SIR—There were 698 deaths reported to have occurred in this city during the week ending Saturday, August 27, 1887, which is a decrease of 60, as compared with the number reported the preceding week, and 2 less than were reported during the corresponding week of the year 1886. The actual mortality for the week ending August 20, 1887, was 779, which is 73.0 above the average for the corresponding week for the past five years, and represents an annual death-rate of 27.22 per 1,000 persons living, the population estimated at 1,487,950.
