The Vice-President laid before the Board the following communication from the Street Cleaning Department:

SEPTEMBER 20, 1892.

Hon. HUGH J. GRANT, Mayor, and Chairman of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment:

SIR—In pursuance of the provisions of section 189 of the New York City Consolidation Act of 1882, and in compliance with request of August 9, 1892, the Commissioner of Street Cleaning has the honor to forward for your consideration the following estimate of the amount required for properly conducting the business of the Department of Street Cleaning for the coming year of 1893. This estimate is prepared on the basis of chapters 269 and 415 of the Laws of 1892, known as the "Advisory Committee's New Street Cleaning Laws," intended for the purpose of the reorganization of this department. Details of such Departmental Estimate, with explanations, are as follows:

The additional six District Superintendents, one Time Collector, eight Section Foremen, ten Assistant Dump Inspectors, seven Stable Foremen, twenty tug and Scow Inspectors, one Superintendent of Incumbrances, etc., are included under "Administration," in conformity with chapters 269 and 415, Laws of 1892.

It is respectfully submitted that the city is now divided into eleven districts, each under the direct supervision of a District Superintendent, who is responsible for the cleanly condition of the streets, avenues, etc., within the same, and also for the proper collection and removal of ashes and garbage therein. There are fifty-eight "sections" or street cleaning districts throughout the city, over which the same number of foremen officiate, and these foremen are responsible for the condition of their sections to the District Superintendents, who in turn are responsible to the Commissioner through the General Superintendent.

The Medical Examiners and the additional Clerks, etc., asked for are necessary to carry into effect the provisions of the Advisory Committee's new street cleaning bills above mentioned.

SWEEPING THE STREETS.

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EXTRA HIRED CARTS.

On account of the uncertainty and delay in leasing the additional stables required by the Department, it is impossible to estimate as to the length of time the Department will be compelled to use a sufficient number of hired carts to perform the work that will be done by the Department carts after such stables are in the possession of the Commissioner of Street Cleaning. Up to the present time I have purchased the number of horses, carts, harness, etc., that the stables at present in the possession of the Department could accommodate. It will be my agreeable duty to procure, with the consent of your Honorable Board, additional horses, carts, etc., to complete the departmental plant to be owned by the City and to be used for the purposes of this Department as soon as the stables are provided. In the meantime it will be necessary for me to use, from the amount allowed for carting and care of horses, etc., a sufficient part thereof to pay for the use of such hired carts as may be necessary.

REMOVAL OF SNOW AND ICE.

Amount required (chapters 269 and 415, Laws of 1892) \$40,000 00

This is \$30,000 less than the amount asked from your Honorable Board for 1892, and will probably be sufficient for this purpose for the coming year.

The amount asked for on account of Final Disposition, as appears in the above items, is based on the increase in the quantity of material collected compared with previous years, and also from the fact that the tugs and scows of the Department, on account of long usage, are in constant need of repairs, entailing continual expense to the City, and also hindrances to the final disposition of ashes and garbage, etc. The two tugs "Municipal" and "Dassori" have been in the Departmental service for some thirteen years, and are at present in a condition causing them to be at times almost useless to perform the service for which they were intended. On this account some of the items under the heading of "Final Disposition" have had to be increased. The city now receives for the privilege of scow trimming \$92,310.40 per year, the largest amount ever received from that source.

I feel it my duty to state to your Honorable Board that, in my judgment, it would be advantageous to the municipality, as also to the administration of this Department, if the final disposition of material could be effected by contract, under proper restriction and superintendence.

I beg leave to call your attention to a communication received by me from Mr. Charles P. Anderson, Superintendent of Tugs and Scows of this Department, in which he explains the increased cost for towing and hiring of scows, as also the poor condition of the Departmental plant used for final disposition:

NEW YORK, September 19, 1892.

Hon. THOMAS S. BRENNAN, Commissioner, etc.:

SIR—In answer to your request for an explanation of the increase of expenditures for final disposition in this Department for the year 1892, I would respectfully state:

Last winter we were unloading deck scows at Haverstraw, Newark Bay and Harlem river. The cold weather stole upon us very suddenly, freezing in several scows at Newark Bay, Haverstraw and Yonkers, which deprived us of the use of same for nearly a month, and our boats were frequently blocked up in our slips around the city, and tugs had to be hired at different times to cut them out. In order to get light scows under the boards we were deprived of an inland place to unload our deck scows, which compelled us to send them all to sea whenever the weather permitted. This combination of circumstances necessitated the hiring of outside scows, of which at one time we had as many as forty-five, all loaded up at the several dumps, as we could not get more than two or three tugs out in a week. We had to send all our boats to sea since the first of July, it costing about twenty dollars more per scow to send them to sea than to inland places, and we are sending on an average daily six scows to sea, which alone cost the Department about one hundred and twenty dollars per day. With the increase of population, under your management as Commissioner I am sure we are removing more refuse than was ever known in the Department. I would like to draw your attention, in addition, to the fact that the plant owned by the City is getting old and worn out and needs continual repairing. The tug "Dassori" was built in 1879; the tug "Municipal" in 1880, and the Department business compelling them to work night and day, which would amount to twenty years' service. They are not staunch enough for our work, as it needs larger boats. The cost of keeping them in repair will amount to considerable, as three thousand dollars might be expended on each of them now to put them in condition for the winter's work, and I can say the same of the deck scows, which also are getting old and will require considerable money to keep them in repair. I have eight or ten now that need immediate repairs which will amount to from two to five hundred dollars each. I think this estimate will be sufficient evidence of increase of expenditures for 1892.

The new street cleaning laws contain provisions for the employment of eleven Stable Foremen from which it is evident that it was intended that the Commissioner of Street Cleaning shall, with the consent and approval of the Honorable Board of Sinking Fund Commissioners, as soon as is practicable, lease the additional stables, at convenient and suitable locations, so that the system may be thorough and efficient as was anticipated by the Mayor's Advisory Committee. I have embraced in above the rentals for seven new stables, which, in addition to the four we now have, will complete the organization of the Department in this particular respect.

There was also allowed, in addition to above, for the latter months of 1892, in conformity with the provisions of chapters 269 and 415, Laws of 1892, the amount in aggregate of \$187,815.35, making the total appropriation as follows:

In the foregoing figures I have included the five per cent. annual increase allowed by the new street cleaning laws as applied to Sweepers, Drivers and Hostlers, which necessarily enlarges the total amount asked for, but would respectfully state that it is entirely with the discretion of your Honorable Board as to whether these additional sums should be expended.

It is a reasonable conclusion that with the annual increase of men allowed by law added to the regular force for the coming year of 1893, a greater efficiency will prevail in regard to the daily sweeping of the streets and avenues, particularly in emergencies (should any arise) such as the one in regard to Asiatic cholera, now happily passing away, during which I deemed it advisable to have several of the down town streets swept three or four times each day, and also resorted to the method of "flushing" the same, as an additional precaution, on which account it was necessary to employ an extra force of men, as such was absolutely needed.

It will be perceived that the increase in the several parts of the appropriation as asked for are in consequence of the new street cleaning laws as applied to the item of administration in adding to the supervisory force; to sweeping, in allowing 1,500 sweepers with an addition each year of five per cent.; in carting, by allowing 750 Drivers and 88 Hostlers, with five per cent. added each year; as also shoeing and feeding of 950 horses, additional mechanics and helpers at new stables, and the extra time allowed to Drivers.

The increase in the items of Final Disposition as above related, are principally caused by the dilapidated condition of the tugs and scows belonging to the Department, on account of the length of time they have been employed and the extraordinary service performed by them. The heavy increase in the quantity of material disposed of is also to be considered.

Under New Stock, it will be well to consider that the amount therein asked for is nearly \$200,000, to be applied to purchasing the balance of the complete plant for the Department, when the city will then become the owner of such entire equipment.

The increase of amount under Rentals and Contingencies is in conformity to provisions and intention of "Advisory Committee's" new street cleaning laws, which embraced the leasing of eleven stables in advantageous and convenient locations throughout the city.

Resolved, That under the power conferred by law upon the Health Department, the following additional amendment of the Sanitary Code for the security of life and health be and the same is hereby adopted and declared to form a portion of the Sanitary Code:

Resolved, That section 141 of the Sanitary Code be and is hereby amended so as to read as follows:

Section 141. That no master, charterer, owner, part owner or consignee of any vessel, or any other person, shall bring to any dock, pier, wharf, or building within one thousand feet thereof, in said city, or unload at any dock, building, or pier therein, or have on storage in the built-up portions of said city, any skins, hides, rags, or similar articles or materials, having been brought from any foreign country or any infected place, or from any points south of Norfolk, Virginia, without or otherwise than according to written permit so to do from this Department; and no person shall sell, exchange, remove, or in any way make exposure of any straw, bedding, or other articles used by immigrants, upon any vessel bringing immigrants to this port until it has been adequately and properly cleansed or disinfected, and all straw bedding, or other articles that have been exposed on any vessel to contagion or infection of any contagious disease, or have been or are liable to communicate such disease, shall be destroyed by fire on said vessel.

A communication from Consulting Pathologist Biggs, in respect to disinfectants and their uses, was received and approved.

The 718 deaths represent a death-rate of 20.38, against 20.62 for the previous week, and 22.72 for the corresponding week of 1891.

The number of deaths was only slightly smaller than in the previous week. The main changes were an increase of 10 in the deaths from phthisis, of 5 from pneumonia, and of 19 from

diseases of the nervous system, and a decrease of 32 in deaths from diarrhoeal diseases, and of 6 from heart diseases.

The deaths from diphtheria were most numerous in the Nineteenth Ward, from measles in the Eleventh and Twelfth Wards, and from scarlet fever the deaths were one each in the Seventh, Tenth, Seventeenth and Twentieth Wards.
