

Hon. JAMES KANE, Commissioner of Sewers:

DEAR SIR-In compliance with your instructions I hand you herewith a report of the transactions of the Department of Sewers, Borough of Manhattan, for the quarter ending December

31, 1920.

3,794 linear feet of sewer and 7 basins connecting therewith have been built, making the present total length of the sewerage of this borough, 2,611,377 linear feet (494.57 miles), with 5,939 basins, which number includes one built under special contract as hereafter stated.

In the schedule accompanying this report you will find a detailed statement showing the status of the several contracts under charge of this Department.

Four sewer contracts and I basin contract have been completed, viz.:

Sewer in Eighty fourth street, between East End avenue and East river.

Sewer in One Hundred and Twenty-fifth street, north side, between Third and Lexington avenues, and south side, between Third and Park avenues.

Sewer in One Hundred and Sixty-fifth street, between Fort Washington avenue and Broadway, and in Broadway, west side, between One Hundred and Sixty-fifth and One Hundred and

way, and in Broadway, west side, between One Hundred and Sixty-fifth and One Hundred and Seventy-first streets.

Completing unfinished sewer in Seventh avenue, west side, between One Hundred and Forty-second and One Hundred and Forty-third streets, connecting with sewer in One Hundred and Forty-third street.

Receiving-basin southeast corner of One Hundred and Thirtieth street and Seventh avenue.

There are now in progress 18 contracts for new sewers and 1 basin contract, as follows:

Sewer in Two Hundred and Fifth street, between Harlem river and Tenth avenue, etc.

Sewer in Two Hundred and Seventh street, between Harlem river and Tenth avenue, etc.

Sewer in Two Hundred and Ninth street, between Harlem river and Tenth lavenue, etc.

Sewer in Edgecombe road, between One Hundred and Fifty-fifth and One Hundred and Sixty-second streets.

Sewer in West street, between West Eleventh and Horatio streets, etc.

Sewer in Broadway, west side, between One Hundred and Fourteenth and One Hundred and Fifteenth streets.

Sewer in Broadway, west side, between One Hundred and Nineteenth street and summit

Sewer in Broadway, west side, between One Hundred and Fifteenth street and summit north of One Hundred and Sixteenth street.

Sewer in Seventh avenue, east side, between Harlem river and One Hundred and Fifty-third
