BOARD OF ESTIMATE AND APPORTIONMENT

EXTRACT FROM

MINUTES, BOARD OF ESTIMATE AND APPORTIONMENT, CITY OF NEW YORK, FEBRUARY 16, 1906.

The Secretary presented the following:

CITY OF NEW YORK—OFFICE OF THE MAYOR, }
January 30, 1906. }

To the Secretary, Board of Estimate and Apportionment:

SIR—The Mayor directs me to acknowledge your letter of the 29th inst., and to return herewith, duly approved by his Honor this day, certified copy of resolution granting to the firm of Abraham & Straus the right to construct a tunnel under and across that portion of Livingston street, etc., Borough of Brooklyn.

Atlantic Hotel Supply Company.

In the matter of the application of the Atlantic Hotel Supply Company for permission to construct, maintain and operate a pipe line from its building at No. 676 Hudson street, under and along Hudson and West Fourteenth streets, and to connect with an existing pipe of the Manhattan Refrigerating Company under Fourteenth street, between Ninth and Tenth avenues, Borough of Manhattan, which was presented to the Board January 12, 1906, and referred to the Bureau of Franchises.

The Secretary presented the following:

Board of Estimate and Apportionment:

GENTLEMEN—I am in receipt of a communication from Joseph Haag, Secretary, submitting for my consideration copy of an application, together with copy of a map accompanying the same, presented to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment by the Atlantic Hotel Supply Company for the right to lay two pipes under Hudson street and West Fourteenth street, from their building No. 676 Hudson street, to a pipe of the Manhattan Refrigerating Company under Fourteenth street, 43 feet west of Ninth avenue.

The petition reads as follows:

Honorable Board of Estimate and Apportionment:

The petition of the Atlantic Hotel Supply Company respectfully shows:

1. That the said Atlantic Hotel Supply Company is a copartnership doing business under said name, and which said company is composed of Frank J. Stoltz, Thomas J. Connors and Everett Wilson; that said name has been duly registered pursuant to the statute in that case made and provided. That said copartnership is engaged in the business of selling meat at wholesale and retail at No. 676 Hudson street, in the Borough of Manhattan, in The City of New York.

2. That said Atlantic Hotel Supply Company respectfully petitions your Honorable Board to grant a license to lay two (2) pipes each of not more than six (6) inches in diameter in the said Borough of Manhattan, extending from a point at or near the southerly side of Fourteenth street about forty-three (43) feet and six (6) inches westerly of the westerly side of Ninth avenue, and thence extending in an easterly direction to the said premises No. 676 Hudson street, as appears by the map or plan submitted herewith; the said pipes to be placed in a trench not more than three (3) feet wide, and located four (4) feet beneath the surface of the said streets and avenues; that the distance to be covered by said pipes will be about three hundred and fifty (350) feet, as appears by the said map.

3. That said pipes are to be used to convey cold air to said No. 676 Hudson street for refrigerating purposes, and are to be connected with pipes of the Manhattan Refrigerating Company which has a line of similar pipes at said place of beginning. That the refrigeration thus procured will be applied to the preservation of the large stock of meat or beef that will be continuously kept by your petitioners on said premises.

4. That your petitioners have taken a lease of said premises, No. 676 Hudson street, for a term of five (5) years and will expend in fitting the same up for the purposes of said business about twenty thousand dollars (\$20,000), and the said premises when improved will contain every facility for the carrying on of said meat business in a manner that will be in conformity with the highest sanitary standards. The said premises are in close proximity to Gansevoort Market, which is the largest beef market in the United States, and the undertaking of your petitioners will meet the constantly increasing demands from hotels and other places of like character, and give them greater opportunities to purchase meat. That the refrigeration to be obtained by the proposed pipe line is necessary to enable your petitioners to carry on their said business on said premises.

5. That if the petition should be granted your petitioners will furnish such indemnity or security as the City may require to insure the faithful compliance with the conditions that it may see fit to impose upon your petitioners in relation to the license applied for.

6. That said proposed pipe line will not interfere with any fixtures or appurtenances forming part of the water mains, sewers, conduits, subways or subpavement fixtures of any kind, nor with any other subsurface structures existing by virtue of any franchises heretofore granted, all of which appears by the said map herewith submitted.

It seems in several instances your Honorable Board has granted consent to the laying of pipes connecting two of the petitioner's buildings, but in the present case the proposed pipe line connects the petitioner's buildings with the mains of a public service corporation, and the question therefore arises, would you have the right to grant the requested consent to the petitioner, or is the proposed pipe line to be considered as an extension of the Manhattan Refrigerating Company's franchise?

I have asked you for further information on the subject of the Manhattan Refrigerating Company's right in the street at the point of the proposed connection with the pipes of the petitioner, and it seems the only information regarding the said Manhattan Refrigerating Company to lay pipes under the streets of the City is contained in replies to communications addressed by you to the Borough President and to the Commissioner of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity.

The Commissioner of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity states that he is unable to find any record of permits having been issued for the laying of such pipes.

The President of the Borough of Manhattan furnished you with copies of two permits which have been issued to the Manhattan Refrigerating Company to lay pipes under certain streets in the vicinity of the new West Washington Market, pursuant to a resolution of the Board of Aldermen adopted April 1, 1890. This resolution granted to the Greenwich Refrigerating Company the right to lay refrigerating pipes under the streets mentioned in the permits.

The Borough President also inclosed a copy of an affidavit made by Robert Hewitt, President of the Manhattan Refrigerating Company, dated April 2, 1901, showing that the Greenwich Refrigerating Company had set over and transferred all its rights, privileges and franchises granted by the Board of Aldermen by said resolution to the Manhattan Refrigerating Company, and it appears that neither the resolution above referred to, or the permits issued by the Borough President, covered the part of West Fourteenth street in question, namely, from Ninth to Tenth avenue.

I am of the opinion therefore that the Manhattan Refrigerating Company had no right to lay pipes in this part of West Fourteenth street, and that to grant the application of the petitioner would be an extension of the franchise of the Manhattan Refrigerating Company.

Further I am of the opinion that the said Manhattan Refrigerating Company should be notified at once to remove its pipes from said street at the place indicated, or make proper application for the extension of its franchise obtained under the resolution of April 1, 1890.

I return herewith the copy application and copy map accompanying your letter of January 12, 1906.

SIR—Under date of January 2, 1906, the Atlantic Hotel Supply Company made application to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment for the right to lay a pipe in Fourteenth street and in Hudson street, the object being to connect the premises owned by the applicant with the pipes of the Manhattan Refrigerating Company, at present said to exist in West Fourteenth street.

An examination was made of the rights granted to the Manhattan Refrigerating Company and inquiries were made of the President of the Borough of Manhattan and of the Commissioner of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity in regard to the rights of the companies to open the streets and lay pipes at the place indicated. The information furnished did not disclose any such rights, and the matter was placed before the Corporation Counsel for his opinion. This opinion has been rendered under date of February 9, 1906, and he advises:

First—That the application of the Atlantic Hotel Supply Company should be denied for the reason that the right applied for is practically an extension of the franchise of the Manhattan Refrigerating Company.

Second—That the Manhattan Refrigerating Company, from the evidence furnished, had no right to lay pipes in that part of West Fourteenth street.

Third—That the Manhattan Refrigerating Company should be notified at once to remove its pipes from said street, at place indicated, or make proper application for an extension of its franchise, obtained under resolution of April 1, 1890.

In accordance therewith, I would recommend that the Board adopt a resolution directing the Secretary to serve notice upon the Manhattan Refrigerating Company to show cause on or before March 2, under what authority it has laid pipes in streets other than those included in the franchise granted by the Board of Aldermen on April 1, 1890, and why any such pipes so laid should not be immediately and forthwith removed.

Whereas, Under date of January 26, 1906, the Manhattan Refrigerating Company was requested by the Bureau of Franchises of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment to furnish certified copies of any permits or grants to lay such pipes, and also a map showing all pipes in the streets which are now owned or controlled by such company; and

Whereas, No reply has been received to such communication; and

Whereas, The Corporation Counsel, in a communication to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, dated February 9, 1906, has given it as his opinion, from the facts presented, that the Manhattan Refrigerating Company had no right to lay pipes in this part of Fourteenth street, and that the said company should be notified to remove such pipes from said street, or make proper application for a franchise for the same; therefore be it

Resolved, That this Board hereby serves notice upon the Manhattan Refrigerating Company to show cause, in writing, on or before March 2, 1906, under what authority it has laid pipes in streets other than those included in the permit granted by the Board of Aldermen on April 1, 1890, and approved by the Mayor on April 8, 1890, and why any such pipes so laid should not be immediately and forthwith removed; and be it further

Resolved, That the Secretary be directed to serve a copy of these resolutions upon the said company.

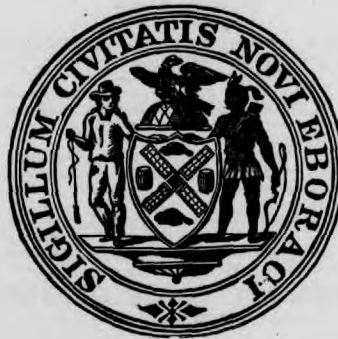

NOTICE TO CONTRACTORS.

GENERAL INSTRUCTIONS TO BIDDERS.

The person or persons making a bid or estimate for any services, work, materials or supplies for The City of New York, or for any of its departments, bureaus or offices, shall furnish the same in a sealed envelope, indorsed with the title of the supplies, materials, work or services for which the bid or estimate is made, with his or their name or names and the date of presentation to the President or Board or to the head of the Department at his or its office, on or before the date and hour named in the advertisement for the same, at which time and place the estimates received will be publicly opened by the President or Board or head of said Department and read, and the award of the contract made according to law as soon thereafter as practicable.

Each bid or estimate shall contain the name and place of residence of the person making the same, and names of all persons interested with him therein, and, if no other person be so interested, it shall distinctly state that fact; also, that it is made without any connection with any other person making an estimate for the same purpose, and is in all respects fair and without collusion or fraud, and that no member of the Board of Aldermen, head of a department, chief of a bureau, deputy thereof, or clerk therein, or other officer of The City of New York is, shall be or become interested, directly or indirectly, as contracting party, partner, stockholder, surety or otherwise in or in the performance of the contract, or in the supplies, work or business to which it relates, or in any portion of the profits thereof. The bid or estimate must be verified by the oath, in writing, of the party or parties making the estimate that the several matters stated herein are in all respects true.

Each bid or estimate shall be accompanied by the consent, in writing, of two householders or freeholders in The City of New York, or of a guaranty or surety company duly authorized by law to act as surety, and shall contain the matters set forth in the blank forms mentioned below.

No bid or estimate will be considered unless, as a condition precedent to the reception or consideration of any proposal, it be accompanied by a certified check upon one of the State or National banks of The City of New York, drawn to the order of the Comptroller, or money to the amount of five per centum of the amount of the bond required, as provided in section 420 of the Greater New York Charter.

The certified check or money should not be inclosed in the envelope containing the bid or estimate, but should be either inclosed in a separate envelope addressed to the head of the Department, President or Board, or submitted personally upon the presentation of the bid or estimate.

For particulars as to the quantity and quality of the supplies, or the nature and extent of the work, reference must be made to the specifications, schedules, plans, etc., on file in the said office of the President, Board or Department.

No bid shall be accepted from or contract awarded to any person who is in arrears to The City of New York upon debt or contract, or who is a defaulter, as surety or otherwise, upon any obligation to the City.

The contract must be bid for separately.

The right is reserved in each case to reject all bids or estimates if it is deemed to be for the interest of the City so to do.

Bidders will write out the amount of their bids or estimates in addition to inserting the same in figures.

Bidders are requested to make their bids or estimates upon the blank forms prepared and furnished by the City, a copy of which, with the proper envelope in which to inclose the bid, together with a copy of the contract, including the specifications, in the form approved by the Corporation Counsel, can be obtained upon application thereto at the office of the Department for which the work is to be done. Plans and drawings of construction work may also be seen there.
