

APPROVED PAPERS.

Ordinances and Resolutions passed by the Common Council during the week ending Sept. 12, 1885.

Resolved, That the sidewalks on the east side of Fourth avenue, from One Hundred and Sixteenth to One Hundred and Twentieth street, be flagged eight feet wide, where not already done, under the direction of the Commissioner of Public Works; and that the accompanying ordinance

Adopted by the Board of Aldermen, August 31, 1885. Approved by the Mayor, September 7, 1885.

Resolved, That Ronald K. Brown be and he is hereby appointed a Commissioner of Deeds for the City and County of New York, in place of Edwin C. Donnell, resigned.

Resignation accepted and resolution adopted by the Board of Aldermen, September 8, 1885.

Resolved, That East One Hundred and Forty-fifth street, between the easterly curb-line of North Third avenue and the westerly curb-line of St. Ann's avenue, be regulated and graded, and that the curb and flag stones where not on the established lines or grades, be taken up and reset and relaid, and new curb-stones be set and new flag-stones, four feet in width, be laid along and on each sidewalk where necessary, and that crosswalks be laid where not heretofore laid across the roadway at each intersection of said street with each avenue, and at the intersection of each avenue with said street, and that the roadway be paved with Belgian or trap-block pavement, all of said work to be in accordance with the established lines and grades, under the direction of the Commissioners of the Department of Public Parks; and that the accompanying ordinance therefor be adopted.

Adopted by the Board of Aldermen, August 31, 1885. Approved by the Mayor, September 9, 1885.

Resolved, That Wednesday, the 30th day of September, 1885, at 11 o'clock A. M., and the chamber of the Board of Aldermen be and are hereby designated as the time and place when and where the applications of the "Houston, West Street and Pavonia Ferry Railroad Company," to the Common Council of the City of New York, for its consent and permission for the construction, maintenance and operation of the branches or extensions of their present surface railroad mentioned in their petitions for such consent, will be first considered, and that public notice be given by the Clerk of this Board by publishing the same for fourteen days, excluding Sundays, in two newspapers published in this city, to be designated therefor by his Honor the Mayor, according to the provisions of chapter 252 of the Laws of 1884; such advertising to be at the expense of the petitioners.

Adopted by the Board of Aldermen, September 8, 1885.

Approved by the Mayor, September 10, 1885, and the "Daily News" and "New York Sun" were designated as the newspapers referred to in the resolution.

Resolved, That Wednesday, the 30th day of September, 1885, at twelve o'clock M., in the chamber of the Board of Aldermen, be and is hereby designated as the time and place when and where the application of the Harlem Bridge, Morrisania and Fordham Railway Company to the Common Council of the City of New York, for its consent for the construction, maintenance and operation of the street surface railroad proposed to be constructed and maintained by said company as mentioned in their petition for such consent, will be first considered; and that public notice be given by the Clerk of this Board, by publishing the same for fourteen days, excluding Sundays, in two daily newspapers of and published in this city, to be designated therefor by his Honor the Mayor, according to the provisions of chapter 252 of the Laws of 1884, such advertising to be at the expense of the petitioner.

Adopted by the Board of Aldermen, September 8, 1885.

Approved by the Mayor, September 10, 1885, and the "Evening Post" and the "New York Times" were designated as the newspapers referred to in the resolution.

AQUEDUCT COMMISSION.

Minutes of Stated Meeting of the Aqueduct Commissioners, held at their office, No. 209 Stewart Building, Wednesday, September 2, 1885, at 2 o'clock P. M.

Commissioners present—The Mayor, the Comptroller, Commissioners William Dowd and C. Baldwin.

Also, Chief Engineer Church, Deputy Chief Engineer Fteley.

And Chief Engineer Birdsall and Consulting Engineer Adams, of the Department of Public

The minutes of the stated meeting of August 19 were read and approved.

The Committee of Finance and Audit reported the examination and audit of bills, included in vouchers Nos. 1058 and 1071, which vouchers, on motion of Commissioner Dowd, were approved by the Commissioners, and ordered certified to the Comptroller for payment.

The Comptroller gave notice of the awarding of "Additional Water Stock of the City of New York"; which notice was read, ordered to be spread upon these minutes, proper entry thereof made upon the books of this Commission, and the notice placed upon file, viz.:

CITY OF NEW YORK—FINANCE DEPARTMENT, COMPTROLLER'S OFFICE, August 31, 1885.

"JAMES W. McCulloh, Esq., Secretary, Aqueduct Commission:

SIR—Under a resolution adopted by the Aqueduct Commission, July 15, 1885, requesting the Comptroller to raise the sum of \$1,000,000, for the monthly payments to become due to contractors on contracts awarded for the construction of the Aqueduct between the Harlem river and the Croton Dam, pursuant to section 32 of chapter 490 of the Laws of 1883, bids were opened at the Comptroller's Office, August 27, 1885, for that amount of 'Additional Water Stock of the City of New York,' bearing interest at the rate of three per cent. per annum, free from city and county taxation, and payable October 1, 1904, according to advertisement for proposals, a copy of which is herewith

The whole amount was taken at a premium of \$17,163, the total proceeds of the bonds being \$1,017,163, which amount has been paid into the City Treasury to the credit of the account of 'Additional Water Fund,' and is subject to the requisition of the Aqueduct Commissioners for the purposes mentioned in said resolution.

The Chief Engineer and Secretary presented a joint report, dated this day, in compliance with the resolution of the 19th of August, calling for a plan for rendering more efficient the work (other than engineering) now performed at the Tarrytown and New York Headquarters offices. The

report was read, and, on motion of the Comptroller, was referred to the Committee on Finance and

The Chief Engineer presented a report dated September 2, 1885:

1st. Asking authority to order one hundred copies of the contract plans for the Aqueduct work between Shaft No. 24 and One Hundred and Thirty-fifth street, in this city at a cost of \$350.

On motion of Commissioner Dowd, authority was given to order the said copies at the cost above-named.

2d. Recommending the division of the said work into sections, as follows:

1. Section 12 to extend from Station 1390 + 63 across Harlem river to Station 1510 on Tenth avenue; containing Shaft No. 25, with the necessary provision for a bailing apparatus for the purpose of freeing from water the inverted siphon under Harlem river, containing also Shaft No. 26, with an overflow and a double cast-iron pipe to conduct the surplus water to Harlem river. Length of the section 1.027 feet.

with an overflow and a double cast-iron pipe to conduct the surplus water to Harlem river. Length of the section 1,937 feet.

2. Section 13 to extend from Station 1510, in Tenth avenue, about three hundred feet north of One Hundred and Seventy-eighth street, to Station 1557; also in Tenth avenue, near One Hundred and Sixty-first street, containing Shafts Nos. 27 and 28. Length of section 4,700 feet.

3. Section 14 to extend from Station 1557, in Tenth avenue, near One Hundred and Sixty-first street, to a point near One Hundred and Thirty-fifth street; containing Shafts Nos. 29, 30, 31, and 32. Length of section, about 7,100 feet.

Total length of the work to be let, about 13,643 feet.

On motion of Commissioner Baldwin, the above recommendations of the Chief Engineer were unanimously approved by the Commissioners, and the said work ordered to be so divided into sections for letting.

The Chief Engineer next presented a report of this date, upon the progress of the work now under contract, which, on motion of Commissioner Dowd, was read in Executive Council and laid over for further consideration.

The Commissioners then adjourned.

BOARD OF ARMORY COMMISSIONERS.

ARMORY BOARD—CITY OF NEW YORK, September 8, 1885.

A meeting of the Armory Board was held this date at the office of his Honor the Mayor, City Hall, all the members being present.

The minutes of the previous meeting were read and approved.

The Board proceeded to the opening of bids for furnishing additional materials and labor for the construction of an armory building at Sixty-first and Sixty-second streets and Ninth avenue, as follows:

The proposal of John Renehan not being sworn to was considered informal, and the Secretary was instructed to refer the same to the Corporation Counsel and ask his opinion whether the necessary affidavit could be now made without readvertising, the bid having been opened, and it being

The Secretary was also instructed to refer the proposals to the Architect for a report from him as to whether in his judgment the bids are reasonable and fair for the work to be done.

A letter was read from A. R. Whitney & Co. concerning the delay in preparing Twelfth Regiment Armory for the iron work, which is ready to be put in place. The letter was ordered filed.

The Secretary read an opinion from the Corporation Counsel, in reply to a communication of July 24, as to whether it is necessary for the Supervising Architect to delegate power to his representative for the purpose of supervising contract work during his absence. The opinion was ordered filed and the following resolution passed:

Resolved, That Joseph Wolf is hereby appointed Supervising Architect of the Twelfth Regiment Armory during the absence of James E. Ware, as his representative, without compensation from this Board.

Cianciminio & Bro. to use and occupy the said premises during the pleasure of the Board, they to pay as compensation for the use thereof the sum of \$6 per week, payable weekly in advance, to take effect from and after September 7th instant.

The communication from Simon Stevens, attorney for Morgan's Louisiana and Texas Railroad and Steamship Company, in reference to the use and occupation of Pier, old 36, North river, and the bulkheads adjoining thereto, was taken from the table and ordered to be placed on file; and the following resolution in relation thereto, offered by President Koch, unanimously adopted:

Resolved, That the following resolution: "Resolved, That the Engineer-in-Chief be and hereby is directed to proceed forthwith with the prosecution of the work heretofore authorized and directed by the resolution of the Board, adopted April 28th, 1880, and that Messrs. Bogart & Morgan, the lessees of Pier, old 36, and the Morgan's Louisiana and Texas Railroad and Steamship Company, the lessees of the bulkhead adjoining the said pier, respectively, be notified that this Board is about proceeding with the work of the permanent improvement thereat, and that they are required and directed, in accordance with the terms of their leases, respectively to at once vacate and surrender possession of the premises severally occupied by them, this Department requiring the immediate possession of the premises severally occupied by them, this Department requiring the immediate possession of the same to enable it to proceed with the work of the permanent improvement thereat," heretofore adopted on the

Resolved, That hereafter the report of the Inspectors on all work under contract for this Department, shall be made under oath, and that no payment shall be made for, or on account of any work performed under contract, or for any material furnished to this Department without the affidavit of the Inspector in charge as to the correctness of the same.

On motion, the matter in reference to the compensation to be paid by the parties occupying manure-dumps at Thirty-seventh street, North river, was referred to Commissioner Matthews, with power.

The Board then went into Executive Session.
On motion of Commissioner Stark, William Cringle and William Strowbridge, Watchmen, who

were heretofore suspended on August 5, 1885, were reinstated and restored to duty.

On motion of President Koch, Thomas Hanly, Foreman Dock-builder, who was heretofore, on August 5, 1885, discharged, was reinstated and restored to duty, and John Stevenson was appointed as Laborer.

On motion, the Board adjourned.

REPORTED MORTALITY* for the week ending September 5, 1885, together with the ACTUAL MORTALITY for the week ending August 29, 1885.

W. DE F. DAY, M. D., Sanitary Superintendent and Register:

SIR—There were 665 deaths reported to have occurred in this city during the week ending Saturday, September 5, 1885, which is an increase of 23, as compared with the number reported the preceding week, and the same number that was reported during the corresponding week of the year 1884. The actual mortality for the week ending August 29, 1885, was 650, which is 11.8 above the average for the corresponding week for the past five years, and represents an annual death-rate of 24.07 per 1,000 persons living, the population estimated at 1,404,129.
