SPECIAL JOINT MEETING OF THE TWO HOUSES CONSTITUTING THE MUNICIPAL ASSEMBLY OF THE CITY OF NEW YORK.

Held in the Aldermanic Chamber.

Resolved, That all motions for the purpose of reducing any item or amount in the Budget fixed by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment shall be submitted in writing and considered in the order in which they may be received.

The President put the question whether the Municipal Assembly would agree with said resolution.

Which was decided in the affirmative by the following vote:

By Alderman Wafer—

Whereas, There is urgent necessity and a growing demand for additional school facilities, in order that thousands of children, now unable to obtain the necessary education to make valuable members of the community and good American citizens; and

Whereas, It is an indisputable fact that unless this pressing want is met and satisfied at once, the number who will be deprived of school accommodation will grow to such proportions as to become a menace to the safety and security of our American institutions by spreading ignorance where intelligence should prevail; therefore

Resolved, That the Municipal Assembly strongly favors and most earnestly recommends that the Board of Estimate and Apportionment should comply with the request of the Board of Education for an appropriation of nine million dollars for school sites, etc., in view of the doubtful conditions which may, if they do not positively, prevent the issue of bonds authorized by the Legislature and indorsed with marked unanimity by the citizens of this City.

Resolved, That while we believe in avoiding a too heavy increase in taxation we do not feel justified in keeping taxes down, if to do so it is necessary to interfere with or to curtail to any extent the education of our young.

Resolved, That the Budget now under consideration be and it is hereby recommended to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, with respectful request that said Board include in the appropriations of 1899 the \$9,000,000 for school sites, etc., though it be necessary to cut down the appropriation in other departments to avoid an increase in taxes beyond that now contemplated.

The President put the question whether the Municipal Assembly would agree to accept said resolution.

By Alderman Goodman—

Whereas, The proposed Budget for 1899, contemplates an appropriation for the Bureau of Municipal Statistics of eleven thousand two hundred dollars, of which ten thousand seven hundred dollars is for salaries, and but five hundred dollars for contingencies; and

Whereas, There are pending before this Board, and now under consideration by its committees, a number of resolutions, authorizing the publication of memorial works, the character of which ought to commend them to all officials and citizens possessing civic pride and American patriotism; and

Whereas, These several resolutions, intended to perpetuate in a proper and in an official manner, the history of consolidation, the description of the magnificent reception accorded our naval heroes, and also of the return of our soldiers, will, if adopted, require ample funds, so that the respective publications be issued in a manner commensurate with their importance; therefore

Resolved, That the Board of Estimate and Apportionment be and it is hereby respectfully requested to add a sufficient sum to the appropriation for the Bureau of Municipal Statistics, to enable it to do this work, if ordered, without delay, and with such elaboration and exactness as is proposed in the several resolutions referred to.

Which was decided in the negative.

By Alderman McInnes—

Resolved, That the members of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment be respectfully requested to attend the meetings of the Municipal Assembly called to consider the Budget, in order to furnish such information to said members that they can vote intelligently upon such matters as may come before them.

Which was ruled out of order.

By Councilman McGarry—

Resolved, That the Budget for the year 1899, submitted to the Municipal Assembly by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, be and the same hereby is adopted and approved.

Councilman Leich presented, as an amendment, the following resolution:

Resolved, That the items aggregating ten thousand seven hundred dollars (\$10,700) for salaries for the Bureau of Municipal Statistics be reduced to three thousand five hundred dollars (\$3,500), and that the amount of the reduction be added to the item of Contingencies in order that the object of the Bureau may be accomplished by the publication of such works as are contemplated by the Charter.

Which was decided in the negative.

Resolved, That, pursuant to the provisions of section 226 of the Greater New York Charter, the Board of Estimate and Apportionment by the affirmative vote of all the members thereof, makes thus the budget of The City of New York for the year one thousand eight hundred and ninety-nine, being, first, the amounts estimated to be required to pay the expenses of conducting the public business of said city for the said year, and secondly, the amounts estimated to be required to pay the State Taxes and charges and expenses of the Counties of New York, Kings, Queens and Richmond, for the said year, amounting in the aggregate to the sum of ninety-three million five hundred and twenty thousand and eighty-two dollars and three cents (\$93,520,982.03), as follows:
