MUNICIPAL CIVIL SERVICE COMMISSION.

Minutes of Meeting of the Municipal Civil Service Commission of New York, Held Wednesday, December 29, 1915, at 10:30 o'clock A. M.

Present—Dr. Henry Moskowitz, President, and Commissioners Darwin R. James, Jr., and Alexander Keogh. The President presided.

A public hearing was had on the adoption of the following preamble and resolution:

Whereas, In order to correct the inappropriate assignments of various Hospital Helpers in the Department of Public Charities to perform the work of Hospital Clerks, provision has been made in the Budget of the Department of Public Charities for the year 1916 for the employment of Hospital Clerks at salaries above \$480 a year with or without maintenance, which positions are in the Competitive Class, and Whereas, Because of long continued service of many Hospital Helpers in the performance of clerical work and because of peculiar conditions in the institutions in the Department of Public Charities, it is in the interests of best administration and the spirit and intent of the Civil Service Law that Hospital Helpers who have served with fidelity for at least three years be allowed to enter a promotion examination for the position of Hospital Clerk in the Competitive Class in order to meet the conditions of the Budget of the Department of Public Charities for the year 1916.

Therefore be it resolved: That, subject to the approval of the Mayor and the State Civil Service Commission, the provisions of clause 18 of Rule XV. be waived and the Municipal Civil Service Commission be empowered to hold a competitive promotion examination for the position of Hospital Clerk, Department of Public Charities, in the Competitive Class, which shall be open to Hospital Helpers in the Non-Competitive Class who have served with fidelity for not less than three years.

Wolf Sheinberg, Acting Auditor of the Department of Public Charities, and Walter H. Conley, Medical Superintendent of the Metropolitan Hospital, Department of Public Charities, appeared in favor of the adoption of the resolution. Harry W. Marsh, Assistant Secretary of the Civil Service Reform Association, also appeared in favor of the adoption of the resolution. There were no other appearances and the Chair declared the hearing closed.

A public hearing was had on the proposed amendment of the Municipal Civil Service Classification by including in the Non-Competitive Class, under the heading "Positions in the Bellevue and Allied Hospitals at compensations not exceeding the amounts set forth below," the following:

Resident Pathologist, \$600 Per Annum, With Maintenance.

Dr. Charles Norris, Director of Laboratories of Bellevue and Allied Hospitals, appeared in favor of the proposed amendment. There were no other appearances, and the Chair declared the hearing closed.

A public hearing was had on the proposed amendment of the Municipal Civil Service Classification by including in the Non-Competitive Class, under the heading "Positions in the Department of Health, at compensations not exceeding the amounts set forth below (Hospitals for Contagious Diseases in New York City)," the following:

Telephone Switchboard Operator, \$660 Per Annum Without Maintenance.

Floyd W. Fiske, Secretary to the Commissioner of the Department of Health, appeared in favor of the proposed amendment. Harry W. Marsh, Assistant Secretary of the Civil Service Reform Association, appeared in opposition. There were no other appearances, and the Chair declared the hearing closed.

The Commission then went into regular session and the minutes of the meeting held December 15 were approved.

The Secretary recorded the death on December 28 of Frederick G. Ireland, Chief Examiner of the Commission. The Commission directed that the following be spread upon the minutes:

With profound regret the Municipal Civil Service Commission records the death on December 28 of one of the most valued and loyal public servants of this City, Mr. Frederick G. Ireland, Chief Examiner of the Commission for over twenty years. Mr. Ireland, a graduate of Harvard University, entered the service of the City on November 13, 1895, as the Commission's Chief Examiner, at a time when the principles of civil service reform were still derided and attacked by political enemies of the merit system. He was one of the staunchest supporters of the Civil Service Law. His sterling character, unswerving honesty and broad culture brought to the Commission a bulwark against political favoritism and dishonesty which was impregnable and an assurance of high standards of public office which was then almost unique. His career saw the development of the competitive system from the elementary examinations of the early days to the advanced, scientific methods of to-day. In all his words and deeds he showed only loyalty and fidelity to the trust reposed in him. The sense of loss to the Commission and to those who have been associated with him in his years of work is inexpressibly keen.

On motion, the following special resolution was adopted:

Whereas, In order to correct the inappropriate assignments of various hospital helpers in the Department of Public Charities to perform the work of Hospital Clerks, provision has been made in the budget of the Department of Public Charities for the year 1916 for the employment of Hospital Clerks at salaries above \$480 a year with or without maintenance, which positions are in the competitive class, and

Whereas, Because of long continued service of many Hospital Helpers in the performance of clerical work and because of peculiar conditions in the institutions in the Department of Public Charities, it is in the interests of best administration and the spirit and intent of the Civil Service Law that Hospital Helpers who have served with fidelity for at least three years be allowed to enter a promotion examination for the position of Hospital Clerk in the competitive class in order to meet the conditions of the budget of the Department of Public Charities for the year 1916, therefore be it

Resolved, That, subject to the approval of the Mayor and the State Civil Service Commission, the provisions of clause 18 of Rule XV. be waived and the Municipal Civil Service Commission be empowered to hold a competitive promotion examination for the position of Hospital Clerk, Department of Public Charities, in the competitive class, which shall be open to Hospital Helpers in the non-competitive class who have served with fidelity for not less than three years.

On motion, it was

Resolved, That the Municipal Civil Service Classification be and the same hereby is amended by including in the Non-Competitive Class, under the heading "Positions in the Bellevue and Allied Hospitals at compensations not exceeding the amounts set forth below" the following:

Resident Pathologist, \$600 Per Annum (With Maintenance).

On motion, the proposed amendment of the Municipal Civil Service Classification by including in the Non-Competitive Class for the Department of Health the position of Telephone Operator at \$660 per annum, without maintenance, was laid over, and the Secretary was instructed to forward to the Commissioner of the Department of Health the eligible lists of Telephone Operator with the request that he endeavor to secure appointees therefrom.

Hon. William A. Prendergast, Comptroller, appeared in connection with the request of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment for authority to employ William A. Wirt as Educational Consultant to the Committee on Education of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment under the provisions of clause 6a of Rule XII. It appearing that the Mayor had consented to the employment of a nonresident in this instance, on motion, it was

Resolved, That, subject to the approval of the Mayor and the State Civil Service Commission, Mr. William A. Wirt of Gary, Indiana, be and he hereby is excepted from examination under the provisions of clause 6a of Rule XII of the Rules of the Municipal Civil Service Commission, to render expert services as Educational Consultant to the Committee on Education of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment for a period of one year at a compensation not to exceed ten thousand dollars (\$10,000).

John A. Connolly, Jr., Clerk in the Department of Public Charities, appeared in connection with the request of the Commissioner of Public Charities that the limitation of compensation (\$750) fixed in the cases of Dr. Charles L. Allers and Dr. James L. Devlin, employed as Examiners in Lunacy, be waived, and the total compensation fixed at \$1,250 each for the year 1915. After careful consideration of the matter, the following resolutions were adopted:

Resolved, That the action of the Commission on February 10, 1915, in authorizing the employment of Dr. Charles E. Pearson and Dr. Jefferson Scales as Examiners in Lunacy in the Department of Public Charities under clause 6 of Rule XII at a compensation not to exceed \$750 in either case, be and the same hereby is rescinded.

Resolved, That, subject to the approval of the Mayor and the State Civil Service Commission, the limitation of compensation (\$750) fixed by clause 6a of Civil Service Rule XII be and the same hereby is waived in so far as it applies to the cases of Dr. Charles L. Allers of 34 Fort Place, New Brighton, S. I., and Dr. James L. Devlin of Rose Avenue, Amboy Road, New Dorp, S. I., employed as Examiners in Lunacy (at \$10 per examination) in the Department of Public Charities, and the total compensation for the year 1915 is hereby fixed at an amount not to exceed \$1,250 in each case.

The Commission again considered the matter of the proposed amendment of the Classification of Positions in the Exempt Class for the Police Department by changing the line "Assistant Property Clerk" to read "Two Assistant Property Clerks," and by including therein the title "Confidential Investigator." The matter was laid over.

On motion, the following resolutions were adopted:

Resolved, That the Secretary be and he hereby is instructed to proceed with an open competitive examination for the position of Chief Probation Officer, male.

Resolved, That the Secretary be and he hereby is instructed to proceed with an examination for promotion to the position of Deputy Chief Probation Officer in the City Magistrates' Courts, to be open to all Probation Officers eligible under clause 10 of Rule XV.

The following resolutions were adopted after a hearing of each of the candidates named therein:

Resolved, That the request of James J. Muldoon, Jr., of 745 Lincoln Place, Brooklyn, that his name be restored to the eligible list of Patrolman be and the same hereby is denied.

Resolved, That the name of Frank A. L. Myers, of 1163 Halsey Street, Brooklyn, be and the same hereby is removed from the eligible list of Patrolman under the provisions of clause 14 of Rule VII and placed upon the list of persons disqualified for employment in the City Service.

Dr. Leon G. Fischer, of 19 Linden Avenue, Brooklyn, appeared, as directed, to show cause why certification of his name from the eligible list of Pathologist-Bacteriologist to the Department of Public Charities should not be revoked by reason of his experience statements. The matter was referred to the Examining Division for a report as to whether the facts disclosed by an investigation of the candidate's experience statements would affect his rating on experience.

Requirements: Candidates must present evidence of at least one year's experience in work involving a knowledge of the underlying principles of foreign and domestic pension funds, or other experience tending to qualify them for this work.

There is one vacancy in the Commission on Pensions. The salary is \$1,800 per annum.

Candidates must be at least 21 years of age on the closing date for the receipt of applications.

The term of the eligibility of the list resulting from this examination is fixed at not less than one year nor more than four years.

The form of advertisement was approved.

A report dated December 28 was presented from the Secretary to the Advisory Board submitting a form of advertisement for the examination for Instructor of Industry, reading substantially as follows:

Applicants must be citizens of the United States and residents of the State of New York.

The subjects and weights of the examination are: Experience, 4; 70% required. Duties, 4; 70% required. Oral and Practical, 2; 70% required. 70% general average is required.

A qualifying physical examination will be given.

Applications for this examination must be filed on a special blank, Form C, with insert. Candidates who fail in any test of the examination will not be summoned for the subsequent tests.

Examinations will be held in the following trades: Masonry, Bricklaying, Cement Working, Carpentry, Plumbing, Electrical Working, Steamfitting, Structural Iron Working, Machine-Shop Working, Road Construction.

Requirements: Each candidate must present evidence of 5 years' experience as a foreman, journeyman or inspector in one of above trades. He must also present evidence of general experience in building or other construction of sufficient time and importance to warrant the examiners in believing him able to direct or instruct in trades allied to his own. Suitable credit will be given, in lieu of experience, for attendance at trade schools and of having pursued courses of sufficient scope to fit for work of this character. Each candidate must specify his special trade on his application.

Duties: Instructors of Industry are required to instruct and direct inmates and laborers and perform work personally. They will be held responsible for the custody and discipline of the inmates assigned to them. In general they will be assigned to the Farm Colony at New Hampton, where camps have been established preliminary to the construction of the Institution Buildings. The quarters are in rough frame buildings provided with water supply and sewerage systems, both of which are in the course of development for the permanent structures. Custodial duty may be required at night at intervals throughout the year.

Candidates must be at least 25 years of age on the closing date for the receipt of applications.

The salary is \$900 per annum with maintenance. Promotion may be expected upon an approval of the Bureau of Standards, Board of Estimate. There are several vacancies in the Department of Correction, and the appointees may be assigned to the Farm Colony at New Hampton, Orange County, New York, or to any of the other institutions of the Department.

The term of the eligibility of the list resulting from this examination is fixed at not less than one year nor more than four years.

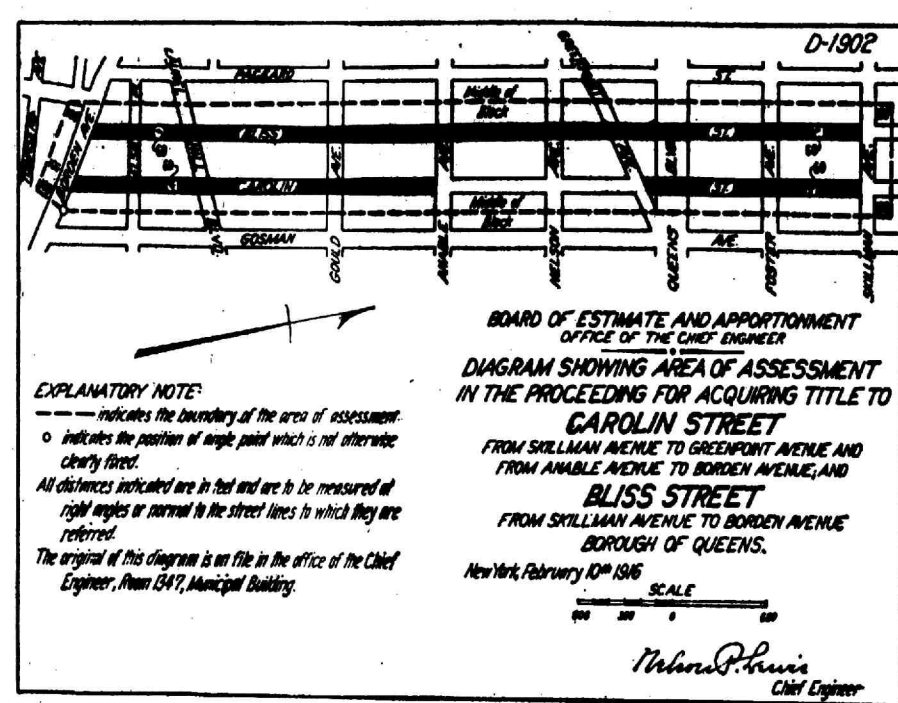

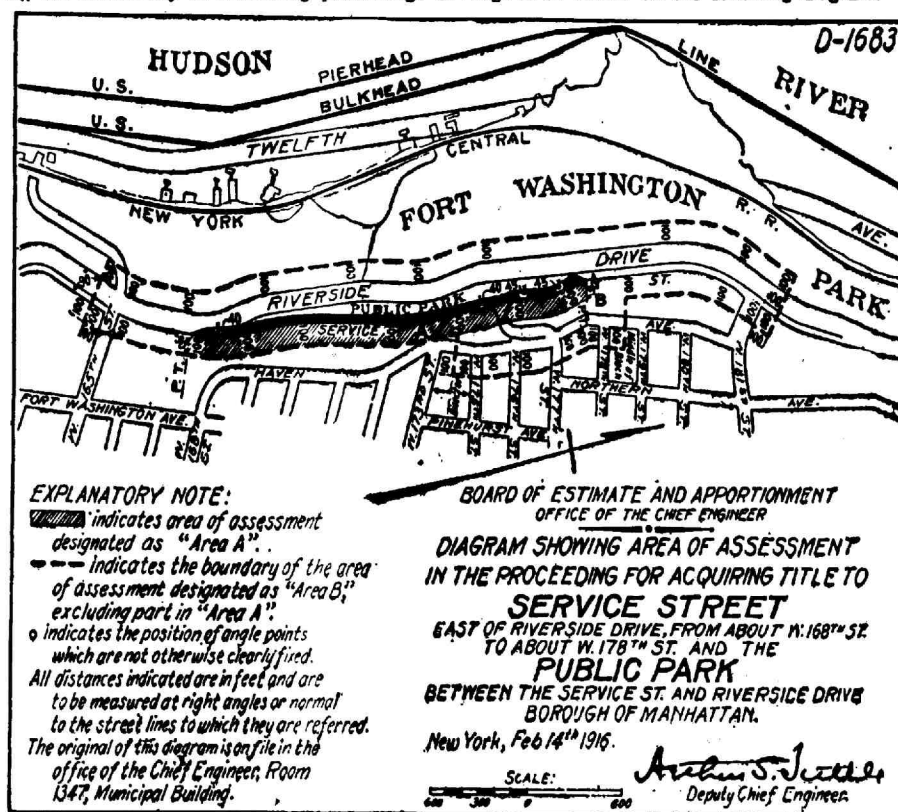

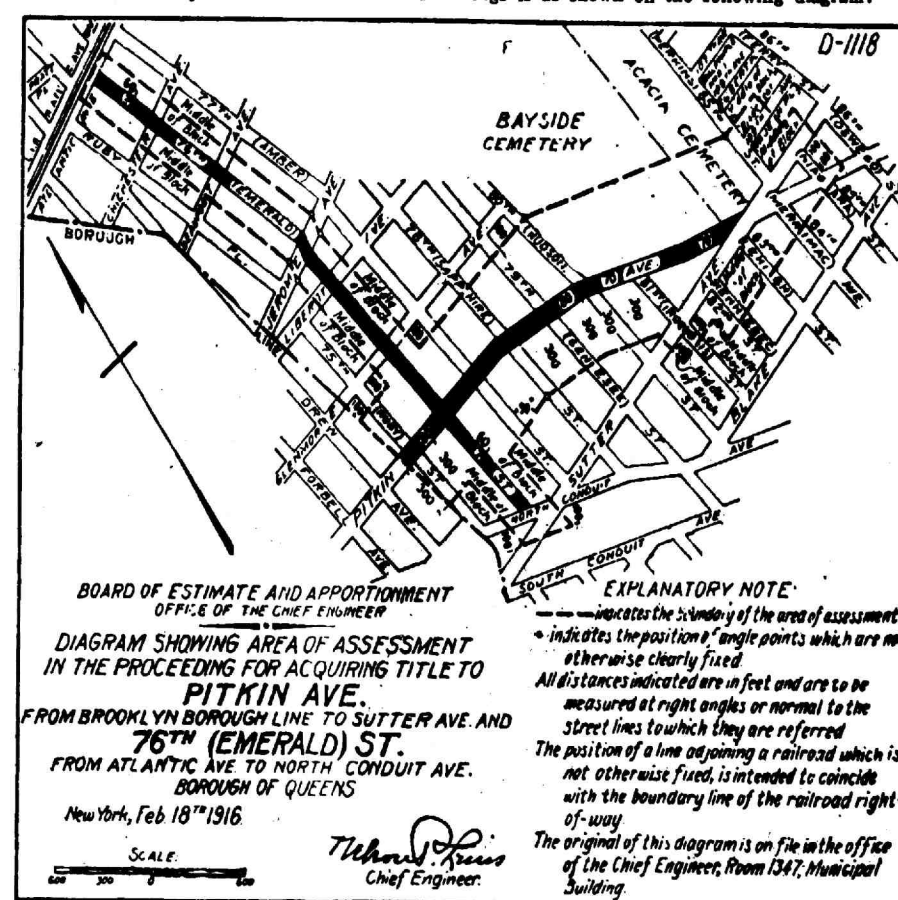
