#### SANITARY BUREAU.

##### Summary of Work.

The following is a summary of the operations of the Sanitary Bureau, which is charged with the duty of inspecting and reporting in proper form all nuisances or causes of danger to the public health, with the execution of the orders of the Board, and with the care of contagious diseases, for the quarter ending March 31, 1886:

The number of inspections made by the Sanitary Inspectors was 66,272.

The number of causes of complaint returned was 4,411.

The number of complaints received from citizens was 2,548, all of which were referred to the Sanitary Inspectors for investigation and report.

The Sanitary Superintendent during the same period, under instruction and authority of the Board, granted 485 permits to discharge cargoes, upon proper vouchers from the Health Officer of the Port; 582 permits to scavengers to empty privies; 78 permits to land rags (in bulk) under bonds; and 160 miscellaneous permits under the Sanitary Code.

During the three months ending March 31, 1886, nine thousand and eighty-two (9,082) permits were granted for burials. During the same period one hundred and seventy-nine (179) applications for transit permits were received and permits granted; seven hundred and fifty-three (753) permits were granted for the burial of still-born children; one thousand and forty-five (1,045) Coroners' certificates were received and recorded; one thousand five hundred and forty-seven (1,547) searches of the records of births, marriages and deaths were made; and nine hundred and ninety-seven (997) transcripts of the records of deaths, one hundred and eight (108) of marriages, and ninety-eight (98) of births from said records were issued. There were five thousand six hundred and sixty (5,660) persons registered as married during the quarter, and eight thousand and nineteen (8,019) children were born during the same period.

## OFFICE OF THE SECRETARY—NOTICES OF THE BOARD.

The notices of the Board for the abatement of nuisances are issued upon the facts and evidence contained in the written reports of the Sanitary Inspectors, the result of personal inspection of premises complained of. During the three months ending March 31, 1886, the number of notices issued by the Board was 3,229. These notices call the attention of owners, lessees, and agents to violation of the Sanitary Code in each case, and require the necessary alteration, repair, cleaning, and improvement of the premises named within five days from the receipt of the notice. If, upon re-inspection, it is found that the requirements of the notice have not been complied with, a suit for penalty is commenced against the delinquents under section 82, chapter 335, Laws of 1873.

## AQUEDUCT COMMISSION.

Minutes of Stated Meeting of the Aqueduct Commissioners, held at their office, No. 209 Stewart Building, on Wednesday, May 12, 1886, at 3 o'clock P. M.

Present—The Mayor, Comptroller, Commissioner of Public Works, Commissioners Spencer, Dowd, and Baldwin.

Also, Chief Engineer Church, and Chief Engineer Birdsall and Consulting Engineer Adams of the Department of Public Works.

The minutes of the stated meeting of May 5 were read and approved.

The Committee of Finance and Audit reported their examination and audit of the monthly estimates for work done by the contractors upon the New Aqueduct during the month of April, included in Vouchers Nos. 1689 to 1702, and amounting to \$316,197.23; also their examination and audit of bills included in Vouchers Nos. 1703 and 1709.

On motion of Commissioner Dowd, all of said vouchers were approved by the Commissioners and ordered certified to the Comptroller for payment.

The Committee on Construction submitted a communication from the Division Engineer of the Seventh Division to the Chief Engineer, in relation to auxiliary offices, which the Chief Engineer and the Committee recommended should be procured.

On motion of Commissioner Spencer it was

Resolved, That the Chief Engineer is hereby authorized to rent the office near High Bridge, referred to by Division Engineer Wogmann in his report to the Chief Engineer, dated May 8, at the rate of \$15 per month, and to have built, at One Hundred and Forty-ninth street and Convent avenue, a temporary office, at a cost not to exceed \$250.

In compliance with so much of the resolutions adopted by the Aqueduct Commissioners on the 5th instant, as refer to the new gate-house at One Hundred and Thirty-fifth street and Convent avenue in this city, the Commissioner of Public Works, under date of May 11, 1886, submitted general plans (Exhibit, J J) for said gate-house, and an estimate of the cost thereof; the specifications for its construction to be similar to those for the new gate-house at Croton Dam.

On motion of the Comptroller, the said plans and estimate were referred to the Chief Engineer for examination and report.

The Comptroller, under date of May 8, 1886, gave notice of the issue of warrants for vouchers not certified by the Aqueduct Commissioners; for the following awards made by the Commissioners of Appraisal for lands taken for the New Aqueduct in the Twenty-fourth Ward of this city, viz.:

To James M. McLean, Parcels 76, 76½.....	\$220 23

The notice was ordered placed upon file and entered upon the books of this Commission.

The Secretary submitted a request from General Greene, Chairman of the Board of Examining Engineers, that the original reports of the Division and Assistant Engineers to the Engineer of Construction be produced before them, and on motion of the Mayor, the Secretary was directed to obtain said reports, and submit them to said Board.

The Secretary reported, verbally, the result of the conference had by him, under direction of the Commissioners, with the Counsel to the Corporation, upon the subject of the claims of Mr. Joseph P. Disbrow, and the advice of said Counsel that the said claims be remitted to the Commissioners of Appraisal for adjustment.

Thereupon Commissioner Dowd moved a reconsideration of the following resolution, adopted by the Commissioners at their meeting of April 28, 1886, viz.:

Resolved, That the sum of twelve hundred dollars (\$1,200) be and the same is hereby awarded to Joseph P. Disbrow as compensation for the damages done to his dwelling-house by blasting in the Aqueduct tunnel through his lands in the Twenty-fourth Ward of this City, and that said amount be certified to the Comptroller for payment to said Disbrow, it being understood that his acceptance thereof is without prejudice to his rights as to other matters for which he claims compensation.

The motion for reconsideration was unanimously adopted.

On motion of the Mayor, it was then unanimously

Resolved, That under the advice of the Counsel to the Corporation, the claims presented to this Commission by Joseph P. Disbrow, Esq., for compensation for the easement in perpetuity required for the New Aqueduct upon his lands (Parcel 72) in the Twenty-fourth Ward of this City, and for damages inflicted upon his property during the construction of said Aqueduct, be and the same are hereby referred to the Commissioners of Appraisal for adjustment, and the Secretary is hereby directed to notify the Counsel of this action of the Aqueduct Commissioners, and to cancel Voucher No. 1680, approved by the Commissioners, May 5, 1886, and to furnish to said Commissioners of Appraisal all the information in possession of this Commission in relation to the aforesaid claims.

The Chief Engineer made report, dated 5th instant, upon proposed changes in the location of the New Aqueduct at Shaft Site, No. 8, the north cut at the Pocantico river, and submitted diagrams showing said changes.

After discussion of the several changes practicable, the Chief Engineer was directed to have surveys, maps and plans made, showing exactly the modification to be made in the location of the Aqueduct at that place, and to submit said maps and plans to the Commissioners at as early date as practicable.

A letter, dated May 10, 1886, was received from Mrs. Mary A. Walker, remonstrating against the proposed building, by the Contractors, of a powder-house upon her property near Shaft 23, in the Twenty-fourth Ward; which matter was referred to the Chief Engineer.

Upon motion of Commissioner Spencer, the Commissioners resumed consideration of the report of the Committee on Construction, of May 5, 1886, upon proposed changes in the work at Shafts 25 and 26, upon Section 12 of the New Aqueduct; in connection with which subject Division Engineer Wogmann, by direction of the Chief Engineer, had prepared maps and estimates which were submitted and explained to the Commissioners.

The Commissioners directed further surveys, maps and plans to be made, for submission by the Commissioner of Public Works and consideration by them at the earliest date practicable. Meanwhile action upon the said report was deferred.

The Commissioners then adjourned.

or Lackawanna, to weigh 2,000 pounds to the ton, and be  
well screened and free from slate.

All of the coal is to be delivered at the various houses,
