The Sanitary Committee, to whom was referred the application of the Edison Electric Illuminating Company for a hearing in respect to order on premises Nos. 47, 49 and 51 West Twenty-sixth street, presented the evidence taken on the 13th instant, and

On motion, the following preamble and resolutions were adopted:

Whereas, Proceedings having been brought before the Board of Health for the purpose of determining as to whether the conduct of business by the Edison Electric Light Company at Nos. 47, 49 and 51 West Twenty-sixth street was a public nuisance, and detrimental to life and health, and the Board having on the second day of November, 1898, made an order that the operation and running of the machinery and dynamos as at present, causing vibrations, be abated, and the discharge of dust, cinders, smoke and gas therefrom be abated; and that the noise of the business as at present conducted on said premises be also abated; and, thereafter, the parties being the complainants against said Edison Electric Light Company being cited to appear before the Board, and a hearing having in part been had before the Chairman of the Sanitary Committee of the Board, and he having reported to the Board this day that upon such hearing it appeared there were several proceedings pending in the Supreme Court for the purpose of determining whether said business was or was not a nuisance; and, it further appearing to the Board that this is the

principal plant of the Edison Electric Light Company, which furnishes light to a large part of the city, and the importance of the case from the public standpoint being such; therefore, be it

Resolved, That the justices of the Supreme Court be and are hereby requested to give one of the proceedings now pending before them a preference on their calendar, so that said question as to whether said business is a nuisance or not may be determined in said proceeding before this Board takes final action upon the same; and that the Secretary be requested to communicate a copy of this preamble and resolution to the attorneys for the parties and also to the justices of the Supreme Court; and that the attorney for the complainants be and is hereby directed to at once make application to the Court for the preference for trial of said case, as herein requested; further

Resolved, That the Secretary be and is hereby directed to report to the Board if any proceedings are had in the Court in the proceedings now pending in the Court having reference to this subject.

Communication from the Assistant Corporation Counsel recommending the discontinuance of the suits named in his report.

The bid of William P. Mitchell & Son for printing for the District Attorney of New York County foots up \$1,501.06. The next lowest bid is that of the M. B. Brown Company, which offers to do the work for \$1,606.84. In the Mitchell bid, however, figures for two items in the schedule have been omitted and it is therefore informal. From the manner in which his bid has been presented, I am unable to indicate precisely what those items are. He has, however, stated his willingness to do all the work called for in the schedule at the sum above named.

The lowest bid for printing for the Department of Water Supply, except on one item, is that of the M. B. Brown Company. On item 66, page 21 of the specifications—printing regular water rate bills—however, the bid of the J. W. Pratt Company is the lowest, namely, \$499.98, while that of the M. B. Brown Company for this item is \$579.70.

The aggregate of the bid of the J. W. Pratt Company for lithographing for the Board of Aldermen is the lowest, except on item 5, page 157—supplying 100,000 lithographed envelopes. On this item the M. B. Brown Company's bid is \$746.24, while the bid of the J. W. Pratt Company is \$751, making the bid of the M. B. Brown Company the lowest on that item.
