

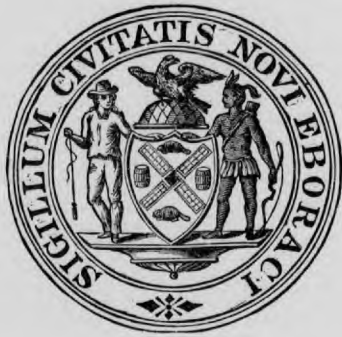

BOARD OF ESTIMATE AND APPORTIONMENT.

BOARD OF ESTIMATE AND APPORTIONMENT—CITY OF NEW YORK,  
MAYOR'S OFFICE, CITY HALL,  
TUESDAY, February 24, 1891—3 o'clock P. M.

The Board met in pursuance of an adjournment.

Present—The following members, viz.:

Hugh J. Grant, the Mayor; Theodore W. Myers, the Comptroller; Michael Coleman, the President of the Department of Taxes and Assessments.  
Absent—John H. V. Arnold, the President of the Board of Aldermen.  
The minutes of the meeting held February 18, 1891, were read and approved.

The Chairman stated that this meeting is held for the special purpose of considering the estimate of the Commissioner of Public Works for repaving certain streets and avenues, under chapter 346 of the Laws of 1889, as presented to this Board at a meeting held February 18, 1891, and laid over at the request of the Comptroller.

The Comptroller stated that he had caused an examination to be made of the asphalt pavements heretofore authorized by this Board, and that upon the report of Engineer McLean, of the Finance Department, they were found to be in good condition (with a few exceptions, which were now being repaired). The streets and avenues as now recommended by the Commissioner of Public Works to be paved with asphalt have been examined by Engineer Cooper, of the Finance Department, and he reports the same as being judiciously selected.

The Chairman moved that West street be omitted from the said estimate for repaving, on account of the railroad tracks located in said street, and that no action be taken upon repaving the said street until the railroad companies shall consent to pay their proportion of the expense thereof.  
Which was agreed to.

The Chairman moved that the Secretary be directed to notify the Commissioner of Public Works and the Commissioners of Public Parks that this Board requests that they confer upon the matter of repaving the plazas at the entrances of the Central Park, at Fifth and Eighth avenues, from the appropriation authorized by chapter 346, Laws of 1889, and report to this Board their views and recommendations relative thereto.  
Which was agreed to.

The Comptroller called up and offered the following resolutions, as amended:

Resolved, That, in pursuance of chapter 346 of the Laws of 1889, the Board of Estimate and Apportionment hereby authorizes and determines that the following-named streets and avenues be repaved with granite-block pavement on concrete foundation, and with crosswalks of North river blue stone or granite at the intersecting and abutting streets where deemed necessary:

Mr. Charles H. Bull has for the past two years rendered such valuable, intelligent and assiduous service on this work, that I consider him entitled to an increase of salary from \$2,500 to \$3,000, as above recommended.

The Comptroller offered the following preamble and resolution:

Whereas, Pursuant to the provisions of chapter 346, Laws of 1889, this Board adopted a resolution this date, authorizing and determining that certain streets and avenues in the City of New York be repaved, and also a resolution providing for the necessary expenses connected therewith;

Resolved, That the Comptroller of the City of New York be and is hereby authorized and directed to issue from time to time, as may be required, stocks or bonds of the Mayor, Aldermen and Commonalty of said city, to the amount of one million dollars (\$1,000,000), payable from taxation, which stocks or bonds shall be redeemable in not less than ten nor more than thirty year

from the date of issue, as the Comptroller shall determine, bearing interest at a rate to be fixed by the Comptroller, not exceeding three per cent. per annum, the proceeds of which bonds or stocks shall be applied to the payment of the expense to be incurred in repaving such streets and avenues as have been or may be designated for repavement, under the provisions of said act, for the year 1890.

Which were adopted by the following vote:

Affirmative—The Mayor, Comptroller and President of the Department of Taxes and Assessments—3.

Thomas F. Gilroy, Commissioner of Public Works, appeared before the Board and made a statement in explanation of the above.

The Comptroller presented the following:

CHARLES V. ADEE, Esq., Clerk, Board of Estimate and Apportionment:

SIR—I have received your letter of the 22d of January ultimo, transmitting a copy of the communication from the Commissioner of Street Improvements of the Twenty-third and Twenty-fourth Wards to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment.

In that communication the officer named requests that a portion of the fund authorized to be raised by chapter 346 of the Laws of 1889 to be expended for the repavement of streets and avenues, may be appropriated for the expense of repaving Third avenue, between the Harlem Bridge and One Hundred and Seventieth street, under a contract to be made by him.

In March, 1890, prior to the creation of the office of Commissioner of Street Improvements of the Twenty-third and Twenty-fourth Wards, an application was made to the Mayor that a portion of the repavement funds should be expended for a similar purpose.

I annex hereto a copy of my opinion then addressed to the Mayor in relation thereto.

In that opinion I called attention to the fact that by the act in question it was made the duty of the Commissioner of Public Works to proceed with the work of repavement authorized by the act, and no power was conferred upon any other officer or department to incur expense chargeable against the fund thereby created.

I therefore came to the conclusion that the Department of Public Parks, which possessed exclusive jurisdiction of street improvements in the Twenty-third and Twenty-fourth Wards, had no power to make contracts payable from the fund created by the special act referred to.

I adhere to the opinion then expressed; I am unable to see that the creation of a Commissioner of Street Improvements of the Twenty-third and Twenty-fourth Wards, by the act, chapter 545 of the Laws of 1890, to exercise the powers theretofore vested in the Department of Public Parks, is sufficient to make any modification of the limitation expressed in the Repavement Act of 1889, by which it is provided that the Commissioner of Public Works shall perform the work authorized by that act, and incur expense chargeable to the special fund therein authorized.

I am, therefore, of the opinion that since, under the terms of the act of 1889, the Commissioner of Public Works only can execute the work of repavement therein authorized, no part of the repavement fund can be expended in the Annexed District.

Hon. HUGH J. GRANT, Mayor:

SIR—I have received the letter of your Secretary, dated March 31, 1890, transmitting, by your direction, in accordance with the suggestion of the Commissioner of Public Works, for my opinion, a communication from Mr. B. R. Guion, Secretary of the Citizens and Taxpayers' Association of the Twenty-third Ward.

The communication of Mr. Guion is to the effect that the Association, of which he is Secretary, has passed a resolution that Third avenue, from Harlem Bridge to One Hundred and Seventieth street, should be repaved and the expense thereof paid out of the appropriations made for repavements under chapter 346 of the Laws of 1889.

The letter from the Commissioner of Public Works to which you refer, is dated March 27, 1890, and states that a legal question is involved as to the construction of the act, and suggests that it be submitted to me for an opinion.

The law in question (chapter 346 of the Laws of 1889) authorizes the Board of Estimate and Apportionment to determine when the public interests require the repavement of streets and avenues. After the Board has authorized a repavement, the act provides as follows: "It shall be the duty of the Commissioner of Public Works in said city to proceed with the work of repavement so authorized."

It is clear that the work of repavement could be done under the act only by the Commissioner of Public Works.

The street improvements, however, in the Twenty-third and Twenty-fourth Wards have heretofore been made under the supervision of the Park Department.

I do not think that it was the intention of the Legislature in enacting the Law of 1889 to change the existing system so radically as to place the work of repaving streets and avenues in the Twenty-third and Twenty-fourth Wards under the supervision of the Commissioner of Public Works.

A construction making such a change should not be adopted unless plainly required by the words of the statute, especially when, as in this case, it might lead to confusion or even conflict of authority between the two Departments.

I advise you, therefore, that the sum appropriated for repavements under the act in question should be spent upon streets which the Commissioner of Public Works now has authority to improve.

CHAMBERS OF THE SURROGATE, NEW YORK COUNTY,  
NEW YORK, February 24, 1891.

To the Board of Estimate and Apportionment:

GENTLEMEN—I enclose, for your information, an accurate statement of the business of this Court during the year 1890.

It shows the increase from 1887 to 1890 in the number of orders and decrees signed and in the number of contested wills, amounting in each case to over one hundred per cent.

This enormous increase in the number of contests makes it impossible for me, with the force now employed in the stenographers' department, to comply with section 2541 of the Code, which requires that proofs of wills and other matters taken by him be written out at length.

In 1865, when the office of Stenographer for this Court was created, the population of the city was 725,386. In 1890, according to the police enumeration, it was 1,701,705, and now it must be a million and three-quarters.

The assessed valuation of property in 1865 was \$608,784,355, in 1890 it was \$1,696,978,390.

In 1865 twelve subordinates in the Surrogate's Court and office could do the business; now, there are fifty-nine fully employed, not including ten clerks temporarily engaged to copy old records.

In 1865, 599 wills were offered for probate, of which 16 were contested; in 1890 there were 1,577 offered and 107 contested.

If \$3,000 was adequate compensation for the Stenographer in 1865, twenty-six years ago, three times that amount would not be excessive now, when the testimony taken each year amounts to not less than 30,000 folios, equal to three million words, and with many duties necessarily imposed upon him in the management of his department, for, at times, he must have several assistants to enable him to keep pace with the business.

I ask that there be appropriated for the residue of the year \$2,500 for a competent law stenographer, to be added to the clerical force of the office.

In my last communication to your Honorable Board I asked for an appropriation of \$1,000 for the salary of a clerk to be known as an examiner. The request was refused. I earnestly ask that you reconsider your action in that regard and that the appropriation be made therefor.

## TO OWNERS OF LANDS ORIGINALLY ACQUIRED BY WATER GRANTS.

**ATTENTION IS CALLED TO THE RECENT** act of the Legislature (chapter 449, Laws of 1889), which provides that whenever any streets or avenues in the city, described in any grant of land under water, from the Mayor, Aldermen and Commonalty containing covenants requiring the grantees and their successors to pave, repave, keep in repair or maintain such streets, shall be in need of repairs, pavement or repavement, the Common Council may, by ordinance, require the same to be paved, repaved or repaired, and the expense thereof to be assessed on the property benefited; and whenever the owner of a lot so assessed shall have paid the assessment levied for such paving, repaving or repairing, such payment shall release and discharge such owner from any and every covenant and obligation as to paving, repaving and repairing, contained in the water grant under which the premises are held, and no further assessment shall be imposed on such lot for paving, repaving or repairing such street or avenue, unless it shall be petitioned for by a majority of the owners of the property (who shall also be the owners of a majority of the property in frontage) on the line of the proposed improvement.

The act further provides that the owner of any such lot may notify the Commissioner of Public Works, in writing, specifying the ward number and street number of the lot that he desires, for himself, his heirs and assigns, to be released from the obligation of such covenants, and elects and agrees that said lot shall be thereupon liable to be assessed as above provided, and thereupon the owner of such lot, his heirs and assigns shall be relieved from any obligation to pave, repair, uphold or maintain said street, and the lot in respect of which such notice was given shall be liable to assessment accordingly.

The Commissioner of Public Works desires to give the following explanation of the operation of this act: When notice, as above described, is given to the Commissioner of Public Works, the owner of the lot or lots therein described, and his heirs and assigns, are forever released from all obligation under the grant in respect to paving, repaving or repairing the street in front of or adjacent to said lot or lots, except one assessment for such paving, repaving or repairs, as the Common Council may, by ordinance, direct to be made thereafter.

No street or avenue within the limits of such grants can be paved, repaved or repaired until said work is authorized by ordinance of the Common Council, and when the owners of such lots desire their streets to be paved, repaved or repaired, they should state their desire and make their application to the Board of Aldermen and not to the Commissioner of Public Works, who has no authority in the matter until directed by ordinance of the Common Council to proceed with the pavement, repavement or repairs.
