COMMUNICATIONS FROM THE DEPARTMENTS AND CORPORATION OFFICERS.

The President laid before the Board the following communication from the Commissioners of Accounts:

MAYOR'S OFFICE, NEW YORK, January 29, 1883.

To the Honorable the Board of Aldermen:

I transmit herewith the report of the Commissioners of Accounts, giving their examination of the Finance Department for the statutory year ending November 30, 1882, with accompanying tables.

NEW YORK, January 27, 1883.

To the Honorable the Mayor and the Common Council of the City of New York:

The Commissioners of Accounts hereby certify and report that the accounts and vouchers of all moneys received into and paid out of the City Treasury during the statutory year ended November thirtieth, A. D. 1882, have been examined and found correct.

That the amount of moneys received into the Treasury for and during the said year, as shown by said accounts and vouchers, is as follows, viz.:

Balance of cash brought forward from the preceding year \$11,614,286 54
Receipts from all sources during the year ended November 30, 1882 65,428,143 75

Total receipts \$77,042,430 29
That the amount of moneys paid out of the Treasury during said year is 69,783,522 53

That the balance of cash for which the Chamberlain was accountable on the thirtieth day of November, 1882, is \$7,258,907 76

And that said balance was at that date on deposit to the credit of the city in the undesignated duly designated depositories:

That the amount of moneys borrowed for or on the credit of the city during the said year is \$24,965,715.40.

That all of said moneys were obtained from sales of bonds and stocks of the City and County of New York, and that none of said bonds and stocks were sold by the city for less than their par value.

That the amount of stocks and bonds paid and canceled during said year is \$26,825,924.04.

And that the warrants drawn by the Comptroller on the Treasury during the said year have been compared with the several laws and ordinances under which the same purport to have been drawn, and that we find that the Comptroller had power to draw such warrants.

Resolved, That the subject of a revision of the drainage system of the Central Park be referred to Commissioner Viele to examine into and report upon.

Resolved, That detailed plans be prepared without delay for the improvement of Riverside Park, so that work may be commenced as soon as the season permits.

Resolved, That the small Boulevard parks at Sixty-fifth and Sixty-sixth streets be put in order as soon as possible.

Resolved, That all awnings, awning-posts and booths, as well as all other objectionable erections and projections, be removed within thirty days from the main entrance to the Central Park, at Fifty-ninth street, and facing the same, and that no sign or advertisements be displayed within the same distance at that point and fronting the park, without the express permission of the Department, on a written request, stating the facts in the case, and that the Captain of the Park Police be directed to enforce this order.

Resolved, That the Chairman be and he is hereby authorized to execute for and on behalf of this Department the contracts for works in the annexed district, awarded on 15th and 22d November last.

Resolved, That the Secretary be authorized to arrange for the supplying of this Department with complete files of bills of the Senate and Assembly during the present session of the Legislature, at an expense not exceeding \$50.

Resolved, That the Chairman be authorized to renew the telephonic service of the Department for the year 1883, including the annexed district.

Resolved, That the Acting Engineer of Construction is hereby directed to prepare and submit to the Board plans and specifications for the construction of a continuation of the Mill Brook sewer through Webster Avenue, as lately opened.

Resolved, That the Chairman be authorized to sign and transmit to the Mayor the report of the Department for the quarter ending with December 31, 1882.

Resolved, That the Chairman be authorized to enter into a license with George W. Eggers for carriage service in the Central Park for a term of three years, he agreeing to pay a license fee of \$250 per annum, and subject to such rules and regulations as the Department may from time to time adopt.

Resolved, That the appointment of William Cashman, police tailor, is hereby ratified and confirmed.

Resolved, That Bernard R. Connelly be and he is hereby appointed gatekeeper on the force of the Department.

Resolved, That John W. Willson be and he is hereby appointed gatekeeper on the force of the Department.

Resolved, That the subject of the discipline of the park and gate keepers' force be referred to Commissioner Viele.

Resolved, That Peter Connelly be and he is hereby appointed a police tailor on the force of the Department.

Resolved, That Joseph Southworth is hereby appointed Inspector on the work of grading Sedgwick Avenue, under permission granted to H. B. Claffin and others, they to pay the said Southworth from money to be deposited by them with this Department under the terms of their stipulation.

Resolved, That when any member of the force of park or gate keepers is charged with contracting a debt under false or fraudulent pretenses, it shall be the duty of the Secretary to take the affidavit of the complainant, setting forth such false pretenses; such affidavit shall be sent to the Captain, who shall thereupon prefer charges against the keeper so complained of for a breach of discipline; any conviction for such breach of discipline shall be punished by dismissal from the force. Repeated complaints against any member of the force for incurring debts, and evidence of continued and persistent neglect or refusal to pay just debts, shall be deemed conduct unbecoming an officer, and will be cause for dismissal of such member from the force.

Resolved, That Michael J. Meany be promoted to the rank and pay of Sergeant on the force of parkkeepers, to date from this day.

Resolved, That hereafter a system be adopted in the Department whereby accounts shall be kept showing in detail the receipt and disposition of all tools and materials purchased, with a debit and credit account of the same. That all tools and materials shall be classified and arranged under the headings of serviceable, unserviceable and worthless, and that every three months an examination and report be made to the Board showing the quantity and condition of such tools and material, with the view of disposing of such of the same at auction as may be unanswerable and worthless for further Departmental use, and that the Property Clerk be and he is hereby charged with the carrying out in detail of the provisions of this order.

149 top connections erected.

279 knee braces erected.

The 4½ inch creosoted yellow pine plank has been laid and fastened on the roadways for a distance of about 800 lineal feet; this required about 130,000 feet of lumber. 11,718 rivets have been driven in five working days, notwithstanding the severe weather.

The work of erection is going on satisfactorily at both of the terminal stations.
