

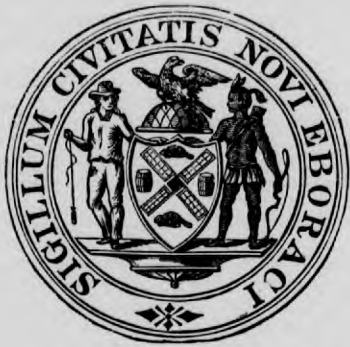

### APPROVED PAPERS.

Ordinances, Resolutions, etc., approved by the Mayor during the week ending August 17, 1878.

Resolved, That permission be and the same is hereby given to Joseph Lewis to place and keep a meat-rack on the sidewalk near the curb-stone in front of No. 188 Eighth avenue, to be not more than 14 feet long and 10 feet high, the posts to be of iron, and so constructed as not to be an incumbrance on the street or an obstruction to public travel, the work to be done at his own expense, under the direction of the Commissioner of Public Works; such permission to continue only during the pleasure of the Common Council.

Adopted by the Board of Aldermen, August 6, 1878.

Received from his Honor the Mayor, August 14, 1878, without his approval or objections thereto; therefore, as provided in section 11, chapter 335, Laws of 1873, the same became adopted.

## DEPARTMENT OF BUILDINGS.

[BOARD OF EXAMINERS.]

TUESDAY, August 13, 1878.

At a meeting of the Board of Examiners, held at the office of the Superintendent of the Department of Buildings, No. 2 Fourth avenue, on Tuesday, the 13th day of August, 1878, at 3 o'clock P. M., in pursuance of the call of the Superintendent of Buildings, at which meeting there were present, Henry Dudley, Esq., Edwin Dobbs, John Banta, Esq., and Deputy Superintendent Henry J. Dudley, who, in the absence of the Superintendent, presided.

The minutes of the previous meeting having been read for the information of the Board, the Chairman submitted the hereinafter named petitions and applications for the action of the Board, to wit:

Petition of Henry C. Spear, builder, on behalf of estate of Wm. C. Rhinelander, for permission to so far vary or deviate from the strict provisions of the Building Law in the proposed alteration and extension of the rear piazzas of the buildings Nos. 158 and 160 West Eleventh street, as to allow the same to be altered and extended in conformity with Alteration Plans and Specifications No. 780, filed July 27, 1878. Petition granted.

Petition of Charles Baxter, architect, on behalf of James E. Ray, owner, for permission, in the erection of six brick two and basement story buildings, each 16 x 45 feet, on south side of East Sixty-ninth street, commencing 75 feet west of First avenue, to so far vary the provisions of the Building Law as to permit the party walls of the same to be constructed only 8 inches in thickness, in con-

formity with New Building Plans and Specifications No. 495, submitted July 30, 1878. Petition upon motion, granted.

Application of the New York and Manhattan Beach Railroad Company, by D. C. Corbin, managing director, for permission to construct at end of Pier No. 74, East river, foot of Twenty-third street, an open shed, to be constructed of wood, about 25 feet in width, 50 feet in depth, and 10 feet in height, with gravel roof, the same to be used and occupied by said company as a shelter for passengers. Application No. 407, filed July 29, 1878. Petition, upon motion, denied.

Petition of Peter Tostevin, architect, for and on behalf of C. Smith & Son, owners, for permission to vary or deviate from the strict provisions of the Building Law so far, in the erection of the brick store, now in course of erection at No. 18 East street, as to permit the same to be constructed in conformity with the Plans and Specifications No. 476 of New Buildings, submitted July 19, 1878, and as amended August 9, 1878; and also petitions that the said building be exempted from the provisions of the Building Law relating to providing fire-proof, metal shutters, blinds or doors, to the several openings thereof, above the first story of front. Petition, upon motion, granted.

Application of the "New York, Lake Erie, and Western R. R. Co.," by E. S. Bowen, superintendent, for permission to erect a bulkhead between Piers 32 and 33, North river, a temporary structure to be built of wood, and to be one story (21 feet) in height, 55 feet front, 40 and 15 feet rear, 30 and 70 feet in depth, with gravel roof; to be used and occupied as a freight station, temporarily, during the repairs in progress to the company's docks by the Dock Department. Petition granted, upon the condition only that the outside of the said structure shall be covered with metal.

Petition of W. Wheeler Smith, architect, for and on behalf of J. Rothschild, owner, for permission to so far vary or deviate from the strict provisions in the Building Law, in the erection of the brick and iron store Nos. 40 and 42 West Fourteenth street, proposed to be built to a height of 88 feet, divided into five stories, to be 50 feet front and rear, and 206 feet 6 inches in depth, with frontage on each street (Fourteenth street, south side, and Thirteenth street, north side), as to allow of the construction of the said building in conformity with the Plans and Specifications for New Buildings No. 394, submitted June 8, 1878. And also petitions that the said building may be exempted from the provisions of section 16 of the Building Law relating to providing fire-proof metal shutters, blinds or doors to openings therein above the first story. Petition, upon motion, denied.

Petition of Charles Baxter, architect, on behalf of John Hertz, owner, for permission in the erection of three brick dwellings, 3 stories or 35 feet in height, each 13 feet 4 inches by 45 feet on south side of One Hundred and Fifth street, 220 feet east of Third avenue, to so far vary the provisions of the Building Law as to allow him to construct the side walls of said buildings over the second tier of beams but 8 inches in thickness, in accordance with the Plans and Specifications No. 498 for New Buildings, submitted August 2, 1878. Petition granted so far only as relates to inside or party walls, but denied as to outside walls, and upon condition that all outside walls shall be constructed of the thickness of twelve (12) inches.

Petition of S. D. Hatch, architect, for and on behalf of Sarah Boreel, owner, for permission in the erection of the seven-story brick (office) building on the premises bounded by Broadway, Cedar, Thames, and Temple streets, 102 by 146 feet and 100 feet in height, to so far vary or deviate from the provisions of the Building Law as to allow of the construction of a portion of one of the bearing-walls in the first story 24 inches instead of 28 inches thick, and also to allow of the erection and completion of the building without having to provide fire-proof metal shutters to the openings thereof, above the first story, as per New Building Plans and Specifications No. 457, filed July 10, 1878. Petition, upon motion, denied.

Petition of Thomas Smith, for permission in the erection of thirty-two two and basement story brick dwellings, 18 feet 9 inches by 40 feet, 30 feet in height, on north side of One Hundred and Forty-first street, 250 feet east of Willis avenue, to so far vary the provisions of the Building Law as to permit him to construct the brick walls of all of the said buildings above the basement story 8 inches in thickness, the basement stories to be 12 inches in thickness, in conformity with the Plans and Specifications No. 429, filed June 20, 1878. Petition granted.

Petition of L. D. Babcock, for permission in the erection of the five-story iron and brick warehouse building, 24 by 100 feet (63½ feet in height), on premises No. 1 College place, to so far deviate from the strict provisions of the Building Law as to allow of the construction of the southerly wall of said building but 16 inches in thickness, instead of 20 inches, in conformity with Plans and Specifications No. 25, filed January 25, 1878. Petition, upon motion, granted.

Petition of Henry Hasagren, for permission to so far vary or deviate from the provisions of the Building Law as to allow him to alter and put on an additional story on the building on rear of lot No. 220 Avenue A, in conformity with the Plan and Specification for Alteration to Buildings No. 804, filed August 7, 1878. Petition, upon motion, denied.

There being no further business before the Board, the minutes were read and approved as read, and the Board, upon motion, adjourned, subject to the call of the Superintendent of Buildings.

## BOARD OF REVISION AND CORRECTION OF ASSESSMENTS.

A meeting of the Board of Revision and Correction of Assessments was held at the Comptroller's office, in the New Court House, on Wednesday, August 14, 1878, at 11:15 o'clock A. M.

Present—John Kelly, Comptroller; William C. Whitney, Counsel to the Corporation.

Absent—John K. Hackett, Recorder.

The minutes of the meeting held July 12, 1878, were read and approved.

The assessment list for regulating, grading, setting curb and gutter stones and flagging Tenth avenue, from Eighty-second to Ninety-third street, with record of awards for damages to buildings by reason of change of grade, ordered to be returned to the Board of Assessors at last meeting for a reconsideration of the matter of the award made to unknown owners, for block 218, Ward No. 30, was presented to the Board by the Comptroller, the same having been returned by the Board of Assessors with communication under date of July 24, 1878, in which they state that "Mr. David McDonald having presented satisfactory evidence of ownership to block 218, Ward No. 30, the Board have made the required change in the list of awards."

On motion, the objections received to said assessment list were overruled and the same was confirmed—all the members of the Board present voting in the affirmative.

The assessment list for constructing sewers in Boulevard, Ninety-eighth street, Ninth avenue and One Hundredth street, from Ninety-sixth street to Eighth avenue, with branches in Ninth avenue, Ninety-eighth, Ninety-ninth and One Hundredth streets, and objections of Messrs. Kellogg, Peters, Marshall, Grube and others, laid over at the last meeting was taken up.

After hearing Mr. John C. Shaw, attorney for Robert Marshall, on motion, the several objections received were overruled, and the assessment list was confirmed—all the members of the Board present voting in the affirmative.

The assessment list for constructing an outlet sewer in One Hundred and Forty-seventh street, Eighth avenue and One Hundred and Forty-fifth street, from avenue St. Nicholas to Harlem river, with branches in Sixth avenue, between One Hundred and Forty-sixth and One Hundred and Forty-seventh streets; in Eighth avenue, between One Hundred and Thirty-third and One Hundred and Forty-fifth streets, and in One Hundred and Thirty-seventh and One Hundred and Forty-first streets, between Eighth avenue and Avenue St. Nicholas, and objections of Mary G. Pinkney, and reply of Commissioner of Public Works thereto; also objections of Nelson Newton, C. D. Gildersleve, George H. Peck, and Joseph T. Goodwin were presented to the Board by the Comptroller, the same having been received from the Board of Assessors, with communication dated July 25, 1878.

After hearing Mr. John C. Shaw, attorney, in behalf of Mary G. Pinkney, on motion, the further consideration of said assessment list was postponed until 28th instant.

The Comptroller presented to the Board a communication from the Board of Assessors, dated August 5, 1878, transmitting copy of an opinion of the Counsel to the Corporation in relation to the assessment list for regulating, etc., Tenth avenue, from One Hundred and Fifty-fifth to One Hundred and Ninety-fourth street, and requesting that they be authorized to take the necessary steps for procuring the requisite maps to extend the area of assessment, in accordance with the opinion of the Counsel to the Corporation referred to.

On motion, the matter was referred to the Board of Assessors, with power to take the necessary action for procuring the additional maps required in making said assessment.

The assessment list for regulating, grading, setting curb and gutter stones, and flagging Ninety-ninth street, from Eighth to Eleventh avenues, with record of awards made by the Board of Assessors for damages to buildings by reason of change in grade on the line, and applications and objections of Ann McManus, Richard Byron, Austin V. Pettit and others, as to the awards in said matter, was presented by the Comptroller, having been received from the Board of Assessors with communication dated July 16, 1878.

After hearing Mr. R. D. Hatch, attorney, in behalf of Ann McManus, and Mr. Charles H. Mitchell, attorney, for Martin M. Kellogg, on motion, the said assessment list was laid over until 28th instant.
