COMMUNICATIONS FROM THE DEPARTMENTS AND CORPORATION OFFICERS.

The President laid before the Board the following communication from the Commissioners of Accounts :

MAYOR'S OFFICE, NEW YORK, January 29, 1883.

To the Honorable the Board of Aldermen:

I transmit herewith the report of the Commissioners of Accounts, giving their examination of the Finance Department for the statutory year ending November 30, 1882, with accompanying tables. FRANKLIN EDSON, Mayor.

To the Honorable the Mayor and the Common Council of the City of New York:

The Commissioners of Accounts hereby certify and report that the accounts and vouchers of all moneys received into and paid out of the City Treasury during the statutory year ended November thirtieth, A. D. 1882, have been examined and found correct.

That the amount of moneys borrowed for or on the credit of the city during the said year

That all of said moneys were obtained from sales of bonds and stocks of the City and County of New York, and that none of said bonds and stocks were sold by the city for less than their par value.

That the amount of stocks and bonds paid and canceled during said year is \$26,825,924.04.

And that the warrants drawn by the Comptroller on the Treasury during the said year have been compared with the several laws and ordinances under which the same purport to have been drawn, and that we find that the Comptroller had power to draw such warrants.
