Mr. WILLIAM C. REDFIELD, Commissioner of Public Works:

Dear Sir—In accordance with the accompanying petition, an inspection has been made of the premises referred to, and it is found that not only on the west side of Jefferson avenue, but on the southerly side of Cornelia street, on the same block, the sidewalks are unimproved. This is also the case on Hamburg avenue, but inasmuch as the latter street is not curbed, I doubt the wisdom of improving the sidewalks until the grade and line for the flagging could be established by curbing. I would, therefore, recommend that the sidewalk on the northwest side of Jefferson avenue, between Hamburg and Knickerbocker avenues, and on the southeast side of Cornelia street, between Hamburg and Knickerbocker avenues, in front of Lots Nos. 7 and 16, Block 195, Twenty-eighth Ward Map, be improved by laying thereon bluestone flagging or cement walk 5 feet in width. Estimated cost of flagging, \$294; of cement walk, \$196. Assessed value of lots, \$10,100.

Such an open place as this could be made attractive if it were well cared for, but as that seems impossible, I am obliged to recommend that the said vacant lots on the northeast side of Hamburg avenue, between Jefferson avenue and Cornelia street; on the southeast side of Cornelia street, between Hamburg and Knickerbocker avenues, and on the northwest side of Jefferson avenue, between Hamburg and Knickerbocker avenues, known as Lots Nos. 7 and 16, Block 195, Twenty-eighth Ward Map, be inclosed with a close board fence, six feet in height, to abate a nuisance. Estimated cost of fencing, \$200. Assessed value of lots, \$10,100.

Mr. WILLIAM C. REDFIELD, Commissioner of Public Works:

Dear Sir—The accompanying petition coming from the Fire Department asks for the opening of Gravesend avenue, between Sheepshead Bay road and Eighty-sixth street. I have already made a report (see letter of February 17, 1902), on a petition asking practically the same thing in requesting the purchase of the Shell road, which is really an extension of Gravesend avenue. In my previous letter I stated that the Board of Public Improvements had taken steps to lay down Gravesend avenue, south of Avenue X, so as to include the present Shell road. I also noted that this map was altered, and a new one substituted, and submitted to the Board of Public Improvements on March 19, 1901. Upon looking over both of these plans, I am fully convinced of the marked superiority of the first plan over the one which was afterward submitted.

I hand you a tracing showing this first plan which, as you will see, provides for a street 100 feet in width, as a continuation of Gravesend avenue, which follows closely the line of the Shell road up to the proposed Gravesend Ship canal. Then, by a reversed curve, it swings to the west so as to follow the line of and include West Eighth street and runs directly to Surf avenue.

It seems to me that this would be an extremely important street for the whole of Coney Island district, as there is now but one decent street leading to Surf avenue, and that is the Ocean Parkway, some distance to the east, while the proposed extension of Gravesend avenue would carry one into the very midst of the busiest part of the island. It would render entirely unnecessary the present extension of Gravesend avenue, between Avenue X and Canal avenue, which is colored gray on the accompanying map, the closing of which would be recommended as a part of this change, except that it would remain as a 60-foot street between Avenue Y and Canal avenue.

The second plan, on the contrary, provided that this extension of Gravesend avenue should be 60 feet in width, from Avenue X to Canal avenue. From there it was to deflect, crossing the proposed canal to West Sixth street, which, in turn, was to be prolonged to the Sheepshead Bay road, where the proposed street was to end within one long block of Surf avenue. I cannot but think that this plan, while it would be more economical, would be of very little use. While the improvement shown on the accompanying plan might perhaps be expensive, it would be of enormous benefit to the entire Coney Island section and the district of assessment, for such an improvement could properly be a very large one.

This report is supposed to supplement my report of February 17.

WILLIAM C. REDFIELD, Esq., Commissioner of Public Works, Borough of Brooklyn:

Dear Sir—In connection with the communication addressed to the President of the Borough by Park Commissioner Young on January 23, asking that steps be taken for the acquisition of the property needed to complete the connection between Fort Hamilton avenue and Shore driveway, in the neighborhood of Ninth avenue, I beg to report as follows:

Proceedings are pending for the acquisition of Ninth avenue, which crosses this land. The title to this part of Ninth avenue was vested in the City October 30, 1901, in accordance with a resolution of the Board of Public Improvements, passed October 23, 1901. There is no record to show that the remainder of the land in question

has ever been acquired by the City. There are no buildings on it; the ground is uneven and is covered with small trees. This land is included in Section 3 of the Map of the Shore road (Bay Ridge parkway), as filed in the Register's Office, and its acquisition is undoubtedly necessary to complete the improvement. I am under the impression that the Shore Road Commission, and its successor, the Park Commissioner of the City of Brooklyn, had the power to purchase the land needed to complete this improvement, and if this right exists now a great amount of trouble and expense could be saved by exercising it.

Mr. WILLIAM C. REDFIELD, Commissioner of Public Works:

Dear Sir—The attached letter from the Rev. Francis Brophy refers to the necessity for the improvement at Mermaid avenue and West Seventeenth street. This matter came up early in May of 1901, and on May 2 I submitted a report to Deputy Commissioner Farrell of the Department of Highways, which was, I presume, forwarded to the Borough President. Inasmuch as these proceedings should probably be begun again, I renew the recommendation that Mermaid avenue between West Fifteenth and West Nineteenth streets be graded and macadamized, including the improvement of the sidewalks. The estimated amount of work and cost are as follows:

2,800 cubic yards of grading.  
 1,708 linear feet of curbing.  
 303 square yards of gutter paving.  
 3,800 square feet of macadam.  
 6,000 square feet of cement sidewalk.  
 Total estimated cost, \$7,800.

The approximate assessed value of the land, exclusive of improvements, within one-half block on each side of the street is \$69,200.

As explained in the preceding report, I would note that it might be supposed from a comparison of the estimated cost and the assessed value of the land that a more substantial and permanent improvement than macadam is advisable, but the land, the assessed value of which is given, extends one-half block on each side of Mermaid avenue, and as these blocks are long the bulk of the assessment would be laid upon the lots fronting on Mermaid avenue, which are assessed at from \$150 to \$200 each, so that the laying of a more substantial pavement would involve an assessment exceeding one-half of the assessed value of the lots. The original petition can probably be found in the Borough President's office if required.

Mr. WILLIAM C. REDFIELD, Commissioner of Public Works:

Dear Sir—In accordance with the accompanying petition for the curbing and guttering of Eighty-sixth street, between Fifth and Eighth avenues, I beg to say that this street is occupied by the tracks of the Brooklyn Rapid Transit Company, that it is the only street between Seventy-ninth street and Gravesend Bay which runs through from Fort Hamilton to Bensonhurst sections, and that its condition is such as to render some improvement very necessary. I would recommend that this improvement be limited simply to grading, curbing and guttering, inasmuch as the sewers have not yet been built in the street. Resolved, That the Board of Local Improvements of the Washington Heights District recommends to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment that proceedings be taken to acquire title to One Hundred and Thirty-sixth street, from Broadway to Riverside Drive Extension.

The Secretary remarked for the Board's information that title to One Hundred and Seventy-second street, from Amsterdam avenue to Audubon avenue, vested in The City of New York in May of 1899, and that the petition for this proceeding would be placed on file.

## MUNICIPAL CIVIL SERVICE COMMISSION.

AMENDMENTS TO THE MUNICIPAL CIVIL SERVICE RULES ADOPTED  
AT A MEETING OF THE MUNICIPAL CIVIL SERVICE  
COMMISSION HELD MAY 3, 1902.

[New Matter Underscored. Matter to be Omitted in Brackets.]

Resolved, That the Municipal Civil Service Rules of The City of New York be, and they are hereby amended as follows:

(1) RULE IV. AS AT PRESENT CONSTITUTED IS HEREBY STRICKEN OUT AND THE FOLLOWING SUBSTITUTED THEREFOR:

## RULE IV.

## CLASSIFICATION.

The offices and positions in the classified service of the City shall be arranged in four divisions, to be known respectively as the Exempt Class, the Competitive Class, the Non-Competitive Class and the Labor Class.

## THE EXEMPT CLASS.

The exempt class shall include the deputies of principal executive officers authorized by law to act generally for and in place of their principals, one secretary of each officer, board or commission authorized by law to appoint a secretary, one clerk and one deputy clerk of each court, if authorized by law, one clerk of each elective judicial officer, and such other subordinate offices or positions as may be placed in said class, in the manner prescribed by the Civil Service Law, for the reason that the filling of such offices or positions through competitive or noncompetitive examination is found to be not practicable. Such offices and positions shall comprise Schedule A, as fixed by Rule 68.

## THE COMPETITIVE CLASS.

The competitive class shall include all offices or positions now existing or hereafter created, of whatever function, designation or compensation, except such as are specifically designated as in the exempt class, the non-competitive class or the labor class.

The offices and positions in the competitive class shall be classified in four schedules, to be known as Schedules B, C, D and E, respectively, as fixed by Rule 68.

Schedules B, C and D shall contain those offices or positions that are graded, and vacancies in the higher grades of which shall be filled, wherever practicable, through promotion. Schedule E shall contain those offices or positions of a special character, which it is not practicable to fill through promotion and vacancies in which may be filled by original appointment, in the manner provided by these rules.

The classification of all offices or positions in the competitive class, and the character of the examinations held therefor, shall be governed solely by the respective duties and functions of such offices or positions.

An office or position in the competitive class the title of which is not specifically included in the classification shall, for purposes of examination or promotion, be deemed to be in the schedule the general description of which, in the judgment of the Municipal Commission, most nearly covers the duties to be performed.

## THE NON-COMPETITIVE CLASS.

The offices and positions in the non-competitive class shall be those in which it is not practicable to include in the competitive class, and which are not in the exempt class or in the labor class. Such offices and position shall comprise Schedule F, as fixed by Rule 68.

## THE LABOR CLASS.

The labor class shall comprise Schedule G, and shall include the positions and employments designated as in such schedule, as fixed by Rule 68.

[The offices and positions in the classified service of the City shall be arranged in four classes, to be designated as the exempt class, the non-competitive class, the competitive class and the labor class, as indicated by the following schedules:

## EXEMPT CLASS.

Schedule A—Part I, shall comprise the exempt class and shall include the deputies of principal executive officers authorized by law to act generally for and in place of their principals, and all places not subject to examination or registration.

## NON-COMPETITIVE CLASS.

Schedule A—Part II, shall comprise the non-competitive class and include such positions as are not in the exempt class (A, Part I.), or in the labor class (Schedule G), and which it is impracticable to include in the competitive class (B, C, D, E and F).

## COMPETITIVE CLASS.

Schedule B shall comprise all clerical positions.

Office boys (or girls) shall be employees actually employed as such in the offices of the departments of public service, who are paid at a rate not exceeding \$25 per month and who shall not be over 18 years of age at the time of examination.

Office boys (or girls) who have served as such for one year, may, at the request of the head of the department in which they have served, be examined for the position of junior clerk, provided they are over 18 years of age.

Junior clerks shall consist of employees who receive a compensation not exceeding \$600 per annum. Junior clerks shall not be eligible to the position of clerk except after the competitive examination prescribed for original appointment to said position.

Schedule C shall comprise the uniformed forces of the Police and Fire Departments.

Schedule D shall comprise all positions requiring special expert knowledge, and which are not included in Schedule E.

Schedule E shall comprise all positions calling for medical services.

Schedule F shall comprise all positions not included in the other schedules.

## LABOR CLASS.

Schedule G shall comprise the Labor Service.

Each schedule shall also include the positions specified under that head in the classification hereto annexed, marked Appendix I.]

(2) RULE V. IS HEREBY AMENDED BY STRIKING OUT THE FIRST AND SECOND PARAGRAPHS THEREOF AND BY SUBSTITUTING THE FOLLOWING:

For the purpose of ascertaining the qualifications of persons seeking or named for positions in the competitive class, there shall be a Board of Examiners, to be composed of a Chief Examiner, who shall be appointed by the Municipal Commission, and as many Examiners appointed or employed by said Commission as it may deem necessary. No person shall be appointed or employed as an examiner for positions in the competitive class who is a public officer or who is employed in any other department of the municipal government.

[For the purpose of ascertaining the qualifications of persons seeking or named for positions in the departments and offices of the municipal government there shall be a board of examiners for all positions in Schedules A, Part II., B, C, D, E and F.

This board shall be composed of a Chief Examiner, to be appointed by the Municipal Commissioners, and as many citizens designated by the said Commissioners

as they may deem necessary. None of such examiners, however, shall be a public officer or employed in any other department of the municipal government.]

(3) RULE VI. AS AT PRESENT CONSTITUTED IS HEREBY STRICKEN OUT, AND THE FOLLOWING IS SUBSTITUTED THEREFOR:

## RULE VI.

## APPOINTMENTS IN THE EXEMPT CLASS.

Appointments to offices or positions in the exempt class may be made without examination; but the appointing officer shall file with the Secretary of the Municipal Civil Service Commission, within five days after making any such appointment, a formal notification thereof, setting forth the full name and address of the appointee, the date of his birth, the position to which he is appointed, the date of appointment, salary, length of [his] residence in The City of New York, his qualifications for the office or position to be filled, the nature of his [previous] employment during the five years immediately previous, [whether he has ever been in official service before, and if so, when and where, name of person in whose place appointed] and such other detailed information as the Commission may deem proper for registration.

[The foregoing provisions shall not apply in the case of appointments to the minor positions in contagious disease hospitals, Department of Health; positions in the Nautical Training School, Department of Education; waitresses, laundresses, cooks, and 950 employees in the Department of Charities; 35 employees and 5 domestics in the Department of Correction, as specified in Schedule A, Part I., of the aforesaid departments.]

No office or position shall be deemed to be in the exempt class unless it is specifically named in Schedule A [Part I.] of the classification, as fixed by Rule 68. Not more than one appointment shall be made to or under the title of any such office or position, unless a different number is specifically mentioned in the classification.

[Appointments to positions in Schedule A, Part II., may be made after non-competitive examination.]

NOTE.—(Remaining paragraphs of Rule 6 transferred to Rule 7).

(4) RULE VII. AS AT PRESENT CONSTITUTED IS HEREBY STRICKEN OUT, AND THE FOLLOWING IS SUBSTITUTED THEREFOR:

[Vacancies in positions classified in Schedules B, C, D, E and F, not filled by promotion, shall be filled by appointment of those graded highest in open competitive examinations, and for no such position shall any non-competitive examination be allowed, except in accordance with the provisions of Rules 6 and 34.]

## RULE VII.

## APPOINTMENTS IN THE COMPETITIVE CLASS.

Vacancies in the competitive class not filled by promotion shall be filled by appointments from among those graded highest in open competitive examinations, excepting as follows:

## EXCEPTIONS FROM COMPETITION.

1. Whenever there are urgent reasons for filling a vacancy in any position in the competitive class, and there is no appropriate list of persons eligible after competitive examination, the appointing officer may nominate a person to the [municipal] commission for non-competitive examination, and if such nominee shall be certified as qualified after such non-competitive examination, he may be appointed provisionally to fill such vacancy until a selection and appointment can be made after competitive examination; but such provisional appointment shall not continue for [a longer period than one month, nor shall any provisional appointment in force at the time of the adoption and promulgation of these rules continue for a longer period than one month] more than ten days after notice to the appointing officer that an eligible list for such position has been prepared, or for a longer period in any case than two months, nor shall successive [temporary] provisional appointments be made to the same position under this [rule] provision.

Note.—(Transferred from Rule 34).

2. Where there is a vacancy of an emergency character in a position in the competitive class, and it is not practicable either to secure a person by certification from an eligible list, or to conduct a non-competitive examination, in the absence of such a list, in time to meet such emergency, an appointment may be made without certification or examination, subject to the approval of the Commission and for a period not exceeding one week, but successive appointments shall not be made under this provision.

3. [To positions in] Where there is a vacancy in any position in the competitive class [where] demanding peculiar and exceptional qualifications of a scientific, professional or educational character, [are required] and upon satisfactory evidence that for specified reasons competition in such special case is not practicable, and that the position can best be filled by the selection of some designated person of high and recognized attainments in such qualities, [and where] the commission may, with the approval of the [State Civil Service Commission has suspended] Mayor, suspend the provisions of the rule requiring competition in such case; but no such suspension shall be general in its application to such [place] position, and all such cases of suspension shall be [reported to the State Civil Service Commission in the annual report made to them] set forth by the commission, with the reasons therefor, in its annual report.

Note.—(Transferred from Rule 6).

4. The Commission may by special resolution except from competitive examination any person engaged in private business who shall render any professional, scientific, technical or expert service of an occasional and exceptional character to any City officer, and whose compensation in any one year shall not exceed \$500; provided that such limitation of compensation shall not apply to any person employed by the Mayor or Corporation Counsel, and provided further that the Commission may suspend such limitation, by special resolution, in other cases. All exceptions from competitive examination under this provision shall be set forth by the Commission, with the reasons therefor, in its annual report.

Appointments may also be made without competitive examination as follows:

[Second]—Whenever there are urgent reasons for filling a vacancy in any position in the competitive class and there is no list of persons eligible for appointment after competitive examination, and then only in accordance with the provisions of Rule 34.]

5. [Third]—To the position of trained nurse, when the applicants are graduates of any of the following-named nurses' training schools: Training School of Bellevue Hospital, Metropolitan Training School, Training School of the City Hospital, Training School of the Kings County Hospital—the names of such applicants may, upon their own application and upon presenting proper diploma, be placed upon the appropriate eligible list with a grading of 100, without further examination, unless required by the Municipal Commission, and shall be certified in response to requisition in the order of the date of filing application.

6. [Fourth]—To the position of Junior Assistant in the Public Library, Borough of Brooklyn, and in the Queens Borough Library, when the applicant shall have passed at least six months in the regular service of either of said libraries as apprentices and without compensation, and shall have received from such library a certificate or diploma, setting forth that they have served in the manner indicated, and that they are duly qualified for permanent services in such library as Junior Assistants, and the names of such persons may, upon the application of such persons, and upon presentation of said certificate or diploma, be placed upon the appropriate eligible list with a grading of 100, and without further examination, unless required by the Municipal Civil Service Commission, and shall be certified in response to the requisition of the said libraries in the order of the date of the filing of their applications.

Whenever the Public Library, Brooklyn, or the Queens Borough Library, has been or hereafter shall be extended into any part of the territory of The City of New York, in which now or hereafter there shall be a library incorporated under the laws of the State of New York, or existing and used as a free public library, all such employees of such library who shall be in the service thereof at the time of the action taken by



the Public Library, Brooklyn, or by the Queens Borough Library, for the purpose of assuming jurisdiction over such library, shall be considered to have been classified in accordance with the positions assigned to them in the service of the Public Library, Brooklyn, or of the Queens Borough Library, as of the date of the original classification of the employees of that library, and shall be certified in accordance with such positions, without examination, unless required by the Municipal Civil Service Commission, immediately upon the requisition of the Public Library, Brooklyn, or of the Queens Borough Library, provided that the library making requisition shall certify that they are qualified for the duties of their respective positions.

7. [Fifth]—To the position of Librarian in charge of Public School Reading Room, and to the position of Attendant in Public School Reading Room.

Competitive examination for the position of Librarian in charge of Public School Reading Room shall be limited to Librarian and Attendants in the New York Public Library who have been in such service for one year prior to the date of the examination, and who shall be certified to have been in such service for the said term by the Director of the New York Public Library.

Competitive examination for the position of Attendant in the Public School Reading Room shall be limited to Attendants, Assistant Attendants and Apprentices who have been in the service of the New York Public Library for the period of six months next preceding such examination and who shall be certified by the Director in charge of the New York Public Library to have been in such service for such time.

Competitive examinations for the positions above named shall be conducted according to the rule for promotion examination.

8. Where a person is to be appointed for service outside The City of New York who is a resident of the locality in which such service is to be performed, and when appointments for such service from eligible lists of persons examined under these rules is found to be not practicable; but no appointment shall be so made without authorization by the Municipal Commission and the reasons therefor shall be set forth, in each case, in the Commission's annual report.

(5) RULE VIII. IS HEREBY AMENDED BY STRIKING THEREFROM THE SCHEDULE DESIGNATIONS "F" AND "A. PART 2," WHEREVER THEY OCCUR.

(6) RULE 28 IS HEREBY AMENDED BY SUBSTITUTING FOR THE FIRST PARAGRAPH THEREOF THE FOLLOWING:

#### RULE 28. ELIGIBLE LISTS.

[Eligible lists shall be prepared by the secretary from time to time, as the needs of the service require, for the different positions and grades in Schedules B, C, D, E and F.]

Examinations for positions or grades in the competitive class shall be set by the Secretary, after conference with the Chief Examiner, and eligible lists prepared, as the needs of the service require.

No examination shall be held under any title not specifically designated by Rule 68 as in the competitive class, unless it is shown to the satisfaction of the Commission that the qualifications required in the position or positions to be filled have not been ascertained by the examination held under any classified title. The Commission may, in such case, authorize a special competitive examination, under these rules, in order to establish an appropriate eligible list, and the reasons therefor shall be stated in the minutes.

All examinations for original appointment to positions in Schedules B or D shall, unless otherwise specified, be for the lowest grade of such position, providing that by direction of the Commission an open competitive examination may at any time be held to secure eligibles for a specified grade of any such position, which it is not practicable to fill under the rules governing promotion.

Upon each eligible list shall be placed the names of only such persons as have been found by the Examining Board to be duly qualified for the position for which such list is prepared. The names of candidates shall be placed upon such list in the order shown by the respective percentages of their aggregate markings upon their examinations, [and when] except that the names of candidates who have been honorably discharged from the military or naval service of the United States in the Civil War [that fact shall be indicated upon said list and such candidate's name] shall be placed at the head of such list, in the order shown by their respective percentages.

[Where an examination for any position or grade takes place before the eligible list for that position or grade is exhausted, a new eligible list shall be prepared after such examination, to take the place of the former eligible list. The persons upon the former eligible list who have not been examined for the new eligible list shall, unless a period of one year from the date of the original entry of their names on the former list has elapsed, be placed respectively upon the new eligible list in the position to which the percentages of their aggregate markings upon their former examinations would entitle them if such markings had instead been given them upon the new examination.]

(6a) RULE 28 IS HEREBY FURTHER AMENDED BY SUBSTITUTING FOR THE LAST PARAGRAPH THEREOF THE FOLLOWING:

All eligible lists completed and in force at the date of the adoption of this rule are hereby continued in force for the balance of the period of eligibility originally attaching to such lists, and shall remain in force until such time as other lists may be formed for the same position or grade, in the manner provided by these rules.

[All eligible lists completed and in force on April 19, 1899, are hereby continued in force for the balance of the period of eligibility originally attaching to such lists, subject to the power of extension herein contained, except, however, eligible lists formed after separate fitness examinations, which are hereby abolished. Eligible lists from examinations completed prior to April 19, 1899, in which the papers had not been completely rated or the results had not been completely tabulated or entered, shall become eligible lists in full force from the date of the promulgation of these rules or from the date of the subsequent completion of such lists.]

(7) RULE 29 IS HEREBY AMENDED BY STRIKING FROM THE FIRST PARAGRAPH THEREOF THE SCHEDULE DESIGNATION "F."

(8) RULE 32 IS HEREBY AMENDED BY ADDING THERETO THE FOLLOWING:

The Commission may by resolution authorize a change in the title of any person holding a classified office or position, as borne on the payroll of the department, office, bureau or institution in which such person is employed, provided that such change is not inconsistent with the rules governing transfer or promotion.

(9) RULE 37 AS AT PRESENT CONSTITUTED IS HEREBY STRICKEN OUT, AND THE FOLLOWING IS SUBSTITUTED THEREFOR:

#### RULE 37.

##### THE GRADED SCHEDULES.

For the purposes of orderly arrangement and of regulated promotion the offices and positions in Schedules B, C and D of the competitive class shall be divided into grades, based upon the relative character of the duties performed and the rates of annual compensation. Such grades shall be, until otherwise established, as follows:

For purposes of promotion, a position in either Schedule B or D, the annual compensation of which is different from that specified for any grade of the aforesaid schedules, shall be deemed as of the grade of such schedule the salary of which is next lower.

When a person permanently occupying an office or position in either of said schedules is paid at a weekly or at a per diem rate, the grading of such office or position shall be according to the corresponding annual rate, computed on a basis of 52 weeks or of 304 working days to a year.

An increase in salary or other compensation of any person holding an office or position within the scope of [these rules] this rule beyond the rate [limit] fixed for the grade in which such office or position is classified, shall be deemed a promotion.

[Positions in the competitive class are graded according to the fixed limit of compensation, as follows:

###### GROUP 1. FOR ALL POSITIONS INCLUDED IN SCHEDULE B.

- First Grade—Office Boy (or girl). Annual compensation of \$300 or less.
- Second Grade—Junior Clerks. Annual compensation of \$600 or less.
- Third Grade—Senior Clerks. Annual compensation of more than \$600, but not more than \$1,000.
- Fourth Grade—Senior Clerks. Annual compensation of more than \$1,000, but not more than \$1,500.
- Fifth Grade—Senior Clerks. Annual compensation of more than \$1,500, but not more than \$2,000.
- Sixth Grade—Senior Clerks. Annual compensation of more than \$2,000, but not more than \$2,500.
- Seventh Grade—Senior Clerks. Annual compensation of more than \$2,500.

###### GROUP 2. FOR ALL POSITIONS INCLUDED IN SCHEDULE C.

###### UNIFORMED FORCE OF THE FIRE DEPARTMENT

- First Grade—Fireman. Annual compensation of \$1,400 or less.
- Second Grade—Engineer of Steamer. Annual compensation of \$1,600 or less.
- Third Grade—Assistant Foreman. Annual compensation of not less than \$1,500 nor more than \$1,800.
- Fourth Grade—Foreman. Annual compensation of not less than \$1,800 nor more than \$2,500.
- Fifth Grade—Chief of Battalion. Annual compensation of not less than \$2,750 nor more than \$3,500.
- Sixth Grade—Deputy Chief. Annual compensation of not less than \$3,500 nor more than \$4,500.
- Seventh Grade—Chief.

###### UNIFORMED FORCE OF THE POLICE DEPARTMENT.

- First Grade—Patrolman. Annual compensation of \$1,400 or less.
- Second Grade—Roundsman. Annual compensation of not less than \$1,400 nor more than \$1,500.

Fourth Grade—Captain. Annual compensation of not less than \$2,000 nor more than \$2,750.

Fifth Grade—Inspector. Annual compensation of not less than \$2,750 nor more than \$3,500.

Sixth Grade—Deputy Chief. Annual compensation of not less than \$3,500 nor more than \$5,000.

**GROUP 3—FOR ALL ARCHITECTURAL, CIVIL OR MECHANICAL ENGINEERING POSITIONS, AS FOLLOWS:**

First Grade—Axeman. Annual compensation of \$900 or less.

Second Grade—Chainman or Rodman. Annual compensation of more than \$900, but not more than \$1,200.

Third Grade—Leveler. Annual compensation of more than \$1,200, but not more than \$1,320.

Fourth Grade—Transitman or Computer; Draughtsman. Annual compensation of more than \$1,320, but not more than \$1,800.

Fifth Grade—Chief Draughtsman. Annual compensation of more than \$1,800, but not more than \$2,000. Assistant Engineer. Annual compensation of more than \$1,800, but not more than \$3,000.

Sixth Grade—Principal Assistant Engineer. Annual compensation of more than \$3,000.

**GROUP 4—FOR ALL OTHER POSITIONS.**

First Grade—Annual compensation of \$600 or less.

Second Grade—Annual compensation of more than \$600, but not more than \$900.

Third Grade—Annual compensation of more than \$900, but not more than \$1,200.

Fourth Grade—Annual compensation of more than \$1,200, but not more than \$1,500.

Fifth Grade—Annual compensation of more than \$1,500, but not more than \$2,100.

Sixth Grade—Annual compensation of more than \$2,100, but not more than \$3,000.

Seventh Grade—Annual compensation of more than \$3,000.]

(10) RULE 38 AS AT PRESENT CONSTITUTED IS HEREBY STRICKEN OUT, AND THE FOLLOWING IS SUBSTITUTED THEREFOR:

Whenever a vacancy is to be filled in any position in Schedules B, C or D, above the lowest grade, and there is no appropriate or adequate eligible list for promotion, the Municipal Commission shall forthwith arrange to hold a competitive examination for promotion, limited to those persons who have served with fidelity for six months in the next lower grade, or for one year in the second lower grade, except as provided in Rule 54. On the request of an appointing officer the Commission may admit to such examination persons holding positions in three or more grades, providing such persons shall have served with fidelity for a period equivalent to service of six months for each of such grades, the reasons for such request to be set forth, in each case, in detail.

No promotion shall be made from a position in one class to a position in another class unless the same be specially authorized by the Municipal Commission; but a person employed in any classified position shall be admissible to the open competitive examination prescribed for original entrance to any other position.

[Whenever a vacancy is to be filled in any position in the competitive class above the lowest grade, the Municipal Commission shall forthwith arrange to hold a promotion examination limited to those persons who have for more than six months served with fidelity in the next lower grade in the same office, department or institution, provided that if there are no persons who have served with fidelity for six months in the next lower grade, or provided all persons in the next lower grade fail in any promotion examination, then all persons in the next lower grade who have served with fidelity for six months in the same office, department or institution, shall have the right to compete in said promotion examination. On the request of the appointing officer the Municipal Commission may permit persons occupying two or more of the next lower grades to compete for the promotion, reasons for such course being set forth in detail.

Whenever after due trial it is found not practicable to fill a vacancy in any position through promotion in the manner herein prescribed, such vacancy shall be filled by original appointment through competitive examination in accordance with the provisions of subdivision 2 of Rule 29.

No promotion can be made from a position in one class to a position in another class unless the same be specially authorized by the Municipal Commission, but a person employed in any position shall not, because of such appointment, be barred from the open competitive examination provided for original entrance to any other position.]

The test of actual service being the main factor for fitness in promotion, there shall be kept in every office continuous and comparative records of the efficiency, punctuality, attention and general good conduct of all persons employed therein. Such records shall at all times be open to inspection to the Municipal Commission for the purpose of verification, or otherwise, and if the same shall have been regularly and properly kept, they shall constitute one of the elements in such promotion examination, with such relative weight as shall be assigned to them by the Examining Board, subject to the approval of the Municipal Commission. If such records have not been regularly and properly kept the Chief Examiner shall prescribe such tests as to him may seem best calculated to determine the relative merit and fitness of persons entitled to enter the promotion examination, subject to the approval of the Municipal Commission.

On receiving the notification of an appointing officer that a vacancy exists which is to be filled by promotion, the Municipal Commission, after consultation with such officer, shall set the earliest date practicable for the examination required under this rule and shall publish the same, by notice, posted conspicuously in the department, office or institution in which such vacancy exists and communicated to those eligible for such examination.

[The appointing officer shall notify the Municipal Commission of any vacancy in a position in his office to be filled by promotion, and thereupon, after consultation with the appointing officer, the Municipal Commission shall direct a competitive examination of those entitled to enter the same under the provisions of this rule, and shall publish the same by notice, giving date and place, posted conspicuously in the office where such vacancy exists, and sent by mail to those eligible for such examination.]

No person shall be promoted from any position in Schedule G to any position classified as subject to competitive examination, unless such person shall have served the City creditably for a period of three years in the department in which he is employed, and then only when the promotion is in accordance with these rules, and is in the direct line of duty and according to grade, and the person named shall pass an examination of the same character as required for original appointment to said position.

It shall be the duty of the officer or officers constituting the appointing power in the department in which a vacancy exists to make and forward to the Municipal Commission a certified copy of the record of the Department, showing the efficiency, character and conduct of every person in such inferior grade who desires to become an applicant for such promotion. The Municipal Commission shall not be bound to accept such certified copies as final, but may in their discretion call for the original records instead. The Municipal Commission or Examining Board shall have the right to call upon the appointing officer for further information upon any of the matters before them.

Whenever there are less than three persons eligible for promotion to fill a vacancy and willing to compete therefor, or whenever an appointing officer wishes to promote uniformly all persons in a particular grade entitled to compete, the person or persons nominated by him may be promoted to the next higher grade, upon a certificate of the facts and on passing a non-competitive examination, approved by the Commission.

[In the uniformed force of the Department of Street Cleaning, in the Borough of Queens, the Borough of Brooklyn and the Borough of Richmond, persons holding positions or places of Dump Boardman, Hostler, Sweeper, Driver, Assistant to Section Foreman, or Assistant to Stable Foreman, who have been employed in the Department of Street Cleaning in any of the aforesaid boroughs for a period of one year, shall be eligible for examination for promotion to the position of Assistant Dump Inspector, and in case there are no Assistant Dump Inspectors eligible for promotion, or none who desire to be examined for promotion, then the persons

holding positions or places classified in Schedule G in the uniformed force of the Department of Street Cleaning, who have been employed in any of said boroughs for a period of one year, shall be eligible for promotion to the position of Dump Inspector, Tug and Scow Inspector, Assistant Stable Foreman, Stable Foreman, Section Foreman and Time Collector, until April 1, 1902, on and after which date the required term of service shall be three years.]

(11) RULE 45 IS HEREBY AMENDED BY ADDING THERETO THE FOLLOWING:

The provision of this rule, or the provisions of Rules 46 and 47 may be waived and the subjects and the weights attaching thereto may be fixed by the Examining Board, in its discretion, in the case of any position in Schedule B, except that of Clerk; but the subjects and the weights in examinations for positions in any schedule shall be specified in the advance advertisement thereof.

Note—(The rules referred to fix obligatory subjects and weights not applicable to various positions placed in Schedule B under the reclassification.)

(12) RULE 47 IS HEREBY AMENDED BY STRIKING THEREFROM THE SCHEDULE DESIGNATIONS "F" AND "A, PART II." WHEREVER THEY OCCUR.

(13) RULE 51 IS HEREBY AMENDED BY ADDING TO THE FIRST PARAGRAPH THEREOF THE FOLLOWING:

"Except that the provisions of this rule or the provisions of Rules 52 to 55, inclusive, shall not apply to candidates for positions in the Street Cleaning Department."

Note—Rules 52 to 55 fix method of Promotion in Police and Fire Departments.)

(14) RULES 56 AND 57 AS AT PRESENT CONSTITUTED ARE HEREBY STRICKEN OUT AND THE FOLLOWING SUBSTITUTED THEREFOR:

The general examination for admission to offices or positions in Schedule D shall be in writing. The subjects of examination and the weights attached thereto shall be set in each case by the Examining Board. No person shall be admitted as a competitor for appointment to any position in Schedule D requiring technical or professional qualifications who shall not present satisfactory evidence that he has received a diploma or certificate from some reputable educational institution, showing that he has pursued in such institution with credit for two years a course of study adapted to qualify him for the position he seeks or for which his appointment is desired. He may, however, produce, in lieu of such diploma or certificate, certificates from one or more professional men of good standing to the effect that he has pursued with them or under their direction and with credit to himself a course of study similar to that before mentioned covering a period of three years. The Examining Board may require candidates for any position classified in Schedule D to present satisfactory evidence or to pass a preliminary physical examination showing that they are free from any physical defect or disease likely to interfere with the proper discharge of the duties of the position sought.

**RULE 56.**

[The Board of Examiners shall examine every applicant eligible under these rules for a position in Schedule D, and shall give a certificate of qualification to such person only when satisfied:

First—That he (or she) is within the limits of age prescribed for the situation named.

Second—That he (or she) is free from any physical defect or disease likely to interfere with the proper discharge of his (or her) duties.

Third—That his (or her) character is such as to qualify him (or her) for such employment; and

Fourth—That he (or she) possesses the requisite knowledge and ability to enter upon the discharge of the duties of such situation or employment.

The fourth article of the certificate shall be determined by the Examining Board from the results of the competitive examination of the different persons applying for the position to which the appointment is to be made. The examination shall have reference to the special qualifications, expert or otherwise, required for that particular position, and shall be practical in its character.

**RULE 57—PART I.**

The general examination for admission to the subordinate places in Schedule D (being Part I. of the classification hereto annexed) shall be in writing and on the following subjects:

1. Handwriting (as shown in examination papers).
2. Arithmetic, viz.: addition, subtraction, multiplication and division.
3. Questions relating to the technical knowledge required for the position sought by the applicant.
4. Experience tending to qualify him for that position.

In addition to this, the health and physical vigor of the applicant shall be tested, as hereinafter required.

The relative weight to be given to these several subjects in making up the average standing shall be fixed by the Examining Board.

**RULE 57—PART II.**

No person shall be admitted as a competitor for appointment to any of the superior positions in Schedule D (being Part II. of the classification hereto annexed) who shall not present to the Examining Board satisfactory evidence that he has received a diploma or certificate from some reputable institution showing that he has pursued in such institution, with credit for two years, a course of study adapted to qualify him for the position which he seeks, or for which his appointment is desired.

He may, however, produce in lieu of such diploma or certificate, certificates from one or more professional men in good standing to the effect that he has pursued with them or under their direction, and with credit to himself, a course of study similar to that before mentioned for the last three years.

Those admitted to competition for the superior positions in Schedule D shall be examined in writing on the following subjects:

1. The technical knowledge required for the position to be filled, and respecting which the examination is held.
2. Experience tending to qualify the applicant for that position.
3. Mathematics.
4. Writing a report upon an assumed state of facts.

The relative weight to be given to these several subjects shall be fixed by the Examining Board.]

(15) RULE 58 AS AT PRESENT CONSTITUTED IS HEREBY STRICKEN OUT, AND THE FOLLOWING IS SUBSTITUTED THEREFOR:

**RULE 58.**

**SCHEDULE E.**

The positions coming under Schedule E [F] being of a miscellaneous character and the qualifications for examination being necessarily varied, the subjects of examination shall be selected by the Examining Board, but shall only be such as will fairly test the qualifications of the applicants for the positions desired.

Note—(Transferred from Rule 59.)

[The general examination for admission to places classified in Schedule E shall be in writing and on the following subjects:

1. The technical knowledge required for the position to be filled.
2. Experience tending to qualify the applicant for that position.

The relative weight given to the subjects shall be as follows:

Technical knowledge ..... 6

Experience ..... 4

Total of weights ..... 10

Applicants for positions in Schedule E must, before being admitted to examination, present satisfactory evidence that they are duly authorized by the laws of the State of New York to practice medicine and surgery.]

(16) RULE 59 AS AT PRESENT CONSTITUTED IS HEREBY STRICKEN OUT, AND THE FOLLOWING SUBSTITUTED THEREFOR:



## RULE 59.

## APPOINTMENTS IN THE NON-COMPETITIVE CLASS

Vacancies in positions in the non-competitive class may be filled by the appointment of such persons as upon proper non-competitive examination shall be certified as qualified to discharge the duties of such positions by a designated Board of Examiners. The head of any department or institution in which a vacancy or vacancies may occur in this class may nominate for examination a person for each vacancy, but in any institution where a number of persons are employed in the same class of work the appointing officer may nominate for examination more than one person, in order to provide a list of qualified persons from which an immediate selection may be made in case of vacancy. Such nomination may be made to the Commission or directly to the Examiners as the Commission may by regulation prescribe.

The Municipal Commission may at any time appoint and commission a board of examiners for positions of this class who may be officers or employees of the department or institution in which such positions exist. Such examiners shall transmit to the Commission monthly a statement of the results of the examinations conducted by them, with the names of persons examined or appointed and such other information as the Commission may require.

Examinations for positions in the non-competitive class shall be such as shall show (1) that the applicant is free from any physical defect or disease likely to interfere with the discharge of his duties, (2) that his general character is satisfactory and (3) that he possesses the requisite knowledge and ability or that he is qualified by experience to discharge his duties efficiently and intelligently.

To preserve a uniform standard in qualifications for like positions and employments in different institutions, the Commission, after consultation with the appointing officers concerned, may at any time, by regulation prescribe uniform limitations and tests, for the government of the examiners.

State of New York, Office of State Civil Service Commission,

Resolved, That the foregoing amendments to the Civil Service Rules of The City of New York, adopted at a meeting of the Municipal Civil Service Commission, held May 3, 1902, be and the same are hereby approved, with the following exceptions:

1. So much of rule 7, paragraph 3, as strikes out the words "State Civil Service Commission has suspended," and inserts in place thereof the words "Mayor, suspend" is hereby disapproved, mere grammatical changes being approved, so that the clause will read "State Civil Service Commission, suspend," and with such exception the amendment is approved.

2. Amendment contained in first two sentences in Rule 7, paragraph 4, is hereby disapproved, but if the Municipal Civil Service Commission, with the approval of Mayor, hereafter amends said proposed amendment by inserting in the first line thereof after the word "resolution" the words "approved by the State Civil Service Commission," said amended amendment is hereby approved as of this date.

The Secretary was directed to forward a resolution to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment for initiating this work when the matter of securing the easement from the New York, New Haven and Hartford Railroad Company, to lay a portion of the sewer system requested in petition of Albert J. Pearson, Wm. Thomas Mapes and others, was obtained, the said matter of easement being referred to in a letter dated April 5, 1902, from Mr. O. W. 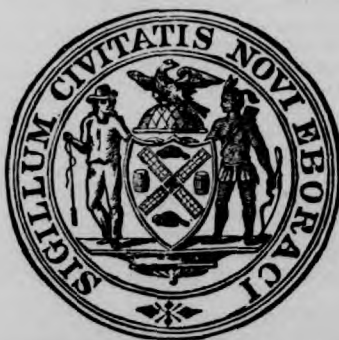

The person or persons making a bid or estimate for any services, work, materials or supplies for The City of New York, or for any of its departments, bureaus or offices, shall furnish the same in a sealed envelope indorsed with the title of the supplies, materials, work or services for which the bid or estimate is made, with his or their name or names and the date of presentation to the President or Board or to the head of the department at his or its office, on or before the date and hour named in the advertisement for the same, at which time and place the estimates received will be publicly opened by the President or Board or head of said department, and read, and the award of the contract made according to law as soon thereafter as practicable.

Each bid or estimate shall contain the name and place of residence of the person making the same, the names of all persons interested in the same, and, if no other person be so interested, it shall distinctly state that fact; also, that it is made without any connection with any other person making an estimate for the same purpose, and is in all respects fair and without collusion or fraud, and that no member of the board of aldermen, head of a department, chief of a bureau, deputy thereof, or clerk therein, or other officer of The City of New York is, shall be or become interested, directly or indirectly, as contracting party, partner, stockholder, surety or otherwise in or in the performance of the contract, or in the supplies, work or business to which it relates, or in any portion of the profits thereof. The bid or estimate must be verified by the oath, in writing, of the party or parties making the estimate that the several matters stated herein are in all respects true.
