### BELLEVUE AND ALLIED HOSPITALS.

Report for the Quarter Ending June 30, 1912.

New York, July 1, 1912.

Hon. WILLIAM J. GAYNOR, Mayor: Sir-In behalf of the Trustees of Bellevue and Allied Hospitals, I beg to submit the following report for the three months closing June 30, 1912:

The Department As a Whole. The attention of the Trustees has been called within the past three months to the alleged necessity of a hospital in the Riverdale district of The Bronx. This district is served to some extent by hospitals situated in Yonkers, and several local associations have petitioned for the establishment of a public hospital, or at least an ambulance relief station in this vicinity. On the other hand, the authorities of Fordham Hospital have reported to the Trustees that a still greater need exists in the neighborhood of Pelham Bay Park. The record of ambulance calls shows that more are received from this locality than from the first one mentioned, the proportion being in the ratio of about 4 to 1. While there is sufficient accommodation at Fordham Hospital to care for these calls, in order to meet them with promptness it is very necessary that the horse ambulances be replaced with motor ones, and in order that this may be done the Trustees have asked for the issue of revenue bonds in the

amount of \$8,000. Doctor S. S. Goldwater, Expert in Hospital Construction to the Department, was anxious to retire at the beginning of the year, but has been persuaded to remain in his position, where he will be much needed in connection with the construction of all the new buildings. The Municipal Civil Service Commission has authorized his appointment without examination.

A request has been made to lease for the General Medical Superintendent the house at No. 157 E. 37th st., such lease to cover a period of three years from the 1st of May, 1912. As the Superintendent was turned out of his former residence at short notice by reason of a new building, the lease of an apartment at 29 Waverly place from January to May, 1912, was submitted for approval.

A set of instructions for the guidance of students and clinical clerks in the wards of the several hospitals of the Department has been drawn up, and will help to regulate and simplify the activities of these useful assistants.

The rule of having the members of the attending staff indicate the hour of their arrival and of their departure at visits to the hospitals has been adopted.

Some question having arisen concerning the right of the Trustees to admit to care and treatment non-residents of The City of New York, and who were to be considered as such, the Board has interpreted the language of the Charter to mean that all persons in need of hospital care and treatment who are bona fide residents of The City of New York, regardless of the length of time they may have resided in the City, should be admitted to the hospitals of the Department for treatment; such other persons as are emergency cases must also be admitted to care, compensation being accepted in all cases where there is ability to pay.

Much difficulty has been experienced in the past quarter with regard to the purchase of coal, owing to the unusually high prices prevailing. Permission was obtained from the Board of Aldermen to purchase coal in the open market without public letting, at a cost not to exceed \$15,000. The advertisement for coal for the remainder of the ensuing year was authorized on May 20, and bids were received on June 4. Some of these bids were accepted, and others rejected, in the hope of

obtaining more favorable prices. Approval has been given to the plan of transferring \$2,000 from the appropriation of General Supplies to meet the cost of purchasing an automobile for the use of the General Medical Superintendent and higher officials of the Department. This will at length make possible unannounced visits to the several hospitals of the De-

It has been estimated that the deficit in the appropriations for the current year will amount to \$60,000. The Finance Committee of the Board has been empowered to ask for this amount, or such portion of it as may ultimately prove to be necessary. A general repairing of the screens and awnings throughout the hospitals has been ordered in order to guard against the presence of flies and other insects.

BELLEVUE HOSPITAL. The architects report progress on the new buildings as follows:

Pavilions L and M. The work of concrete foundation on top of piles was started the last week of April on the northwest part of Pavilion M. On May 17 the work of piling was completed, with the exception of piles under sewer on south side of building. The first week of June the concrete foundation was completed to level of damp-proofing. The progress of the work during the last three months has been satisfactory. The con-Maltbie. 3 p. m.—Room 305—Case No. 1541—Flatbush Gas Company—Samuel Maires crete foundation has been completed, including footings for all areas, balconies and granite steps. Over entire cellar bottom the concrete foundation is finished. The damp-proofing has been done and work of building walls on north and south elevation has started.

Pavilions I and K. The work done during the last three months on Pavilions I and K consisted only Laundry Machinery.

All equipment of the Laundry is practically installed, as also is the electrical work, with the exception of connections to motors and panel-boards. The plumbing and steam connections are all completed and have been tested. The ventilating system is finished with the exception of drying tumbler. All tables are set in place. Within a week the contractor intends to test and run the plant.

Word has been received from our Inspector of Construction that the brick to be used in L and M, and the piles provided for I and K, are not in accordance with the specifications. This matter has been reported to the architects and referred to the of Estimate and Apportionment.

Building Committee for adjustment.

The President has submitted the outline of a reply he is preparing to the communication filed with the Corporate Stock Budget Committee by the Homoeopathic Medical Society of the County of New York, relative to the request of the Trustees for \$2,753,500 for the new Bellevue. To this will be attached a letter from the architects, Messrs. McKim, Mead and White, setting forth the great injury to the public interest that would ensue were these plans to be curtailed as suggested by the Homeopathic Medical Society.

Other Building Matters.

The Commissioner of Public Charities offered to accept the new morgue, providing the title to the building was vested in his Department, and also that the funds necessary for the employment of the help required could be obtained. The matter of divided authority in the new building was referred to himself and the President for adjustment, and the Corporation Counsel will be consulted in order to make the transfer final. The only obstacle now remaining in the way of the transfer depends upon the Commissioner obtaining the funds necessary for the payment of additional employees.

The form of contract for the erection of roof wards on Pavilions A and B has been approved, and the advertisement for bids for their construction authorized.

The specifications for a proposed extension of the balconies on the old buildings at Bellevue, for the use particularly of the children in the orthopedic wards, have been prepared. It is proposed to widen the balconies on all three floors of the old buildings, and authority to advertise for bids for this work has been given.

The installation of machinery in the new laundry is being rapidly completed, and the building is nearly ready for occupancy. To supervise the operation of the costly machinery it has been judged advisable to re-establish the position of Laundry Manager or Superintendent, at a salary of \$1,200 a year with maintenance. It is hoped this may be granted in view of the responsibilities involved in the supervision of the new

A request from the American Laundry Machinery Company to extend the time of their contract by sixty days has been received, and upon the recommendation of the architects, Messrs. McKim, Mead and White, was granted.

The Hospital Grounds.

The grounds in front of the new Pathological Building, long neglected, have now been planted with turf and already add much to the appearance of that building. The appointment of additional men to care for the grounds in the spring has been

Permission has been given to proceed at once with the planting of trees on 26th st. and 1st ave., in front of the old hospital. The first bids received were rejected and the General Medical Superintendent was authorized to accept separate bids for cutting holes in the sidewalk, and for planting the trees afterwards.

The School for Midwives.

To accommodate the increasing number of patients and pupils at the School for Midwives it has been necessary to ask for the rental of two apartments in the house adjoining the school, No. 221 E. 26th st. This can be done at an annual rental of \$600, provided that this Department make all necessary alterations and replace the same at the expiration of the lease. A request has been made on the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund to this effect.

Miscellaneous. Permission has been given to the two Assistant Pathologists to reside in one of the rooms on the upper floor of the Pathological Building, these rooms to be furnished by themselves, and their installation will place the hospital under no additional expense.

At the instance of Doctor W. Gilman Thompson a Committee on Nursing Efficiency in the hospital has been appointed. This committee will have for its aim the devising of measures to improve the nursing in the wards of the hospital, both from the point of view of the service and supplies. It will be composed of two representatives each from the Medical Board, the Board of Managers of the Training School and the Board of Trustees.

The offer of Cornell University Medical College to maintain a respiration calorimeter in Bellevue Hospital, Second Medical Division, has been accepted by the Trustees. Doctor Graham Lusk has been placed in control of the instrument.

The Trustees have been requested to establish a nursery for the children of mothers admitted to the hospital. This request was referred to the Social Service Committee for recommendation, but it has not been found practicable to make such signed. an arrangement at the present time.

The matter of police protection at Bellevue has received illustration recently at the hospital, and a request has again been made to the Police Commissioner for the assignment of at least one officer to the hospital grounds, in addition to those especially designated to the prison ward.

The new law makes it incumbent on the Trustees to send ambulances for insane patients. This has been their policy, but in order to carry it out with uniformity and regularity it will be necessary to acquire additional ambulance facilities. Pending authorization from the financial authorities of the City the General Medical Superintendent has been authorized to make temporary arrangements.

The matter of selecting a site for the new out patient department, nurses' home, employees' quarters, etc., at Gouverneur Hospital remains in the hands of the Department of Finance. The Trustees cannot too strongly urge that steps be hastened to secure the necessary site. As the small plot between the hospital and the river could not be utilized for this purpose without shutting off much of the light and fresh air from the wards of the hospital, the Commissioner of Parks has been asked to proceed with plans for the conversion of this space into a small park.

It has been decided to pay a small salary to the Physician in charge of the Tuberculosis Clinic for children on the boat "Westfield." The assignment of a Nurse's entire time to this clinic has been also arranged for. An investigation of the boat with regard to its condition, needs, etc., was ordered, with the result that new awnings, new beds and new linen for the beds were found necessary and requisition

made for same. The Local Needs Committee of the Corlears Hook Park Association has requested the Dock Commissioner to provide one or more additional stories to the pier now in course of erection at the foot of Jackson st., in order to make provision for the day camp and the clinic which is now being conducted on the old ferryboat "Westfield." This request has been endorsed by the Trustees.

The appointment of two social service Nurses at Gouverneur will be asked for in the Budget provision for 1913.

The use of the intra-tracheal method of anæsthesia, the same apparatus being used as we employ at Bellevue, has been authorized by the Trustees. The purchase of two automobile ambulances at a cost not to exceed \$3,000 each has been authorized for the use of this hospital.

The issue of revenue bonds in the sum of \$337.50 to pay for the salary of a Hebrew Chaplain to be assigned to this hospital has been authorized by the Board

HARLEM HOSPITAL,

J. H. Freedlander, the architect for the new wing at Harlem Hospital, transmitted a complete set of plans on June 3. The architect was directed to arrange for a complete separation in the duct system connecting the sink rooms and toilets, and the group of ducts which terminate in the wards. This was done upon the advice of Doctor Goldwater, and the plans were otherwise approved with the understanding that an alternate should be provided for the installation of a vacuum cleaning plant, and for a wainscot of tiling in the bathrooms, toilets, etc., so that these might be installed if the requisite funds are available.

The Consulting Engineers for the new wing have said that an additional \$25,000 will be required to meet the cost of increasing the water supply and refrigerating plant in the power house, the extension of these services becoming necessary with that of the hospital. While expressing regret that this had not been foreseen, the Trustees are obliged to request that an appropriation of this amount be included in

the Corporate Stock Budget for 1913.

The form of contract as well as the plans and specifications for the construction of the Nurses' home in connection with Harlem Hospital have received the approval of the Board of Estimate. Advertisement for bids on this work has now been authorized.

A recommendation has come to the Trustees from the State Charities Aid Association that provision be made for a new and separate building at Harlem Hospital for the use of the out patient department. The Trustees were at first unwilling to go to this expense, although it seems probable that such a building will soon become a necessity. Moreover, the ground floor of the present hospital, greatly overcrowded as it is, could be admirably adopted for other purposes. In pursuance of this plan the President has been authorized to confer informally with the Comptroller in regard to the acquisition of a suitable site. The construction of a portable building as an extension to the present out patient department, which had been suggested as one possible outcome of the problem of overcrowding, was disapproved by the Trustees.

An investigator has been appointed whose first task should be the supervision of the out patient department at Harlem. Patients giving wrong addresses or other false information are to be refused treatment; and an effort is to be made to learn what proportion of the patients are able to pay for private treatment. It is also expected to learn what proportion of the patients come from without the hospital ambulance district. When this is learned such patients will be referred to a dispensary in the neighborhood from which they come.

FORDHAM HOSPITAL. As has been reported before, the Trustees have made request on the City authorities for an appropriation with which to undertake the enlargement of Fordham Hospital. Mr. Almirall, the architect, has made drawings with this in view, and has asked that Doctor Goldwater be instructed to confer with him in the completion of the plans. It is understood that until an appropriation for the purpose has been made available, that the Trustees are not responsible for the payment of Mr. Almirall's services.

A revised print of the proposed roof ward plan at Fordham Hospital was received from Mr. Almirall on April 1. After consultation with Doctor Goldwater it was resolved to approve these plans and order the alteration of the working drawings

Word was received from the Wadsworth Construction Company on April 12 that their contract for the workshop at Fordham Hospital had been completed. The Supervising Engineer was directed to inspect and report on the work which must be completed before the contract can be accepted. As the contract expired several months ago it was thereupon declared abandoned and arrangements were entered into for completion of the building as early as possible.

The Medical Board has recommended that no tuberculosis clinic be established at Fordham Hospital for the present, and the Trustees have concurred in this recommendation. The appointment of an additional social service Nurse is desirable and

should be effected if funds permit. The construction of an enclosure for ashes in front of the boiler house at the

hospital has been authorized. Reference has already been made to the action of the Trustees in requesting money for the purchase of two additional automobile ambulances to attend particularly to calls from the outlying portions of the district.

A request has come from the Fordham University Medical School for better facilities for clinical instruction in Fordham Hospital. In pursuance of this plan it has been agreed that medical appointments should be made in the future only after a definite understanding with the candidate that he was to teach in the University Medical School. At the same time the school was invited to submit suggestions in regard to rules governing the number of students to be admitted for teaching purposes at any one time.

The offer of the Medical Board to inoculate against typhoid fever all employees of the hospital has been gratefully accepted by the Trustees, and will be put into operation wheresoever the employees concerned are willing to undergo the inoculation.


