

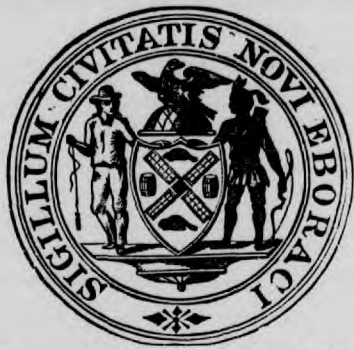

NEW YORK, July 9, 1878.

The Board of Health met this day.

#### Reports Received.

From the Sanitary Superintendent—On operations of the Sanitary Bureau; on contagious diseases; on slaughter houses; on work performed by Disinfecting Corps; on application for permits; weekly report from Riverside Hospital; on work of Visiting Corps; on condition of rescuing apparatus; quarterly report of work performed by Vaccinating Corps; on certain street pavements, etc.; on application of Mr. J. Bowers for leave of absence; on sanitary condition of nine shanties, situated east side of Third avenue, south of One Hundred and Seventh street.

#### Reports referred to other Departments.

To the Comptroller—On condition of sidewalk and street gutter in front of 180 Clinton street.

To Department Public Parks—On condition of receiving basin at northeast corner Third avenue and One Hundred and Seventieth street, and street crossing at corner Fulton avenue and One Hundred and Seventieth street.

To the Department of Public Works—On street pavements in front of 314 West Thirty-sixth street; in Christie street, between Broome and Grand streets; in Water street, between Corlears and Jackson streets; in Sheriff street, between Delancey and Rivington streets; on receiving basin at northwest corner Corlears and Water street; on sewer culvert at northeast corner Fifth avenue and Eighty-fourth street; receiving basin corner Houston street and Avenue C; receiving basin corner Corlears and Water streets.

#### Resolutions.

Resolved, That the Secretary of the Board respectfully call the attention of the District Attorney to the fact that the manufacture of fertilizers on Newtown creek with sludge acid has been continued, especially by Clark and Clark & Reed, and often at night; that the reports of Inspectors Goldschmidt and Brennan show that within the last two weeks the manufacture at Clark's factory has been the same, and the nuisance therefrom similar to that proved in the month of May, and that unless Clark and Clark & Reed, on Newtown creek, stop using sludge acid the east side nuisance will be likely to prevail during the summer. This Board is satisfied that at Clark's factory the nuisance is continued, and has not been abated.

Resolved, That the Consulting Architect be requested to examine some of the plans of tenement houses recently filed in Department of Buildings, and report to this Board at its next meeting whether they comply in all particulars with the Tenant House Act.

Resolved, That the Department of Public Works be respectfully requested, for sanitary reasons, to flush the gutters with Croton water, so far as possible, during the summer months, with particular reference to keeping the street culvert basins filled with water.

Resolved, That the Sanitary Superintendent be and is hereby authorized and directed to repair the rescuing apparatus at an expense not to exceed \$50.

Resolved, That Orders 2641, 2642, and 2643, on premises south side of One Hundred and Twenty-seventh street, east of Madison avenue, be and is hereby suspended indefinitely.

Resolved, That Order 2200, on premises 68 Oliver street, be and is hereby suspended during the pleasure of the Board, provided the owner stipulates to keep the premises disinfected and in an inoffensive condition.

Resolved, That Order 4873 on premises 56 and 58 East Fifty-sixth street be and is hereby extended until October 1, 1878.

Resolved, That Order 5466 and 5467 on premises 52 Frankfort street and No. 1 Vandewater street be and are hereby rescinded.

Resolved, That leave of absence of two weeks from the 15th instant be and is hereby granted to M. J. Bowers.

Resolved, That Dr. Geo. Hart be and is hereby appointed an Assistant Sanitary Inspector for temporary service in the inspection of tenement houses with particular reference to the care and attendance of sick children therein; that such service continue for five weeks, and that the amount to be paid for such service for that period be \$100.

Resolved, That the services of Samuel A. Goldschmidt, Ph. D., be and are hereby continued or one month.

Whereas, The Sanitary Superintendent has certified to this Board that the nine buildings situated on the east side of Third avenue south of One Hundred and Ninth street, New York city, have become dangerous to life by reason of want of repair,

Ordered, That all persons in said buildings situated on the east side of Third avenue south of One Hundred and Seventh street, New York city, be required to vacate said buildings on or before July 19, 1878, for the reason that said buildings are dangerous to life by reason of want of repair; and further that this order be affixed conspicuously on the front of said buildings, and be served as the law requires under the direction of the Sanitary Superintendent, and further that said buildings be not again used as human habitations without a written permit from this Board.

Resolved, That the Register of Records be and is hereby authorized and directed to register the following birth and marriage returns:

#### Sanitary Bureau.

The following is a record of the work performed in the Sanitary Bureau for the week ending July 6, 1878:

The total number of inspections made by the Sanitary and Assistant Sanitary Inspectors was 1,488, as follows, viz.: 3 public buildings, 647 tenement houses, 154 private dwellings, 44 other dwellings, 12 manufactories and workshops, 9 stores and warehouses, 44 stables, 37 slaughter-houses, 1 bone and rag house, 2 uninhabitable dwellings, 4 public sewers, 16 fat-rendering establishments, 1

lime kiln, 7 manure dumps, 1 garbage dump, 1 oil works, 1 pond, 5 soap factories, 1 tripe establishment, 35 sunken and vacant lots, 50 yards, courts, and areas, 36 cellars and basements, 85 waste pipes and drains, 160 privies and water closets, 33 streets, gutters, and sidewalks, 3 dangerous stairways, 6 cesspools, 2 piggeries, 4 smoky chimneys, 1 fertilizing works, 2 glycerine works, 1 stock yard, 19 other nuisances, together with 62 visits of the Sanitary Inspectors to cases of contagious disease.

The number of reports thereon received from the Inspectors was 614.

During the past week 245 complaints were received from citizens, and referred to the Sanitary and Assistant Sanitary Inspectors for investigation and report.

Permits were issued to the consignees of 97 vessels to discharge cargoes, on vouchers from the Health Officer of the port.

81 permits were granted to scavengers to empty, clean, and disinfect privy-sinks.

The Disinfecting Corps have visited 48 dwellings where contagious diseases were found, and have disinfected and fumigated 47 houses, 47 privy-sinks, together with clothing, bedding, etc.

One person sick with measles was removed to Hospital.

The following is a comparative statement of cases of contagious disease reported at this Bureau for the two weeks ending July 6, 1878:

665 deaths were reported to have occurred in this city during the week ending Saturday, July 6, 1878. This is an increase of 111 as compared with the preceding week, but is 8 less than the number reported for the corresponding week of last year. The actual mortality for the week ending June 29, was 606, as follows:

This represents an annual death-rate of 29.09 in every 1,000 inhabitants, the population estimated at 1,083,256.

The number of deaths reported during the week, of children under five years of age, was 400, or 60.15 per cent. of the total, and from diarrhoeal diseases, 184, showing an increase compared with the mortality of the preceding week, of the former, of 116, and of the latter of 83; the number of deaths in tenement-houses increased 58; in houses containing 3 families and less, 45; and in institutions, 3. Ten deaths were caused by the direct effects of heat, and 8 by drowning. The following diseases also increased in fatality during the past compared with the previous week, viz.: erysipelas, 2; typhoid fever, 3; cerebro-spinal fever, 1; puerperal diseases, 3; inanition, 7; cancer, 8; phthisis, 3; bronchitis, 6; diseases of the nervous system 26; cirrhosis and hepatitis, 1; enteritis, gastritis, and peritonitis, 5; Bright's diseases and nephritis, 2; cyanosis and aeteciasis, 7; while scarlatina decreased, 5; diphtheria, 6; croup, 3; whooping-cough, 1; malarial fever, 1; alcoholism, 1; rheumatism and gout, 1; pneumonia, 6; heart diseases, 12; hydrocephalus and tubercular meningitis, 3; premature and pretermatural births, 3.

Of the 400 children under 5 years of age that died in this city during the week, 6 were in the First Ward, 8 in the Fourth, 5 in the Fifth, 8 in the Sixth, 17 in the Seventh, 15 in the Eighth, 14 in the Ninth, 25 in the Tenth, 24 in the Eleventh, 33 in the Twelfth, 12 in the Thirteenth, 10 in the Fourteenth, 6 in the Fifteenth, 16 in the Sixteenth, 25 in the Seventeenth, 11 in the Eighteenth, 52 in the Nineteenth, 42 in the Twentieth, 20 in the Twenty-first, 47 in the Twenty-second, 3 in the Twenty-third, and 1 in the Twenty-fourth. Of the total number of deaths reported for the week, 84 were in institutions, 367 in tenement houses, 197 in houses containing 3 families or less, 4 in hotels and boarding houses, 12 in rivers, streets, boats, etc.; 14 were on the basement floor, 141 were on the first floor, 173 on the second, 140 on the third, 77 on the fourth, 23 on the fifth. All the deaths reported for the week were of residents of New York City. 46 were stated to be single, 133 married, 51 widowed, and the condition of 435 was not stated, these were children who had not attained a marriageable age.

The disposition of 663 deaths and still-births, or 92.21 per cent. of the total number reported, was in the following 14 cemeteries: Bayside (Jewish), 17; Calvary (Roman Catholic), 283; City (pauper burial-ground, undenominational), 72; Greenwood (undenominational), 56; Lutheran (undenominational), 111; Cypress Hills (undenominational), 16; Evergreen (undenominational), 41; Woodlawn (undenominational), 18; St. Michael's (Protestant Episcopal), 20; Union (Methodist Protestant), 4; Holy Cross (Roman Catholic), 6; Machpelah, L. I. (Jewish), 5; St. Raymond's (Roman Catholic), 6; Washington (undenominational), 8.

The distribution of deaths for the week ending June 29, was in the following wards, viz.: First, 7; Second, 0; Third, 7; Fourth, 14; Fifth, 16; Sixth, 6; Seventh, 29; Eighth, 18; Ninth, 15; Tenth, 40; Eleventh, 33; Twelfth, 49; Thirteenth, 12; Fourteenth, 9; Fifteenth, 19; Sixteenth, 20; Seventeenth, 46; Eighteenth, 22; Nineteenth, 78; Twentieth, 46; Twenty-first, 40; Twenty-second, 67; Twenty-third, 9; Twenty-fourth, 4.

The mean temperature for the week ending July 6, was 81.4 degrees Fahr., the mean reading of the barometer was 29.938, the mean humidity was 64, saturation being 100, the number of miles traveled by the wind was 560, and there was no rain-fall during the week, as reported by D. Draper, Director of the N. Y. Meteorological Observatory, Central Park.

The annual death-rate per 1,000 persons living, of the estimated or enumerated population, according to the most recent weekly returns of Philadelphia, was 19.62, Brooklyn 20.93, St. Louis 14.14, Chicago 12.05, Baltimore 26.22, Boston 20.21, Cincinnati 15.27, New Orleans 26, Cleveland, 14.44, Richmond 24.82, Charleston 49.06, Lowell 16.73, Worcester 17.68, Cambridge 12.26, Fall River 15.86, Lawrence 11.58, Lynn 18.96, Springfield 11.59—monthly returns—Providence 15.36, Elmira 12.85, Chattanooga, Tenn. 21, Minneapolis 16.20, Plattsburgh, N. Foreign Cities—weekly returns—London 20.3, Liverpool 26, Birmingham 22.3, Manchester 24.8, Glasgow 26, Edinburgh 20, Dundee 20, Dublin 22.5, Belfast 34, Cork 18, Brussels 18, Antwerp 20.7, Ghent 15.3, Buda-Pesth 36.8, Paris 22.8, Venice 26.2, Berlin 37, Munich 39, Breslau 32.33, Vienna 31.3, Trieste 26.4, Copenhagen 22.5, Stockholm 19.4, Christiania 14.9, Amsterdam 25.3, Rotterdam 26.6, The Hague 28.1, Bombay 40.7, Geneva (with suburbs) 22.8, Basel 22, Bern 25.4, Warsaw 43.22, St. Petersburg 48.21—monthly return—Montreal 30, Hamburg (State) 27.49.

During the week ending July 6, 1878, there were issued from this Bureau 665 burial permits for city deaths, 15 for bodies in transitu, and 54 for the interment of still-born infants. There were recorded 665 deaths, 143 marriages, 332 births, 54 still-births, 15 applications for transit permits, and 67 returns from coroners. There were 28 searches of the registers of births, marriages, and deaths, and 2 transcripts of marriage record, and 26 of death were issued from this Bureau.

APPLICATIONS FOR EXEMPTIONS WILL BE heard here, from 9 to 4 daily, from all persons hitherto liable or recently serving who have become exempt, and all needed information will be given.

Those who have not answered as to their liability, or proved permanent exemption, will receive a "jury enrollment notice," requiring them to appear before me this year. Whether liable or not, such notices must be answered (in person, if possible, and at this office only) under severe penalties. If exempt, the party must bring proof of exemption; if liable, he must also answer in person, giving full and correct name, residence, etc., etc. No attention paid to letters.

Persons "enrolled" as liable must serve when called or pay their fines. No mere excuse will be allowed or interference permitted. The fines, received from those who, for business or other reasons, are unable to serve at the time selected, pay the expenses of this office, and if unpaid will be entered as judgments upon the property of the delinquents.

All good citizens will aid the course of justice, and secure reliable and respectable juries, and equalize their duty by serving promptly when summoned, allowing their clerks or subordinates to serve, reporting to me any attempt at bribery or evasion, and suggesting names for enrollment. Persons between sixty and seventy years of age, summer absentees, persons temporarily ill, and United States and District Court jurors are not exempt.

Every man must attend to his own notice. It is a misdemeanor to give any jury paper to another to answer. It is also punishable by fine or imprisonment to give or receive any present or bribe, directly or indirectly, in relation to a jury service, or to withhold any paper or make any false statement, and every case will be fully prosecuted.
