		building situated upon lot No. 149 East Eighteenth street, in the Borough of Manhattan, has become dangerous to life, and is unfit for human habitation because of de-	
		fects in the plumbing thereof, and because of the existence of a nuisance on the	
		premises which is likely to cause sickness among its occupants.	
		Ordered, That all persons in said building situated on lot No. 149 East Eighteenth	
		street, in the Borough of Manhattan, be required to vacate said building on or before	
		June 22, 1909, for the reason that said building is dangerous to life and is unfit for	
		human habitation because of defects in the plumbing thereof, and because of the ex-	
		istence of a nuisance on the premises likely to cause sickness among its occupants.	
		And, further, that this order be affixed conspicuously on the front of and in said	
		building and be served as the law requires, under the direction of the Sanitary Super-	
		intendent.	
		Whereas, The Sanitary Superintendent has certified to this Board that the	
		building situated upon lot Nos. 334 and 336 East Ninety-eighth street, in the Borough	
		of Manhattan, has become dangerous to life, and is unfit for human habitation be-

Resolved, That Thomas Keane, a Disinfector in the employ of this Department, assigned to duty in the Division of Contagious Diseases, Borough of Manhattan, against whom charges of neglect of duty, falsification of reports and drunkenness were preferred and sustained, be and he is hereby dismissed from the service of the Department of Health, to take effect June 7, 1909.

John McNamara, a first grade Clerk, in the employ of the Department of Health, against whom charges of failure to report, for duty on time, neglect of duty and violation of the rules of the Division of Communicable Diseases governing his duties as a Clerk, were preferred, appeared pursuant to notice and submitted his resignation, which was received and accepted, to take effect June 17, 1909.

From William Farrell & Son (81748). Asking that their permit for the occupation of a berth for the unloading of coal on the south side of the pier foot of West One Hundred and Thirty-first street, North River, be transferred to William Brennan. Permit transferred as requested, to commence May 1, 1909, and to continue during the pleasure of the Commissioner, but not longer than April 30, 1910, rental to be at the rate of \$20 per month, payable monthly in advance to Cashier; the privilege does not allow the maintenance of a team boat or barge, and the permittee is to place a runway or platform on the pier when using horses.
