To the Board of Estimate and Apportionment:

I respectfully ask an appropriation of five thousand dollars for supplies to be used in this office for the current year, as well as to pay for necessary repairs to furniture, etc. Gas, electric light, telephones and ice are included in the term supplies.

There is an expense of at least \$60 a year to notify notaries of their appointment—all delinquent jurors must be notified by mail; the expressage must be paid on all packages sent to the Justices of the Supreme Court; all car fares on subpoenas within the county are paid out of the contingent fund; repairs to twelve typewriters, dyes, time stamps must also be paid. The Session Laws have to be bought; also two Codes of Civil Procedure.

The furniture is in a very bad condition, and it will require considerable money to repair same.

Among other items to be purchased are a cutting machine, towels, soap, payroll blanks, vouchers, etc.

The sum asked for will be the very least that I can get along with.

Gentlemen—Since transmitting to you my estimate of the expenditure for the Department of Bridges for the year 1902, dated February 15, 1902, James E. Ryan, Patrick Ryan, William F. O'Brien, James S. McGrath and John Holsten have been promoted from Bridge Tenders to Bridge Keepers in the Borough of Brooklyn, at a salary of \$1,095 each per year, an increase of \$1,277.50 in the amount required for salaries and wages in that borough.

Heretofore there was only one Bridge Keeper in the Borough of Brooklyn, whose salary was \$1,095, or \$3 per day. Last October some twenty-nine Bridge Tenders took a Civil Service examination for promotion to Bridge Keeper, there being five additional bridges at which Keepers were needed. The foregoing named men were certified by the Municipal Civil Service Commission as having passed the best examination, and have been promoted accordingly.

Schedule E of the estimate of expenditure in this Department for 1902 will therefore need to be increased to the sum of \$61,277.50, and the whole amount of the Departmental Estimate correspondingly increased to the sum of \$425,188.12.

Sir—By direction of the Park Board, I beg to transmit for your consideration the following items to be added to the Revised Departmental Estimate of this Department, submitted February 20, 1902:

Repairs to asphalt walks, Central Park..... \$6,000 00

I find that, through a clerical error, this item was omitted from the revised estimate. The area which should be resurfaced with asphalt in place of the present disintegrated surface is approximately 33,000 square feet, and the estimated cost, including inspection, engineering, etc., is \$6,000.

Trees, West End avenue..... \$38,000 00

Chapter 46, Laws of 1894, placed these trees under the care of this Department. The law requires that the same be maintained by a special appropriation. (The extensive building operations in the Borough of The Bronx, with the consequent increase of territory requiring protection from fire, renders it necessary that a small Central Office be established at a point in the centre of population in that borough. Under the existing arrangement the present Central Office in the Borough of Manhattan cares for the wires and signals of both boroughs, which duty at times taxes its resources to the utmost. In the establishment of the new office it is the intention to restrict the care of the wires and signals of each borough to its own Central Office, an innovation which will minimize the risk of extensive damage thereto. It is proposed to make the Harlem dividing line for the circuits, thereby insuring to the territory above that river freedom from the effects of interruption to the workings of the submarine cables which now cross the same, or the breaking as the result of storms of the lines on this side of the river. The plan will also provide a duplicate Central Office which, in the event of the destruction of the one, will permit of re-established fire-alarm protection within a comparatively short time thereafter.)

—due to the enhanced compensation requested for the Buildings Superintendent, his assistant and certain of the present office staff, the additional expense of the new positions of General Inspector and Foreman of Repairs, and of the proposed increase in the mechanical force, rendered necessary in view of the contemplated reorganization of this branch of the service, and the broadening of the scope of its work. It is the intention, among other things, to do away with the practice which has obtained for many years of engaging the services of outside architects to prepare the plans and specifications and supervise the construction of new apparatus houses, leaving this work to be performed by the Buildings Superintendent and his assistant, both of whom are well qualified for the duty; and also to have done by the enlarged mechanical force, under the oversight of the General Inspector and the Foreman of Repairs, a very considerable part of the minor repair work that is at present performed by contractors employed for the purpose. The combined result of both of these innovations, it is confidently believed, would more than counterbalance the increased allowance required to accomplish the desired ends.

A gross sum of \$390,000 was allowed for "Apparatus, Supplies, etc." for 1902 by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment (resolution October 30, 1901), as against \$402,750 asked in the original estimate for the current year. Upon a careful reconsideration of the whole subject it is believed that not only should the full amount asked (\$402,750) have been appropriated, but that the item for "Horse Hire" should be increased by \$1,000, and that of "Harness" by \$500, to meet the needs of the service, making the total amount required for the year 1902 \$404,250, an increase of \$14,250 over the original allowance.

For two new fireboats, at an estimated cost of \$75,000 each.....

One of the new boats is required to take the place of the "William F. Havemeyer," a wooden boat constructed nearly thirty years since, and which, having become useless for the purposes of the Department, was sold at public auction in October, 1901.

The second new fireboat is absolutely necessary to afford adequate protection against fire to the merchandise stored along our water front and worth vast sums (the Department now having its sphere of duty in this regard very materially enlarged), as well as for the proper safeguarding of the shipping in the harbor.

For completing repairs to the fireboat "Zophar Mills" (Engine 51).....

A special bond issue appropriation of \$75,000 was authorized in the year 1901 for the purpose of making extensive alterations and repairs to the fireboats "The New Yorker" (Engine 57) and "Zophar Mills" (Engine 51). The contract now in course of fulfillment for the work on the former will exhaust more than half of the amount allowed, and it is estimated that, besides the balance remaining from the original appropriation, the additional sum asked herein will be absolutely necessary to meet the expense of the extensive alterations and repairs required to the fireboat "Zophar Mills."

Aggregate

The foregoing estimate, amounting to three million thirty-one thousand four hundred seventeen dollars and eight cents (\$3,031,417.08), is adopted as the sum of money which will be required for the expense necessary for the administration of the Fire Department of The City of New York for the year 1902, Boroughs of Manhattan and The Bronx.

The amount allowed (\$45,310) is insufficient to install and maintain a modern fire alarm telegraph system in all of the towns and villages, as requested, and I would urge that the full amount of \$90,150 be allowed. Some reductions have been made in salaries, price of wire, and the number of employees in this estimate; but, should the full amount be allowed, we shall have an alarm system that will insure ample protection to the property in these localities, and the system would be all that would be required, should at any time the paid department be extended.

Since the enactment of chapter 82, Laws of 1900, the operation of the fire alarm systems in the Volunteer Firemen's territory of the Borough of Queens has been very unsatisfactory and at times extremely hazardous.

Prior to the passage of that law, the Volunteer Fire Departments in said Borough received for their maintenance such amounts as were authorized by the Charter of the city. This was discontinued by the law of 1900, and in lieu thereof a specific sum has been paid annually to the treasurer of each Volunteer Fire Company; that is to say, for an engine company, \$1,200; hook and ladder company, \$1,000; hose company, \$800. These amounts represent an aggregate annual increase from \$21,636 to \$62,800, notwithstanding which many of the companies have failed or refused to defray any portion of the expense of maintaining the fire alarm telegraph, and the paid department, without any available provision therefor, has been compelled, so far as it could, to keep the lines in working order. This is a condition much too hazardous to be continued. Our resources are insufficient for the purpose. To remedy this it is proposed to establish a sub-central station in the Village of Jamaica, install telegraph systems in the villages now dependent on bell towers only, extend and improve the present system, and to connect all with the sub-station at Jamaica and thence by telephone to the Headquarters in Borough of Brooklyn.

The location of a sub-station, as suggested, the installation of new systems and the improvement and extension of the old lines will give only needed protection. The entire plant to be under control and direction of the Fire Commissioner, as provided in section 729 of the Greater New York Charter.

It is intended, as soon as practicable, to comply with the requirement of section 722 of the Charter, in relation to extending the Paid Fire Department over the Borough of Richmond, and, preliminary thereto, there is urgent demand for the establishment of an effective fire alarm telegraph system therein, the borough embracing within its territorial limits an area of 57¼ square miles with a present population of 67,250. There are 48 Engine, Hook and Ladder and Hose Companies located at various points in the borough, to none of which is it possible to communicate the need for their services (aside from verbal and telephonic notification, which, of course, is not practicable save in isolated instances) in any other way than by resort to the primitive method of blowing steam whistles or ringing fire bells. Furthermore, the absence of proper facilities for promptly sending alarms for fire is the cause of the annual destruction of much valuable property, a result which could in large measure be prevented by the introduction of an appropriate modern system of telegraphic communication, such as will be furnished the people of this important and growing part of the Greater New York, if provision for the purpose, as herein requested, shall be made.

The foregoing estimate, amounting to fifty thousand three hundred dollars (\$50,300), is adopted as the sum of money which will be required for establishing a fire alarm telegraph system and providing for the equipment and maintenance thereof in the Borough of Richmond for the year 1902.

Extract from Section 762, Chapter 378, Laws of 1897.

Sec. 762. All lights used in theatres and other places of public amusement, manufactories, stores, hotels, lodging houses and in show windows, shall be properly protected by globes or glass coverings, or in such other manner as the Fire Commissioner shall prescribe. The owners and proprietors of all manufactories, hotels, tenement houses, apartment houses, office buildings, boarding and lodging houses, warehouses, stores and offices, theatres and music halls, and the authorities or persons having charge of all hospitals and asylums, and of the public schools and other public buildings, churches and other places where large numbers of persons are congregated for purposes of worship, instruction or amusement, shall provide such means of communicating alarms of fire, accident or danger, to the Police and Fire Departments, respectively, as the Fire Commissioner or Police Board may direct, and shall also provide such fire hose, fire extinguishers, buckets, axes, fire hooks, fire doors and other means of preventing and extinguishing fires as said Fire Commissioner may direct. In every building used or occupied as a hotel, lodging house, or public or private hospital or asylum, there shall be employed by the owner or proprietor, or other person or persons having the charge or management thereof, one or more watchmen, whose exclusive duty it shall be to visit every portion of such building, at regular and frequent intervals, under rules and regulations to be established by the Fire Commissioner, for the purpose of detecting fires or other sources of danger, and giving timely warning thereof to the inmates of the building. In every room in each of said buildings there shall be posted a card, upon which shall be printed a diagram showing the exits, halls, stairways, elevators and fire escapes, and in the halls and passageways signs shall be posted indicating the location of the stairs and fire escapes. In each of the said buildings there shall be placed and provided electrical or other alarms and time detectors, to be approved by the Fire Commissioner, by means of which the movements of said watchman may be recorded, and through which alarms of fire or other danger may be instantly communicated, by means of bells or gongs, to every portion of the building. Said electrical apparatus, and all other appliances placed or kept within any of said buildings for the purpose of preventing or extinguishing fires, or for affording means of escape therefrom in case of fire, shall be kept at all times in good working order and proper condition for immediate use, and any member of the uniformed force of said Department may enter any of the said buildings at any time for the purpose of inspecting said apparatus or appliances.

Sec. 773. Any person, persons or corporations, for the violation of or non-compliance with any of the several provisions of the several sections of this title, when the penalty is not therein specially provided, shall severally forfeit and pay a fine or penalty in the sum of fifty dollars for each and every offense. * * * Any person who shall willfully violate or neglect or refuse to comply with any provision or requirement of this title, or any regulation, order or special direction duly made thereunder, shall also be guilty of a misdemeanor.

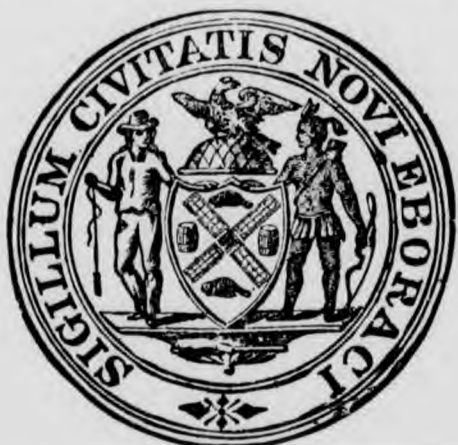
