Minutes of Stated Meeting of the Aqueduct Commissioners, Held at Their Office, No. 280 Broadway, New York City, on Tuesday, January 19, 1904, at 2 p. m.

Present—Commissioners Ten Eyck (President), Ryan, Windolph and Curtis
and Chief Engineer Smith.

Minutes of meetings of January 12 and 14, 1904, were read and approved.

The Committee on Finance and Audit reported the examination and audit of bills contained in Vouchers Nos. 15858 and 15876, inclusive, amounting to \$883.38, which were approved and ordered certified to the Comptroller for payment by the following vote:

Affirmative—Commissioners Ten Eyck, Ryan, Windolph and Curtis—4.

The Construction Committee returned to the Commissioners Report No. 870 of the Chief Engineer, dated January 4, 1904, recommending the employment of an expert mechanical engineer to test pumps and pumping machinery at Shaft No. 25, with a proposed resolution from the Commissioners limiting the expenditure therefor to \$500, together with Amended Report No. 870 of the Chief Engineer, dated January 18, 1904, with the recommendation that said resolution be amended to read \$800, and that the amended report be approved and the expenditure authorized and the reports and resolution ordered filed.

The recommendations of the Committee were adopted and the following resolution offered:

The recommendation of the Committee was adopted.

The Construction Committee also returned to the Commissioners Report No. 883, of the Chief Engineer, dated January 18, 1904, in relation to extra work required to be done in connection with the reinforcing of the arch of the Old Croton Aqueduct, with the recommendation that the report be approved and ordered filed, and the authority therein requested by the Chief Engineer granted.

Dr. William Mabon, Superintendent of Bellevue Hospital, reported as follows:

About 6 o'clock on the morning of February 2 a fire broke out in the drying room of the laundry. It was discovered by an employee passing the building, who at once gave the alarm. The local department responded immediately and had a stream on in a minute and a half. The City Department was also called upon and rendered most efficient service. The loss is confined to those articles in the drying room at the time, consisting mostly of patients' shirts, night shirts and pajamas, and will probably amount to \$375. Mr. Philip Smith, the chief of our local department, became sick as a result of the fire, but is now convalescent. His services and those of the corps were very satisfactory.

An estimate on repairing the garbage destructor is presented for your consideration. This furnace was installed five or six years ago at a cost of \$2,700, and nothing has thus far been expended upon it for repairs. If it is not repaired at once it may break down and require a much larger sum for repairs.

Notices are now being prepared prohibiting patients from spitting tobacco juice into the sputum cups, and it was thought well to incorporate in the notice a prohibition against smoking in the wards.

The Superintendent of Nurses has been conferred with in reference to the subject of additional nurses, and this matter is now receiving her consideration.

Mr. Lewis, Chief Engineer of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, called up on the 'phone the other day in reference to the opening of Tee Taw avenue, and said that he would recommend to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment that the outbuildings be allowed to stand for a time, and later on, if other arrangements are necessary, ample time will be given to provide for them.

Three bids were received on the fire escape stairway. The lowest is from the Central Iron Works and has been accepted at \$285.

Gouverneur Hospital.

The Corporation Counsel has been interviewed in reference to bids received on the alterations and additions to Gouverneur Hospital. The matter was referred to an assistant who said he would consider it and send his report to the Corporation Counsel at the earliest possible moment.

Harlem Hospital.

Arrangements have been made for painting the interior of Harlem Hospital as well as the isolating room in the rear.

Resolved, That the Board of Trustees request of the Board of Estimate and Apportion a further appropriation in the sum of fifty thousand dollars for the purpose of providing the necessary means for carrying on and completing the work at Gouverneur as heretofore planned and advertised for.
