DEAR SIR—In compliance with your instructions I hand you herewith a report of the transactions of the Department of Sewers, Borough of Manhattan, for the quarter ending December 31, 1900.

3,794 linear feet of sewer and 7 basins connecting therewith have been built, making the present total length of the sewerage of this borough, 2,611,377 linear feet (494.57 miles), with 5,939 basins, which number includes one built under special contract as hereafter stated.

In the schedule accompanying this report you will find a detailed statement showing the status of the several contracts under charge of this Department.

Four sewer contracts and 1 basin contract have been completed, viz. :

Sewer in Eighty-fourth street, between East End avenue and East river.

Sewer in One Hundred and Twenty-fifth street, north side, between Third and Lexington

Report of Work done in the Construction Bureau of the Department of Sewers, Borough of The Bronx, during the Quarter ending December 31, 1900.

The total length of sewers constructed in the Borough of The Bronx, at the close of the quarter ending December 31, 1900, is 875,992.47 linear feet or 165.908 miles, being divided as follows: 831,234.1 linear feet or 157.431 miles in the regular "Combined System" according to filed District Drainage Maps for the Twenty-third and Twenty-fourth Wards, west of the Bronx river, and 44,758.37 linear feet or 6.477 miles in the "Separate System" specially designed for the district east of the Bronx river (or Williamsbridge) previous to annexation.

19,238.38 linear feet or 3.644 miles of sewers were constructed during the quarter (exclusive of district east of Bronx river), being divided into 6,744.2 linear feet or 1.277 miles of brick sewer and 12,494.16 linear feet or 2.367 miles of pipe sewers.

The total number of receiving-basins (west of Bronx river) is 1,978, twenty-one (21) having been constructed during the quarter.

There was no construction work done in the district east of the Bronx river (or Williamsbridge system) during the quarter.

Eighty (80) contracts were in force during the quarter.

Eleven (11) having had final payments made during the quarter.

Twenty-nine (29) being under six months repairs throughout the quarter.

Ten (10) having been completed during the quarter.

One (1) having been begun and completed during the quarter.

Twenty-four (24) being under construction throughout the quarter.

Five (5) having been begun during the quarter.

40 contracts were under construction during the quarter.

DEAR SIR—I submit herewith the operations of the Department of Sewers, Borough of Brooklyn, for the quarter ending December 31, 1900.

As a detailed description of the progress of sewer construction will be given in the annual report, covering all quarters of the year, a short statement only will be given here, including tabular statements, in detail, as to the work performed.

The length of the sewerage system in this borough on December 31, 1900, has been found to be 650,096 miles.

That length, which has been constructed during the quarter, is as shown in the following table:

While this statement shows an actual construction of 4.439 miles, the sewerage system has been increased only 3.725 miles, as new construction has resulted in the abandonment of .714 miles of old sewers.

Fifty-four (54) receiving-basins have been built, while one (1) has been abandoned, giving a net increase of 53 for the quarter and increasing the number connected with the sewerage system to a grand total of 7,799.

Eighty (80) contracts have been in force during the quarter.

Eighteen (18) contracts have been entered into.

Fourteen (14) contracts have been completed in full, and accounts of same closed in the books of the department.

Forty-one (41) contracts are in the status of the guarantee for repair period, a period extending six months after the completion of all work.

Thirty-four (34) contracts have been in the course of construction; of these, thirteen (13) have been completed in construction and placed in guarantee period, giving twenty-one (21) contracts in course of construction at this time.

Two (2) contracts have, as yet, not been commenced.

The report of the Chief Engineer of Sewers, Borough of Brooklyn, also the report of the Superintendent of Sewers, herewith attached, show, in detail, the work accomplished in the construction of sewers and in the maintaining of the existing sewerage system in this borough, respectively.

Hon. JAMES KANE, Commissioner of Sewers, City of New York:

DEAR SIR—I have the honor to transmit herewith, in accordance with section 1544, chapter 378 of the Laws of 1897, for your consideration, a statement of the transactions of the Department of Sewers, Borough of Queens, for the quarter ending December 31, 1900:

The Engineer reports the following work done during the quarter:

- (1) 1,399 linear feet of brick sewer built.
- (2) 899 linear feet of pipe sewer built.
- (3) Plans for sewerage system at Ingleside and South Flushing Park.
- (4) Location of property acquired for erection of disposal plant at Jamaica.

The above-mentioned works under Items Nos. 1 and 2 were performed by Contractor L. R. Clapp, on Flushing avenue, under contract dated September 7, 1900. The amount of the payments on account of this contract to December 31, 1900, amounts to \$8,530.29, leaving a balance of \$26,657.50 with which to complete the work. The work is progressing rather slowly owing to the inadequate force of workmen employed on the job. Numerous complaints have been made to this Department by the residents and property-owners along the line of improvement owing to the torn-up and impassable condition of the thoroughfare. Mr. L. R. Clapp has been repeatedly notified by this Department to proceed with more rapidity to complete his contract and thereby avoid any further complaints or possible suits against the City.

In reference to the above-mentioned Item No. 3, namely, the making of plans for the sewerage system at Ingleside and South Flushing Park, I wish to state that these plans have been prepared, but as the streets and avenues have not been dedicated to the City, nor any Commission appointed to acquire title to same, nothing further can be done in the matter until such title is invested in the City.

In reference to the above-mentioned Item No. 4, relative to the location of property acquired for the erection of the disposal plant at Jamaica, I wish to state that the same has been surveyed and work has commenced cleaning away the brush and timber which is on the property. As soon as this has been completed, the contractor will be notified to commence work, which will probably be about the middle part of January.

Fifth Ward.

In the Fifth Ward of the Borough, petitions have been received and passed by the Local Board of Improvements of the Borough of Queens, for the construction of a trunk sewer through the Boulevard, from Rockaway Park to Norton's creek; also for the erection of a sewage disposal plant to be built, the location of said plant to be at South Arverne. This plant when completed will care for the sewage matter of Rockaway Park, Seaside, Hollands, Hammells, Arverne and Edgemere. The sewers of Far Rockaway have been regularly flushed once a week. By doing this it has prevented any complaints being made, as was the case before this flushing was regularly done.

At the Disposal Works there has been 16,104,067 gallons of sewage matter chemically treated and disposed of. The Engineer has chlorinated eight (8) times. The machinery at the Disposal Works is in good order with the exception of the ejectors and compressors, which need thorough overhauling.

During this quarter forty-nine (49) permits for sewer connections have issued and the sum of four hundred and ninety dollars (\$490) received for same has been turned over to the City Chamberlain.

APPOINTMENT MADE BY THE MAYOR

MARCH 7, 1901.

Thomas F. Reilly, residing at No. 314 West One Hundred and Forty-first street, an Inspector of Common Schools for the Twenty-ninth School District of the boroughs of Manhattan and The Bronx, for the unexpired portion of a term of five years which commenced July 1, 1900.

DEPARTMENT OF DOCKS AND FERRIES.

At a regular meeting of the Board of Docks, held Friday, January 11, 1901, at 2 o'clock P. M. Present—The full Board.

The minutes of the meetings held January 4 and 5, 1901, were approved.

Henry Hoyt, attorney, appeared on behalf of Edward Brady, John Swan and others, and a representative of the Jamaica Bay Yacht Club was also present, protesting against the granting of any permit to Michael Holland to construct a pier at Holland's Station, Jamaica Bay, Borough of Queens. Michael Holland was present and stated that although the pier accommodations now existing at said location were sufficient for his own needs, he desired to construct an additional pier for the purpose of improving his own property thereat. He was informed that the permit would not be granted for the erection of another pier, the same not being intended for commercial purposes.

The following permits were granted, the work to be done under the supervision of the Engineer-in-Chief:

Metropolitan Steamship Company, to remove six piles on the south side of Pier 10, North river, and to replace same with new ones, the work to be kept within existing lines.

Lehigh Valley Railroad Company, to repair Pier, new 56, North river, from time to time when necessary, during the ensuing six months, the work to be kept within existing lines, and at least 24 hours' notice to be given the Engineer-in-Chief before the commencement of any such work.

W. J. Keys, to cut a gangway on the south side of Pier 19, East river, the consent of Robert M. Ferris, the occupant of the pier, to be first obtained.

The Bush Company, Limited, to dredge in front of their property between Thirty-ninth and Forty-first streets, Brooklyn.

The following communications were ordered on file:

From the Corporation Counsel—Transmitting bills of costs in proceedings for the acquisition of water-front property at Pier, old 4, East river, and Pier, new 7, East river, and between Bloomfield and Little West Twelfth streets, on the North river. Chief Clerk directed to draw the necessary requisitions therefor.

From the Department of Parks—Requesting that the Pier at the foot of Bay Ridge avenue, and the other piers along the Shore Drive, in the Borough of Brooklyn, be repaired by this Department.

On motion, the report of the Engineer-in-Chief, stating that access to said piers can only be had across the Drive under special permit from the Department of Parks, and that any repairs to such piers should therefore be made by that Department, was placed on file and the Secretary directed to transmit a copy of the report to the Department of Parks.

From James O'Neill—Agreeing to furnish this Department with legislative bills during the session of 1901 for the sum of \$50.

From E. A. Cruikshank & Company, agents for owners—Requesting an extension of time of thirty days in which to consider the offer of the Board for the purchase of Pier 14, East river. Application granted.

From the New York Central & Hudson River Railroad Company—Requesting permission to build a temporary bulkhead shed south of Pier, new 34, East river, pending the construction of a shed on said pier.

On motion, the application for permission to build a shed on the bulkhead was denied, but permission was granted said company to erect a temporary shed outshore of the bulkhead either on Pier, new 34, East river, or in front of the bulkhead adjoining the south side of said pier; such shed, if constructed, to remain thereat only during the pleasure of the Board, and to be erected under the direction and supervision of the Engineer-in-Chief of this Department.

From the Pennsylvania Railroad Company—Requesting permission to erect an office building and to extend the bulkhead shed north of Pier, new 29, North river.

On motion, the following resolution was adopted:

Resolved, That permission be and hereby is granted the Pennsylvania Railroad Company to erect a shed extending from a point 71 feet 8 inches north of the northerly side of Pier, new 29, North river, and running thence northerly 148 feet 4 inches and extending inshore a distance of 50 feet from the bulkhead-line; said shed to be erected in accordance with plans and specifications to be submitted to and approved by the Engineer-in-Chief of this Department and under his direction and supervision.

From C. H. Mallory & Company—Requesting that dredging be done by this Department in the slips between Piers 20 and 21, East river, to a depth of 25 feet at mean low water. Engineer-in-Chief directed to order the necessary dredging thereat.

From Lawrence, Son & Gerrish—Requesting permission to dredge in front of the bulkhead westerly of the westerly side of Cherry street, East river, and that dredging be done by this Department to a depth of 25 feet at mean low water in front of the bulkhead at the foot of said street.

On motion, the permission requested was granted, the work to be done under the direction and supervision of the Engineer-in-Chief; and the Engineer-in-Chief was directed to order the necessary dredging at the foot of said street.

From William D. Porter—Requesting that the islands now existing in front of the ferry-houses along the North river, be repaired, and that additional islands be placed in front of the Barclay, Chambers, Desbrosses and Christopher Street Ferry-houses. Engineer-in-Chief directed to repair the existing islands and to place new ones where necessary.

From the Portchester Transportation Company, C. H. Holmes and the North and East River Steamboat Company—Requesting that the string-piece on the north side of Pier, new 32, East river, be cut in order to provide gangway accommodations for their steamers.
