

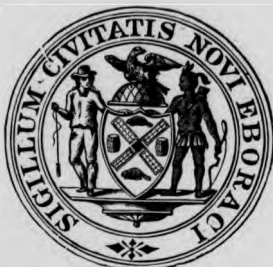

## APPROVED PAPERS.

*Ordinances and Resolutions passed by the Common Council during the week ending Jan. 2, 1886.*

Resolved, That the repairs to the hull of the tug "Manhattan," belonging to the Department of Docks of the City of New York, which are not included in any existing contract, be and hereby are ordered to be done otherwise than by contract, in accordance with section 64 of chapter 410 of the Laws of 1882, commonly known as the "Consolidation Act."

Adopted by the Board of Aldermen, December 22, 1885.  
Approved by the Mayor, December 28, 1885.

AN ORDINANCE relating to the use of large or double fire-hydrants in the City of New York. The Mayor, Aldermen and Commonalty of the City of New York do ordain as follows: Section 1. No person other than an employee of the Department of Public Works or of the Fire Department shall be permitted to use the large or double fire-hydrants placed throughout the City for the use of the Fire Department, and any street sprinkler, sweeper or cleaner or other person or persons not connected with either the Department of Public Works or the Fire Department, found tampering with or using any of said hydrants, shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor, and, on conviction thereof, shall be fined the sum of twenty-five dollars, and in default of payment thereof shall be punished by imprisonment for a period not exceeding ten days.

Sec. 2. All ordinances or parts of ordinances inconsistent or conflicting with the provisions of this ordinance are hereby repealed.

Sec. 3. This ordinance shall take effect immediately.

Resolved, That permission be and the same is hereby given to the "New York Juvenile Asylum" to build a retaining wall on the stoop-line in front of their premises on Eleventh avenue, east side, running about five hundred feet north of One Hundred and Seventy-sixth street, the work to be done at their own expense, under the direction of the Commissioner of Public Works; such permission to continue only during the pleasure of the Common Council.

Adopted by the Board of Aldermen, December 22, 1885.  
Approved by the Mayor, December 29, 1885.

Resolved, That a free drinking-hydrant be placed on the west side of Eighth avenue, about fifty feet north of Sixty-third street, under the direction of the Commissioner of Public Works.

Davidson, and the Board of Estimate and Apportionment is hereby directed to include said sum in the annual tax levy for 1886.
