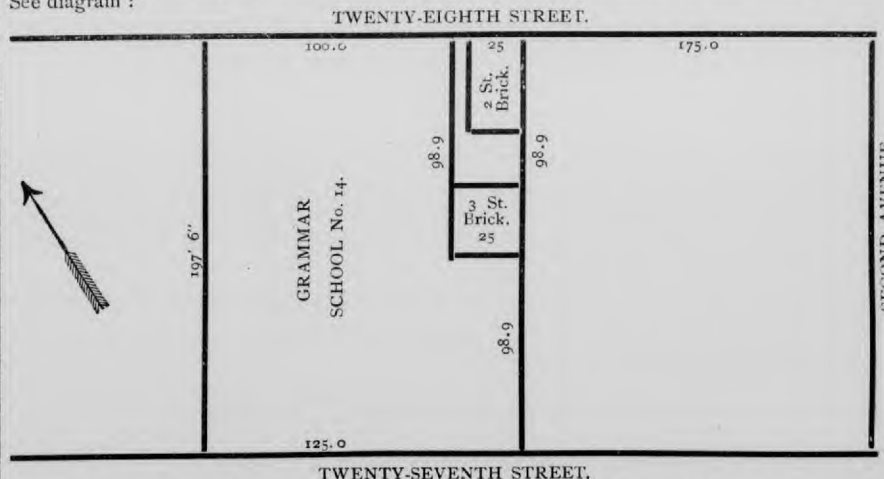

Hon. THEO. W. MYERS, Comptroller:

SIR—The Board of Education, by resolution adopted July 1, 1891, requests the approval of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment of an appropriation of \$16,000 for the purchase of a lot on the south side of Twenty-eighth street, lying east of and adjoining the site of Grammar School No. 14. See diagram:



The position of this lot relative to the Grammar School renders its acquisition of great importance for the purposes of light and air. Should a high building of any kind be erected on the property it would be a serious detriment to the school.

I estimate the value at \$15,000, at which price it was sold in April last, but the necessity of ownership would justify the price fixed. To take it by condemnation proceedings would cost much more.

Whereas, The Board of Education adopted a resolution on July 1, 1891, requesting the issue of further additional bonds, from the proceeds of which sixteen thousand dollars (\$16,000) be appropriated for the purchase, as a site for school purposes, of all that certain piece or parcel of land and premises situate, lying and being in the Twenty-first Ward of the City of New York, adjoining the site of Grammar School Number Fourteen, bounded and described as follows: Beginning at a point on the southerly side of Twenty-eighth street distant about one hundred and seventy-five feet westerly from the corner formed by the intersection of the westerly side of Second avenue with the southerly side of Twenty-eighth street, and running thence westerly along the southerly side of Twenty-eighth street about twenty-five feet; thence southerly, parallel with Second avenue, about ninety-eight feet nine inches to the centre line of the block between Twenty-seventh and Twenty-eighth streets; thence easterly, along said centre line, about twenty-five feet; thence northerly, parallel with Second avenue, about ninety-eight feet nine inches, to the point or place of beginning, said premises being known by the street number 234 East Twenty-eighth street; and

Whereas, The Engineer of the Finance Department advises the acquisition of the said parcel at the price named; therefore

Resolved, That this Board hereby approves of the action of the Board of Education in the above matter; and

Resolved, That, pursuant to the provisions of chapter 252 of the Laws of 1889, the Comptroller be and he is hereby authorized and directed to issue additional School-house Bonds in the name of the Mayor, Aldermen and Commonalty of the City of New York, to be known as Consoli-

dated Stock of the City of New York, as provided by section 132 of the New York City Consolidation Act of 1882, to the amount of sixteen thousand dollars (\$16,000), to run for such period as the Comptroller shall determine, not longer than twenty years from the date of issue, and at a rate of interest not exceeding three per cent. per annum, the proceeds of which bonds are to be applied to the purpose mentioned in said resolution; and

Resolved, That the said stock is hereby exempted from taxation by the City and County of New York, pursuant to an ordinance of the Common Council, approved by the Mayor October 2, 1880, and the provisions of section 137 of the New York City Consolidation Act of 1882.

Hon. HUGH J. GRANT, Chairman, Board of Estimate and Apportionment:

DEAR SIR—The demands upon the appropriation for "Removing Obstructions in Streets and Avenues," especially for the removal of electric wires and carrying poles, in obedience to requisitions or orders from the Board of Electrical Control, have been so great that, with the exception of a small amount reserved for the ordinary business of removing street obstructions for the remainder of the year, the appropriation is now exhausted, and no further removals of poles and wires can be made unless provision is made by transfer from other appropriations. Requisitions or orders from the Board of Electrical Control are now at hand the execution of which will involve an expense of at least \$5,000, and other orders will be received before the close of the year.

I, therefore, respectfully ask that the following transfers be made to the appropriation for "Removing Obstructions in Streets and Avenues" for 1891, from unexpended balances of appropriations for 1890, from which the respective amounts can be spared, as follows:

From "Aqueduct—Repairs, Maintenance and Strengthening—Building new Gate-house and removing the old" for 1890.....	\$8,716 50

To the Honorable the Board of Estimate and Apportionment:

GENTLEMEN—By resolution of your Honorable Board, adopted January 14, 1891, the sum of \$450 was transferred to the appropriation for 1891, entitled "Incidental Expenses of the Sheriff's Office and County Jail, etc.," to reimburse me for cash advanced to purchase 1,000 tickets for railroad fares of convicts conveyed to the State Prison; said expense of conveying prisoners to the State Prison being paid eventually by the State and returned into the City Treasury. For the six months, January to June, inclusive, I received from the State, "Account Transporting Prisoners," and have paid into the City Treasury the sum of \$2,300.32.

On July 15 I purchased an additional lot of 1,000 railroad tickets, and now respectfully request that the sum of \$450 be transferred by your Honorable Board from the appropriation "Support of Indigent Prisoners in County Jail, at seventy cents per day per capita," which is more than sufficient to meet the charges made and to be made against the same, to the appropriation entitled "Incidental Expenses of the Sheriff's Office and County Jail, etc.," which is insufficient for the purposes thereof, to reimburse me for said expenditure.

Whereas, The Sheriff, John J. Gorman, has purchased at a large reduction or commutation price, one thousand tickets for railroad fare of convicts conveyed to the State Prison, and paid for them out of his own pocket in advance; and

Whereas, Said expense of conveying prisoners to State Prison is paid eventually by the State to the Sheriff, who returns it to the City Treasury;

Resolved, That the sum of four hundred and fifty dollars (\$450) be and is hereby transferred from the appropriation made to the Sheriff's Office for the year 1891, entitled "Support of Indigent Prisoners in County Jail at seventy cents per day per capita," which is in excess of the amount required for the purposes thereof, to the appropriation entitled "Incidental Expenses of the Sheriff's Office and the County Jail, etc.," for 1891, which is insufficient for the purposes thereof, the amount to be paid to John J. Gorman, Sheriff of the City and County of New York, to reimburse him for advance of cash to purchase one thousand railroad tickets for conveying convicts to the State Prison.

Which were adopted by the following vote:

Affirmative—The Mayor, Comptroller, President of the Board of Aldermen and President of the Department of Taxes and Assessments—4.

The Comptroller called up and offered the following resolution, laid over at a meeting held July 1, 1891:

Resolved, That the sum of twenty-seven hundred dollars (\$2,700) be and the same is hereby transferred from the appropriation made to the Excise Department for 1891, under a resolution of this Board adopted June 19, 1891, entitled:

"For salaries of Inspectors, Doorkeeper, Steamboat Roundsman and Cleaner, legal expenses, etc.".....	\$1,800 00

The Comptroller presented the following:

CITY OF NEW YORK—HARLEM RIVER BRIDGE COMMISSION,
WASHINGTON BUILDING, NO. 1 BROADWAY,
June 23, 1891.

The Hon. THEODORE W. MYERS, Comptroller of the City of New York:

SIR—Referring to our conversation of this morning relative to the turning over of the Washington Bridge to the Department of Public Parks, I beg leave to say to you that the Harlem River Bridge Commissioners are now, and always since the completion of the Bridge have been, willing and anxious to turn the same over to the custody of the Park Department.

Early in the spring of 1889, when the bridge was practically completed, preparation was made to turn it over to the Park Department and to formally open it to the public. These preparations were brought to a stand-still by a communication from the Counsel to the Corporation under date of March 23, 1889, addressed to the Harlem Bridge Commissioners, wherein the City's legal adviser, after reciting the fact that he had been led to make an examination of the law in reference to the bridge by a request for an opinion from the Superintendent of Lamps and Gas as to the lighting of the new bridge, and reciting the provisions of law applicable to the case, advises the Commission that its jurisdiction is not to cease, and that of the Department of Public Parks is not to attach, until the Commission shall have fully completed the bridge, as well as the parks and highways provided for in the Act of 1888. He further stated that no provision of law existed for the general use of the bridge by the public. I do not send you the original communication from the Corporation Counsel, as you stated that you should refer this communication to that gentleman, who will find a copy of his letter on file in his own office.

Upon receipt of the letter of March 23, 1889, from the Corporation Counsel preparations for the formal opening of the bridge were suspended. I may state that the legal advisers of the Commission, Messrs. Carter and Ledyard, were also of the opinion that no legal authority existed to whom the bridge might be transferred before the completion of the work provided for in the Act of 1888.

The Commission proceeded to carry into effect the Act of 1888. Before that could be done the Legislature again intervened, without the knowledge of the Commission, and passed the act known as chapter 249 of the Laws of 1890, introduced by Senator Ives. This act required the Commission to take proceedings to acquire a largely increased area between Tenth avenue and the Harlem river, the present High Bridge Park and a line one hundred and fifty feet north of the Washington Bridge. The Commission are now endeavoring to comply with the extremely mandatory provisions of the latter act.

I do not hesitate to say that none of this legislation was sought by the Bridge Commissioners, although they consider the purposes of this legislation to be in the main desirable, and especially those embraced in the Act of 1888, for the protection of the bridge.

The Bridge Commissioners being thus advised, could not declare the bridge open to public use. Yet they have not interfered to prevent the use of the structure and the public have been in the actual use of it. The public property thus left in the custody of the Commission has been watched and cared for, and the item of \$3,000 embraced in the requisition now before you is to pay for such care.

That the question may now be plainly presented to the legal adviser of the City, the Commissioners now formally offer to turn over the bridge to the Department of Public Parks of the City of New York upon being advised that the law will permit such transfer and that no liability will be incurred by the Commissioners in so doing.

Personally the Commissioners will regard such transfer as a relief. They do not ask for express sanction, but only for permission.

In the event that the Corporation Counsel decides that such transfer cannot be made, the Commission desire that the question of their power to have the public property thus left upon their hands properly cared for and protected from injury or deterioration may be passed upon.

Such protection cannot be had without expense. They do not wish to incur expense without the assurance of funds to meet it. You are therefore respectfully urged to obtain such an opinion in the premises as the Corporation Counsel may deem proper, to the end that this Commission may be clearly justified in ceasing to care for the bridge, if no funds be provided.

CITY OF NEW YORK—HARLEM RIVER BRIDGE COMMISSION,
WASHINGTON BUILDING, NO. 1 BROADWAY,

To the Board of Estimate and Apportionment of the City of New York:

GENTLEMEN—On the 17th day of September, 1890, the Board of Estimate and Apportionment granted the balance of the requisition presented on the 24th of June, 1890, by the Harlem River Bridge Commissioners, which said balance amounted to the sum of \$91,948. A memorandum of the items composing said amount of \$91,948 was furnished to the Hon. Theodore W. Myers, Comptroller of the City of New York, and was by him laid before your Board, and according to the resolution adopted by your Board such memorandum was the basis for your action.

The Comptroller holds that in the payment of vouchers he must regard the different items embraced in said memorandum. In that memorandum the sum of \$15,000 was included for Engineer's supervising, contract and other works, including Mr. Bogart, Consulting Engineer; also Clerks and Inspectors on work. A further item of \$4,000 was allowed for maintenance of the bridge. These two items, aggregating \$19,000, were to have provided for all the pay-rolls of the Commission and engineering services to date, covering a period of twelve months, the expectation being that the duties of the Commission would be terminated within that time. As you are aware the duties of the Commission have not yet been completed, and in view of the delay in signing contracts to complete the work, owing to the unwillingness of the Comptroller to approve the sureties offered on the proposed contracts until your Honorable Body should have acted on the requisition now before you, it is very apparent that the duties of the Commission cannot terminate before the 1st of January.

Furthermore, property-holders interested in the High Bridge Park lands have brought proceedings against this Commission and the Corporation Counsel to compel them to proceed and acquire the said High Bridge Park lands under the provisions of chapter 249 of the Laws of 1890.

Under the circumstances enumerated this Commission cannot hope to go out of office inside of several months; at any rate not until the Legislature convenes can relief be had.

The Commission are in receipt of a notice from the Comptroller that a balance of only \$786 is available for payment of the August pay-roll of this Commission, and that no funds can be used to make further payments without fresh requisition being acted upon favorably by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment.

The items of \$2,400 for office rent and expenses, and of \$900 for printing, etc., are also exhausted.

Requisition is therefore hereby made upon your Honorable Body for the sum of six thousand dollars, and a memorandum of the purposes for which said funds are required is inclosed.

Whereas, The Aqueduct Commissioners desire to extend the leases of Rooms Nos. 206, 207, 209, 211, 213, 214, 215, 216 and 217 in the Stewart Building, now occupied as offices of the Aqueduct Commission, for the term of one year from May 1, 1891, at a yearly rental of ten thousand two hundred dollars (\$10,200), and the owner, Henry Hilton, has agreed to such extension;

Resolved, That, in pursuance of section 41 of chapter 490, Laws of 1883, the Board of Estimate and Apportionment hereby approves of the releasing or extension of the leases of said rooms for the further term of one year from May 1, 1891, at the yearly rent of ten thousand two hundred dollars (\$10,200).

Which were adopted by the following vote:

Affirmative—The Mayor, Comptroller, President of the Board of Aldermen and President of the Department of Taxes and Assessments—4.

The Comptroller stated that, in consequence of the insufficiency of the appropriation for "Disbursement and Fees of County Officers and Witnesses," made in the Final Estimate for 1891, to meet the payment of bills for transcripts of stenographic notes of cases in the various Courts as ordered by the Justices of said Courts, and approved by the District Attorney, it would be necessary to make provision therefor.

On motion, the matter was referred to the President of the Board of Aldermen to examine into and report.

The Comptroller moved that when this Board adjourns, it do so to meet on Friday, September 11, 1891, at 10.30 o'clock A. M.

Which was agreed to.

"Resolved, That in pursuance of a communication dated August 5, 1891, from the Harlem River Bridge Commission in reference to Washington Bridge, and the opinion of the Counsel to the Corporation, it is ordered that, on behalf of the Mayor, Aldermen and Commonalty of the City of New York, the Department of Public Parks hereby accepts the said bridge and its approaches, as authorized under the Act of 1885, and requests that all maps and records and plans connected therewith be filed with the Department of Parks."

“ And further provided, that such transfer does not charge the Department of Public Parks with any existing unfinished contracts.”

A. Gallup, President of the Department of Public Parks, appeared and presented the following :

CITY OF NEW YORK—DEPARTMENT OF PUBLIC PARKS,
COMMISSIONER'S OFFICE, NOS. 49 AND 51 CHAMBERS STREET,
September 10, 1891.

To the Chairman of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment :

SIR—This Department has, on the 9th day of September, passed a resolution concerning the Washington Bridge, which has been communicated to your Board. The Commissioners also expressed the opinion that it would not be wise to take control of the Washington Bridge until the 1st of October.

The President of the Department of Taxes intimated to this Department at their meeting yesterday that the Board of Estimate and Apportionment would require this Department to maintain the said bridge out of the funds heretofore appropriated for the Department. An inspection of the balances on hand of the various accounts shows that the appropriation for telephonic service is the only account where a balance exists. This arises from the fact that the telephone lines furnished to this Department have not been entirely repaired since the storm which destroyed them during last January. A letter received to-day from the Metropolitan Telephone and Telegraph Company contains the consent of that company to a reduction of about \$1,200 in the charge for telephonic service from January 25 to September 1. This Department therefore respectfully requests that the Board of Estimate and Apportionment will transfer from the account entitled “ Telephonic Service—For Maintaining Telephonic Service for the Department,” for which \$4,000 was appropriated, the sum of \$800, and add same to the account entitled “ Harlem River Bridges—General Maintenance,” for which the sum of \$22,000 was appropriated. Since the appropriations were made at the first of the year six bridge-tenders were discharged, in order to keep the expenditures of the Department within the amount authorized by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment as compared with the amount allowed for the previous year, and the balance unexpended of this account at the beginning of the year 1892 will hardly exceed \$100. No account other than the telephonic service account will show a balance which can be conveniently applied to the maintenance of the Washington Bridge, as appears by the present condition of the accounts of this Department.

Debate was had thereon, when the subject and plan was referred back to the Park Department for further consideration.

The following communication was received :

DEPARTMENT OF STREET CLEANING—CITY OF NEW YORK,
STEWART BUILDING,
NEW YORK, August 11, 1891.

Hon. HUGH J. GRANT, President of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment :

DEAR SIR—I have the honor to respectfully request the transfer from the account of “ Plant, 1891,” to the account of “ Carting, 1891,” of \$100,000. Also from the account of “ Sweeping, 1891,” to the account of “ Carting, 1891,” of \$50,000.

These transfers are made necessary because of the total appropriation for the year being \$323,104.15 less than was asked for in the Departmental Estimate. The failure of the Board to give the amount requested rendered it impossible, as was stated at the time it would be, to do more than save from “ Plant ” and “ Sweeping ” enough to make these transfers to “ Carting,” the amount for which was cut down to \$400,000, when over \$546,000 was asked, and it was shown that the expenditures for that item in the year 1890 would be over \$525,000. They were, as matter of fact, \$528,768.63.

This is the condition in which this item of the appropriation was left through the action of two members of the Board of 1890, notwithstanding that the President of the Board voted for, and urged the other members of the Board to vote for, the entire amount asked.

The amount to the credit of “ Carting ” will be exhausted on or before the 20th instant.

The quantity of material carted during the first six months of this year was 100,800 in excess of the number carted during the same period in 1890, and 92,121 loads over the quantity estimated to be carted.

Inasmuch as the application of the Commissioner of Street Cleaning has been deferred presentation to this Board on account of the continual failure of the Commissioner to be present and explain in detail the necessity for such transfer, that the full consideration of this matter be deferred until the Commissioner appears before this Board and make such satisfactory explanation as may be required to warrant such transfer being made, and in the meantime, to provide for present wants, a transfer of not exceeding fifteen thousand dollars be made from the item of “ Sweeping ” to “ Carting,” 1891.

Whereupon the Comptroller offered the following :

Resolved, That the sum of fifteen thousand dollars be and is hereby transferred from the appropriation made to the Department of Street Cleaning for 1891, entitled “ Cleaning Streets—Sweeping,” which is in excess of the amount required for the purposes thereof, to the appropriation made to the same Department for 1891, entitled “ Cleaning Streets—Carting,” which is insufficient for the purposes thereof.

WILLARD BULLARD, Chief Sanitary Inspector:

SIR—I hereby report the following, as a result of an inspection in respect to the sanitary condition of that portion of Kingsbridge included between Macomb street on the south, Courtland Park on the north, Albany avenue on the east and Broadway on the west.

There are over sixty private houses located on this property, of which at least half is a salt marsh. Some of these houses are fitted with modern plumbing and discharge their waste-water into cesspools.

Others have the usual yard hydrant, and dispose of their waste-waters by allowing them to run into ditches and thence into the swamp. Owing to the fact that this ground being marshy, it is almost impossible to build stone cesspools or to prevent the wooden ones, which are used, from rotting and eventually allowing their contents to filter through the walls and saturate the soil.

As the number of houses already existing is increased by new ones, usually small two-story houses, this question of disposing of the sewage becomes more and more serious. The present condition of this locality is such as to be a menace to the public health, owing to these leaking cesspools, together with the fact that these families have no other possible way to dispose of their sewage. There are no sewers, public or private, in this locality, notwithstanding the fact that they are more necessary here than in any other portion of the Twenty-fourth Ward.

Upon consultation with the Engineer of the Department of Street Improvements of the Twenty-third and Twenty-fourth Wards, I find that the main sewer for this district will be located on Broadway. The City as yet, not having obtained title to any part of Broadway close to the river will leave the main sewer when constructed without an outlet.

I would therefore recommend that such action be taken by the Board of Street Opening and Improvement to acquire title to such lands as will provide this main sewer with an outlet.

TO OWNERS OF LANDS ORIGINALLY ACQUIRED BY WATER GRANTS.

ATTENTION IS CALLED TO THE RECENT act of the Legislature (chapter 449, Laws of 1889), which provides that whenever any streets or avenues in the city, described in any grant of land under water, from the Mayor, Aldermen and Commonalty containing covenants requiring the grantees and their successors to pave, repave, keep in repair or maintain such streets, shall be in need of repairs, pavement or repavement the Common Council may, by ordinance, require the same to be paved, repaved or repaired, and the expense thereof to be assessed on the property benefited; and whenever the owner of a lot so assessed shall have paid the assessment levied for such paving, repaving or repairing, such payment shall release and discharge such owner from any and every covenant and obligation as a paving, repaving and repairing, contained in the water grant under which the premises are held, and no further assessment shall be imposed on such lot for paving, repaving or repairing such street or avenue, unless it shall be petitioned for by a majority of the owners of the property (who shall also be the owners of a majority of the property in frontage) on the line of the proposed improvement.
