## BANKING COMMISSION.

The quarterly meeting of the officers to designate City depositories, in accordance with Section 196. Chapter 466, Laws of 1901, was held on Monday, November 2, 1914. Present: William A. Prendergast, Comptroller, and Henry Bruere, Chamberlain. Owing to the absence of the Mayor, it was decided to adjourn the regular meeting until Wednesday, November 4, 1914.

The adjourned meeting of the Commission was held on Wednesday. November 4, 1914. Present: Hon. John Purroy Mitchel, Mayor; William A. Prendergast, Comptroller, and Henry Bruere, Chamberlain.

The Chamberlain offered the following: "Resolved, That the present City depositories be re-designated."

Which was unanimously adopted. The Chamberlain offered the following:

"Resolved, That the minimum rate of interest on deposits be fixed at two (2) per cent., that the Chamberlain be empowered, wherever he may do so in his best judgment, to enter into contract for such higher rate of interest as may be obtained. The Chamberlain is empowered in his discretion to require from any or all such depositories bonds to secure the deposits made therein, such bonds to be approved by the Comptroller."

Which was unanimously adopted. The following report of the action taken by the Commission was approved: Report on the Meeting of the Banking Commission.

November 4, 1914. The Banking Commission, met to-day to fix the rate of interest on City deposits for the three months ending January 31, 1915. The minimum rate was fixed at 2 per cent., but the Chamberlain was authorized to make better arrangements with banks which offered to pay a larger rate of interest.

In accordance with the usual practice, a letter was sent to the banks by the Chamberlain ten days ago, asking what rate of interest would be paid on City balances for the quarter beginning November 1. The replies received show that it will be possible to place \$55,400,000 in banks at rates higher than 2 per cent., the average rate for this amount being 2.75 per cent.

Under the law, which permits a deposit in any one bank of an amount equal to 50 per cent. of the capital and surplus, \$149,346,000 could be deposited in banks paying better than 2 per cent., but the Chamberlain has limited the regular deposits in banks to 20 per cent. of the capital and surplus, as a conservative policy.

Under the offers received at the beginning of the first quarter of the year, it was possible to place \$27,000,000 above 2 per cent., the second quarter \$26,000,000, the third quarter \$43,000,000, and as stated above \$55,000,000 for the coming quarter.

92 institutions have agreed to pay rates in excess of 2 per cent. as follows: Thirtyfive institutions, 3 per cent.; one institution, 2.85 per cent.; five institutions, 23/4 per cent.; fifty institutions, 21/2 per cent.; one institution, 21/4 per cent. The increased earnings during the past nine months ended October 31, due to



impartially received sums on deposit in proportion to their size, strength and amount of interest paid, will be continued during the succeeding quarter.
