Laundrying, cooking and cleaning up in general done in all the prisons by prison labor. The Prisons were entirely kept clean of roaches, waterbugs, etc., by the services rendered by the Brown Insecticide Company.

SIR—In reply to the action taken by the Board of Public Improvements, inclosing copy of a communication from the President of the Borough of Brooklyn, recommending that the "line of Pennsylvania avenue, between New Lots avenue and Vandalia avenue, be changed so as to conform with the lines of the street as they were laid down on the Commissioner's Map of The City of Brooklyn prior to November 9, 1896," with the original plan showing the proposed change, I have to state as follows :

Pennsylvania avenue, as it is at the present time, on the ground northerly of New Lots road, is 100 feet in width. From there to Vandalia avenue it is laid out 80 feet wide, and forms a continuous road. The petitioners request that Pennsylvania avenue be placed in the same location where it was prior to November 9, 1896, which would reduce the said avenue to a width of 80 feet, and make considerable offset or break in the line of the avenue at New Lots road.

The change was requested to afford a better lay-out of the lots south of New Lots road, but is injurious to the alignment of the avenue, and the reduction in width from 80 feet to 60 feet is not advisable, because there are few wide streets in that section of the Borough of Brooklyn, and because Pennsylvania avenue is open for travel 100 feet from New Lots road to its junction with Bushwick avenue and Jamaica avenue.

I have prepared, however, and submit herewith, a map which I consider an improvement over the proposed change, and comes near the wish of the petitioners, by shifting the said Pennsylvania avenue to the proposed location easterly, widening it to 80 feet, and extending the eastern line of Pennsylvania avenue, from New Lots road northerly, until it intersects Pennsylvania avenue, as laid out northerly of New Lots road.

I would recommend, however, that this new suggestion be referred back to the Local Board of the Borough of Brooklyn before action is taken by the Board of Public Improvements.

DEAR SIR—Referring to the construction of sewers in Seventy-ninth street, from New York Bay to Fort Hamilton avenue ; Seventy-fifth street, from New York Bay to Fort Hamilton avenue ; in Fifth avenue, from Ovington avenue to Seventy-ninth street, the following report is respectfully submitted, in compliance with your order and the order of the Commissioner of Sewers under date of March 10, 1899.

I attach sketch for clearness in description of that which follows :

In order to build the sewers within the limits of the recommendation of the Local Board of Improvements of February 25, 1899, it will become necessary to construct sewers in Sixth avenue ; between Seventy-ninth street and Seventy-seventh street ; in Seventy-seventh street, between Fifth and Sixth avenues ; in Fourth avenue (west side), between Seventy-fifth street and Seventy-ninth street ; in Second avenue, between Seventy-fifth street and Seventy-ninth street, and in Narrows avenue and Bay Ridge avenue, between Seventy-fifth street and Seventy-first street, to conform with the adopted sewerage plan.

The following estimated cost and assessed valuation within the probable area of assessment, as near as it can be ascertained, is here respectfully submitted :

Hon. MAURICE F. HOLAHAN, *President, Board of Public Improvements* :

DEAR SIR—Under date of February 23, 1899, Mr. James Flanigan addressed a communication to me requesting the cancellation of eighty-five days' overtime charged against him under his contract for regulating and grading One Hundred and Eightieth street, from Amsterdam avenue to Kingsbridge road. The contractor's claim for remission of the overtime is made on the ground that he was unable to continue his work from April 28, 1898, to about September 14, 1898, because payments were not made to him when due on account of the suspension of payments from the Street Improvement Fund pending a decision of the question of the city's debt limit having been exceeded. Our Inspector's record of the time on the contract agrees with Contractor Flanigan's statement.

On March 8 I communicated these facts to the Comptroller, advising him that there are other similar cases in which remission of overtime is claimed, and requesting his advice as to what action this Department ought to take on Mr. Flanigan's and other similar applications for cancellation of overtime on contracts.

To my communication of March 8, the Comptroller replied on the 10th instant. I quote from his letter as follows :

"Mr. Flanigan's statement is substantially correct, and I hereby certify to you that, acting under the powers conferred upon the Comptroller by section 149 of the Charter, I am prepared to compromise and settle mutual claims existing between Mr. Flanigan and the city on the following basis : That if Mr. Flanigan will release all claims against the city arising by reason of the city's failure to make payments to him on his contract when due, the city will release its claim against Mr. Flanigan for the overtime."



"I assume from the conversations I have had with you that this settlement will meet with the approval of yourself and of the Board of Public Improvements. Before formally entering into the same, however, I would like to have the Board of Public Improvements recommend such settlement by resolution."

Acting on the suggestion of the Comptroller, I respectfully recommend that the Board of Public Improvements authorize the cancellation of the eighty-five days' overtime on Mr. James Flanigan's contract for regulating and grading One Hundred and Eightieth street, from Amsterdam avenue to Kingsbridge road, on condition that he will release the city from all claims arising by reason of failure to make payments to him on his contract when due.

I also recommend that the cancellation of overtime be authorized in the following similar cases and on the same condition as specified in the foregoing recommendation:

Contract of J. C. Rodgers, for paving Jerome avenue, Section 1; overtime, 19 days;  
Contract of Thilemann & Smith, for paving Jerome avenue, Section 2; overtime, 80½ days;  
Contract of W. F. Murray, for regulating, etc., Marcher avenue, from Jerome avenue to Featherbed lane; overtime, 21¼ days;  
Contract of James Leeson, for regulating, grading, etc., Plimpton avenue, from Orchard to Boscobel avenue; overtime, 158¾ days;  
Contract of T. J. McLaughlin, for regulating, grading, etc., St. Joseph street; overtime, 100 days;  
Contract of C. W. Collins, for regulating, grading, etc., Home street, from Intervale avenue to Westchester avenue; overtime, 27¼ days;  
Contract of John Connell, for regulating, grading, etc., Crotona Park, North, from Arthur avenue to East One Hundred and Seventy-fifth street; overtime, 58 days.

DEAR SIR—In the matter of sewerage of Eighty-fourth street, between East End avenue and the East river, I beg leave to say that there is no sewer in this block, and the houses now erected have some other method of draining besides that of the public sewer.

I therefore recommend that the construction of a public sewer be undertaken in that street, and that the Board of Local Improvements be requested to take action thereon.

The estimated cost of the sewer is \$3,500; the assessed value of real estate within the probable area of assessment, \$713,500.

Resolved, by the Board of Public Improvements, That, in pursuance of section 413 of the Greater New York Charter, the construction of sewer in Eighty-fourth street, between East End avenue and the East river, in the Borough of Manhattan, under the direction of the Commissioner of Sewers, be and the same hereby is authorized and approved, there having been presented to said Board an estimate, in writing, of the cost of the said work or improvement, and a statement of the assessed value, according to the last preceding tax-roll, of the real estate included within the probable area of assessment. The estimated cost of the said work is three thousand five hundred dollars.

Affirmative—Commissioner of Water Supply, Commissioner of Highways, Commissioner of Street Cleaning, Commissioner of Sewers, Commissioner of Public Buildings, Lighting and Supplies, Commissioner of Bridges, President of the Borough of Manhattan and President of the Board.

And the following form of ordinance was approved for transmission to the Municipal Assembly:

Be it Ordained by the Municipal Assembly of The City of New York, as follows:

That, in pursuance of section 413 of the Greater New York Charter, the following resolution of the Board of Public Improvements, adopted by that Board on the 15th day of March, 1899, be and the same hereby is approved, and the public work or improvement therein provided for is hereby authorized, viz:

"Resolved, by the Board of Public Improvements, That, in pursuance of section 413 of the Greater New York Charter, the construction of sewer in East Eighty-fourth street, between East End avenue and the East river, in the Borough of Manhattan, under the direction of the Commissioner of Sewers, be and the same hereby is authorized and approved, there having been presented to said Board an estimate, in writing, of the cost of the said work or improvement, and a statement of the assessed value, according to the last preceding tax-roll, of the real estate included within the probable area of assessment. The estimated cost of the said work is three thousand five hundred dollars."

The following preamble and resolutions were submitted by the President of the Borough of Queens, and the matter was referred to the Corporation Counsel for his opinion:

Whereas, In the matter of "Peter C. Hendrickson, appellant, vs. The City of New York, impleaded with others, appellant, and the Jamaica Electric Light Company, respondent," which was a taxpayer's action brought to annul a contract alleged to have been entered into on the 17th day of December, 1897, between the Town of Jamaica and the Jamaica Electric Light Company, for furnishing electric lights to a designated lighting district in that town for a period of ten years from the date of the contract; and

Whereas, In a decision recently rendered thereon, in which all the Judges composing the Appellate Division of the Supreme Court of the Second Judicial Department, State of New York, concurred; and

Whereas, In said decision the following appears, to wit:

"We can find no manifestation in the Greater New York Charter of any intention on the part of its framers to empower existing municipalities which should be included in the consolidation to exercise legislative authority, or enter into contracts which should have no effect whatever until the Greater New York came into existence." "The contract in question could by no possibility be of any benefit to the Town of Jamaica or the people of the lighting district to which it related while Jamaica remained a town. The contract could have no practical effect on the Town of Jamaica until after that town should be comprised within the consolidated city; and its only effect thereafter, if valid, would be to restrict and limit the powers of the municipal authorities of the Greater New York for a period of ten years after consolidation, and impose upon the city the obligations of paying for such lighting at a rate fixed by the Town Board. A municipal corporation just about to merge its individuality into another and larger corporate entity may not make a contract from which it can derive no benefit during its independent existence."

"It is perfectly plain that in the fortnight which elapsed between the execution of the contract in question and the termination of the existence of Jamaica as a town, no benefit whatever could accrue or did accrue to the lighting district."

"The whole undertaking was prospective and could have no effective operation until after consolidation."

"It was an effort on the part of the Town Board to do that which, we think, they possessed no authority to do under well established principles of public policy which condemn such contracts as void"; and,

Whereas, It is alleged that the Town Board of the Town of Jamaica, Queens County, New York, on December 30, 1897, the last but one day of its existence as such, before merging into the Greater New York, did establish two water supply districts in said town, and designated same as Queens Water Supply District and Hollis Water Supply District, respectively; and,

Whereas, It is alleged that on said 30th day of December, 1897, said Town Board of Jamaica did enter into separate contract with the Jamaica Water Supply Company for each of the aforesaid water supply districts for water to be used by the said Town Board and its successors during a period of five years from date of contract;

Now, in view of the foregoing and the relation it may bear to the alleged contracts of the Jamaica Water Supply Company, made December 30, 1897, as therein set forth, be and it is hereby

Resolved, That this Board respectfully recommend to the Corporation Counsel, the Comptroller and the Commissioner of Water Supply, that their several departments apply the principles and reasons contained in the decision herein set forth towards voiding and nullifying any claims of right or demand of payment of public moneys that may be made by the Jamaica Water Supply Company under the said contracts or any such like contracts relating to said water supply districts; and further

Resolved, That the Commissioner of Water Supply be and he hereby is respectfully requested to report to this Board at an early date the extent of the real needs of said district for supply of water, together with the best means and the expense by and for which the city could meet the public wants in respect thereto; and

Ordered, That the Secretary duly certify and transmit copy of foregoing to the Corporation Counsel, Comptroller and the Commissioner of Water Supply.

The Board of Examiners met this day at 3.15 P. M.

Present—Thomas J. Brady, Commissioner of Buildings for the boroughs of Manhattan and The Bronx (in the chair), and Messrs. Dobbs, Bonner, O'Reilly, Fryer, Conover, Moore.

Absent—Messrs. McMillan and Post.

The minutes of February 28, 1899, were read, and, on motion, approved.

Mr. Moore here entered.

Petitions were then submitted for approval, as follows:

Plan 289, Alterations to Buildings, 1899—Petition to allow a shed to be placed on roof to protect three printing frames; same to be covered with corrugated-iron and to be 8 feet high, 15 feet long, and 10 feet deep, as stated in petition; No. 138 Fulton street. Petitioners, Kolesch & Co. Approved on condition that the side brick-wall be carried up at "A" on plans and that the studs be filled in with porous terra cotta or covered on outside with corrugated-iron and that the supporting cross beams be of such size as the Department may require.

Plan 4A, New Buildings, 1899—Petition to allow Duffy's plaster boards covered with plaster to be used on cellar ceiling, as stated in petition; east side of Intervale avenue, 100 feet north of Westchester avenue. Petitioner, John DeHart. Approved.

Plan 99, New Buildings, 1899—Petition to allow the outside wall at staircase in first and second stories to be built 12 inches thick of brick, laid in Portland cement mortar, in place of 16 inches thick of brick, laid in lime and sand mortar; also to allow the main entrance hall partitions up to staircase, to be constructed of 4-inch tees, angles or channels, placed not more than 30 inches from centres, well braced and filled in between solid with 4 inches brickwork, or 4 inches thick porous terra cotta, or 4 inches thick burnt-clay blocks, well set in cement and plastered both sides; ceiling of same to be constructed of 2-inch tees, angles or channels, placed not more than 24 inches from centres, and filled in between solid with 2-inch porous terra-cotta blocks well set in cement and plastered underneath, all as stated in petition. Nos. 314-316 East Ninth street. Petitioners, Kurtzer and Rohl. Approved, without requiring the walls to be laid in Portland cement mortar.

Plan 100, New Buildings, 1899—Petition to allow the outside wall of staircase in first and second stories to be built 12 inches thick of brick laid in good Portland cement mortar, in place of 16 inches thick of brick laid in lime and sand mortar; also to allow the main entrance hall partitions up to staircase, to be constructed of 4-inch tees, angles or channels, placed not more than 30 inches from centres, well braced and filled in between solid with 4 inches brickwork, or 4 inches thick porous terra cotta, or 4 inches thick burnt-clay blocks, well set in cement and plastered both sides; ceiling of same to be constructed of 2-inch tees, angles or channels, placed not more than 24 inches from centres, and filled in between solid with 2-inch porous terra cotta blocks well set in cement and plastered underneath, all as stated in petition. No. 318 East Ninth street. Petitioners, Kurtzer and Rohl. Approved without requiring the walls to be laid in Portland cement mortar.

Plan 103A, New Buildings, 1899—Petition to allow Duffy's patent plaster boards to be used on cellar ceiling instead of iron lath and plaster, as stated in petition. West side of Rosedale avenue, 200 feet south of Mansion street. Petitioner, Charles W. Miller. Approved.

Plan 107, New Buildings, 1899—Petition to allow the first-story entrance hall to be inclosed by fireproof partitions constructed of 4-inch I beams and channels, set not more than 30 inches on

centers and properly braced and built in with 4 inches of hard-burnt brickwork, plastered on both sides; ceiling to be constructed of 2-inch hard-burnt clay blocks, supported by 2-inch tees laid 2 feet apart, and plastered on underside; also to allow steel floor beams of first story in front part of corner building to be supported by a 9-inch steel girder and 5-inch cast-iron posts, instead of an 8-inch brick wall, all as stated in petition; Nos. 21, 23 and 25 Avenue D. Petitioner, Horenburger and Straub. Approved.

Plan 108, New Buildings, 1899—Petition to allow the proposed building to be connected with the present seven-story non-fireproof building adjoining on west; said connection to be made only on basement and first story, by means of a fireproof passage constructed with steel and iron framing and hard-burnt terra-cotta floor, ceiling and walls as shown, and to connect with fireproof main hall of present building, as shown on plans and as stated in petition; No. 34 West Thirty-fifth street. Petitioner, Ralph S. Townsend. Approved.

Plan 112, New Buildings, 1899—Petition to allow the outside wall at stairs in first story to be built 12 inches thick of brick in place of 16 inches by building the same 12 inches thick of brick in good cement mortar in place of lime and sand mortar; said wall being only 53 feet high from first story floor to roof beams, as stated in petition; Nos. 504, 506, 508, 510, 512 East Eighty-first street. Petitioner, Jobst Hoffman. Approved, on condition that the partitions dividing the apartments marked "A" on plans at dumb-waiter shaft be made fireproof.

Plan 114, New Buildings, 1899—Petition to allow the partitions inclosing first story entrance hallways to be constructed of 4-inch angle and tee iron frame spaced 30 inches apart, and filled in with 4-inch terra-cotta blocks, plastered on both sides; ceilings to be constructed of 2-inch tee irons, spaced 24 inches apart, and filled in between with 2-inch terra-cotta blocks, plastered on under side, as stated in petition; Nos. 516 and 518 East Eleventh street. Petitioner, George Fred. Pelham. Approved.

Plan 120, New Buildings, 1899—Petition to allow iron columns and girders to be used in cellar in place of an 8-inch brick wall; also to allow the interior cellar stairs to be placed under the main stairs, inasmuch as said stairs are fireproof from top to bottom and inclosed with brick walls on all stories, all as stated in petition; west side of Central Park West, 75 feet 11 inches north of One Hundred and Sixth street. Petitioners, Neville & Bagge. Approved as to use of iron columns and girders in cellar. Approved as to location of cellar stairs on condition that self-closing fireproof doors are provided at openings in basement marked "A" "A" on plans. Mr. Moore and Mr. Bonner voting no.

Plan 90, New Buildings, 1899—Petition to allow the vestibule and first-story hallway walls and ceilings to be constructed as follows: The side walls to be constructed of 4-inch by 4-inch tee irons, set 2 feet on centres, filled with porous terra-cotta blocks 4 inches by 12 inches by 24 inches, laid in cement mortar and plastered on both sides; the ceiling of vestibule and hallway to be constructed of 4-inch by 4-inch tee irons, placed 2 inches on centres, laid in cement mortar and plastered on exposed sides, all as stated in petition; No. 124 Lewis street. Petitioner, Frederick Jaeger. Approved on condition that ceiling blocks are 2 inches thick of burnt clay.

Plan 2, New Buildings, 1899—Petition to allow the elevator to be inclosed with iron grille instead of fireproof blocks, as same is already in a fireproof brick stair inclosure; also to allow the interior cellar stairs to be placed under the main stairs, inasmuch as said main stairs are fireproof from top to bottom and inclosed with brick walls on all stories; also to allow iron columns and girders to be used in cellar in place of an 8-inch brick wall, all as stated in petition; southwest corner of Western Boulevard and Ninety-ninth street. Petitioners, Neville & Bagge. Approved as to inclosing elevator with iron grille. Approved as to location of cellar stairs on condition that self-closing fireproof doors are provided at openings marked "A," "A," "A," "A," on cellar plans, and an 8 inch brick wall provided at point marked "B" on cellar plans. Messrs. Bonner and Moore voting no. Approved as to use of iron columns and girders in cellar.

Plan 121A, New Buildings, 1899—Petition to allow buildings to be erected 38 feet in height instead of 35 feet, as stated in petition. Petitioner, Joseph C. Cocker; west side of Jackson avenue, 90 feet south of One Hundred and Fifty-sixth street. Approved.

Plan 122A, New Buildings, 1899—Petition to allow cast-iron columns and steel girders to be erected in that portion of cellar where span exceeds 18 feet, in place of brick fore and aft partition walls, size, material and weight of columns and girders as shown on cellar plan, as stated in petition; northeast corner Brook avenue and St. Paul place. Petitioner, George Fred. Pelham. Approved.

Plan 129, New Buildings, 1899—Petition to allow the first-story entrance halls to be inclosed by fireproof partitions, constructed of 4-inch I beams and channels, set not more than 30 inches on centres, and properly braced and built in with 4 inches of hard-burnt brickwork, plastered on both sides; ceilings to be constructed of 2-inch hard-burnt clay blocks, supported by 2-inch tees, laid 2 feet apart and plastered on under side; also to inclose water-closets in No. 85 Catherine street (middle house), at staircase, by fireproof partitions, constructed of 2½-inch angle-irons and 3-inch hard-burnt fireproof blocks, laid in cement mortar and plastered on both sides; also to allow the second-story staircase walls at light courts to be built 12 inches thick, said walls being non-bearing and only about 53 feet high from second floor to roof; also to allow the interior cellar stairs in Nos. 83 and 85 Catherine street, at dumb-waiters, where checked "X," to be inclosed by 2½-inch angle-irons and 3-inch hard-burnt fireproof blocks, set in cement mortar and plastered on both sides, all as stated in petition; Nos. 83 to 87 Catherine street and Nos. 116 to 120 Cherry street. Petitioners, Horenburger & Straub. Denied.

Plan, 140, New Buildings, 1899—A petition to allow the outside wall at staircase in first and second stories to be built 12 inches thick of brick laid in good Portland cement mortar, in place of 16 inches thick of brick laid in lime mortar; also to allow the main entrance hall partitions up to staircase, to be constructed of 4-inch tees, angles or channels, placed not more than 30 inches from centres, well braced and filled in between solid with 4 inches brickwork, or 4-inches thick porous terra cotta, or 4-inches thick burnt clay blocks, well set in cement and plastered both sides; ceiling of same, to be constructed of 2-inch tees, angles or channels, placed not more than 24 inches from centres and filled in between solid with 2-inch porous terra cotta blocks, well set in cement and plastered underneath, all as stated in petition; No. 312 East Ninth street. Petitioners, Kurtzer and Rohl. Approved without requiring that the walls be laid in Portland cement mortar and on condition that fireproof partitions be provided at points marked "A" on plans at each story at dumb-waiter.

Plan 148, New Buildings, 1899—Petition to allow the partitions inclosing the first-story entrance hallway to be constructed of 4-inch angle and tee iron frame spaced 30 inches apart, filled in between with 4-inch terra cotta blocks plastered on both sides; ceiling to be constructed of 2-inch tee irons spaced 24 inches apart, and filled in with 2-inch terra cotta blocks, plastered on underside, as stated in petition; No. 232 East Seventy-sixth street. Petitioner, George Fred. Pelham. Approved.

Plan 155, New Buildings, 1899—Petition to allow the partitions inclosing first-story entrance hallway to be constructed of 4-inch angle and tee iron frame spaced 30 inches apart and filled in with 4-inch terra cotta blocks, plastered on both sides; ceilings to be constructed of 2-inch tee irons spaced 24 inches apart and filled in between with 2-inch terra cotta blocks, plastered on under side as stated in petition; No. 137-39 Broome street. Petitioner, George Fred. Pelham. Approved.

Plan 161, New Buildings, 1899—Petition to allow the partitions inclosing the first story entrance hallway to be constructed of 4-inch angle and tee iron, frame spaced 30 inches apart, and filled in between with 4-inch terra cotta blocks plastered on both sides; ceiling to be constructed of 2-inch tee irons, spaced 24 inches apart, and filled in between with 2-inch terra cotta blocks, plastered on under side, as stated in petition; No. 51 Norfolk street. Petitioner, George Fred. Pelham. Approved.

Plan 699, New Buildings, 1898—Petition to allow the Bailey system of fireproof floor filling to be used in place of brick arches; the lower flanges of steel beams on first story to be covered underneath with wire lath, as stated in petition; south side of Eighty-fourth street, 100 feet west of West End avenue. Petitioner, T. J. McGuire. Approved.

Plan 729A, New Buildings, 1898—Petition to allow Duffy's plaster boards to be used on cellar ceilings in place of wire lath and to be covered with two coats of plaster, as stated in petition; west side of Cottage Grove avenue, 100 feet south of Cornell avenue. Petitioner, George S. Springsteel. Approved.

Plan 927, New Buildings, 1898—Petition to allow the dome to be constructed with steel framing filled with 4-inch terra cotta blocks and covered on the outside with sheet iron, as stated in petition; Nos. 145 and 147 Fifth avenue. Petitioner, H. Edwards-Ficken. Approved.

The award of the contract will be made as soon as practicable after the opening of the bids. Delivery will be required to be made from time to time, and in such quantities, as may be directed by the said Commissioner.

Any bidder for this contract must be known to be engaged in and well prepared for the business, and must have satisfactory testimonials to that effect, and the person or persons to whom the contract may be awarded will be required to give security for the performance of the contract, by his or their bond, with two sufficient sureties, each in the penal amount of fifty (50) per cent. of the bid for each article.
