## LOCAL BOARD.

## BOROUGH OF QUEENS.

The Local Board of the Borough of Queens, City of New York, met at the temporary Borough Hall, Jackson avenue, Long Island City, on February 23, 1900.

Present—Councilman David L. Van Nostrand and Alderman Joseph Geiser and President of the Borough Frederick Bowley.

Minutes of the previous meeting approved.

The following were duly adopted:

Whereas, Direction has been given, authority granted and the necessary funds appropriated to repave with asphalt Flushing avenue, from North Henry street to Old Bowery Bay road, in the First Ward, Borough of Queens, City of New York; and

Whereas, In view of the foregoing and with the wish that the expenditure requisite for such undertaking may be profitably made, the Deputy Commissioner of Sewers has, through the President of this, the Local Board of aforesaid borough, in meeting assembled this 23d day of February, 1900, submitted to the consideration of this Board the statement, "that the sewer system, many years ago established in said avenue, should be taken up and reconstructed on improved plan, to more fully respond to the prospective requirements of the premises along the line thereof, as made possible by the building in recent years of large trunk sewer approximately intersecting Flushing avenue, at Hoyt avenue and Woolsey avenue."

Wherefore, In deference to the opinion and conclusion of the head of the Sewer Department of this Borough, as to the requirements of said avenue in that particular, which is subject to his jurisdiction; be and it is hereby

Resolved, That the foregoing matter be and is hereby recommended to the prompt and favorable consideration and action of the Board of Public Improvements, City of New York.

Also,

Whereas, The recent fire at North Beach in the Second Ward, Borough of Queens, City of New York, by which considerable property was destroyed, was in a great measure due to the absence of any water supply system to combat therewith, leaving the Fire Department, under such conditions, utterly powerless, by reason of which fire insurance companies have since canceled and threaten to further cancel policies of insurance for that section whilst such condition of danger of damage by fire continues; and

Whereas, The aforesaid has forced the consideration and demands prompt action toward having water-mains with fire-hydrants extended in and through such section; and

Whereas, The owners of premises thereby affected have represented to this Board that the Citizens' Water Supply Company has expressed its willingness to extend its water-mains thereto to meet the requirements of said section in respect thereto; now, in view of the foregoing, be and it is hereby

Resolved, That recommendation be and the same is hereby made to the Board of Public Improvements, City of New York, that it take prompt and favorable action toward the granting of permit to said company to extend its water-mains for the purposes hereinbefore stated, and in such directions thereto from its present water-mains as shall seem proper to the Commissioner of Water Supply; and further

Resolved, That in the matter of the City extending its public water-mains to said section within as early a date as said company may require to extend its private water-mains thereto, be and hereby is recommended to the consideration of said Board, as the extending of the City's water-mains is under such like conditions preferable to this, the Local Board of borough aforesaid.

Also,

Whereas, At meeting of the Local Board of the Borough of Queens, City of New York, on February 23, 1900, a petition numerously signed by owners of real estate in Winfield, in the Second Ward, aforesaid borough, was submitted in which the desire is expressed that the City's water-mains be extended in and through the streets and avenues therein set forth, to wit:

Boroughs avenue, from Thomson avenue to William street; Bowne avenue, from Thomson avenue to Monroe street; Bowne avenue, from Maurice avenue to about one hundred feet from William street toward Clinton street; also, Hicks avenue, from Thomson avenue to Turnpike road, and Shell road, from Thomson avenue to Boroughs avenue; and,

Whereas, The needs of said section for supply of water for domestic use and fire purposes is undeniable; therefore,

Resolved, That the matter be and hereby is recommended to the favorable consideration and prompt action of the Board of Public Improvements, City of New York.

Also,

Whereas, The President of the Borough of Queens, City of New York, has submitted to the favorable consideration and prompt action of this, the Local Board of borough and city aforesaid, a petition asking that Webster avenue, from Jackson avenue westerly to William street, in the First Ward of said borough, be graded, regulated, paved with asphalt, curbed and flagged; and,

Whereas, Due notice was published of the public hearing to be given thereon by this Board, in response to which none appeared in opposition to aforesaid petition; and,

Whereas, It seems to this Board that for the City to make the local improvements asked for would be to the best interest of the City; therefore, be and it is hereby

Resolved, That this Board, in meeting assembled this 23d day of February, 1900, does hereby recommend said petition to the Board of Public Improvements, City of New York, for its prompt and favorable action thereon.

Also,

Whereas, The President of the Borough of Queens, City of New York, has submitted for the favorable consideration and prompt action of this, the Local Board of borough and city aforesaid, a petition asking that Webster avenue, from William street to the East river, in the First Ward of aforesaid borough, be graded, regulated, paved with asphalt, curbed and flagged; and,

Whereas, Due notice was published of the public hearing to be given thereon by this Board, in response to which none appeared in opposition thereto; and

Whereas, It seems to this Board that for the City to make the local improvements asked for would be to the best interests of all concerned; therefore, be and it is hereby

Resolved, That this Board, in meeting assembled this 23d day of February, 1900, does hereby recommend said petition to the Board of Public Improvements, City of New York, for its prompt and favorable action thereon.

## LOCAL BOARD.

## FIRST DISTRICT, BOROUGH OF RICHMOND.

The Local Board, First District, Borough of Richmond, The City of New York, met at the Borough Office, in the First National Bank Building, at St. George, in said borough, on Tuesday, March 13, 1900, at 10 o'clock in the forenoon.

The roll was called and the following members were present and answered to their names: Councilman Bodine, Councilman O'Grady, Alderman Vaughan and President Cromwell.

The minutes of the meeting of March 6, 1900, were duly approved.

The matter of Petition No. 58, asking for the setting aside of the South Side Boulevard, between the Old Town road and Red lane, for speeding purposes, was taken up for consideration and an adjourned public hearing of the matter had.

The petitioners, through their representatives at the meeting, stated that they were willing to modify their petition by asking that driving at any rate of speed be allowed on the wings of that portion of the boulevard lying between Seaview avenue and Red lane, from the hours of three to six o'clock in the afternoon of each day.

In the discussion which followed the following gentlemen spoke in favor of the petition as modified:

Mr. Jacob I. Houseman, Dr. James McKee, Mr. Thomas H. Harper and Mr. Edward Thompson.

The following gentlemen spoke in opposition to the petition as modified:

Mr. Lawrence A. Seaver, Mr. Ernst Kressmann and Mr. Joseph Egbert.

The following protest, signed by Mr. Tunis E. Butler and thirty-three other property-owners along the line of the boulevard, was filed with the Board:

Whereas, We have learned that a petition is now under consideration by your honorable Board, praying that upon a certain portion of the South Side Boulevard the speeding of horses be allowed during certain hours of each day; and

Whereas, We believe that the use of said boulevard for this purpose will endanger the life and limb of those wishing to use the said highway, and

Whereas, We believe that the use of the highway for this purpose will be a serious damage to property values along the line of said Boulevard; now, therefore, we, the undersigned property-owners and taxpayers of the Borough of Richmond, in the vicinity of said Boulevard, hereby earnestly protest against the granting of the privilege asked for and protest against the granting to any class of the community privileges which in effect preclude the free and uninterrupted enjoyment by all classes of our citizens of their rights in all the public highways.

At the meeting Mr. David E. Rumph, one of the signers of the petition, stated that he wished to have his name withdrawn from the petition.

The following resolution was offered by President Cromwell:

Resolved, That the Local Board, First District, Borough of Richmond, The City of New York, hereby approves the adoption by the Municipal Assembly of The City of New York, of an ordinance allowing the driving of horses at any rate of speed on the wings (but on the wings only) of the South Side Boulevard, in the Borough of Richmond, being that portion of the road between the macadam and the curb line, on that part of the road lying between Seaview avenue and Red lane, between the hours of three o'clock and six o'clock in the afternoon of each day, except Sundays, subject to the pleasure of the Municipal Assembly, but for a period which in no event shall exceed one year from the date of the passage of this resolution. Nothing in this resolution, however, shall be construed as limiting or interfering in any way with the rights of the property-owners along the said highway or the rights of the general public in said highway. This resolution, however, shall only become operative upon the filing with the President of the Borough of the written consent of a majority of the property-owners according to frontage upon the portion of said Boulevard above referred to.

On motion of Councilman O'Grady, it was voted to amend said resolution by cutting out the last sentence thereof, namely, "This resolution, however, shall become operative upon the filing with the President of the Borough of the written consent of a majority of the property-owners according to frontage upon the portion of said Boulevard above referred to."

Councilman Bodine, Councilman O'Grady and Alderman Vaughan voted in the affirmative, and President Cromwell in the negative.

The following resolution was then adopted:

Resolved, That the Local Board, First District, Borough of Richmond, The City of New York, hereby approves the adoption by the Municipal Assembly of The City of New York, of an ordinance allowing the driving of horses at any rate of speed on the wings (but on the wings only) of the South Side Boulevard, in the Borough of Richmond, being that portion of the road between the macadam and the curb line, on that part of the road lying between Seaview avenue and Red lane, between the hours of three o'clock and six o'clock in the afternoon of each day, except



Sundays, subject to the pleasure of the Municipal Assembly, but for a period which in no event shall exceed one year from the date of the passage of this resolution. Nothing in this resolution, however, shall be construed as limiting or interfering in any way with the rights of the property-owners along the said highway or the rights of the general public in said highway.

Affirmative—Councilman Bodine, Councilman O'Grady and Alderman Vaughan.

Negative—President Cromwell.

Mr. Cromwell, in explaining his vote, stated that he was unwilling to favor the setting apart of any portion of the Boulevard for a speedway, or for any special purpose, while it was so strongly opposed by the property-owners and taxpayers along the line. He felt that, until these property-owners could be satisfied that the proposed speedway would not be an injury, their wishes in the matter should be consulted. He also read a letter, dated March 12, 1900, from Mr. James T. Nelson, Secretary and Treasurer of the Sea Beach Land Company, a real estate expert.

The letter was as follows:

"MARCH 12, 1900.

Hon. GEORGE CROMWELL, President, Borough of Richmond, New York:

DEAR SIR—I have been interested in real estate adventures for many years and have had such practical and large experience that I think I am qualified to speak as an expert on the question of the proposed speedway on the South Side Boulevard in the Borough of Richmond.

From my residence and large business in real estate in the County of Kings, now the Borough of Brooklyn, I have had occasion to pay a great deal of attention to the development of suburban real estate. I have been long familiar with the Ocean Boulevard extending from Prospect Park to the ocean. The said Boulevard was opened fully twenty-five years ago, and has been devoted, as is generally known, very extensively in the past to the speeding of horses. The result of this has been that the development has been very meagre, notwithstanding that this road is 240 feet wide, with two side roads as well as two bicycle paths in addition to the main roadway. The benefit that was supposed to have accrued to the adjacent property-owners, who were very heavily assessed for making the Boulevard, has been in many instances ruinous. Much of the property has been sold in the past for less than the amount of the assessments. The only improvements that a speedway fosters have been road houses, and the great number of them have become resorts of very questionable character.

The proposition of converting a public highway into a speedway would seem to me to be an outrage on the property-owners through which the proposed speedway extended. The number of women and children, and even adults and vigorous men, in crossing a street of this kind would be very great, and the drivers of business wagons and private vehicles would incur very serious risk by the racing which would at times necessitate the pulling from the side into the main macadamized portion of the road. It seems to me that if such a movement were undertaken that an injunction could be maintained against the exercise of this right for any such private purpose. The road was opened and improved as a public highway, and no portion of the same could be diverted from this use without the unanimous consent of the property-owners. The devotion of a portion of this road to the use proposed would be a violation of the rights of the property-owners. It seems to me that if you, as President of this Borough, should assent to such confiscation of the property-owners' rights that it would be a great injustice. To those who seek a place in which to speed horses there is plenty of land which can be leased or bought and a speedway constructed by them and for their use, and the rights of the poor would not thereby be violated or curtailed.

I think that the accusation against you of willfully approving something that was for a benefit for a very small minority and the injury of the public at large would be well founded, particularly as there is no available paralleling boulevard or road excepting the Richmond road which is now incumbered by a trolley line, and is at a great distance from the South Side Boulevard, as well as being far from a direct line.

The matter of the application of the Staten Island Midland Railroad Company for permission to place a platform on Richmond road, near Red lane, was taken up for consideration, and the following resolution was adopted:

The opinion of the Corporation Counsel, dated March 12, 1900, and stating that "on the facts which he has been able to ascertain he was of the opinion that Stone street was not a public street" was submitted to the Board and ordered on file.

Whereas, The Fire Department of the Borough of Richmond are seriously hampered in their very efficient work by the present inadequate system of sending alarms; be it therefore

Resolved, That the Chiefs of the respective Departments and the Presidents of the Boards of Representatives of the Fire Department of this borough, be and they are hereby respectfully invited to attend a meeting of this Board to be held on the 20th day of March, 1900, with a view to secure a modern fire-alarm system for this borough.
