After hearing A. C. Hottenroth, Esq., in opposition to the proposed action, and William Victor Goldberger, Esq., and Fritz Lindinger, Esq., in support of the proposition, on motion of the Comptroller, the following resolution was adopted:

PARK, BOUNDED BY LYNCH STREET, FLUSHING, BEDFORD AND LEE AVENUES, BROOKLYN.

The matter of laying out as a public park the property bounded by Flushing avenue, Bedford avenue, Lee avenue and Lynch street, in the Borough of Brooklyn, which was laid over on December 11, 1903, was taken up, and was laid over pending the receipt of report from the Park Commissioner.

SIRS-I am in due receipt of a communication from John H. Mooney, Esq.,

Assistant Secretary to your Board, which is as follows:

"On November 20, 1903, this Board approved plans for an overhead crossing of the tracks of the New York Central and Hudson River Railroad Company at West One Hundred and Seventy-seventh street, in accordance with the provisions of chapter 423 of the Laws of 1903.

"Recently several applications have been received for a reconsideration of the action of November 20, and, in accordance with the action taken by the Board on the 8th inst., I am directed to request that you will advise the Board as to its powers to amend the plans already adopted without further legislation."

In answer to this communication I have to say that there is nothing in the act in guestion which reserves to your Board the power of amendment or modification of

question which reserves to your Board the power of amendment or modification of the plans adopted.

In my opinion, therefore, you have not the power, without further legislation, to amend the plans adopted by you under section 4 of chapter 423 of the Laws of 1903.

Acquiring Land for Widening West Two Hundred and Seventh Street, MANHATTAN.

Honorable Board of Estimate and Apportionment of The City of New York:

Gentlemen—At a meeting of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, held March 25, 1904, a resolution was passed changing the map or plan of The City of New York by widening Two Hundred and Seventh street, in the Borough of Manhattan, between Ninth avenue and River street.

This widening is necessary in connection with the proposed Fordham Heights Bridge, the building of which has already begun, and the land in question should be in possession of this Department by the 1st day of July, 1904.

The two parcels of land are described as follows:

### Parcel A.

Sir-In the accompanying letter from the Commissioner of Bridges, dated April 13, 1904, the Board of Estimate and Apportionment is requested to initiate proceedings for the acquisition of the land necessary to widen Two Hundred and Seventh street, between Ninth avenue and River avenue, in the Borough of Manhattan.

This street was widened by the resolution of the Board of Estimate and Apportion-

This street was widehed by the resolution of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment adopted on March 25, 1904, by adding ten feet to each side, for this one block. The object of the widening was to permit of the construction of a new bridge across the Harlem river, known as Fordham Heights Bridge, and the Department of Bridges is preparing to make a contract and proceed with this work.

The approach to the bridge will occupy the central portion of the street, and until it is widehed there will not be room for local business at the sides of the approach.

It is recommended that the Corporation Counsel be authorized to apply for the appointment of Commissioners of Estimate and Assessment for this purpose, and that the entire expense of the proceeding be borne by the City at large, it being in no way a local improvment, but a change which is necessitated by the construction of an improvement bridge. portant bridge.

Hon. George B. McClellan, Mayor, Chairman of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment:

Sir—Herewith is submitted a resolution adopted by the Local Board of the Flat-bush District, Borough of Brooklyn, on February 29, 1904, recommending the changing of the grades in the territory bounded by Flatbush avenue, Clarendon road, Albany ave-nue and Avenue I.

This proposed change is recommended principally for the reason that additional covering is needed for the sewers in the streets within the district named. It is also designed to conform with improvements already made.

The changes affect several excepts which have already been payed but I am advised

designed to conform with improvements already made.

The changes affect several streets which have already been paved, but I am advised, upon inquiry, that the proposed new grades will conform with the pavement as laid. In nearly all cases the grades are raised. At four points this raising of grade will amount to five feet; at several other points it will be between four and five feet, while in the majority of cases the change will vary from a few inches to 2½ feet.

The borough authorities appear to have investigated the subject carefully, and it is recommended that the new grades be adopted after the necessary public hearing.

RAILROAD CROSSINGS AT TWELFTH AVENUE, BROOKLYN.

The following communication from the Acting President of the Borough of Brooklyn and report of the Chief Engineer were presented, and the matter was referred to the Corporation Counsel:

Gentlemen—The Local Board of the Bay Ridge District, Borough of Brooklyn, by resolutions adopted March 24, 1904, initiated proceedings for the regulating, grading and the paving of Twelfth avenue, from Sixtieth to Sixty-fifth streets.

The above street is crossed between Sixty-first and Sixty-second streets by the rights of way of the Long Island Railroad Company and the Sea Beach Line of the Brooklyn Rapid Transit Company, the tracks of both roads being very much below the established grade at Twelfth avenue. Under authority of chapter 507, Laws of 1903, it is proposed to depress the tracks of the Long Island Railroad Company some seventeen feet below their present elevation.

In view of these facts it appears to me proper that the Board of Estimate and Apportionment should, before authorizing the grading and paving of this street, refer to the Board of Railroad Commissioners the determination of the manner in which the streets shall be carried across the said railroads and the apportionment of the cost thereof, as provided by chapter 754, Laws of 1897.

Sir—The accompanying letter, dated April 14, 1904, from the Commissioner of Public Works and Acting President of the Borough of Brooklyn, asks the Board of Estimate and Apportionment to take such action as may be necessary to secure the consent and approval of the State Railroad Commission to the establishment of a crossing on the line of Twelfth avenue, over the tracks of the Manhattan Beach Branch of the Long Island Railroad and the Sea Beach Line of the Brooklyn Rapid Transit Company.

Proceedings have already been initiated by the Local Board of the Bay Ridge District for the regulating and grading of Twelfth avenue, between Sixtieth and Sixty-fifth streets. Between Sixty-first and Sixty-second streets this avenue is crossed by the two railroads above referred to, each of which occupies a strip about 50 feet in width, these strips being adjacent to each other, so that a bridge about 100 feet in length would be required for the crossing.

Both roads are in a cut of such depth that a slight elevation in grade of the avenue would secure the necessary head-room. It is proposed, however, to depress the tracks of the Manhattan Beach Road still more, in connection with the elimination of the grade crossings, the plans for which are now being formulated by a Special Commission appointed for that purpose.

The law under which this Commission is working designates certain streets at which crossing should be established, but Twelfth avenue is not one of them, so that it would seem necessary to act in accordance with the provisions of sections 61 and 62 of the State Railroad Law. (Chapter 754 of the Laws of 1897.) This act requires that:

"Notice of intention to lay out such street, avenue or highway, or any portion of a street, avenue or highway across a steam railroad, shall be given to such railroad company by the municipal corporation at least fifteen days prior to the making of the order laying out such street, avenue or highway president of the railroad corporation, or any general officer thereof. Such notice shall designate the time and place and when and where a hearing will be given to such railroad company, and such railroad company shall have the right to be heard before the authorities of such municipal corporation upon the question of the necessity of such street avenue or highway."

authorities of such municipal corporation upon the question of the necessity of such street, avenue or highway."

Title to Twelfth avenue has been acquired by regular opening proceedings, having been vested in the City on February 4, 1899. The Corporation Counsel has already stated that the Board of Estimate and Apportionment is undoubtedly the municipal authority which should give such hearing as may be required, and notify the railroad company and make application to the State Railroad Commission.

Section 65 of the Railroad Law provides that where two or more lines owned and operated by different corporations are crossed, the expense not paid by the City shall be equally divided between the two corporations. It is also provided that the City shall bear one-half the total expense, and that the work shall be done by the railroad corporation or corporations, and that the expense shall be primarily paid by them, the City reimbursing the railroad company or companies for its proper share of the expense.

It is recommended that a date be fixed for the consideration of a resolution applying to the State Railroad Commission for the right to construct these crossings on the

ing to the State Railroad Commission for the right to construct these crossings on the line of Twelfth avenue, and that the proper officers of the Long Island Railroad Company and the Brooklyn Rapid Transit Company be given at least fifteen days' notice of this proposed action, in order that they may be heard, in accordance with the provisions of the statute.

Sir-In the accompanying letter the President of the Borough of Brooklyn requests that the Board of Estimate and Apportionment provide for the vesting of title in the City to the land required for the public park bounded by Fulton street, Stuyvesant avenue and Chauncey street.

This public park was laid out upon the map of the City by resolution of the former Board of Estimate and Apportionment adopted on July 25, 1902, and subsequently concurred in by the Board of Aldermen.

On July 22, 1903, proceedings were instituted by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment to acquire title, and the Commissioners appointed for this purpose filed their oaths on December 11, 1903. The draft damage map was received by the Commission on March 4 of the present year, and the first meeting of the Commissioners to be held for the purpose of taking testimony as to damages to be paid has been fixed for April 8 next

Inasmuch as the land included within the proposed park is almost entirely covered by buildings, title could not be vested in the City at an earlier date than June, 1904, and the request, therefore, seems somewhat premature, especially in view of the fact that the Commissioner of Parks for the Boroughs of Brooklyn and Queens has not indicated to the Board that he is prepared to proceed with the demolition of the buildings and the improvement of the park.

It would seem wise, therefore, to defer action until it can be shown that the park can be made available for public use.

SIR—Herewith is submitted a resolution adopted by the Local Board of the Chester District, Borough of The Bronx, on February 25, 1904, recommending that proceedings be initiated for acquiring title to the land required for that part of the eastern approach to the City Island Bridge which has not yet been acquired by the

This approach has been laid out on a very ambitious scale. It branches from the end of the bridge in both directions, and I am advised that the approach was so laid out on account of the proposed boulevard which it was planned would encircle City Island, following its shore line. This boulevard, however, was never placed upon the map of the City. To lay it out would seriously interfere with the principal industry of the residents of the island, which is boat building. The easterly shore is at all times occupied by yachts and small boats, and a boulevard along the water front would interfere with the storage of such craft.

As has been stated in a report upon the proposed widening of Main street, there is but one thoroughfare on the island, and that is Main street, which is now 50 feet wide, and which it is proposed to increase to 80 feet in width.

The bridge approach, on the large scale shown on the present plans, seems entirely unnecessary and out of place. In order to meet it Main street is widened at its northerly end not to 80 feet, but to 120 feet.

It is recommended that before any steps be taken to acquire the remainder of this bridge approach, or to widen Main street, the map of the City be changed by the elimination of so much of this bridge approach not already acquired as would lie outside of Main street when widened to 80 feet. It is further recommended that the matter be referred to the Commissionr of Bridges to prepare such a modification of the present bridge approach if the suggestion meets with his approval.

SIR—Herewith is submitted a resolution adopted by the Local Board of the Chester District, Borough of The Bronx, on February 25, 1904, recommending that the map of The City of New York be altered by widening Main street, City Island, in the Borough of The Bronx, from 50 to 80 feet, from South Elizabeth street to Long Island Sound.

Main street is one of a few streets on City Island which have ever been laid down on a map adopted in accordance with the provisions of the present City Charter. On this map it is shown as extending from the bridge connecting City Island with the mainland, to the extreme southerly end of the island, and is 80 feet in width for nearly all of that distance. From South Elizabeth street to Long Island Sound, a distance of 640 feet, it is laid down to have a width of 50 feet. The resolution now under consideration provides for widening this section, making it the same width as the remainder of the street.

The widening will involve the partial destruction of six or seven frame buildings, either 1½ or 2 stories in height. There is a substantial timber dock at the foot of the street, and this dock evidently accommodates such freight and passenger business as

street, and this dock evidently accommodates such freight and passenger business as comes to the community by water.

Throughout its entire length Main street is at present about 50 feet in width, and is a typical village street, lined for the greater portion of its length with frame houses, stores and shops. A resolution has already been received for acquiring title to the land needed for widening the street for its entire length, which resolution cannot properly be considered until it is determined whether the two blocks at the southerly end of the street are to be widened to conform with the remainder.

The proceeding to acquire title will necessarily be an expensive one, as so many buildings are affected, and accompanying the resolution is a recommendation that sixty per cent. of the entire cost of the opening proceeding be borne by the City at large.

It is recommended that a public hearing be given in order that this question of widening the street may be disposed of before considering that of acquiring title.

RETAINING BUILDINGS WITHIN THE LINES OF TEE TAW AVENUE, THE BRONX. The following report from the Comptroller was presented:

SIR—The City has under lease premises located on West One Hundred and Ninetieth street, Aqueduct avenue and Tee Taw avenue, in the Borough of The Bronx, as more particularly shown on the diagram hereto annexed, marked Plots A and B, at an annual rental of \$5,100, which lease expires April 1, 1907.

Some time since proceedings were instituted by the City for the opening of Tee Taw avenue, including the property under lease, was taken for the opening, and an award of \$8,260 was made by the Commissioners in said opening. Erected upon this strip of land so to be taken was part of a large building used by the hospital people as a morgue, stable and shop, and if the part of the building so taken was removed therefrom it would destroy the part of the building remaining on the plot marked A, not taken for the opening. The hospital has urgent need for these buildings, and a communication was transmitted to the President of the Borough of The Bronx, requesting that the buildings, or so much thereof as was included in the opening of Tee Taw avenue, be permitted to remain until such times as the new Fordham Hospital, to be erected upon the St. John's College grounds is completed. The President of the Borough of The Bronx, in a communication, consented to permit the buildings to be retained within the lines of Tee Taw avenue in his borough, and requested that the Board of Estimate and Apportionment adopt the following resolution:

requested that the Board of Estimate and Apportionment adopt the following resolution:

"Resolved, by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment of The City of New York, in pursuance of section 971 of the Greater New York Charter, That all buildings within the limits of Tee Taw avenue, between West One Hundred and Ninetieth street and Kingsbridge road, in the Borough of The Bronx, occupied by the Fordham Hospital, be permitted to remain unremoved until such time as the improvement of said avenue is authorized by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment."

Under date of April 21, this office transmitted a communication on the same subject matter to the Hon, John J. Delany, in which the Law Department was requested to have the matter of the opening of Tee Taw avenue, in so far as the building included within the lines of said opening was concerned, and the value of the lease, established in the matter of the award, for the reason that after title vests the award will carry interest at 6 per cent. The matter of the retention of the buildings is between the Borough President and the hospital, and not between the lessors and the City, and there should be a deduction made in the rent charged under the lease for that part of the building belonging to the City. We have not as yet received the Corporation Counsel's opinion in reply thereto.

SIR-With a communication dated April 25, 1904, the Commissioner of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity submits a plan showing certain lands in the Borough of Queens, in the town of Hempstead, Nassau County, which he wishes to acquire for the purpose of maintaining, preserving and increasing the supply of pure and wholesome He also asks that such action as is necessary be taken to acquire the land

described.

described.

This particular plan shows twenty-four parcels of land, all of them small and varying in size from .027 of an acre to 1.63 acres. All of these twenty-four parcels are located along the line of the conduit, at somewhat irregular intervals, between the Spring Creek Pumping-station, at or about the line between the boroughs of Brooklyn and Queens and the Milburn Reservoir in the town of Hempstead.

The widening of the conduit lands is very desirable, in order not only to make it possible to construct additional conduits, but in order to accommodate the material needed for protective covering over the conduit pipe-lines already built.

Section 486 of the Greater New York Charter provides that maps showing land which it is necessary to acquire for such purposes shall be presented to the Board of Estimate for approval, but before the adoption of such maps by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment a public hearing shall be given, notice of which shall be published for three successive weeks in the CITY RECORD, the corporation newspapers and two papers published in the county or counties in which the real estate to be acquired is situated.

It is therefore recommended that a date be fixed for a public hearing, and that the necessary notices be published as required by section 486 of the Greater New York Charter.

SIR—With the accompanying letter from the Commissioner of Bridges, dated April 22, 1904, is submitted a blue print of the map approved by the Commissioner of Bridges on April 21, 1904, showing lands in the Borough of Manhattan which he has selected under the provisions of section 1436 of the Charter, as required, for the New York and Brooklyn Bridge.

The land referred to is a small triangular plot, the three sides of which are 16 feet 33% inches; 15 feet 51/4 inches, and 4 feet 101/4 inches, and having an area of 37.46 square feet.

SIR—Herewith is submitted a letter from Eugene A. Fornes, Secretary of the Board of Armory Commissioners, referring to a communication from Pilcher, Thomas & Tachau, the architects for the proposed armory for Troop "C," N. G., N. Y.

It seems that on October 9, 1903, the Armory Board referred a similar letter from the architects to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, at the suggestion of the Mayor, with the request that the Engineer of your Board report upon the matter contained. The communication of last October was received and investigated, but the matter was never placed upon the calendar owing to the lack of time at the end of the year.

The architects call attention to the fact that neither President street nor Union street, which bound the proposed armory on the north and south, have been opened, and that it will be necessary to have these streets opened and sewer connections established for stable discharges, etc., before work on the structure can proceed very far.

I have received, under date of April 21, a letter from John Kennedy & Sons, contractors for the building, asking that steps be taken to open the streets and provide the necessary drainage and water supply. I replied to his letter on April 22, advising the contractors that the Board of Estimate and Apportionment had not the power to initiate proceedings to open or sewer streets or to lay water-mains, and suggested that he bring the matter to the attention of the President of the Borough of Brooklyn, in order that it might be brought before the Local Board having jurisdiction.

Bedford avenue has been opened, and the President of the Borough of Brooklyn has already received bids for the grading and paving of the street.

As the Board of Estimate and Apportionment cannot initiate proceedings for the improvements referred to by the Armory Commissioners, it is recommended that the matter be referred to the President of the Borough of Brooklyn.

Both West Farms road and Westchester avenue are important streets, 100 feet in width, intersecting near Westchester creek. The public place laid out at their intersection is triangular in shape, having a base of about 380 feet and an altitude of about 220 feet having an area of just about one acre.

It is at present occupied by a number of build-

tion is triangular in shape, having a base of about 380 feet and an altitude of about 220 feet, having an area of just about one acre. It is at present occupied by a number of buildings, about nine of which are frame, and one brick, though none of them are expensive. West Farms road (or Main street) is occupied by a double-track railroad, and is macadamized, curbed and flagged. Westchester avenue is similarly improved, except that it is not extended along what will be the southerly side of the public place, its connection with West Farms road being obtained through Lane avenue, which forms the westerly side of the public place, and a narrow street passing through what will be the public place or park. Lane avenue is 100 feet in width, and is now in use, curbed, flagged and macadamized, although it will be widened on the easterly side, but the buildings taken by this widening have already been referred to as included within the

proposed public place.

The road leading from West Farms road to the dock on Westchester creek will be about 330 feet in length, with a width of 60 feet at West Farms road, which width is maintained for 90 feet, when it will gradually change to a width of 120 feet at the bulkhead. This street and the public dock will undoubtedly be a great convenience to the people of the neighborhood, and as Westchester creek is navigable, it will be extensively used for the handling of building material, coal, etc.

It might be thought that the allowance of open space and the width of the streets are greater than the needs of the locality will require. The intersection is a very important one, however, and the public place or park will undoubtedly be of great ultimate benefit. In my judgment it should be treated as a public place, as it has been designated, and not as a park.

benefit. In my judgment it should be treated as a public place, as it has been designated, and not as a park.

In view of the fact that the streets which it is proposed to open have all been fully dedicated, are in use and have been improved for a width of at least 60 feet, the proceedings now under consideration are considered widenings, and the rule for the distribution of expense under which the Board has lately been working can properly apply. It is recommended that the resolution of the Local Board be approved, and that proceedings be instituted to acquire the property needed, and that 50 per cent. of the cost of acquiring the public place, Lane avenue and the road to the bulkhead, be borne by the City at large, and that the remainder be assessed upon the property deemed to be benefited.

SIR—With the accompanying letter from the President of the Borough of The Bronx, dated April 7, 1904, there is submitted a drainage plan showing the location and size of a system of main sewers in the Chester District, Borough of The Bronx, extending from the Bronx and Pelham parkway, near the Eastchester road, in a southerly direction to an outlet in the East river at the foot of White Plains road.

This main sewer will provide for the drainage of a very large area, some of which is at present low ground only a few feet above tide. The main sewer varies from 10 feet 9 inches to 17 feet 6 inches-in diameter, with several outlets for surface water into Westchester creek. The diameters named above are those of an equivalent circular sewer, although the use of a circular section is impossible, inasmuch as the low elevation of the ground would require the raising of the surface grades to an elevation which would be far above the natural surface, and it is proposed to build concrete steel sewers of as economical a form as possible, either one wide shallow sewer or twin sewers; the details of shapes and sizes have not yet been determined, but the plan shows, as is customary, the equivalent circular sewer.

I find, upon inquiry of the borough officials, that the low land between the main sewers can be drained by carrying such water courses as now exist beneath the sewer, so that there will be no impounding of water with the damage that would ensue therefrom.

The plan shows a grade for each intersecting street. Such grades have not yet been formally adopted, the streets traversed lying within the territory for which a general map or plan was adopted on May 29, 1903, which map did not fix street grades. I am advised, however, that the study of the grades for this territory has progressed sufficiently to determine grade elevations for each of these streets, and that the grade maps, when presented, will conform with the elevations shown upon the sewerage plan. I believe, therefore, that the requirements of section 444 of the Charter, which are that drainage plans shall show the depth of sewers and drains below the present surface and below the established grade, are substantially complied with in the plan now before the Board.

SIR—Herewith is transmitted a resolution of the Local Board of the Morrisania District, Borough of The Bronx, adopted on April 7, 1904, initiating proceedings for grading, curbing and flagging East Two Hundred and Third street, between the Grand Boulevard and Concourse, and Briggs avenue.

A similar resolution was presented at a meeting of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, held on December 11, 1903, but was not approved at that time, apparently for the reason that the work could be accomplished as quickly if it were authorized in the following spring instead of then. The improvement is petitioned for by the owners of 175 feet of frontage on or near the street.

The abutting property is largely built up with frame dwellings. The majority of these are so located as to conform with the grade of the roadway in present use. The established grades of the street will necessitate a considerable amount of filling, the depth at Valentine avenue being about ten feet, and the same will result in seriously damaging many of the buildings.

damaging many of the buildings.

The attention of the Local Board has been drawn to this condition, but the members were last year of the opinion that the grade of the street should not be changed, inasmuch as it is one of the approaches to the Concourse. Their action of last year is indorsed by the present Local Board. I see no reason why the improvement should not be authorized, and would recommend such action.

SIR—At the meeting of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, held on April 22, there was submitted a resolution of the Local Board of the Morrisania District, Borough of The Bronx, providing for curbing and paving Nelson avenue, from West One Hundred and Sixty-fourth street to Boscobel avenue, with telford macadam pavenuent.

In my report to the Board, attention was called to the fact that the street had already been graded, curbed and flagged, that a number of houses had been built, and that the assessed value of the abutting property being more than twenty times the estimated cost of the improvement, it was evident that the property-owners could afford to pay for a more substantial pavement. This statement was made without giving any consideration to the desirability of using macadam on such a street, where the traffic was such as to make it suitable, but was based upon the general policy of the last Board of Estimate and Apportionment, which was that in all cases where the property was able to stand the assessment for a more substantial pavement, macadam should not be authorized, except in special cases. I was instructed to confer with the President of the Borough and make a supplementary report to the Board.

In accordance with these instructions, I have taken the matter up with the President of the Borough of The Bronx, who is of the firm belief that, owing to the residential character of this street and its location, which renders it extremely improbable that it will ever become a thoroughfare, there is no reason why a well laid telford

macadam should not last for many years. The only objection which could be urged to the use of macadam on such a street is the cost of sprinkling, as the traffic will be so

light that repairs will not be an important item.

While the authorization of a large mileage of macadam roads in the Borough of The Bronx, where property is so valuable, would doubtless be unwise, there seems no reason why the particular improvement now before the Board should not be authorized, and this action is recommended.

The approximate amount of work involved is as follows:

7,300 linear feet of old and new curb to be set.
600 square feet of new bridgestones.
12,400 square yards of telford macadam pavement.
Total estimated cost, \$20,000; assessed valuation of the property within the probable area of assessment is \$469,660.

SIR—Herewith is submitted a resolution adopted by the Local Board of the Staten Island District, Borough of Richmond, on March 15, 1904, providing for regulating and grading Waters avenue, from Livermore avenue to Jewett avenue, in the First Ward of the Borough of Richmond, and to pave the roadway with macadam, except at street intersections, where the roadways and crosswalks are to be paved with vitrified brick on a concrete foundation, and including also the setting of curb at street corners

The grading and macadamizing of Waters avenue was authorized in December of last year. The Local Board has recently requested the Board of Estimate and Apportionment to rescind that authorization, and upon the advice of the Corporation Counsel, given under date of April 21, the action recommended was taken.

The improvement now contemplated by the Local Board, while nearly as expensive as would have been the grading and macadamizing first proposed, is of a somewhat unusual character, in that the street intersections are to be paved with vitrified brick on a concrete foundation and the street corners curbed, while for the remainder of the street the roadway only is to be graded and macadamized. The substantial paving of all street intersections will undoubtedly result in a more permainent improvement than would have been secured had the former resolution, calling only for macadam, been allowed to stand.

The conditions in this section of the Borough of Richmond were discussed quite fully at a previous meeting of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment. The necessity of authorizing the use of macadam on many of the streets in the Borough of Richmond is, I think, unquestioned, in view of the low values of the abutting property and the light traffic to which the roads are subjected.

Waters avenue is one of the streets laid down on the map of the Prohibition Park section, adopted on September 30, 1903. In 1897 the street was deeded to the Trustees of the Village of New Brighton, and accepted as a public street. The proposed improvement covers a length of ten blocks. The street is already shaped and graded; plank sidewalks have been laid for the greater part of the distance, although some of the sidewalks have been improved by flagging, and some cement curbing has been set.

The houses secure their water, gas and sewer connections from the intersecting streets, although between Clinton B. Fiske avenue and Wardwell avenue there is a

gas main in the streeet.

It is recommended that the improvement be authorized as provided for in the resolution of the Local Board, the approximate amount of work involved being as

1,500 linear feet of curbing.
1,850 square yards of brick pavement on a concrete foundation.

Maine avenue is one of the streets laid down on the map of the Prohibition Park section, approved by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment on September 30, 1903. The land within the lines of the street was deeded to the village of New Brighton, part of it in 1895 and the remainder of the section covered by the improvement in 1897.

Sewers have already been built, water-main has been laid between Jewett avenue and Clinton B. Fisk avenue, and gas-mains have been laid between Jewett avenue and gas-mains have been laid between Jewett and Wardwell avenues, so that there is still one block remaining without water-main and two blocks without gas-main. The street is lighted by electricity and inasmuch as there is no water in Willard avenue the property-owners on one-half the most easterly block will be unable to secure water, unless a main is laid either in Willard avenue or in Maine

The proposed improvement covers three blocks upon which there are now four houses. The street has been roughly graded and shaped and the sidewalks are partially flagged and in some instances curb has been set.

As has already been stated in connection with a report on the proposed improvement of Waters avenue, the paving of the roadway between intersecting streets with macadam, and the laying of vitrified brick pavement on a concrete foundation at all street intersections, will furnish a substantial and satisfactory improvement for this section, and it is recommended that the resolution of the Local Board be approved, the approximate amount of work involved being as follows:

450 cubic yards of grading.

450 cubic yards of grading.
100 linear feet of curbing.
530 square yards of brick pavement on concrete foundation.
1,000 square yards of macadam pavement.

The total estimated cost of the improvement is \$3,400 and the assessed valuation of the property within the probable area of assessment is \$39,350.

SIR-In compliance with the provisions of section 1544 of the Greater New York Charter, the Municipal Civil Service Commission presents its report for the three

months ending March 31, 1904. On January 1, 1904, the following-named persons were appointed as members of

At a meeting held the same day, Commissioner McCooey was elected President, and Mr. Henry Berlinger was appointed Secretary to fill the vacancy caused by the resignation of Mr. S. William Briscoe. On January 6 Mr. Philip J. Coffey was appointed Assistant Secretary.

On January 6 the Chief Examiner submited a report showing that twenty-seven examinations held during the previous year and in which 8,835 persons had competed had not been completed, and that, in addition, six examinations, in which there were 2,331 candidates, had been ordered, but not held. It was decided to call no further examinations except such as were found to be absolutely necesary until the number of uncompleted examinations was materially reduced.

At the present time the only examinations of those referred to in the report of the Chief Examiner that are still uncompleted are those for the following positions: Female Clerk, Female Junior Clerk, Patrolman, Roundsman.

The eligible lists for Female Clerk and Female Junior Clerk are now being completed.

The present eligible list for Patrolman, on which there remain the names of 367 eligibles, was declared July 17, 1903. Under the law, this list cannot be superseded by another within one year, and therefore nothing would be gained by establishing the

another within one year, and therefore nothing would be gained by establishing the new list at this time.

There has been some delay in establishing the eligible list for promotion to Roundsman in the Police Department because of the general dissatisfaction expressed by members of the Police Force and others interested in Police matters with the scheme adopted by the Commission on December 16, 1903, for the rating of record and seniority. The following plan was prepared and adopted by the Commission after conferences with the Police Commissioner and other high officials of the Police Department and committees composed of members of the Uniformed Force:



The person or persons making a bid or estimate for any services, work, materials or supplies for The City of New York, or for any of its departments, bureaus or offices, shall furnish the same in a sealed envelope, indorsed with the title of the supplies, materials, work or services for which the bid or estimate is made, with his or their name or names and the date of presentation to the President or Board or to the head of the Department at his or its office, on or before the date and hour named in the advertisement for the same, at which time and place the estimates received will be publicly opened by the President or Board or head of said Department and read, and the award of the contract made according to law as soon thereatter as practicable

of said Department and read, and the award of the contract made according to law as soon thereafter as practicable

Each bid or estimate shall contain the name and place of residence of the person making the same, the names of all persons interested with him therein, and, if no other person be so interested, it shall distinctly state that fact: also, that it is made without any connection with any other person making an estimate for the same purpose, and is in all respects fair and without collusion or traud, and that no member of the Board of Aldermen, head of a department, chief of a bureau deputy thereof, or clerk therein, or other officer of The City of New York is, shall be or become interested, directly or indirectly, as contracting party, partner, stockholder, surety or otherwise in or in the performance of the contract, or in the supplies, work or business to which it relates, or in any portion of the profits thereof. The bid or estimate must be verified by the oath, in writing, of the party or parties making the estimate that the several matters stated herein are in all respects true. Each bid or estimate shall be accompanied by the consent, in writing of two householders or freeholders in The City of New York, or of a guaranty or surety company duly authorized by law to act as surety, and shall contain the matters set forth in the blank forms mentioned below.

No bid or estimate will be considered unless, as a condition precedent to the recention or consideration.

No bid or estimate will be considered unless, as a condition precedent to the reception or consideration of any proposal, it be accompanied by a certified check upon one of the State or National banks of The City of New York, drawn to the order of the Comptroller, or money to the amount of five per centum of the amount of the bond required, as provided in section 4 of the Greater New York Charter.

The certified check or money should not be included in the envelope containing the bid or estimate.
