DEPARTMENT OF PUBLIC PARKS.

Abstract of Proceedings for the week ending September 22, 1877.

MEETING, WEDNESDAY, SEPTEMBER 19.

Consent was given to the substitution of Mr. N. Schoen, as surety, in place of Mr. Henry Smith, upon the contract for reflowing the roadway of the Third Avenue Bridge.
John O'Connell, Laborer, and J. Dowd, Teamster, Twenty-third and Twenty-fourth Wards, were restored.

The exchange of a gray wolf for three monkeys was authorized.

A plan and specifications for casing the five main ribs in the Central Hall of the Museum of Art Building with galvanized iron, the estimated cost of which is \$6,000, were approved, and the Secretary directed to prepare and insert the necessary advertisements for proposals for said work.

Messrs. Van Horn & Fogazzi, Contractors, were allowed a payment, not exceeding \$1,375, on account.

The application of Mr. R. M. Waters, for permission to connect a six-inch drain-pipe with the surface drain-pipe now being laid on Riverside avenue, was denied; also the application of Mr. C. Borger, for permission to sell fruit, etc., at Eighth avenue and Sixtieth street.

The Board of Estimate and Apportionment was requested to transfer the sum of \$7,575 to the appropriation for "Maintenance of Parks and Places," 1877, from certain other appropriations for 1877, on which there are balances not required.

All the mowers employed on the parks were discharged.

The purchase of four boat loads of gravel, as required, was authorized.

Post-keepers Philip Loeffel and W. F. Leonard, and Gate-keeper Patrick Sheran, who have been for many years in the employment of the Department, but are now ill and unable to perform duty, were granted leave of absence, with half pay, until further order.

The President was authorized to sign the returns to the writs of certiorari in the cases of Messrs. Isaac Evans and Henry Koster against the Commissioners of the Department.

The following contracts were awarded, viz.:

To Mr. P. Mulholland, for construction of sewers in Mott avenue, etc.

To Mr. John B. Devlin, for construction of sewer in Third avenue and One Hundred and Forty-third street.

To Messrs. James J. Jones and John J. McQuade, for the delivery of trap-rock and screenings.

Mr. T. W. Rollins was allowed the sum of \$100 for the erection of the temporary bridge at the south end of the Museum of Natural History Building.

The following resolutions were adopted:

I.

Resolved, That the proposals heretofore received for the construction of a bridge over the Harlem river, at the intersection of Madison avenue and One Hundred and Thirty-ninth street, be not opened, and that the construction of said bridge upon the plans heretofore adopted be and hereby is abandoned.

II.

Resolved, That the Civil and Topographical Engineer be directed to report as to the nature and cause of the green stuff floating in the Central Park lakes, and as to whether any means can be used to avoid it otherwise than by an additional supply of water. Also to consider and report at what cost and with what prospect of value an artesian well could be provided, and whether any other means can be adopted to increase the supply of water, not involving drawing from the Croton Reservoirs.

III.

AT A MEETING OF THE BOARD OF HEALTH of the Health Department of the City of New York, held at its office on the fourth day of September, 1877, the following resolution was adopted:

Resolved, That, under the power conferred by law upon the Health Department, the following additional section of the Sanitary Code, for the security of life and health, be and the same is hereby adopted and declared to form a portion of the Sanitary Code:

Section 28. That hereafter, no Texas, Colorado, or other dangerous cattle shall be driven through or along the public streets, except in those cases only where the cattle shall be landed at the foot of the street leading to the slaughter-house to which such cattle shall be destined, and where the street shall be effectually barred or closed, so as to prevent the escape of such cattle during the transfer from the dock to such slaughter-house, and no such cattle shall be landed except in accordance with the provisions and restrictions of this ordinance.
