



#### PUBLIC NOTICE.

A resolution, of which the following is a copy, was adopted by the Common Council, May 26, 1886, and was approved by the Mayor, May 28, 1886, viz.:

"Resolved, That in consideration of the fact that little, if any, business is transacted in the public offices of the Corporation after 12 o'clock, M., on Saturdays during the summer season, the various offices of the City, except those specially required by law to be kept open, be closed at noon every Saturday during the months of June, July, August and September, and the heads of the several departments of the City government be and are hereby requested to give their employees a half-holiday on Saturdays during the months above named."

### DEPARTMENT OF DOCKS.

At a special meeting of the Board of Docks, held June 4, 1886.

Present—The full Board.

The minutes of the meeting held June 2, 1886, were read and approved.

The Board then went into Executive Session.

A communication from the President, tendering his resignation as President of the Board was received, read, and

On motion, laid on the table.

A communication from the Department of Public Charities and Correction, requesting use of water-front south of One Hundred and Fifteenth street, Harlem river, for landing, was referred to the President.

The application of the Baltimore and Ohio Railroad Company, for lease of south half of Pier, old 33 and north half of Pier, old 34, and the bulkhead, was received, read, and

On motion, laid on the table.

The Engineer-in-Chief reported that he had directed that James H. Gavin be not again assigned to duty as Acting Watchman, for being found asleep while on duty, and recommended that his action be approved.

On motion, the report was received and recommendation adopted.

On motion, the President was authorized to advise James Millward that his offer of June 2d instant, to surrender to the Department the bulkhead between Sixtieth and Sixty-second streets, East river, used and occupied by him under permit issued December 24, 1885, is accepted, to take effect June 5, 1886.

On motion, the President was authorized to notify the Dock Master of the District to collect wharfage from all vessels occupying said bulkhead from and after that date.

On motion, the Engineer-in-Chief was directed to place the necessary spring-piles at outer end of Pier foot of East Thirty-second street, East river.

Commissioner Stark reported that John H. Starin had agreed to pay \$2.50 per day for the privilege of landing at Pier foot of Thirty-second street, East river, which was

On motion, accepted and the President authorized to notify the Dock Master of the District of the action of the Board.

The President offered the following preambles and resolution which were adopted:

Whereas, This Board has learned with sincere regret of the decease, on the 1st instant, of the Hon. John Kelly, and

Whereas, This Board recognizes the fact that the death of John Kelly has caused the loss of a citizen and a gentleman whose honest, straightforward and honorable course in the various public positions he has held and the services he has rendered, has won the respect and esteem of the community at large, and

Whereas, This Board desires to place on record its high appreciation of the many praiseworthy acts of benevolence and charity so unostentatiously performed by the deceased, as also to unite in the universal expression of sorrow over the loss of an estimable citizen; therefore

Resolved, That this Board hereby expresses in an unqualified manner, its sincere sorrow at the decease of Hon. John Kelly, and tenders its heartfelt sympathy to the family and friends of the deceased at their irreparable loss;

Resolved, As a mark of respect to the worthy deceased, that the offices of this Board be closed on Saturday, June 5, 1886, the day set apart for the funeral obsequies, and that the members of the Board attend the funeral services at the time and place mentioned.

On motion of Commissioner Stark, the resolution adopted June 29, 1883, was amended to read as follows:

Resolved, That the offices of this Board shall be open daily (Saturdays, Sundays and legal holidays excepted), for the transaction of public business, from 9 A. M. to 4 P. M., and the same shall be open as aforesaid on Saturdays, except when a legal holiday may occur on that day, from the 1st day of October to the 1st day of June from 9 A. M. to 3 P. M., and from the 1st day of June to the 1st day of October from 9 A. M. to 12 M.

On motion, Thomas Darby and Hugh McCann were appointed as Laborers.

On motion, the Board adjourned.

At a meeting of the Board of Docks, held June 9, 1886.

Present—The full Board.

The minutes of the meeting held June 4, 1886, were read and approved.

The following communications were received, read, and

On motion, laid on the table to await action, as stated, to wit:

From Sanderson & Son—Requesting permission to place a boiler, hoisting-engine and two large pole-derricks on Pier, new 54, North river. Referred to the Engineer-in-Chief to examine and report.

From United States Branch Hydrographic Office—In reference to the general utility and advisability of time-balls, to be regulated by the United States Naval Observatory—Referred to the Engineer-in-Chief to examine and report.

From Jonson Foundry Company—Requesting permission to drive piles at the bulkhead between One Hundred and Eighteenth and One Hundred and Nineteenth streets, Harlem river. Referred to the Engineer-in-Chief to examine and report.

From S. A. Frost—Requesting permission to repair portion of Pier 18, East river. The action of Commissioner Stark in directing the Engineer-in-Chief to examine and report was approved.

From Gustav Schwab—Requesting the opinion of the Board respecting the representation of the harbor of the City of New York, as prepared by Captain Palmer.

From Engineer-in-Chief—

1st. In reference to removing water-tanks located on Pier, old 42, North river.

2d. Report on Secretary's Order, No. 5417, as to the repairs required to the pavement on surface of bulkhead between Piers, new 41 and 42, North river.

3d. Report on Secretary's Order, No. 5,057, in reference to the application of the Old Colony Steamboat Company for permission to construct an additional platform at bulkhead adjoining Pier, old 28, North river. The Secretary directed to request the President of said Company to call on the President on Friday, June 11th instant, at 11 o'clock A. M.

4th. Report on Secretary's Order No. 5325—In reference to the application of the Screw Dock Company, for permission to construct a pier between Piers 39 and 40, East river. The Secretary directed to request Alfred C. Chapin, attorney for said company, to call on the President, on Friday, June 11th instant, at 11 o'clock A. M.

The following communications were received, read, and, on motion, ordered to be placed on file, action being taken where necessary, as stated, to wit:

From E. G. Smith, agent—Requesting permission to repair Pier 24, East river. Permission granted, the work to be done under the supervision and direction of the Engineer-in-Chief.

From Stephen H. Mills, Lessee—Requesting permission to repair Pier 23, East river. Permission granted, the work to be done under the supervision and direction of the Engineer-in-Chief.

From Wm. J. Sparks—Requesting renewal of permit for tally-house on Pier 10, East river. Permit granted, to be and remain thereat only during the pleasure of the Board.

From Aqueduct Commission—Reporting that they had notified the contractors to desist from dumping stone in the Harlem river beyond high water line.

From Wm. Geoghegan—Requesting information respecting the revocation of permit granted to the New York and Brooklyn Ferry Company to locate a dumping-board on Pier 57, East river. The President authorized to request Morgan J. O'Brien, attorney for Ferry Company, to appear before the Board on Thursday, June 10th instant, at 2 o'clock P. M.

From Wm. A. Hall—Requesting permission to locate floating bath at southwest end of the Battery, and requesting that the compensation be reduced to \$10 per day. Permission granted to locate bath thereat on the same terms and conditions as last year, the rate therefor to be \$12.50 per day until otherwise ordered. The President authorized to notify Dock Master Chas. H. Thompson of the action of the Board.

From James Cruikshank—Requesting permission to repair holes in deck of Pier 3, North river. The action of Commissioner Stark in issuing a permit, the work to be done under the supervision and direction of the Engineer-in-Chief, was approved.

From United States Steamship "Minnesota"—Requesting permission to erect stanchions, etc., for the purpose of making an inclosure on edge of Pier at West Twenty-seventh street, North river. The action of Commissioners Matthews and Stark in issuing a permit, the work to be done under the supervision and direction of the Engineer-in-Chief, was approved.

From Francis Gordon Brown—Requesting test of cement and enclosing \$10 to pay the cost. The action of the President in directing the Engineer-in-Chief to test said cement was approved.

From Henderson Brothers, Agents Anchor Line—Reporting that the "City of Rome" will arrive June 17th instant. The President authorized to notify the Dock Master of the district.

From John A. Bouker:

1st. Reporting that he had not, nor had any of his employees, removed A. J. Howell's boat from berth at Pier foot of Fifty-fifth street, North river.

2d. Reporting that he had never unloaded sand on Pier at Fifty-fifth street, North river, without a canvas.

From Engineer-in-Chief:

1st. Reporting assignment of employees to special duty.

2d. Reporting the amount of work done during the weeks ending June 5, 1886.

3d. Reporting that John Jackson and Thomas P. Ryan had been found asleep while on duty, and recommending that they be not again assigned to duty as Acting Watchmen. The action of the Engineer-in-Chief approved, and recommendation adopted.

4th. Report on Secretary's Order, No. 5409, repairs required to Pier at Eighty-sixth street, East river. The Engineer-in-Chief to repair as recommended in his report at cost of about \$120.

5th. Report on Secretary's Order, No. 5408, repairs required to asphalt pavement on Pier, new 1, North river. The President authorized to notify the Iron Steamboat Company, lessees, to commence to repair within ten days, under the supervision and the direction of the Engineer-in-Chief, or the penalty for violation of the rules will be imposed.

6th. Report on Secretary's Order No. 5268, that he had repaired roof of shed on Pier, new 43, North river.

7th. Report on Secretary's Order No. 5418, that he had fastened iron cleat at bulkhead south of Pier, new 43, North river.

8th. Report on Secretary's Order No. 5422, that he had repaired Pier at Thirty-fourth street, North river.

9th. Report on Secretary's Order No. 5416, that he had driven spikes and bolts projecting from fenders at Pier foot of Bethune street, North river.

10th. Report on Secretary's Order No. 5420, that he had fastened cluster of piles southwest corner Pier, old 23, North river.

11th. Report on Secretary's Order No. 5370, that he had superintended repairing pavement at bulkhead, Pier 49, East river.

12th. Report on Secretary's Order No. 5328, that he had superintended repairing sheathing on deck of Pier 3, East river.

13th. Report on Secretary's Order No. 5309, that he had superintended repairing sheathing on deck of Pier 29, East river.

14th. Report on Secretary's Order No. 5263, that he had superintended repairing Pier foot of Twenty-second street, North river.

15th. Report on Secretary's Order No. 5302, that he had superintended driving piles, etc., Pier 45, East river.

16th. Report on Secretary's Order No. 5391, that he had fenced off outer end of Pier, old 54, North river, and repaired balance of pier.

17th. Report on Secretary's Order No. 5375, that he had repaired roadway to Piers, new 46 and 47, North river.

18th. Report on Secretary's Order No. 5395, that he had repaired bulkhead foot of Sixty-first street, East river.

19th. Report on Secretary's Order No. 5421, that he had drove and fastened fender-piles at Pier foot of Eighteenth street, North river.

20th. Report on Secretary's Order No. 5398, that he had repaired bulkhead foot of Thirtieth street, East river.

21st. Report on Secretary's Order No. 5402, that he had placed and fastened fenders at bulkhead foot of Cherry street, East river.

John M. Smith, Dock Master, to whom was referred the application of the Consumer's Ice Company for permission to erect a temporary ice-bridge on Pier foot of Horatio street, North river, reported that the same would not interfere with the use of either side of said pier, as they propose to locate it on the outer end.

On motion, the report was received, and, together with the application, ordered to be placed on file, and the President authorized to notify the Ice Company that their application has been granted, to be and remain thereat only during the pleasure of the Board, and to be erected and constructed under the supervision and direction of the Engineer-in-Chief.

From the Dock Master of the District—Reporting that the approach to Pier 6, East river, is in a bad condition. The action of the President in directing the Engineer-in-Chief to repair was approved.

From the Dock Master of the District—Recommending that the sheathing on inner end of Pier, new 43, North river, be repaired. The action of the President in directing the Engineer-in-Chief to repair was approved.

From the Dock Master of the District—Reporting that twenty half-round fenders are needed at Pier 46, East river, and the vertical sheathing at outer end of north side of Pier 62, East river, requires fastening. The action of the President in directing the Engineer-in-Chief to examine and repair, if necessary, was approved.

Commissioner Matthews reported that he had notified Kennedy, Reinhart & Co., that the compensation for use of ice-bridge and scales located at bulkhead foot of West Twenty-ninth street, North river, would be \$4 per day until otherwise ordered, commencing June 1st instant.

On motion, his action was approved, and the President authorized to notify the Dock Master of the District of the action of the Board.

Commissioner Stark reported that Thomas E. Crimmins had agreed to pay \$7 per day for thirteen days' use of dumping-board at the foot of Twenty-second street, East river, that being the time he had used said dumping-board, which was,

On motion, accepted and the President authorized to notify the Dock Master of the District to collect said amount.

Commissioner Stark also reported that Thomas E. Crimmins had agreed to pay as compensation for use of dumping-board located at foot of Sixty-fourth street, East river, the sum of \$2 per day for each and every day from May 13, 1885, to May 13, 1886. The report was received, and

On motion, adopted, and the President authorized to notify Dock Master Joseph F. Sharkey of the action of the Board.

The Communication from the Staten Island Rapid Transit Railroad Company, for permission to remove small tally-house from Pier 1, East river, to Pier 6, North river; and also requesting permission to tear down the old shed between Pier 1, East river, and the Pier westerly thereof, in order to allow communication between the two piers, was

On motion, taken from the table, and with the report from the Engineer-in-Chief on Secretary's Order No. 5428, in relation thereto, was ordered to be placed on file, and permission granted, the work to be done under the supervision and direction of the Engineer-in-Chief of this Department.

Commissioner Matthews, to whom was referred, with power, the application of John Dorschell, for permission to locate bath at foot of Eighty-first street, North river, reported thereon and recommended that he be charged \$40 per month for the months of June, July, August and September, and \$50 in advance for the period from October 1, 1886, to June 1, 1887.

On motion, the report was received, recommendation adopted, and the President authorized to advise Mr. Dorschell and Dock Master Abram Duryee of the action of the Board.

Simon Stevens, attorney for Delaware, Lackawanna and Western Railroad Company and C. P. Huntington, lessees, appeared before the Board in reference to applications for a lease of bulkhead at Piers, new 37 and 41, North river, with permission to erect sheds thereat.

On motion, the further consideration of the subject was laid on the table and referred to Executive Session.

On motion, the application of the Pennsylvania Railroad Company for lease of Pier at foot of West Thirty-fifth street, North river, was referred to Executive Session.

The communication from James J. Coogan, for Sarah Lynch, requesting permission to build a crib bulkhead from One Hundred and Fifty-fifth to One Hundred and Fifty-seventh streets, Harlem river, was,

On motion, taken from the table, and with the report from the Engineer-in-Chief on Secretary's Order No. 5367, in relation thereto, was ordered to be placed on file, and the following resolution, offered by the President, was adopted:

Resolved, That permission be and hereby is granted to Sarah Lynch to build a good and substantial wooden bulkhead, for a depth of twenty feet at mean low water, alongside of the same, except where solid rock is found at a less depth than twenty feet, from the middle of One Hundred and Fifty-fifth street to the middle of One Hundred and Fifty-seventh street, Harlem river, upon plans and specifications to be first submitted to and approved by the Engineer-in-Chief of this Department, and all the work to be done under the supervision and direction of that officer, provided that no part of said structure is built outside of the established bulkhead and pier-head line, or the line of the Harlem River Improvement, as laid down by the United States Engineers.

On motion, the Engineer-in-Chief was directed to examine and report in regard to the recommendation of James J. Coogan, that a bulkhead be built from the middle of One Hundred and Fifty-seventh street to Eighth avenue, Harlem river.

On motion of Commissioner Stark the communication from the President offering his resignation as President of the Board, was taken from the table for action.

On motion, the resignation was accepted, and the following resolution, accompanying said resignation, was adopted:

Resolved, That the Board of Docks proceed forthwith to the election of a President of this Board.

On motion of Commissioner Stark, Commissioner Matthews took the Chair, and the Board proceeded to elect a President.

On motion it was decided that the vote should be by ballot.

Commissioner Matthews appointed the Secretary and Recording Clerk as Tellers.

Commissioner Stark having received a majority of the votes cast was declared duly elected President of the Board for the year ending April 30, 1887.

The Treasurer, Commissioner Matthews, presented his report of receipts for the week ending June 5, 1886, amounting to \$30,886.41, which was received and ordered to be spread in full on the minutes, as follows:

SIR—There were 577 deaths reported to have occurred in this city during the week ending Saturday, June 5, 1886, which is a decrease of 58, as compared with the number reported the preceding week, and 44 less than were reported during the corresponding week of the year 1885. The actual mortality for the week ending May 29, 1886, was 600, which is 51.0 below the average for the corresponding week for the past five years, and represents an annual death-rate of 21.74 per 1,000 persons living, the population estimated at 1,435,290.

PROPOSALS FOR ESTIMATES FOR THE general finishing work of the Armory Building, at Ninth avenue, Sixty-first and Sixty-second streets, County and City of New York, will be received by the Armory Board at the office of the President, his Honor the Mayor, City Hall, until 2 o'clock P. M. of the 24th day of June, 1886, at which time and place they will be publicly opened and read by said Board.

Any person making an estimate for the above work shall furnish the same in a sealed envelope to the President of said Armory Board, indorsed "Estimate for Materials and Work in Furnishing Gas Fixtures for the Armory Building, at Ninth avenue, Sixty-first and Sixty-second streets," and also with the name of the person or persons presenting the same, and the date of its presentation.

Any bidder for this contract must be known to be engaged in and well prepared for the business, and must have satisfactory testimonials to that effect; and the person or persons to whom the contract may be awarded will be required to give security for the performance of the contract by his or their bond, with two sufficient sureties, each in the penal sum of \$4,500.

Bidders are required to submit their estimates upon the following express conditions, which shall apply to and become part of every estimate received:

1st. Bidders must satisfy themselves by personal examination of the location of the proposed work, and by such other means as they may prefer, as to the accuracy

of the estimate, and shall not at any time after the submission of an estimate, dispute or complain of the statement of quantities, nor assert that there was any misunderstanding in regard to the nature or amount of the work to be done.

2d. Bidders will be required to complete the entire work to the satisfaction of the Armory Board, and in substantial accordance with the specifications of the contract and the plans therein referred to. No extra compensation beyond the amount payable for the work before mentioned, which shall be actually performed, at the prices therefor to be specified by the lowest bidder, shall be due or payable for the entire work.

Bidders will state in their estimates a price for the whole of the work to be done, in conformity with the approved form of contract and the specifications therein set forth, by which price the bids will be tested. This price is to cover all expenses of every kind involved in or incidental to the fulfillment of the contract, including any claim that may arise through delay, from any cause, in the performing of the work thereunder.

Bidders will distinctly write out, both in words and in figures, the amount of their estimates for doing this work.

The person or persons to whom the contract may be awarded will be required to attend at this office with the sureties offered by him or them, and execute the contract within five days from the date of the service of a notice to that effect; and in case of failure or neglect so to do he or they will be considered as having abandoned it, and as in default to the Corporation, and the contract will be readvertised and relet, and so on until it be accepted and executed.

Bidders are required to state in their estimate their names and places of residence, the names of all persons interested with them therein; and if no other person be so interested, the estimate shall distinctly state the fact; also that the estimate is made without any connection with any other person making an estimate for the same work, and that it is in all respects fair, and without collusion or fraud; and also that no member of the Common Council, head of a department, chief of a bureau, deputy thereof, or clerk therein, or other officer of the Corporation, is directly or indirectly interested therein, or in the supplies or work to which it relates, or in any portion of the profits thereof; which estimate must be verified by the oath, in writing, of the party making the estimate that the several matters stated therein are in all respects true. *Where more than one person is interested, it is requisite that the verification be made and subscribed by all the parties interested.*

3. Thence northeasterly, curving to the left on the arc of a circle tangent to the preceding course
