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COMMISSIONERS OF THE SINKING FUND OF THE CITY OF NEW YORK.

Proceedings of the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, at a Meeting Held in Room 16, City Hall, at 11 o'clock a. m., on Tuesday, July 1, 1902.

Present—Seth Low, Mayor; Edward M. Grout, Comptroller; Elgin R. L. Gould, Chamberlain; Charles V. Fornes, President Board of Aldermen, and Herbert Parsons, Chairman Finance Committee, Board of Aldermen.

The following communications were received from the Department of Docks and Ferries relative to the leasing of the Staten Island Ferry franchise:

NEW YORK, June 23, 1902.

N. TAYLOR PHILLIPS, Esq., Secretary to the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund:

SIR—As Commissioner of Docks I recommend that the interest of the City will not be best protected by leasing the franchise of a ferry from and to the foot of Whitehall street, in the Borough of Manhattan, over and across the waters of New York Bay and to and from Staten Island, in the Borough of Richmond, together with the wharf property belonging to The City of New York (which said wharf property is more particularly described in the accompanying form of lease) assigned to be used in connection with and for the purposes of said ferry, at public auction or by sealed bids and after public advertisement and appraisal, under the direction of said Commissioner of Docks, and in lieu thereof respectfully request that the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, by a resolution adopted by unanimous vote, authorize the leasing of such franchise by private agreement, said lease to contain the terms and conditions which are summarized in the accompanying form of resolution.

The franchise and wharf property referred to are leased at the present time to the Rapid Transit Ferry Company for a term of ten years from June 1, 1894, namely, June 1, 1904, at a rent of \$21,500 per annum for the wharf property, and five and one-half per cent. of the gross receipts, not to be less than \$22,500, for the franchise, the proposed lease waives the franchise charges and fixes the rent at \$21,500 per annum, the lease to be for a term of twenty-five years, commencing as soon as practicable after the adoption of a resolution authorizing same by the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund.

The present lease provides that the ferry shall make forty-eight trips daily, the new lease fifty trips daily, which, during the commission hours, shall be at fifteen minute intervals. The present lease provides that the boats to be used on said ferry shall be similar to those now in use. The new lease provides for retiring the present ferryboats, except the two most modern; that two new additional boats shall be placed in operation within a year, and the two boats to be retained shall be improved so as to meet the requirements of the Commissioner of Docks, namely, a maximum time of twenty-five minutes in making trips, modern toilet and other accessories. The present lease provides that upon the surrender or giving up of the franchise to operate the present ferry, the new lessee should purchase the boats, buildings and other property of the former lessee at an appraised valuation. The present lease provides that at the expiration they shall remove the buildings, ferry racks, etc., so that the new lessee shall be able to commence without any obligation to the retiring lessee. The new lease provides that in the event of the establishment of another ferry to Staten Island, the Department shall have a right to enter upon one-half of the present structures, for the purpose of providing accommodations for the new ferry, in which case the rental of the Rapid Transit Ferry Company shall be reduced to \$11,500, and that the lessee of the additional ferry shall reimburse the Rapid Transit Company for the structures which they may take at a valuation to be fixed by an arbitration commission composed of the Mayor, Comptroller and President of the Borough of Richmond, on behalf of the City, and three persons to be selected by the Rapid Transit Ferry Company, and provides for the selection of an umpire in case of their failure to agree.

The new lease also contains the following provisions which do not appear in the present lease:

First—Readjustment of rent every ten years by the arbitration commission above referred to.

Second—Readjustment of service whereby in the event that the Commissioner of Docks considers the service to be not up to the requirements, he may order the ferry company to make the necessary improvements, and in case of their failure to do so, the matter will be referred to the Arbitration Commission above referred to, and whose decision in the matter shall be final and binding upon both parties.

The remaining clauses of the lease are practically the same as are contained in the present and similar to those in the form of lease now in use by this Department.

Hon. EDWARD M. GROUT, Comptroller and Commissioner of the Sinking Fund:

SIR—Supplementing my recent letter to you in reference to the proposed new lease to the Staten Island Ferry Company, I desire to add the following:

The proposed lease which is recommended for the approval of the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund provides that the charge for the franchise (the minimum amount of which is \$22,500 per annum), is waived in the new lease; thus for a term of twenty-five years the City will lose from this source the sum of \$562,000.

To offset this, however, the company waives the clause in the existing lease which provides for the payment of \$175,000 for certain improvements, and also the valuation of the boats, buildings and other property used in the operation of the ferry which is to be purchased by the incoming tenant at an appraised valuation. In addition to this, the company is obliged by the new lease to spend within the first year in the purchase of two new boats and the improvement of the "Robert Garrett" and "Castleton" the sum of \$720,000, and the increased cost of operation of the two new boats and the two improved old boats over the present cost in the way of increased coal consumption and other expenses is estimated at \$175,000 per annum, which, for twenty-five years, would amount to \$4,355,000. This, added to the capital of \$720,000 to be invested during the first year, would give a total of \$5,075,000.

The interest charges have been eliminated in both cases, as the figures of the increased expenditure, etc., must naturally be approximate only, and based upon figures furnished to us.

In connection therewith the Comptroller presented the following report of the Engineer of the Department of Finance:

Hon. EDWARD M. GROUT, Comptroller:

SIR—Hon. McDougall Hawkes, Commissioner of Docks and Ferries, in communication to the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, dated June 23, 1902, says:

As Commissioner of Docks, I recommend that the interests of the City will not be best protected by leasing the franchise of a ferry from and to the foot of Whitehall street, in the Borough of Manhattan, over and across the waters of New

York Bay and to and from Staten Island, in the Borough of Richmond, together with the wharf property belonging to the City of New York (which said wharf property is more particularly described in the accompanying form of lease), assigned to be used in connection with and for the purposes of said ferry, at public auction or by sealed bids and after public advertisement and appraisal, under the direction of said Commissioner of Docks, and in lieu thereof respectfully request that the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, by a resolution adopted by unanimous vote, authorize the leasing of such franchise by private agreement, said lease to contain the terms and conditions which are summarized in the accompanying form of resolution.

The franchise and wharf property referred to are leased at the present time to the Rapid Transit Ferry Company for a term of ten years from June 1, 1894, namely, to June 1, 1904, at a rent of \$21,500 per annum for the wharf property and 5 per cent. of the gross receipts, not to be less than \$22,500, for the franchise. The proposed lease waives the franchise charge and fixes the rent at \$21,500 per annum, the lease to be for a term of twenty-five years, commencing as soon as practicable after the adoption of a resolution authorizing same by the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund.

The present lease provides that the ferry shall make forty-eight trips daily, the new lease, fifty trips daily, which, during the commission hours, shall be at fifteen minutes' intervals. The present lease provides that the boats to be used on said ferry shall be similar to those now in use. The new lease also contains the following provisions which do not appear in the present lease:

First—Readjustment of rent every ten years by the arbitration commission above referred to.

Second—Readjustment of service whereby in the event that the Commissioner of Docks considers the service to be not up to the requirements, he may order the ferry company to make the necessary improvements, and in case of their failure to do so, the matter will be referred to the Arbitration Commission above referred to, and whose decision in the matter shall be final and binding upon both parties.

The remaining clauses of the lease are practically the same as are contained in the present lease, and similar to those in the form of lease now in use by this Department.

The proposed resolution accompanying this communication, is as follows:

"Whereas, Section 826 of the Greater New York Charter provides that the Commissioner of Docks shall have power and is authorized to lease, in the name of and for the benefit of the City of New York, in the manner provided by law, the franchise of any ferry or ferries belonging to said City, for the highest marketable price or rental, at public auction or by sealed bids, and always after public advertisement and appraisal under the direction of said Commissioner, but not for a term longer than twenty-five years, nor for a renewal for a longer term than ten years; and

"Whereas, It is further provided in said section that whenever it may be determined by the unanimous vote of the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, upon the recommendation of the Commissioner of Docks, that the interests of the city will not be best promoted by leasing the franchise of a ferry in the manner in said section thereinbefore directed, it shall be lawful for said Commissioner of Docks and said Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, by resolutions adopted by such unanimous vote, to lease such franchise by private agreement for a term not exceeding twenty-five years and under such conditions as in their judgment will best protect and further the interests of the City and the traveling public; and

"Whereas, Under date of June 23, 1902, the Commissioner of Docks has recommended that the interests of the City will not be best promoted by leasing the franchise of the ferry from and to the foot of Whitehall street, in the Borough of Manhattan, over and across the waters of New York Bay, to and from Staten Island, in the Borough of Richmond, together with wharf property belonging to the City of New York and assigned to be used in connection with and for the purposes of said ferry, at public auction or by sealed bids, and after public advertisement and appraisal under the direction of the said Commissioner of Docks; now, therefore, be it

"Resolved, That, pursuant to the provisions of section 826 of the Greater New York Charter, the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, by unanimous vote, determine that the interests of the City of New York will not be best promoted by leasing the franchise of the hereinbefore mentioned ferry at public auction as provided in section 826 of the Greater New York Charter; and it is further

"Resolved, That, pursuant to the provisions of section 826 of the Greater New York Charter, the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, by unanimous vote, hereby approve of and authorize a lease by private agreement to the Rapid Transit Ferry Company of the franchise to operate a ferry from and to the foot of Whitehall street, in the Borough of Manhattan, over and across the waters of the New York Bay, to and from Staten Island, in the Borough of Richmond, in The City of New York, together with the wharf property belonging to The City of New York and assigned to be used in connection with and for the purposes of said ferry, namely: All that certain wharf property situated on the East river, in the Borough of Manhattan, and known as Pier No. 1, together with the eighty-one and one-half feet of bulkhead lying between the easterly side of said pier and the westerly side of the small pier located between Piers Nos. 1 and 2, and also the westerly half of said small pier, together with the structures thereon; and also all that small pier west of Pier No. 1, East river, the bulkhead between said piers, and the buildings, sheds, platforms, ferry racks and other structures erected on said small pier and said bulkhead and along the westerly side of said Pier No. 1 and on the land under water between said piers; and be it further

"Resolved, That said lease shall contain the following terms and conditions:

"1. The right to run a ferry, together with the right to use the wharf property described above in connection therewith.

"2. The term to be for twenty-five years from and after the first day of _____.

"3. The rent to be at the rate of \$21,500 per annum, payable quarterly in advance.

"4. The lessee to furnish at its own expense the ferry structures, landings, etc.

"5. The lessee to dredge to a depth of at least ten feet at mean low water.

"6. The lessee to repair.

"7. The lessee to be liable for damage to wharf property.

"8. Lessee to be liable for damages for injuries to persons or property on the premises.

"9. The city to have the right to enter upon the property for the purpose of improvement; the lessee to remove the structures on sixty days' notice for such purpose; and upon completion of improvement, the lessee to have the right to re-enter upon the property and reconstruct ferry structures, etc.

"10. Lessee to furnish steam ferryboats for the transportation of passengers and vehicles, etc., such as the Commissioner of Docks shall approve as to capacity, safety

and comfort, which provision may be complied with in the following manner:

"(a) That on or before the 1st day of July, 1903, two new ferryboats of the most improved design, capable of making the trip between the landings in the maximum time of twenty-five minutes under favorable conditions, shall be built and placed in operation.

"(b) That the ferryboats 'Robert Garrett' and 'Castleton' may be retained in the service provided that they shall be improved so as to meet the requirements of paragraph (a).

"(c) That all boats placed in the passenger service after July 1st, 1903, shall be of the most approved style and shall meet the requirements of paragraph (a).

"(d) That the ferryboats 'Westfield' and 'Middleton' shall be withdrawn from the passenger service after July 1st, 1903.

"(e) That the ferryboat 'Southfield' shall be withdrawn from the passenger service after July 1st, 1903, but may be held as a reserve boat.

"11. The lessee to keep boats in good repair.

"12. The number of trips to be as follows:

"Daily, except Sundays and holidays, the passenger boats to make at least fifty trips each way, and between 7 a. m. and 9 a. m. and between 5 p. m. and 7 p. m., the interval between departures to be not more than fifteen minutes. Not less than three trips to be made each day, except on Sundays and holidays, to and from Tompkinsville and Clifton.

"13. Every five years a readjustment of service by the Commissioner of Docks, but the lessee to have the privilege of submitting orders of Commissioner to Arbitration Commission consisting of the Mayor, the Commissioner of Docks and the President of the Borough of Richmond, in behalf of the City, and three persons to be designated by the Ferry Company in its behalf, and in case of their failure to agree, an umpire to be selected and the decision of four of said Arbitration Commission to be final.

"14. All trolley car lines to have equal access to the ferry at St. George.

"15. Every ten years a readjustment of rent by the Arbitration Commission above referred to.

"16. Readjustment of rent in case of the building of any bridge or tunnel or the establishment of any additional ferry.

"17. In case of establishment of an additional ferry, the City to have the right to enter upon the easterly half of the ferry structures at the foot of Whitehall street, Borough of Manhattan, and take possession of same, in which event the rent to be reduced to \$11,500 per annum, and the lessee of the new ferry to reimburse the present ferry company for the ferry structures, slips, etc., thus taken, at a valuation to be determined by the Arbitration Commission.

"18. The boats to be provided with fire pump and hose and to attend at fires when required, the city to pay \$20 per hour when boats are so engaged.

"19. Lessee to provide proper crews for the operation of the boats.

"20. The rates of ferrage to be the same as at present.

"21. Lessee not to assign or sublet without the consent of the Commissioner of Docks.

"22. The lessee to remove the ferry structures, etc., at the expiration or other termination of the lease.

"23. Lease not to interfere with any previous grants nor with right to grant future ferries.

"24. For non-payment of rent, City may re-enter premises and lease cease.

"25. Lease may be cancelled on default in any of provisions after ten days notice to comply therewith.

"26. No waiver of default to act as waiver of subsequent default.

"27. The Rapid Transit Ferry Company to surrender existing lease expiring June 1st, 1904.

"28. The form of said lease, except as herein otherwise provided, to be the same as present form of lease now used by the Department of Docks and Ferries, copy of which may be seen at the office of said Department, Pier A, Battery place; and be it further

"Resolved, That the Commissioner of Docks is hereby authorized and directed to execute such lease when approved by the Corporation Counsel."

The items contained in the above resolution and abstract are more fully and clearly set forth in the form of proposed lease furnished by the Commissioner and herewith inclosed.

The facts to be considered are very fully given in the Commissioner's communication, from which a clear knowledge of the position can be obtained.

The evident object of the proposed "private agreement" is to obtain a more satisfactory arrangement of the ferry between Whitehall street and St. George, commonly termed the Staten Island Ferry, than exists at present, or could exist under a lease given in the same manner as the present one.

The Commissioner, without explanation, says:

"The proposed lease waives the franchise charge and fixes the rent at \$21,500 per annum."

I sought information from the Commissioner on this point, but the only answer he could give was that the figures given represent the best bargain he can make.

In a communication to me, June 28, 1902, the Commissioner gives the following figures, viz.: The amount waived, \$22,500 per annum, amounts in twenty-five years to \$562,500. To offset this, the company waives the payment of \$175,000 for certain improvements and also the valuation of the boats, buildings and other property used in the operation of the ferry.

In addition to this the new lease requires the expenditure in the first year in the purchase of two new boats, and the improvement of the "Robert Garrett" and "Castleton" of the sum of \$720,000, and the increased cost of operating the two new boats and the two improved old boats in the way of increased coal consumption, and other expenses are estimated at \$175,000 per annum, amounting in twenty-five years to \$4,375,000. This, added to the capital of \$720,000 to be invested in the first year, would give a total of \$5,375,000.

A copy of this letter is inclosed.

This ferry is an exceedingly important one and we all know that the many thousand people using it habitually have to spend at least one hour each day on the boats.

It is scarcely necessary to say that these people should be furnished the best accommodations available. With the exception of the inconvenience caused by the present antiquated style of boats used in part in the service, the ferry is well conducted; with the improvements required in the "private agreement" there is every reason to expect a perfectly satisfactory correction of evils which have been endured for many years.

By the terms of the lease, the rental will be readjusted in 1912 and in 1922 by a Commission appointed as defined in the lease.

That every five years a readjustment of service by the Commissioner of Docks is to be made, but the lessee to have the privilege of submitting orders to the Commission above referred to.

Every item of the lease indicates careful supervision.

Believing that the people are justly entitled, on this long ferry, to the best of modern service attainable, I would respectfully recommend the approval of the "private agreement" submitted by the Commissioner of Docks and Ferries.

The following communications were received and read:

June 30, 1902.

To the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, and to the Commissioner of Docks and Ferries:

GENTLEMEN—On Thursday last it appeared in the public prints that an application would be made on that day by the Rapid Transit Ferry Company to the Sinking Fund Commissioners for a lease of the ferry between Manhattan and Richmond for a term of twenty-five years. It was stated that the lease was not to be offered at public sale, but was to be made by private agreement, for which, of course, the unanimous consent of the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund would be required.

The Board of Directors of the Rapid Transit Ferry Company, the present lessee of the ferry, and the corporation with whom the new lease was apparently intended to be made, consists of nine members.

I am authorized to and do represent five members of that Board, constituting a majority thereof, namely Messrs. Henry H. Rogers, William Lanman Bull, Samuel Thomas, Thomas F. Ryan and George B. M. Harvey, who were not consulted in any way by those assuming to represent the Rapid Transit Ferry Company in any negotiations which led up to the formulation of the proposed lease.

Having since Thursday last been afforded an opportunity to examine the lease, the majority directors are of the opinion that it does not properly subserve the interests of Greater New York, nor those of the traveling public, nor does it properly protect the interests of the Staten Island Railroad Company, which connects with the ferry and performs in large degree the trolley tramway service of the Island; this last-named company is controlled by the directors whom I represent and who will to-day be put in full possession and control of that railroad.

It is believed by my clients that, in order to insure the development of Staten Island, the proposed lease should provide, among other things, definitely for a better method of reaching the second story of the present ferry house by the trolley company than that now existing, and should also contain a provision enabling the passengers of this road to reach the upper decks of the boats from the second story of the ferry house, so that they need not be compelled, as they now are, to descend and reascend again, in order to reach the upper decks. They believe, too, that there should be no limitation as to the nature of the ferry boats, since it is deemed by my clients that where dispatch, speed, convenience and safety of passengers is concerned, the double-end ferry boat is not the proper type to employ for passenger service. It will be borne in mind that the service to be performed is not really a ferry service, as compared with the ordinary traffic of the North and the East rivers; strong and varying currents are to be guarded against, as is the ebb and flow of tide; stress of weather is to be encountered, and all these elements should be considered in deciding on the type of boats to be employed, instead of ignoring them, as they have been ignored in the past and are being ignored in the proposed lease.

In the opinion of my clients, the service to St. George should be confined to foot passengers; provision should be made for traffic boats with incidental passenger service, for which landings should be made further down than St. George, on both sides of the Island, and not only on one side, as is contemplated by the proposed lease, the population of the Island being distributed almost equally on both sides.

If some fair understanding, embodying these suggestions, and which shall accord with the wishes of the people of Staten Island, can be agreed upon between the Directors whom I represent and the remaining three directors representing the Baltimore & Ohio interests and the interests of the Rapid Transit Railroad, and even in the event of their dissent, the majority of the Board will be prepared to accept such a lease, prepared in conformity with these ideas.

I am authorized to state that, as soon as such a lease shall have been formulated, we are prepared to order and put in commission as rapidly as possible at least two first class boats which shall be thoroughly equipped and fitted for the passenger service, immediately to reconstruct and improve the "Robert Garrett" and "Castleton," and do whatever else may be essential to establish the very best possible passenger service between St. George and Manhattan, and an adequate traffic and incidental passenger service between Manhattan and both Clifton and Port Richmond.

I have been informed that some of the suggestions herein embodied were made by the Commissioner of Docks and Ferries to those who represented the minority of the directors who conducted the negotiations which led up to the formulation of the proposed lease without consultation with their co-directors, but that his efforts to obtain these concessions, or any of them, though earnestly insisted upon, were fruitless.

I am confident that a lease, amended as herein suggested, conforming to the wishes of the Commissioner and those of the President of the Borough of Richmond, will be adopted by the majority of the Board.

STAPLETON, S. I., June 28, 1902.

To the Sinking Fund Commissioners of The City of New York:

GENTLEMEN—You are at present considering the matter of a franchise for a ferry between the Boroughs of Manhattan and Richmond. In the discussion of the matter in the public prints it does not appear that the interests of Stapleton as a landing or possible terminus has ever been considered. As one of the largest taxpayers in the community and representing perhaps the largest industry in Stapleton, the Rubsam & Horrmann Brewing Company, I desire to call your attention to the fact that at present Stapleton is the most thickly populated community in the Borough of Richmond.

Before the institution of the Rapid Transit Railroad there always had been a ferry at Stapleton and even at one time there were two ferries running from this place. It is also understood that in the event the ferry terminus or landing would be at Stapleton the Midland Railroad Company will connect therewith and make Stapleton its terminus.

Stapleton has the reputation of being the most thrifty and prosperous community in the Borough of Richmond and there is no doubt that so far as the East and South Shores are concerned it is the principal place of business. Between Port Richmond and Tottenville Stapleton has the most business and needs ferry facilities most.

I further desire to call your attention to the absolute need of better freight facilities and facilities for conveying teams. A large number of farmers of the South Shore and all business men of the East Shore who drive daily back and forth to New York, as well as all the factories and industrial enterprises of the South and East Shores desire Stapleton as a landing place or ferry terminus, and, therefore, when considering the plans for the new ferry franchise I would respectfully urge that you take into consideration the urgent and pressing needs of Stapleton and its undoubtedly right to be considered in connection therewith.

Dock Commissioner Hawkes related to the Board the difficulties encountered and the circumstances under which the Department arrived at the recommendation made.

Lester K. Clark, Esq., counsel for the Staten Island Rapid Transit Company, was heard at length in support of the lease as presented.

Edward Lauterbach, Esq., representing five members of the Board of Directors of the Rapid Transit Ferry Company, was heard in protest. He stated that he was authorized to say that as soon as such a lease as described in his communication above shall have been formulated his clients are prepared to order and put in commission as rapidly as possible at least two first-class boats of the "Monmouth" type of the Sandy Hook Route, which shall be thoroughly equipped and fitted for passenger service, immediately to reconstruct and improve the "Robert Garrett" and "Castleton" and do whatever else may be essential to establish the very best passenger service between the Boroughs of Richmond and Manhattan, and an adequate traffic and passenger service between Manhattan and both Clifton and Port Richmond.

Hon. George Cromwell, President of the Borough of Richmond, was also heard in protest and favored the plan outlined by Mr. Lauterbach. He also suggested that something might be done in the way of establishing commutation rates.

Mr. William A. Short, of the Staten Island Chamber of Commerce, also protested against the lease in its present form.

Dock Commissioner Hawkes then addressed the Board and stated that the hearing had brought out a new condition of affairs and concessions which he was unable to obtain before, and requested that the matter be referred back to him for reconsideration and resubmission to this Board in some better form.

On motion of the Mayor, the matter was referred back to the Commissioner of Docks.

The following communication was received from the Department of Docks and Ferries relative to an amendment to resolution authorizing a sale of the East Forty-second Street Ferry: (See page .)

NEW YORK, June 14, 1902.

Hon. Seth Low, Mayor of The City of New York and Chairman of the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund;

Sir—At a meeting of the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund held May 21, 1902, the terms and conditions of the sale of the ferry franchise and wharf property at the foot of East Forty-second street to the Brooklyn Ferry Company was approved.

Since this advertisement was sent to the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund for approval, as you are doubtless aware, the policy of the City in relation to the ferry leases has been changed by striking out the clause providing for the purchase at a fair valuation of the boats, buildings and other property of the lessees used in and actually necessary for the operation of the ferry, upon the termination of the lease, and surrender and delivery of the premises by the lessee, if the lessees shall not renew the lease for another term, and in lieu thereof a clause has recently been inserted in all ferry leases that upon the expiration or sooner termination of the lease, the lessees may, and upon the demand of the Commissioner of Docks shall, remove any and all structures used for ferry purposes and situated on said property.

This has been demonstrated to be for the interest of the City, as the compulsory taking over of the buildings, etc., of the former lessee has prohibited any competition at the expiration of the lease for the ferry privileges.

The amendment proposed is to strike out the paragraph marked "A" on page 4 of the proposed advertisement and insert in lieu thereof the following:

"The lease will contain a covenant providing that upon the expiration or sooner termination of the said term of ten years, the lessee may, and upon demand in writing by the Commissioner of Docks or other proper officer or department of The City of New York thereto duly authorized, shall, at the cost and expense of the lessee, forthwith and at the utmost practicable speed wholly remove from the premises hereinbefore described, the buildings, platforms, floats, bridges, ferry racks, piling and fixtures which shall have been erected or placed by the lessee, its successors or assigns, upon or within the limits of the wharf property to be leased, so that there shall be in the slip adjacent to the hereinbefore described wharf property, used for the purposes of said ferry and in every part thereof, from the bulkhead out, at least ten feet of water at mean low water."

I have also increased the Auctioneer's fees from \$25 to \$50. There is a probability that the company might not bid, and in that case the Auctioneer receives no fees. It may be that three or four attempts will have to be made before the ferry is finally sold at auction, and I consider \$50 a fair fee when the ferry is finally sold.

In connection therewith the Comptroller presented the following report of the Engineer of the Department of Finance, and offered the following resolution:

June 24, 1902.

Hon. Edward M. Grout, Comptroller:

Sir—Hon. McDougall Hawkes, Commissioner of Docks and Ferries, in a communication dated June 14, 1902, requests the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund to amend the terms and conditions of sale, as approved by them on May 21, 1902, of the ferry franchise from the foot of East Forty-second street, Manhattan, to Brooklyn.

The change proposed is to omit the clause or covenant in the lease "providing for the purchase, at a fair valuation, of the boats, buildings and other property of the lessees, used in and actually necessary for the operation of said ferry, upon the termination and surrender and delivery of the premises by the lessee, if the lessees shall not become the purchasers for another term, provided that The City of New York shall not be deemed thereby to purchase said property in any event," and substitute therefor the following:

"The lease will contain a covenant providing that, upon the expiration or sooner termination of the said term of ten years, the lessee may, and upon demand in writing by the Commissioner of Docks, or other proper officer or department of The City of New York thereto duly authorized, shall, at the cost and expense of the lessee, forthwith and at the utmost practicable speed wholly remove from the premises hereinbefore described, the buildings, platforms, floats, bridges, ferry racks, piling and fixtures which shall have been erected or placed by the lessee, its successors or assigns, upon or within the limits of the wharf property to be leased, so that there shall be in the slip adjacent to the hereinbefore described wharf property, used for the purposes of said ferry and in every part thereof, from the bulkhead out, at least ten feet of water at mean low water."

The Commissioner states that "the policy of the City in relation to ferry leases has been changed," since the original advertisement of this lease, by inserting the latter clause quoted, for the former, in all ferry leases.

As but one lease has been passed upon by the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, namely of the ferry from the foot of West One Hundred and Thirtieth street, I was not aware that "the policy of the City" had been changed.

The Dock Commissioner gives his reasons as to why it would be desirable to make such change, but I am in doubt as to the advisability of the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund adopting the same as a general policy of the City.

As the clause for a purchase at a fair valuation of the boats, buildings, etc., of the lessee has been inserted in all ferry leases for many years past, I think it would be advisable that no direct change of policy be adopted by the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, but that in each case as presented, many of them offering different conditions, should be passed upon separately.

In the present instance, I see no objection to the insertion of the clause that the lessee must vacate the premises at the end of the term in place of the covenant requiring the purchase of the lessee's property at a fair valuation, and I would therefore recommend that the terms and conditions be amended as requested by the Commissioner.

Resolved, That the resolution adopted by this Board at meeting held May 21, 1902, approving of the terms and conditions of sale of the ferry franchise from the foot of East Forty-second street, Borough of Manhattan, to Broadway, Borough of Brooklyn, be and the same is hereby amended by omitting the clause or covenant "providing for the purchase, at a fair valuation, of the boats, buildings and other property of the lessees, used in and actually necessary for the operation of said ferry, upon the termination and surrender and delivery of the premises by the lessee, if the lessees shall not become the purchasers for another term, provided that The City of New York shall not be deemed thereby to purchase said property in any event," and substituting therefor the following:

"The lease will contain a covenant providing that upon the expiration or sooner termination of the said term of ten years, the lessee may, and upon demand in writing by the Commissioner of Docks or other proper officer or department of The City of New York thereto duly authorized, shall, at the cost and expense of the lessee, forthwith and at the utmost practicable speed wholly remove from the premises hereinbefore described, the buildings, platforms, floats, bridges, ferry racks, piling and fixtures which shall have been erected or placed by the lessee, its successors or assigns, upon or within the limits of the wharf property to be leased, so that there shall be in the slip adjacent to the hereinbefore described wharf property, used for the purposes of said ferry and in every part thereof, from the bulkhead out, at least ten feet of water at mean low water."

The report was accepted and the resolution unanimously adopted.

The following communication was received from the Department of Docks and Ferries relative to a lease of the bulkhead at the foot of East Eighty-fourth street, Borough of Manhattan, to the Cygnet Club:

NEW YORK, June 5, 1902.

N. Taylor Phillips, Esq., Secretary to the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund:

Sir—I transmit herewith for the approval of the Commissioners of the Sinking

Fund an agreement to lease to Samuel McGarigle, President of the Cygnet Club, the bulkhead now occupied by said club at the foot of East Eighty-fourth street, for a term of three years, from the date said lease is approved by the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, at a rental of \$150 per annum, payable monthly in advance at the office of this Department.

The club at the present time occupies a house 27 by 18 feet, and the rental charged has been that paid heretofore to Charles Acton, of No. 93 East One Hundred and Sixteenth street, agent for James Peeters and A. N. Peeters, of Westbrook, Conn., who claimed to own the property.

It appears that East Eighty-fourth street was officially opened from East End avenue to the bulkhead line on December 5, 1896, and the premises in question are therefore City property, but this Department was never advised of the opening of said street, and the premises inside of high-water mark within the lines of the street have always been considered as private property. The foot of East Eighty-fourth street ends in a bluff some 20 feet in height, and the crib which it is proposed to lease to the Cygnet Club lies at the foot of the wall. This condition of affairs renders the foot of East Eighty-fourth street unavailable for wharfage purposes, and in fact for any use except that for which it is proposed to be put by the lessee.

I might add that a demand has been made upon the private parties for the refund of the rental received since December 5, 1896, and in case of their failure to comply the Corporation Counsel will be directed to take steps for its collection.

In connection therewith the Comptroller presented the following report of the Engineer of the Department of Finance and offered the following resolution:

Hon. Edward M. Grout, Comptroller:

Sir—In regard to the proposed lease of the bulkhead foot of East Eighty-fourth street, Borough of Manhattan, to Samuel McGarigle, President of the Cygnet Club, for a term of three years, at an annual rental of \$150, as submitted by the Commissioner of Docks and Ferries, in a communication dated June 5, 1902, for the approval of the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, I would report as follows:

The conditions are as stated in the letter of the Commissioner, except that the title to East Eighty-fourth street was vested on February 14, 1896, the proceedings for opening being confirmed on December 7, and the order filed December 15, 1896.

It does not appear from an examination of the damage map that any private ownership exists in the land and water front occupied and used by the club, as the award for all the land between high-water mark and the United States pier and bulkhead line was made to The City of New York.

The action, therefore, of Charles Acton, as agent for collecting rent at any time for this property, does not appear warranted.

I see no objections to the approval of the proposed lease by the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund.

The report was accepted and the resolution unanimously adopted.

The following communication was received from the Department of Docks and Ferries relative to a lease of Pier, new 26, North river, to the Old Dominion Steamship Company:

NEW YORK, May 29, 1902.

N. Taylor Phillips, Esq., Secretary to the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund:

Sir—Subject to the approval of the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, I have agreed to lease to the Old Dominion Steamship Company Pier, new 26, North river, at the foot of Beach street, together with the bulkhead extending from a point 125 feet south of the southerly side of Pier, new 26, to the southerly side of Pier, new 27, and extending in width from the front or edge of said bulkhead to a line fifty feet easterly therefrom, for a term of ten years from May 1, 1902, with the privilege of two renewals of ten years each, upon notice being given at least three months prior to the expiration of the preceding term, the rental for the first term to be at the rate of \$49,428.34 per annum, for the second term at the rate of \$52,723.56 per annum, and for the third term at the rate of \$56,238.46 per annum, payable in every case quarterly in advance at the office of this department.

The Old Dominion Steamship Company has been a tenant of the City at its present site for over thirty years, during which time it has expended about \$200,000 in improvements on the property.

The sheds and other structures thereon have now so deteriorated that it is necessary that they be practically rebuilt. This will be done by the company at its cost and expense. The company states that it proposes to expend in the near future upwards of \$40,000 in improvements on the property, and that it expects to expend \$100,000 for such improvements within the first term of the lease for which it has made application. For this reason a lease of thirty years is recommended.

In addition, it appears to me that the interests of the City and its commercial advantage will be subserved by encouraging coastwise transportation lines in every manner consistent with the good of the City, and that such lines should receive just and fair treatment.

The total cost of building the pier with its extensions, and including the cost of the bulkhead wall and improvements in rear of same, amounted to \$259,311.62.

The pier as it now stands is 855 by 80 feet.

Pier, new 25, the next pier on the south, is leased for \$36,163.47. The next pier on the south is leased for \$29,186.19, while Piers, new 27 and 28, the next two piers on the north, together with 145 feet of bulkhead, are leased for \$56,000.

The present rental of Pier, new 26, and bulkhead is \$46,339.07 per annum, and the rental proposed in the new lease is an advance of six and two-thirds per cent. over the present rental, and in view of the large expenditures which the company must of necessity make within the near future and of all the other facts in the case, I consider the proposed rental a fair one and beg to recommend that the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund approve of and consent to the execution of a lease on the terms above set forth.

No other application for a lease of said Pier, new 26, North river, or said bulkhead, has been made to this Department.

That the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund hereby approve of and consent to the execution, by the Commissioner of Docks, of a lease to the Old Dominion Steamship Company of Pier, new 26, North River, at the foot of Beach street, together with the bulkhead extending from a point 125 feet south of the southerly side of Pier, new 26, to the southerly side of Pier, new 27, North river, and extending, in width, from the front or edge of said bulkhead to a line fifty feet easterly therefrom, for a term of ten years from May 1, 1902, with the privilege of two renewals of ten years each, upon notice being given at least three months prior to the expiration of the preceding term, the rental for the first term to be at the rate of \$49,428.34 per annum, for the second term at the rate of \$52,723.56 per annum, and for the third term at the rate of \$56,238.46 per annum, payable in every case quarterly in advance at the office of the Department of Docks and Ferries.

Which was unanimously adopted.

The following communication was received from the Department of Docks and Ferries relative to a lease of a portion of the pier at the foot of East Eighth street to John F. Walsh and others:

NEW YORK, May 29, 1902.

N. TAYLOR PHILLIPS, Esq., Secretary to the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund:

SIR—Subject to the approval of the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, I have agreed to lease to John F. Walsh, James Tregarthen and James A. Tregarthen the northerly half of the pier foot of East Eighth street, Borough of Manhattan, for a term of ten years from June 1, 1902, at a rental of twelve hundred dollars per annum, payable quarterly in advance at the office of this Department.

The lessees shall have the privilege of mooring a dry dock on the northerly side of said pier, said dry dock to be moored at least seventy-five feet from the inner end of the pier.

The lease will contain a provision that if at any time during the said term of ten years The City of New York shall become possessed of title to the southerly half of said pier, then, at the option of the Commissioner of Docks and the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, said lease may be canceled.

The northerly half of the above mentioned pier is owned by the City and the southerly half is claimed to be owned by the Long Island Railroad Company and is at present occupied by said company. A suit was commenced many years ago by the City for the acquisition of the southerly half, but has never been tried.

Owing to the dual ownership of the pier and the questionable title of the railroad company to the southerly half thereof, it has been impossible to have any extensive repairs made, and actually the pier requires to be rebuilt.

As above stated, the lease will provide that if at any time during the term thereof the City become possessed of title to the southerly half of the pier, then, at the option of the Commissioner of Docks and the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, the lease may be canceled, and the pier can then be torn down and a new pier built in its place.

In the meantime the Department is receiving little or no revenue from the pier, as owing to the decayed condition of same it is unwilling to accept the responsibility of allowing boats to moor at its portion of the pier in consequence of liability to accidents, and the Department is of the opinion that the best use to which it could be put pending the settlement of the suit and the rebuilding of the pier is to lease it for the purpose of mooring a dry dock therat.

It is estimated that about \$8,000 must be spent by the lessees in order that the pier may be made suitable for the purpose for which it is to be leased, and in view of this condition of affairs no comparison of rentals can be made with other piers in the vicinity.

At the pier foot of East Fourth street there is a dry dock on the north side and one on the south side, each of which pay at the rate of \$1,750 per annum, but this pier is in first-class condition, practically new and was dredged to a depth of thirty feet by the Department before the dry docks were moored therat.

At the foot of Stanton street, East river, the southerly half of the pier and the bulkhead southerly have been leased for dry dock purposes at the rate of \$4,000 per annum, but in this case the lessee has the use of the new-made land in rear of the stone bulkhead, which serves as a yard and is used for the storing of the materials required in the carrying on of its business. In this case, also, the Department does the dredging, which for dry dock purposes must be to a depth at least twice that required for ordinary wharfage purposes in that vicinity.

In view of the large preliminary expenditure to be made by the lessee, the uncertainty of the duration of the lease and the dilapidated condition of the pier (which the lessee is required to keep in order and assume liability for accidents), I am of the opinion that the rate of twelve hundred dollars is a fair one and beg to recommend that the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund approve of and consent to the execution of a lease upon the terms above set forth.

No other application for a lease of the north side of the pier foot of East Eighth street has been made to this Department.

Tregarthen of the northerly half of the pier foot of East Eighth street, Borough of Manhattan, for a term of ten years from June 1, 1902, at a rental of twelve hundred dollars per annum, payable quarterly in advance at the office of the Department of Docks and Ferries, with the privilege to the lessees of mooring a dry dock on the northerly side of said pier, said dry dock to be moored at least seventy-five feet from the inner end of the pier. The said lease shall also contain a provision that if at any time during the term thereof The City of New York shall acquire title to the southerly half of said pier foot of East Eighth street, then the Commissioner of Docks may, at his option, with the approval and consent of the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, cancel and terminate the said lease.

The following communication was received from the Department of Docks and Ferries relative to a lease of the outer end of the Recreation Pier at the foot of West One Hundred and Twenty-ninth street, to Eben E. Olcott:

NEW YORK, June 2, 1902.

N. TAYLOR PHILLIPS, Esq., Secretary to the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund:

SIR—Subject to the approval of the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, I have agreed to lease to Eben E. Olcott, all and singular, the wharfage which may arise, accrue or become due in the manner and at the rates prescribed by law at the outer end of the pier foot of West One Hundred and Twenty-ninth street and at the north and south sides of said pier for a distance of twenty feet from the outer end thereof, with the privilege of using the surface of said pier inshore a distance of ninety-six feet from the outer end thereof, excepting, however, all structures, closets, etc., forming part of the recreation structure on said pier, for the term of five years from the date of the consent of the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund to the execution of such lease, at a rental of three thousand dollars per annum, payable quarterly in advance at the office of this department, and with the privilege of a renewal for a further term of five years at an advanced rental of twenty per cent. on the rental for the first term.

It is understood that the use of that portion of the pier above agreed to be leased

shall in no way interfere with the operation of the ferry to Fort Lee, New Jersey, during the temporary location of said ferry at the north side of said pier, and also that the lease shall be subject to all the provisions of Section 837 of the Greater New York Charter.

The pier at the foot of West One Hundred and Twenty-ninth Street has recreation structure erected on it, the recreation structure forming the second story, thus making it a shedded pier, and its use is regulated by section 837 of the Greater New York Charter.

Mr. Olcott, the proposed lessee, is the president of the Hudson River Day Line, and the lease is granted for the purpose of enabling this line to make a landing in Harlem, which will afford the residents of that part of the city facilities equal to those possessed by the people of the downtown sections for reaching Hudson River points, and will also afford the residents of cities and towns up the river an opportunity to patronize the large stores which the upper part of the city now boasts of. During the summer months the traveling public residing in the upper section of the city, who have occasion to patronize the Hudson River boats, and who are now obliged to go downtown to reach them, will find it a great convenience if they can take the boats at One Hundred and Twenty-ninth Street. The Department has tried for some time to induce the North River steamboats to land at the pier in question, but they have declined to do so unless they could control the outer end so as to insure their landing without delay. The steamboats run practically on railroad time, and a pier open to general wharfage such as the One Hundred and Twenty-ninth Street pier has been heretofore is not suitable for their purposes, as the delays would prevent their making the necessary connections.

The entire pier during the year 1901 earned \$3,830.31, and as the lease in question is for the outer end only I consider the rental proposed, three thousand dollars, a fair one.

The rental for the renewal term has been fixed at an advance of twenty per cent., as in my opinion the value of the pier will be greatly enhanced within the next five years.

The pier is about 329 feet long on the north side and 353 on the south side, and is 60 feet in width, and together with the shed thereon cost \$130,204.01.

Owing to the fact that the lease in question is merely for the outer end of the pier, no comparison can be made with the rentals of adjoining piers. The twenty feet on the north and south sides, which are included in the lease, are added for the purpose of enabling the steamboat company to control this space. They require about twenty feet for swinging their boats in and out.

I respectfully request that the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund approve of and consent to the execution of a lease by me in accordance with the terms above stated.

Olcott, of the outer end of the pier foot of West One Hundred and Twenty-ninth Street, Borough of Manhattan, together with twenty feet on the north side and twenty feet on the south side of said pier extending inshore from the outer end thereof, and together with the use of the surface of said pier for a distance of ninety-six feet from the outer end thereof, excepting, however, all structures, closets, etc., forming part of the recreation structure on said pier, for a term of five years from the 1st day of July, 1902, at a rental of three thousand dollars per annum, payable quarterly in advance at the office of the Department of Docks and Ferries.

The lessee shall have the privilege of a renewal for a further term of five years at an advanced rental of twenty per cent. on the rental for the first term.

It is understood and agreed that the use of that portion of the pier above agreed to be leased shall in no way interfere with the operation of the ferry to Fort Lee, New Jersey, during the temporary location of said ferry at the north side of said pier, and also that the lease shall be subject to all provisions of section 837 of the Greater New York Charter.

The following communication was received from the Department of Docks and Ferries relative to the vesting of title in condemnation proceedings for the Department of Docks, between Eighteenth and Twenty-third streets, North River:

NEW YORK, June 20, 1902.

N. TAYLOR PHILLIPS, Esq., Secretary to the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund:

SIR—I beg to advise that on June 20, 1902, the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, by resolution duly adopted, authorized the institution of proceedings for the acquisition by the City of certain property and rights, hereinafter described, for the improvement of that portion of the water front along the Hudson River, known as the Chelsea section.

It is the desire of this Department that the improvement of this Chelsea Section shall proceed with the utmost practicable celerity, and I therefore beg to request that the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund shall, in accordance with section 823a of the Greater New York Charter, as amended by chapter 611 of the Laws of 1902, by resolution direct, that the title to the said wharf property and rights described below shall vest in the City of New York, upon the filing in the office of the Clerk of the Supreme Court, in the First Judicial District, of the oaths of the Commissioners of Estimate and Assessment to be appointed in said proceedings.

The following is a description of the premises referred to above:

1. Bulkhead rights extending from the southerly side of West Twenty-third street to the northerly side of West Twenty-second street.

2. The block bounded by the northerly side of West Twenty-first street and the southerly side of West Twenty-second street, the westerly side of Eleventh avenue and the easterly side of Thirteenth avenue.

3. The bulkhead rights extending from the northerly side of West Twenty-first street to the southerly side of West Twenty-second street.

4. The block bounded by the northerly side of West Twenty-first street and the southerly side of West Twenty-second street, the westerly side of Eleventh avenue and the easterly side of Thirteenth avenue.

5. The bulkhead rights extending from the northerly side of West Twenty-first street to the southerly side of West Twenty-first street.

6. Block bounded by the northerly side of West Nineteenth street, southerly side of West Twentieth street, westerly side of Eleventh avenue and easterly side of Thirteenth avenue.

7. The bulkhead rights extending from the northerly side of West Nineteenth street to the southerly side of West Twentieth street.

8. Bounded by the northerly side of West Nineteenth street, easterly side of Eleventh avenue, southerly side of West Twentieth street, and easterly side of marginal street, wharf or place.

9. Block bounded by the northerly side of West Eighteenth street, southerly side of West Nineteenth street, westerly side of Eleventh avenue and easterly side of Thirteenth avenue.

10. Bulkhead rights extending from the northerly side of West Eighteenth street to the southerly side of West Nineteenth street.

11. Bounded by the northerly side of West Eighteenth street, easterly side of Eleventh avenue, southerly side of West Nineteenth street, and easterly side of marginal wharf, street or place.

In connection therewith the Comptroller presented the following report of the Engineer of the Department of Finance and offered the following resolution:

Hon. EDWARD M. GROUT, Comptroller:

SIR—Hon. McDougall Hawkes, Commissioner of Docks and Ferries, in a communication dated June 20, 1902, requests the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund to take action, pursuant to chapter 611 of the Laws of 1902, by directing that title to certain wharf property, land and land under water, between the north side of Eighteenth street, to the south side of Twenty-third street, the east side of a marginal street, wharf or place (as laid out on a map of the Department of Docks and Ferries, and approved by the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund March 11, 1898, as amended by resolution of July 31, 1901), and the Hudson or North River, the several pieces being more particularly described in the said communication, shall vest in the City of New York upon the filing of the oaths of the Commissioners of Estimate and Appraisal to be appointed by the Supreme Court, and proceedings taken to acquire the same.

The Board of Estimate and Apportionment on June 20, 1902, authorized the Corporation Counsel to initiate proceedings to acquire title to the said property for and in behalf of the City of New York, and the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, pursuant to chapter 611 of the Laws of 1902, are given power to direct, by resolution, that the title to said lands shall vest in the City at such time after the filing of the oaths of the Commissioners aforesaid, as they may deem expedient.

As the law further provides that this action may be taken "in a proceeding *hereafter brought* * * * it will be necessary for the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund to await action until after the appointment of Commissioners of Estimate and Appraisal has been made by the Supreme Court, at which time the proceedings may be deemed to have been legally initiated.

After these proceedings are initiated, it will be necessary for the Law Department to have the premises examined before the present structures are removed, in order to provide for the City's testimony before the Commissioners.

This could be done in thirty days and during this period the Department of Docks and Ferries would have time to advertise and let the necessary contracts for the improvement, so that no time would be lost between the date of vesting of title and the actual commencement of work.

I am of the opinion that the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund should exercise the power given them by the said law, and would, therefore, recommend that a resolution be passed, directing that thirty (30) days after the filing of the oaths of the Commissioners duly appointed, the title to the said wharf property, uplands and land under water, rights, terms, easements and privileges, shall vest in The City of New York.

It would appear to me that if the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund should decide to take this course, notice of their proposed action should be published in order that property owners may have as much time to arrange their business affairs as possible, before the City takes summary possession.

You have already received communications requesting to be advised of what action, if any, is likely to be taken.

Whereas, Pursuant to the provisions of chapter 611 of the Laws of 1902, this Board is given power to direct by resolution that the title to the said lands, etc., shall vest in The City of New York at such time after the filing of oaths of Commissioners of Estimate and Appraisal, to be appointed by the Supreme Court, as may be deemed expedient, and

Whereas, It is the sense of the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund that the title to the said lands, etc., should vest as soon as practicable after the appointment of said Commissioners, in order that the improvement of the water front may proceed at the earliest possible time; therefore be it

Resolved, That the property owners are hereby given notice that it is the intention of the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund to vest title in The City of New York for the said property thirty days after the filing of oaths of the Commissioners of Estimate and Appraisal, to be appointed by the Supreme Court; and be it further

Resolved, That this resolution be published in the "City Record" for thirty days.

The report was accepted and the resolution unanimously adopted.

The following communication was received from the Department of Docks and Ferries relative to a lease of Piers 10 and 11, North river, to the Central Railroad of New Jersey:

NEW YORK, June 19, 1902.

Hon. SETH LOW, Mayor, and Chairman of the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund:

SIR—I transmit herewith copy of communication to the Central Railroad Company of New Jersey agreeing to lease to said company Piers, new 10 and 11, North river, together with the adjoining bulkheads, with the privilege of erecting sheds on said piers, for a term of ten years from the date said piers and bulkheads are completed and ready for occupation, at a yearly rental of \$74,000, with covenants for two renewals of ten years each, the company in addition to convey to The City of New York the title of the southerly half of Pier, old 12, to the northerly half of Pier, old 14, together with fifty-eight feet of bulkhead, etc., also providing that the company shall proceed at once with the improvement, under the new plan, of the property owned by said company next northerly of the premises above referred to, for a distance of about 173 feet.

The company at the present time is the lessee of the northerly half of Pier 12, Pier 13, and the southerly half of Pier 14, North river, with the bulkheads between, for which it pays the City the rent of \$53,850 per annum, which piers will be extinguished by the building of new Piers 10 and 11, which it is proposed to lease to the company.

The company owns the southerly half of Pier 12, the northerly half of Pier 14 and 58 feet bulkhead south of Pier, old 12, the assessed valuation of which is estimated at \$156,000; the exact assessed valuation it is impossible to state, as a portion of the premises are combined with other property owned by the company.

The improvements under the new plan in question contemplate the building of a bulkhead a distance of 346 feet and the erection of two new piers, one at Albany street, to be known as Pier, new 10, and one at Cedar street, to be known as Pier, new 11.

The company on January 22, 1894, offered to sell to the City the property in question for the sum of \$400,000, on condition that the City would grant a lease of the premises, which it is proposed now to lease, for the sum of \$78,000, and an agreement was entered into between the company and the Board of Docks at that time for the purchase of the property, which, however, was not acted upon by the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund.

By the present arrangement the City gets \$74,000 per annum for the lease of the piers, and the property which the Dock Board at that time agreed to purchase for \$400,000 is to be transferred to the City without cost, as a consideration therefor.

In addition to this, the City secures the improvement of the water front under the new plan, the building of the bulkhead wall and the widening of the exterior street for a distance of 583 feet, 237 feet of which will be built by the company at its own cost and expense, and 346 feet, referred to in the proposed lease, which latter work will be completed by the City at an estimated cost of \$300,000.

Pier, new 10, when built, will be 750 feet long by 80 feet wide, and Pier, new 11, will be about 781 feet long by 60 feet wide at the northerly side of which is the ferry rack of the Central Railroad Company of New Jersey's Liberty street ferry.

The next pier to the south, which is owned by the City and leased, is Pier, new 1, (North river, a two-sided pier), the area of which is 36,252 square feet, and is leased for \$23,000 per annum, 63 cents per square foot per annum. In addition, the lessee is given the use of the shed on said pier which belonged, at the time of the commencement of the lease, to The City of New York.

The next pier to the north, which is leased, is Pier, new 14 (a two-sided pier),

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American Line, lessee, the rental of which is 63 cents per square foot per annum. In this latter case the lessee built the shed.

The next pier to the north is Pier, new 15 (a one-sided pier), also leased to the American Line, at 57 cents per square foot per annum, the lessee erecting the shed.

Pier, new 10, is a two-sided pier and Pier, new 11, a one-sided pier which, under the proposed lease, will be rented by the City to said company, at the rate of \$74,000 per annum, 65 cents per square foot, and in addition, the City acquires property, the assessed valuation of which is over \$150,000, and is probably worth nearly \$400,000, free of cost.

The entire improvements, together with the sheds which will be erected by the company, to revert to the City at the expiration of the lease, and the City secures in addition, the improvements under the new plan and the widening of the exterior street for a distance of 583 feet, bringing the improvements down to the middle of the block between Albany and Carlisle streets, with the exception of the Pennsylvania property at the foot of Cortlandt street, and this Department has been informed that the latter company was only waiting for the improvements of the Liberty Street Ferry premises before proceeding with the Cortlandt street improvements.

I consider this one of the best business propositions that has ever been presented to the City through this Department, and as the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund will meet on the 25th instant, for the last time this summer, I respectfully request that it be acted upon at that meeting.

Hon. EDWARD M. GROUT, Comptroller:

SIR—Hon. McDougall Hawkes, Commissioner of the Department of Docks and Ferries, in a communication dated June 19, 1902, transmits a "copy of communication to the Central Railroad Company of New Jersey, agreeing to lease to said company, Piers, new 10 and 11, North river, together with the adjoining bulkheads, with the privilege of erecting sheds on said piers, for a term of ten years from the date said piers and bulkheads are completed and ready for occupation, at a yearly rental of \$74,000, with covenants for two renewals of ten years each."

The communication to the Central Railroad of New Jersey above referred to is as follows:

"By virtue of the power and authority vested by law and in pursuance of the statutes in such case made and provided, as Commissioners of Docks, I hereby agree to lease, assign and to farm let to the Central Railroad Company of New Jersey, all and singular the wharfage which may arise, accrue or become due in the manner and at the rates prescribed by law, for the use and occupation of a pier to be built at or near the foot of Albany street, to be known as Pier, new 10, North river, and a pier to be built at or near the foot of Cedar street, North river, to be known as Pier, new 11, North river, the dimensions and locations of said piers to be hereafter determined by the Commissioner of Docks, and the bulkhead extending from a point opposite the middle of the block between Carlisle and Albany streets on the North river northerly to a point about forty feet southerly of the northerly line of Cedar street extended, to the bulkhead line of 1871, a distance of about 346 feet, more or less, to be hereafter determined by the Board of Docks, for a term of ten years from the date when said piers and bulkheads are completed and ready for occupation at a yearly rental of \$74,000 per annum, payable quarterly in advance at the office of this Department, with covenants for two renewals of ten years each at an advance of 5 per cent. on each renewal.

"The rentals shall commence as follows:

"When the Engineer-in-Chief or other proper officer of the Department of Docks and Ferries shall report the completion of Pier, new 10, North river, the Central Railroad Company of New Jersey shall commence payment of rental therefor at the rate of \$35,000 per annum for said pier.

"When the Engineer-in-Chief or other proper officer of the Department shall report the completion of Pier, new 11, North river, the Central Railroad Company of New Jersey shall commence the payment of rental therefor at the rate of \$30,000 per annum for said pier.

"And, when the two piers and bulkhead are completed, as certified by the Engineer-in-Chief or other proper official of the Department of Docks and Ferries, rental shall be fixed at the rate of \$74,000, as above provided.

"The Central Railroad Company of New Jersey shall have the right to erect on said Piers, new 10 and 11, sheds, in accordance with the plans and specifications to be submitted to and approved by the Engineer-in-Chief of this Department. Said sheds to revert to and become the property of The City of New York upon the expiration or sooner termination of said lease.

"It being understood and agreed that the above agreement to lease is granted upon the following conditions:

"First—The Central Railroad Company of New Jersey shall convey or cause to be conveyed to The City of New York good title to the several rights, titles and interests in and to the northerly half of Pier 14 and in and to the southerly half of Pier, old 12, North river, and in and to the wharfage rights, etc., appertaining to the fifty-eight feet of bulkhead on the southerly side of said Pier, old 12, North river, with the rights to land under water and the riparian and other rights, if any, in front thereof and connected therewith not now owned by The City of New York or by the people of the State of New York.

"Second—The Central Railroad Company of New Jersey shall agree to proceed with the improvement under the new plan adopted by the Department of Docks and approved by the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, of the property commencing at the northerly side of Pier, old 14, North river, and extending northerly a distance of about 173 feet. Said work to be commenced within three months from July 1, 1902, and to be pushed to completion as rapidly as possible, the work to be entirely completed before July 1, 1904.

"Third—The Central Railroad Company of New Jersey shall agree to execute a lease containing the covenants and conditions at the present time embodied in that lease of wharf property granted by the Commissioner of Docks, a copy of which may be seen and examined at the office of the Department, Pier "A," Battery place.

"Fourth—This agreement to lease to be of no force or effect unless the terms and conditions thereof are approved by the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, and that said Commissioners of the Sinking Fund consent to approve of the execution of a lease embodying the terms and conditions as above recited, and that the Central Railroad Company of New Jersey shall file their written acceptance within five days."

I inclose herewith a diagram showing the location of the improvement and lease.

The lease as outlined in the agreement presented by the Commissioner appears to me, in every way, advantageous to the City, and I respectfully recommend that the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund approve the same.

Resolved, That the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund hereby approve of and consent to the execution by the Commissioner of Docks, of a lease to the Central Railroad Company of New Jersey, of all and singular the wharfage, which may arise, accrue or become due, in the manner and at the rates prescribed by law, for the use and occupation of the pier to be built at or near the foot of Albany street, to be known as Pier new 10, North river, and the pier to be built at or near the foot of Cedar street, to be known as Pier new 11, North river, the dimensions and locations of said piers to be hereafter determined by the Commissioner of Docks, and the bulkhead extending from a point opposite the middle of the block between Carlisle and Albany streets, on the North river, northerly to a point about forty feet southerly of the northerly line of Cedar street extended, a distance of about 346 feet, more or less, to be hereafter determined by the Commissioner of Docks, for the term of ten years from the date when said piers and bulkhead are completed and ready for occupation, at a rental of \$74,000 per annum, payable quarterly in advance at the office of the Department of Docks and Ferries, with covenants for two renewals of ten years each, at an advance of 5 per cent. on each renewal.

The rental shall commence as follows:

When the Engineer-in-Chief of the Department of Docks and Ferries reports the

completion of Pier new 10, North river, the Central Railroad Company of New Jersey shall commence payment of rental therefor at the rate of \$35,000 per annum.

When the Engineer-in-Chief shall report the completion of Pier new 11, North river, the lessee shall commence the payment of rental at the rate of \$30,000 per annum, and when the two piers, together with the bulkhead, are completed, as certified to by the Engineer-in-Chief of the Department of Docks and Ferries, the rental, at the rate of \$74,000 per annum aforesaid, shall become payable.

The Central Railroad Company of New Jersey shall have the right to erect on said Piers new 10 and 11, sheds in accordance with plans and specifications to be submitted to and approved by the Engineer-in-Chief of the Department of Docks and Ferries, said sheds to revert to and become the property of the City of New York upon the expiration or sooner termination of said lease, it being understood and agreed that the lease is granted upon the following conditions:

First—The Central Railroad Company of New Jersey shall convey or cause to be conveyed to The City of New York good title to the several rights, titles and interests in and to the northerly half of Pier 14 and in and to the southerly half of Pier old 12, North river, and in and to the wharfage, etc., appertaining to the fifty-eight feet of bulkhead on the southerly side of Pier old 12, North river, with the rights to lands under water and the riparian and other rights, if any, in front of and connected therewith, not now owned by the City of New York or by the State of New York.

Second—The Central Railroad Company of New Jersey shall agree to proceed with the improvements under the New Plan adopted by the Department of Docks and Ferries and approved by the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, of the property commencing at the northerly side of Pier old 14, North river, and extending northerly a distance of about 173 feet, said work to be commenced within three months from July 1st, 1902, and to be pushed to completion as rapidly as possible, the work to be entirely completed before July 1st, 1904.

The Central Railroad Company of New Jersey shall agree to execute a lease containing the covenants and conditions at present embodied in the leases of wharf property granted by the Commissioner of Docks, a copy of which may be seen and examined at the office of the Department, Pier "A," Battery Place.

The report was accepted and the resolution unanimously adopted.

The following communication was received from the Department of Docks and Ferries relative to the request of the North Side Board of Trade for docking facilities on the Harlem river: (See page)

NEW YORK, June 24, 1902.

N. TAYLOR PHILLIPS, Esq., Secretary to the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund:

SIR—Referring to your communication of the 10th instant, transmitting preamble and resolution from the North Side Board of Trade requesting the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund to take the necessary steps for the erection of a public dock at or near One Hundred and Thirty-sixth Street on the Harlem River, also requesting the Dock Board to provide one or more public docks on the Bronx side of the Harlem River, which was referred to the Commissioner of Docks for report, I beg to submit the following:

A careful examination has been made of the water front of the Bronx in the vicinity of East One Hundred and Thirty-sixth Street, and the Department is of the opinion that the foot of this street possesses the greatest advantages for the location of a public dock.

There is no doubt an urgent necessity for additional public wharf room in the Borough of the Bronx, but before any steps can be taken to locate a public dock at the foot of East One Hundred and Thirty-sixth Street that street must first be opened to the bulkhead line, and as soon as this is done the Department will proceed at once with the construction of a pier. The Commissioner has been in communication with the President of the Borough of the Bronx relative thereto, and the proper authorities in the Borough of the Bronx have taken the initial steps for opening East One Hundred and Thirty-sixth Street out to the bulkhead line.

Hon. EDWARD M. GROUT, Comptroller:

SIR—In regard to the request of the Board of Education that the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund authorize a renewal of the lease of premises on Steinway and Vanderventer avenues, Borough of Queens, for three years from September 9, 1902, at an annual rental of \$900, I beg to submit an extract from my report of January 30, 1899, in regard to the original lease:

"These premises consist of a three-story and cellar frame building, 25 by 55 feet, on a lot 25 by 95 feet 1/4 inches, arranged for store below and tenement above. The property is assessed on the tax books at \$3,500, and may be worth \$6,000. The rental asked is 15 per cent. of this amount. It is expected that the changes to be made by the owner (whose name is not given in the resolution) will cost about \$300.

"It is apparent that such a rent as asked cannot properly be paid on the value of the property, or the amount of the improvement; it may, however, be that the property is absolutely necessary for the purpose of providing school room in that vicinity.

"I can see no reason for fixing the date of this proposed lease, October 1, 1898, as the building is not occupied for school purposes, and no changes whatever have been made, as called for in the resolution."

The lessor is Edward W. Larner, and under the terms of the lease authorized, The City of New York is obliged to make all repairs.

There has been no increase in assessed valuation of the property since my original report, and the City having paid what I consider much more than market value for three years, I believe the Board of Education should be requested to secure better terms for a renewal.

Kirkland, Deputy Superintendent of School Supplies for the Borough of Queens, with the President of the Queens County Savings Bank, compensation to be made at the rate of ten dollars per month.

The Committee on Supplies has approved this bill for payment, and submits for adoption the following resolution:

Resolved, That the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund be and they hereby are requested to authorize and direct the Comptroller of The City of New York to pay to the Queens County Savings Bank, No. 71 Broadway, Flushing, Borough of Queens, \$110, being the rent of basement and hall of the bank building, No. 71 Broadway, Flushing, Borough of Queens, occupied by the depository for school supplies from March 1, 1899, to February 1, 1900.

A true copy of report and resolution adopted by the Board of Education, at a meeting held June 25, 1902.

The premises leased were insufficient for the storage of the material, and the hallway and part of the basement were subsequently used until larger quarters at Nos. 63 and 65 Broadway were leased by resolution of the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, on February 1, 1900 (Minutes, page 65).

I would recommend that the Comptroller be authorized to pay for the use and occupation of such hallway and basement for the eleven months, at \$10 per month, as requested by the Board of Education.

Relating to Appeal No. 192 of 1902, on file with your Board, affecting the plans designated as New Building No. 375 of 1902, in the Building Bureau, I respectfully request permission to submit to your Board the following revised proposition to supersede the application filed to you on June 27, 1902.

It is desired to have the fore and aft partitions, where so marked, constructed fireproof by the use of 3 inch porous terra cotta blocks laid in cement in angle and tee irons, placed 2 feet 6 inches on centres. Said angles, tees, etc., to be supported by resting on steel I beams set in the second tier. The cross partition will be built of similar terra cotta blocks, but will rest on steel beams placed directly beneath the partition in each tier.

This revision of the original application is submitted for your worthy consideration and approval at the next meeting of your Board.

Mr. Cleary and Mr. Meyers appeared in explanation.

On motion, duly made and seconded, approved on condition that the apartments on each floor shall be separated from each other by the proposed fireproof partitions.

Mr. D'Oench voting no.

Appeal No. 193 of 1902, New Building No. 411 of 1902 (withdrawn by the Superintendent of Buildings July 1, as the plans and papers had not been examined).

On motion, duly made and seconded, approved on condition that the apartments on each floor shall be separated from each other by the proposed fireproof partitions.

Mr. D'Oench voting no.

Appeal No. 201 of 1902, New Building No. 382 of 1902, premises north side of One Hundred and Sixth street, fifty-five feet west of Manhattan avenue, Moore & Landsiedel, architects and appellants.

1. In regard to present old party wall would ask that same be allowed to be built upon eight feet higher; the present wall is now sixty feet high twenty-eight inches thick for second, ten feet and twenty-four inches first, ten feet below curb and sixteen inches thick on first story and twelve inches to top of brick wall, which would make a twelve-inch portion about fifty-three feet. The adjoining house is a five-story apartment house; the walls are built of best materials throughout and in excellent condition.

2. In regard to fifty feet for a single thickness, the front and rear walls will be laid in cement; the windows have been made three feet from three feet four inches, and piers made larger, and therefore be allowed to use same to a height of single thickness for a sixteen-inch wall to fifty-three feet.

Mr. F. L. Landsiedel appeared in explanation.

No action taken on section No. 1 of appeal by reason of the opinion of the Superintendent of Buildings.

Motion duly made and seconded that section No. 2 be approved on condition that the front and rear walls of the first story be made twenty inches thick, exclusive of ashlar, and above the first story be built sixteen inches thick. The walls to be laid in cement mortar, and the face brick bonded every sixth course, with regular headers. Lost on vote.

Appeal No. 202 of 1902, Alteration No. 955 of 1902, premises No. 77 West Forty-fifth street, John J. Manley, architect and appellant.

The petitioners' client would respectfully ask that the law be so modified and construed to allow the extension for inclosure of a boiler, which is to be used for heating apparatus, to be constructed of L and T iron frames, covered with galvanized iron, for the following reasons:

1. That structure is entirely fireproof and forms a cover for boiler and heating apparatus, and has no direct connection with main building.

2. That said construction answers the requirements of Section No. 27 of the Code and is of a form of construction equally as good as brick walls required by Section No. 32 of the Code.

3. That the objection be waived requiring brick walls inclosing boiler and that substantial justice be done and that plans be approved as filed.

Appeal withdrawn by the Superintendent of Buildings.

Appeal No. 203 of 1902, New Building No. 346 of 1902, premises Nos. 57 and 59 East Eleventh street, Messrs. Buchman & Fox, architects and appellants.

Appeal withdrawn by Messrs. Buchman & Fox, July 7, 1902.

Appeal No. 204 of 1902, Alteration (no number), Brooklyn, premises south side of State street, about 150 feet east of Hoyt street; C. Shubert, architect and appellant.

The addition to the westerly side of the building, in accordance to the plans and specifications herewith, said addition to extend over the present or existing alleyway to the brick party wall of the adjoining building.

Mr. C. Shubert appeared in explanation.

"The agitation for street signs has been adroitly managed in the interest of a plan which, if adopted, will eventually result in large and needless annual expense." I have no objection whatever to the Comptroller or any other member of this Board placing upon record his opposition to any appropriation asked for, but I do insist that such a protest should contain only facts and reasons and nothing more. The quotation from his communication, which was deliberately prepared, reflects upon at least one member of this Board and also upon disinterested citizens who gratuitously gave their services to the City for its benefit. The Comptroller could have no knowledge whatever of the matter referred to, and his comment is purely speculative. I desire to say that the statement is wholly untrue. No such "agitation" was ever "adroitly" or in any other way planned in favor of any particular sign or class of signs. The sole purpose of those who are associated with me was to find a sign artistic, legible, thoroughly practicable and one which would entail the smallest amount of expense to the City. The statement, therefore, of the Comptroller is wholly unjustified in fact, but is simply an imaginary one and should not be made a part of the records of this Board. I have no objection, however, to its remaining if the Board desires it, but I shall ask that this communication also be made part of the record.

Resolved, That the Board of Estimate and Apportionment hereby approves of the selection of the property at the corner bounded by Rodney street, Marcy avenue and Division avenue, in the Borough of Brooklyn, size 245 feet by 213 feet by 245 feet, as a site for a Carnegie Library, and that the Comptroller be and hereby is authorized to employ a surveyor for the purpose of having the property surveyed and having the tax valuations certified in order that this Board may present the same to the Corporation Counsel, with instructions to commence condemnation proceedings.

Which was adopted by the following vote:

Affirmative—The Mayor, Comptroller, President of the Board of Aldermen, and the Presidents of the Boroughs of Manhattan, Brooklyn, The Bronx, Queens and Richmond—16.

The consideration of the proposed site on Franklin avenue was laid over.

The President of the Borough of Brooklyn offered the following:

Resolved, That the negotiations for the purchase, at private sale, of the property, 100 feet by 90 feet, located at the northwest corner of Clinton and Union streets, in the Borough of Brooklyn, for a Carnegie Library site, be referred to the Comptroller, with power.

Which was adopted by the following vote:

Affirmative—The Mayor, Comptroller, President of the Board of Aldermen, and the Presidents of the Boroughs of Manhattan, Brooklyn, The Bronx, Queens and Richmond—16.

The President of the Board of Aldermen offered the following:

Resolved, That the Board of Estimate and Apportionment hereby approves of and accepts the property, 100 feet by 100 feet, located on the northwest corner of First avenue and Thirteenth street, in the former Village of College Point, now a part of the Third Ward, Borough of Queens, as a site for a Carnegie Library, by warranty deed, at a nominal consideration, and requests the Corporation Counsel to examine the title and prepare the necessary papers for the acquisition of the same by gift.

Which was adopted by the following vote:

Affirmative—The Mayor, Comptroller, President of the Board of Aldermen, and the Presidents of the Boroughs of Manhattan, Brooklyn, The Bronx, Queens and Richmond—16.

The President of the Borough of Queens offered the following:

Resolved, That as an expression of appreciation the Board of Estimate and Apportionment extends to the citizens of the former Village of College Point, now a part of the Third Ward of the Borough of Queens, a vote of thanks for their generosity in donating to The City of New York the property, 100 feet by 100 feet, located on the northwest corner of First avenue and Thirteenth street, as a site for a Carnegie Library.

Which was adopted by the following vote:

Affirmative—The Mayor, Comptroller, President of the Board of Aldermen, and the Presidents of the Boroughs of Manhattan, Brooklyn, The Bronx, Queens and Richmond—16.

The Comptroller presented the following:

LAW DEPARTMENT—OFFICE OF THE CORPORATION COUNSEL.
NEW YORK, May 8, 1902.

Hon. EDWARD M. GROUT, Comptroller.

Sir—I have received a letter from your Deputy, dated February 19, 1902, forwarding for my consideration resolutions proposed to be presented to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, affecting the construction of certain relief sewers in the Borough of Brooklyn, together with a report to you from Mr. A. J. Provost, Jr., Assistant Engineer, dated January 30, 1902.

You request my advice as to whether the recommendation contained in that report may properly be presented to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, and if so, whether the proposed resolutions submitted are in proper form for action by that body in order to accomplish the desired result.

The matter is a very complicated one, and I shall not attempt to set forth in this communication all of the details.

It begins with chapter 387 of the Laws of 1884, which is entitled "An Act in relation to sewers and drainage in the City of Brooklyn."

This act was incorporated into chapter 583 of the Laws of 1888 (the Brooklyn Charter), and some of its provisions were subsequently amended in certain respects by Laws of 1889, chapter 354, and Laws of 1894, chapter 379.

The general object of these statutes was to bring about the construction of a system of sewers for the relief of existing sewers, and more particularly to prevent their overflowing when there was an unusual quantity of surface water to be carried off.

Provision was made for the creation of a fund to be denominated "Main Sewer Relief and Extension Fund." The amount of this fund, as finally authorized, was two millions of dollars.

This fund was to be created by the sale of bonds of the City of Brooklyn, and the interest thereon, as well as their redemption, was to be provided for through the tax levy, and therefore by general taxation, so that it was not contemplated that any local assessment should be made.

It appears from the said report of Mr. Provost that the former City of Brooklyn issued bonds under these acts to the amount of \$1,833,000, so that there was a balance of \$167,000 for which bonds could have been issued to meet the expenses of completing the plan of relief sewers, which had been formulated by the Board of Engineers appointed by the City of Brooklyn in 1878 and in 1884.

Further details with regard to this matter can be obtained from the resolutions adopted by the Board of Public Improvements July 12, 1899, which were rescinded December 24, 1901, and from the report of Mr. Provost, dated August 15, 1899, to Mr. McLean, Engineer in the Finance Department, which is printed at page 772 of the minutes of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment for the year 1899. The minutes of the Board of Public Improvements for the year 1900, at page 1884, may also be referred to as regards the Bushwick avenue sidewalk sewers.

It is clear that under section 170 of the Charter The City of New York could lawfully issue Corporate Stock to the amount of the said balance of \$167,000, being the balance that remained unissued of the amount limited to be issued pursuant to the authority of the said laws relating to the City of Brooklyn.

In the years 1899, 1900 and 1901 the Board of Public Improvements adopted certain resolutions relating to this subject, and contracts were awarded in 1899 and 1900 for three improvements, which are described as follows:

1. Reid avenue main relief sewer.
2. Greene avenue main relief sewer extension.
3. Bushwick avenue sidewalk sewers.

These contracts were certified by the Commissioner of Sewers as chargeable to the Street Improvement Fund, and have been completed.

The cost has been paid out of the Street Improvement Fund on the supposition that it was returnable to that fund from the collections of assessments. In the case of the Bushwick avenue sidewalk sewers assessment lists have been prepared and confirmed, but no such lists have been prepared in the other two cases.

It will be unnecessary here to go further into the details. They can be pursued through the various reports and resolutions already cited, and others, if it is at any time necessary to do so.

It is now proposed to raise the balance by the sale of bonds, to the amount of \$167,000, under section 170 of the Charter, and use the proceeds to reimburse the Street Improvement Fund and to pay other charges for the construction of these sewers.

In this way the original scheme of building the sewers at the expense of the City at large, and not by assessment on private property, will be carried out.

This solution of a very perplexing problem is, I think, a good one, and perfectly legal if authorized by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment.

I have revised the proposed resolutions, and inclose a form which I think will be sufficient to accomplish the purpose.

Hon. EDWARD M. GROUT, Comptroller:

Sir—Referring to certain resolutions adopted by the Board of Public Improvements and by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment in 1899, 1900 and 1901, affecting improvements in the Borough of Brooklyn, having for their object the relief of various main sewers, I beg to state that the construction of relief or auxiliary sewers in the former City of Brooklyn was provided for by special legislation, as follows:

Chapter 387, Laws of 1884, as incorporated in chapter 583, Laws of 1888, and as amended in chapter 354, Laws of 1889, and as further amended in chapter 379, Laws of 1894.

The law in its original form created a fund denominated the "Main Sewer Relief and Extension Fund," and limited the aggregate amount of bonds to be issued for this to \$1,000,000. The interest on these bonds, as well as their redemption, was to be provided for in the tax levy and became a public tax. Under the amendments above referred to the limit of the aggregate amount of bonds to be issued for this fund was raised, first, to \$1,250,000, and finally to \$2,000,000. These acts provided that whenever, in the judgment of the Commissioner of City Works, it shall become necessary to construct a main sewer for the more perfect delivery of sewage or surface water from or through any main sewer heretofore constructed and completed in any drainage district of the City of Brooklyn, under and according to the general drainage plan adopted in and for said city, or to prevent an overflow from any sewer upon adjacent property, it shall be the duty of the said Commissioner of City Works to prepare a plan or plans of new mains for the relief of such drainage district, and to submit same, with estimates of cost, to the Common Council for approval. The amount of bonds to be issued for such improvements was limited to \$250,000 in any one year, and determined by action of the Mayor, Comptroller and City Clerk. Under these statutes the former City of Brooklyn issued bonds for such improvements to the aggregate amount of \$1,833,000, as appears in a resolution adopted by the Board of Public Improvements July 12, 1899, leaving a balance of \$167,000 for future bond issues to meet the expenses of completing the comprehensive plan of relief sewers formulated by the Board of Expert Engineers appointed by the City of Brooklyn in 1878 and in 1884. The recommendations of these Boards, and the relief sewers constructed in accordance with same by the City of Brooklyn, were discussed at length in my report of August 15, 1899, to Mr. McLean, Engineer, Department of Finance, which appears on page 773 of the minutes of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment of 1899.

With regard to carrying on these improvements after consolidation with The City of New York, section 170 of the Greater New York Charter provided, "when ever, and to the extent to which, it may be lawful for the municipal or public corporations, or parts thereof, including the Counties of Kings, * * * to issue for public purposes bonds pursuant to laws enacted prior to January 1, 1898, it shall be lawful for The City of New York as hereby constituted, to issue corporate stock as herein provided for the same purposes; provided, however, that the amount so to be issued shall not in any case exceed the balance remaining unissued of the amount limited to be issued pursuant to the authority of said laws. In similar instances assessment bonds and revenue bond of The City of New York, as hereby constituted, may likewise be so issued, subject to the same limitations as to the amount thereof.

It would appear that there was authority for continuing the construction of relief sewers in the Borough of Brooklyn subsequent to January 1, 1898, under the provisions of chapter 387, Laws of 1884, and amendments thereto, and that the total cost of such new construction under these acts was limited to \$167,000.

Plans for such work have been prepared by the Commissioner of Sewers, as the successor of the Commissioner of City Works, of the City of Brooklyn, as follows:

1. Main Relief Sewer, in Reid avenue, between Putnam and DeKalb avenues; in Stuyvesant avenue, between Greene and Gates avenues, and in Monroe street, between Ralph and Patchen avenues, at an estimated cost of \$20,000, which will be designated hereafter as the Reid Avenue Main Relief Sewer.

2. Main relief sewers in Greene avenue, between Patchen avenue and Bushwick avenue; in Bushwick avenue, between Greene avenue and Weirfield street; in Weirfield street, between Bushwick and Evergreen avenues; in Evergreen avenue, between Weirfield and Halsey streets; in Halsey street, between Evergreen and Central avenues; in Central avenue, between Halsey and Eldert streets, at an estimated cost of \$170,000, which will be designated hereafter as the Greene Avenue Main Relief Sewer Extension.

3. Pipe sewers under westerly sidewalk of Bushwick avenue, between Greene avenue and Weirfield street, rendered necessary by the construction of main relief sewer in Bushwick avenue, at an estimated cost of \$6,000, which will be designated hereafter as the Bushwick Avenue Sidewalk Sewers.

Of these the Greene Avenue Main Relief Sewer Extension may be considered as the completion of the general plan laid down by the Expert Board of Engineers before referred to. The Reid Avenue Main Relief Sewer, and the Bushwick Avenue Sidewalk Sewers may be considered as details necessary to render the general plan of relief operative. Contracts for these three improvements were awarded in 1899 and 1900; all of them were certified by the Commissioner of Sewers as chargeable to the Street Improvement Fund. These contracts have been completed and the cost of same has been paid out of the Street Improvement Fund, on the supposition that it was returnable to that fund from assessment collections. In the case of the Bushwick Avenue Sidewalk Sewers assessment lists have been prepared and confirmed. For the other two improvements I am informed no assessment lists have been prepared.

In order to pass upon the status of these improvements, it is necessary to consider the various proceedings authorizing their construction and the appropriations made for same. These will, therefore, be discussed in order:

I. The Reid Avenue Main Relief Sewer.

Plans for this improvement were prepared by the Commissioner of City Works, former City of Brooklyn, and submitted to the Common Council for approval October 11, 1897, as required in the Special Acts for relief sewers before referred to. In his communication he requests the Common Council to authorize the construction of relief sewers in Reid avenue, between Putnam and DeKalb avenues; in Stuyvesant avenue, between Greene and Gates avenues, and in Monroe street, between Ralph and Patchen avenues, to further the improvement already made by the construction of the Greene Avenue Main Relief Sewers.

On October 11, 1897, the Common Council by resolution approved the plan and directed the Commissioner of City Works to proceed with the construction of said sewers and contingent constructions under the provisions of chapter 583, Laws of 1888, as amended by chapter 354, Laws of 1889, and as further amended by chapter 379, Laws of 1894.

No issue of bonds was made to meet the cost of the work, as it was believed a sufficient balance existed in the Main Sewer Relief and Extension Fund. Contract for the work was awarded to Daniel J. Creem, December 23, 1897, but failed

to be certified. On July 1, 1899, the Commissioner of Sewers in a communication to the Board of Public Improvements requesting authority under the provisions of sections 415 and 422 of the charter to resubmit and award contract for these Main Relief Sewers, the Comptroller having returned the original contract to his office with the statement that the balance to the credit of the "Main Sewer Relief and Extension Fund" was insufficient to meet the cost of the work and the Corporation Counsel having advised the Commissioner that he had, under the authority of the Board of Public Improvements, the powers to enter into a new contract for the purpose indicated. In response to this request the Board of Public Improvements adopted October 11, 1899, a resolution authorizing and approving the construction of sewers in Reid avenue, between Putnam and DeKalb avenues; in Stuyvesant avenue, between Greene and Gates avenues; in Monroe street, between Ralph and Patchen avenues, and determining that no part of the cost and expense thereof should be borne and paid by The City of New York, but the whole of such cost and expense to be assessed upon the property deemed to be benefited thereby. In accordance with which contract was awarded January 2, 1900, to L. R. Clapp, the work completed and paid for out of the Street Improvement Fund, as previously stated.

It would therefore appear that although this work was an integral part of a plan of relief sewers, which had been carefully formulated, and for which Legislative authority prescribed a definite method of meeting the cost, which authority was still operative under section 170 of the Greater New York Charter, the Commissioner of Sewers and the Board of Public Improvements did not act in accordance with that authority.

I am of the opinion that the proceedings were regular until they reached the Board of Public Improvements and that that Board should properly have requested the Board of Estimate and Apportionment to authorize and direct the issue of "Main Relief Sewer and Extension Bonds" to meet the cost of the work, instead of assessing the cost of the same upon a section of the City. It would appear doubtful if the assessment will stand if levied. The entire cost of the work has been \$21,903.50. I understand there are no outstanding liabilities against this contract. Recommendation is made that it would be proper for the Board of Estimate and Apportionment to determine by resolution that the cost of the work shall be met as provided in chapter 387, Laws of 1884, and amendments thereto, and that when the Main Sewer Relief and Extension Fund shall contain a sufficient balance, an amount equal to that taken from the "Street Improvement Fund" on account of this work shall be restored to the fund from such balance.

II.—Greene Avenue Main Relief Sewer Extension.

Plans for this improvement were prepared by the Commissioner of Sewers and submitted, under title "Main Relief Extension No. III," to the Board of Public Improvements in June, 1899. On July 12, 1899, that Board adopted the following resolutions affecting the work:

"Whereas, The Legislature of the State of New York in 1892 and 1894 had authorized the expenditure of two million dollars for the construction of certain sewers in the Borough of Brooklyn, under title of the 'Main Sewer Relief and Extension Fund'; and

"Whereas, It appears that previous to January 1, 1898, bonds to the amount of one million eight hundred and thirty-three thousand dollars had been issued, leaving a balance of one hundred and sixty-seven thousand dollars not acted upon; now be it

"Resolved, That the Board of Estimate and Apportionment is hereby requested to authorize and direct the Comptroller to issue bonds amounting to one hundred and sixty-seven thousand dollars for the purpose of constructing sewers in Greene avenue, from Patchen to Bushwick avenues; Bushwick avenue, from Greene avenue to Weirfield street; Weirfield street, from Bushwick avenue to Evergreen avenue; Evergreen avenue, from Weirfield street to Halsey street; Halsey street, from Evergreen avenue to Central avenue, and Central avenue, from Halsey street to Eldredge street, in the Borough of Brooklyn."

The Board of Public Improvements also adopted, on the same day, a resolution diametrically opposed to the above and as follows:

"Resolved, By the Board of Public Improvements, that, in pursuance of sections 415 and 422 of the Greater New York Charter, the construction of sewers in Greene avenue, from Patchen avenue to Bushwick avenue; Bushwick avenue, from Greene avenue to Weirfield street; Weirfield street, from Bushwick avenue to Evergreen avenue; Evergreen avenue, from Weirfield street to Halsey street; Halsey street, from Evergreen avenue to Central avenue, and Central avenue, from Halsey street to Eldredge street, in the Borough of Brooklyn, under the direction of the Commissioner of Sewers, said system being known as the Main Sewer Relief and Extension, be and the same hereby is authorized and approved, there having been presented to said Board an estimate in writing, in such detail as the said Board has directed, of the cost of the proposed work or improvement, and a statement of the assessed value, according to the last preceding taxroll, of the real estate included within the probable area of assessment, the estimated cost of said work being one hundred and seventy thousand dollars. The said assessed value of the real estate included within the probable area of assessment is seventy-one million three hundred and forty-five thousand and fourteen dollars.

"And the said Board does hereby determine that no portion of the cost and expense thereof shall be borne and paid by The City of New York, but the whole of such cost and expense shall be assessed upon the property deemed to be benefited thereby.

The first resolution required the approval of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment. It was presented at the meeting of that body on September 15, 1899, and acted upon as follows:

"Resolved, That, pursuant to the provisions of chapter 379, Laws of 1894, and section 170 of the Greater New York Charter, the Comptroller be authorized, subject to concurrence herewith by the Municipal Assembly, to issue Corporate Stock of The City of New York, in the manner provided by section 169 of the Greater New York Charter, to the amount of one hundred and sixty-seven thousand dollars; the proceeds whereof shall be paid into the "Main Sewer Relief and Extension Fund," so as to provide means for the construction of sewers in the Borough of Brooklyn, in Greene avenue, from Patchen avenue to Bushwick avenue," etc.

I have been unable to determine that concurrent action was taken on this resolution by the Municipal Assembly; it presumably failed of such action, as the bonds have not been issued.

The Commissioners of Sewers, proceeding, apparently, under the second resolution of the Board of Public Improvements of July 12, solicited bids for the work and awarded contract November 3, 1899, to the Borough Construction Company. This contract was certified by the Commissioner of Sewers as chargeable to the "Street Improvement Fund," and payments for the work have been paid out of this fund to the amount of \$151,220.06. There is an outstanding contract liability of \$16,983 retained from final payment, as security for a period of six months, from August 20, 1901.

On December 24, 1901, the Board of Public Improvements rescinded both resolutions of July 12, 1899, authorizing the extension of the main relief sewer in Greene avenue and other avenues named therein, and adopted in place thereof:

(a) Resolution requesting Board of Estimate and Apportionment to authorize and direct the Comptroller to issue bonds for the Main Sewer Relief and Extension Fund to the amount of \$167,000, for the purpose of constructing the work; and

(b) Resolution authorizing and approving the construction of the sewers under sections 415 and 422 of the City Charter and determining that the entire cost and expense of the work shall be borne and paid by The City of New York in accordance with the Main Relief Sewer Acts of 1892 and 1894.

It would appear thus that authority exists for the work, but that in the absence of concurrent action by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment and by the Municipal Assembly, no appropriation was provided for meeting the cost of the work. It would seem imperative that the amount taken from the Street Improvement Fund, some one hundred and fifty odd thousand dollars, be restored from a proper source, and in order that this may be done, recommendation is made that it would be proper for the Board of Estimate and Apportionment to authorize and direct the Comptroller to issue the \$167,000 worth of available bonds for this purpose. It would appear, under the provisions of section 169 of the City Charter, that concurrent action by the Board of Aldermen is not necessary to authorize the bond issue.

III.—The Bushwick Avenue Sidewalks Sewers.

The necessity for this work and its relation to the Greene Avenue Main Relief Sewer Extension are fully stated in the communication of June 15, 1900, addressed by the Commissioner of Sewers to the Board of Public Improvements, which ap-

pears on page 1884 of the minutes of the Board for 1900. Plans for the work were prepared by the Department of Sewers and contract awarded to J. H. Holmes & Co., under authority of a resolution of the Board of Public Improvements (June 20, 1900), which directed that the entire cost of the work be assessed upon the property benefited thereby. The contract was certified by the Commissioner of Sewers as chargeable to the Street Improvement Fund, and payments have been made from this fund on account of this work to the extent of \$5,882.57. I understand there are no outstanding liabilities against this work. Assessment lists have been prepared and were confirmed October 15, 1901.

I find that these sewers were rendered necessary by the construction of the Greene Avenue Main Relief Sewer Extension, and that while they are not relief sewers, and cannot be classed as mains or sub-mains, which the relief sewer laws provided for, they are nevertheless a part of the comprehensive plan for relief and their cost as such should, in my opinion, be provided for in the same manner as the relief sewer whose construction rendered them necessary. That chapter 387 of the Laws of 1884 intended that all necessary expense attending the construction of relief sewers should be included in the cost of such relief sewers is shown in section 5 and 6 of that act, which provides that in case it becomes necessary to raise the grade of a street or to acquire title to or easement in private property for the purpose of constructing relief sewers, the expense thereof shall be deemed to be and be taken as a part of the cost of constructing such sewers.

For this reason, as well as the fact that the abutting property was previously provided with proper and adequate sewers, constructed at its own cost and expense, it would seem that the collection of the assessment levied for the new sewers would be extremely difficult.

Recommendation is made that if the assessment proceedings for this work can be vacated it would be proper for the Board of Estimate and Apportionment to determine that the entire cost shall be met as provided in chapter 387 of the Laws of 1884, and amendments thereto, and that when the "Main Sewer Relief and Extension Fund" shall contain a sufficient balance, an amount equal to that taken from the "Street Improvement Fund," on account of this work, shall be restored to that fund from such balance.

IV.—A further improvement and similar in its nature to the Bushwick avenue sidewalk sewers was instituted by the Department of Sewers, providing for the re-laying of the asphalt bicycle strip on the westerly side of Bushwick avenue, between Greene avenue and Weirfield street. This work was rendered necessary by the change in location of that portion of the Greene avenue main relief sewer extension in Bushwick avenue, between the limits stated, previously referred to. The Department of Sewers decided it could not compel the contractors to restore this asphalt strip and the Board of Public Improvements was requested to authorize the re-laying of same as an "adjunct to the contract," entitled, "Contract for Sewers in Greene avenue, from Patchen avenue to Bushwick avenue," at an estimated cost of \$2,375. Such authority was granted October 2, 1901, the Board of Public Improvements determining that the entire cost of the work be assessed upon the property benefited thereby.

While it appears extremely doubtful if, under the City Charter, assessment proceedings for repaving can be properly instituted without the consent of a majority of the property owners affected by the assessment, in view of the fact that no contract has been entered into for the performance of this work, it may be properly eliminated from the subject under consideration, and will not be further referred to herein, beyond the recommendation that further proceedings in the matter be discontinued.

A summary of the foregoing improvements which have been completed shows the total cost of same to have been as follows:

I.—Reid Avenue Main Relief Sewer, etc.

It would appear that the premiums from the issue of the above \$167,000 Corporate Stock would more than cover this apparent deficit.

It should be noted that the balance on hand January 22, 1902, amounting to \$24,811.98, is stated to be by the Chief Bookkeeper of this Department a book balance, and not a cash balance. Since it agrees quite closely with the balance carried on the books of the Sewer Bureau of the Borough of Brooklyn, it is presumably approximately correct.

—be and the same is hereby rescinded.

Which was adopted by the following vote:

Affirmative—The Mayor, Comptroller, President of the Board of Aldermen and the Presidents of the Boroughs of Manhattan, Brooklyn, The Bronx, Queens and Richmond—16.

The following preamble and resolution were offered:

Whereas, The Legislature of the State of New York in 1884, 1889 and 1894, had authorized the expenditure of two million dollars (\$2,000,000) for the construction of certain sewers in the Borough of Brooklyn, under title of "Main Sewer Relief and Extension Fund"; and

Whereas, It appears that previous to January 1, 1898, bonds to the amount of

one million eight hundred and thirty-three thousand dollars (\$1,833,000) had been issued, leaving a balance of one hundred and sixty-seven thousand dollars (\$167,000) not acted upon; now be it.

Resolved, That, pursuant to the provisions of chapter 379, Laws of 1894, and section 170 of the amended Greater New York Charter, the Comptroller be authorized to issue Corporate Stock of The City of New York, in the manner provided by section 169 of the amended Greater New York Charter, to the amount of one hundred and sixty-seven thousand dollars (\$167,000); the proceeds whereof, including the premiums on the bonds, shall be paid into the "Main Sewer Relief and Extension Fund," so as to provide means for meeting the cost of constructing main relief sewers in the Borough of Brooklyn as follows:

(1) In Reid avenue, between Putnam and DeKalb avenues; in Stuyvesant avenue, between Greene and Gates avenues, and in Monroe street, between Ralph and Patchen avenues.

(2) In Greene avenue, between Patchen avenue and Bushwick avenue; in Bushwick avenue, between Greene avenue and Weirfield street; in Weirfield street, between Bushwick and Evergreen avenues; in Evergreen avenue, between Weirfield and Halsey streets; in Halsey street, between Evergreen and Central avenues; in Central avenue, between Halsey and Eldert streets.

(3) Under westerly sidewalk of Bushwick avenue, between Greene avenue and Weirfield street.

And further

Resolved, That the Comptroller be and hereby is authorized and directed, from the proceeds of the bonds to be sold pursuant to the foregoing resolution, to reimburse the "Street Improvement Fund" to the extent of the disbursements therefrom of the cost of constructing the sewers in Reid avenue and Greene avenue, above referred to, and that he be further authorized and directed to pay from such proceeds the assessment heretofore laid and confirmed for constructing the sewer under the westerly sidewalk of Bushwick avenue, between Greene avenue and Weirfield street.

Which were adopted by the following vote:

Affirmative—The Mayor, Comptroller, President of the Board of Aldermen and the Presidents of the Boroughs of Manhattan, Brooklyn, The Bronx, Queens and Richmond—16.

The Comptroller presented the following:

Resolved, That, pursuant to the provisions of section 180 of the amended Greater New York Charter, the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund hereby recommend to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment that the Comptroller be authorized to issue, from time to time, as may be required, Corporate Stock of The City of New York to the amount of five million dollars (\$5,000,000), the proceeds whereof to be applied to the uses and purposes of the Departments of Docks and Ferries.

Hon. SETH LOW, Mayor, Chairman, Board of Estimate and Apportionment:

DEAR SIR—In my communication of April 2d ult., respecting the bond issues required by this Department for improvements and additions to the City's water systems, I mentioned certain works of urgent importance, as within the limit of \$2,000,000, which the Board, under section 178 of the Greater New York Charter, might authorize without the concurrence of the Board of Aldermen (see pages 18 and 19 of said communication).

I have not yet received any official notification of your Board's action on these requests; and I now beg to advise you that delay upon the part of the Board results in prohibiting this Department from taking any steps toward the execution of works of vital consequence to the people, which might be completed within a comparatively short time; nor can I conceive of any contemplated improvements as surpassing these in importance to the welfare of the inhabitants of the city. My enumeration must necessarily be incomplete, for I shall select but a few of the most urgently required works.

Borough of Brooklyn.

1. Two additional boilers at the Millburn Pumping Station, \$22,000, in regard to which I wrote you again on the 25th ult., sending with my letter a proposed resolution for the requisite bond issue.

These boilers are needed in connection with the additional pumping engines at the Millburn Engine House, for which authorization and bond issue were obtained last year, contract for which is soon to be advertised. The construction of the pumping engines and of the boilers should progress simultaneously. Until these works shall be finished, the capacity for additional water supply to the Borough of Brooklyn to be derived from the new conduit (which is to be built by December next) will not be fully utilized. Hence, delay in authorizing a bond issue for these boilers is in effect an addition to the time to the contractor to complete the new conduit. I have protested against an extension of his time granted by the former Commissioner of Water Supply; and, in the interest of the people of Brooklyn, I beg to enter a protest against what might amount to an extension by delay upon the part of your Board to authorize this necessary work.

2. Filter Plant at Hempstead, Long Island, \$200,000. The City should, by filtration, protect the large water supply from this reservoir or it may be lost from contamination from sewage and house drainage, and such contamination has begun to manifest itself and is sure to increase. A recent report of the Chief Engineer for the Boroughs of Brooklyn and Queens, to me, states that 2,327 closets and cesspools at Hempstead were inspected and cleaned by the Department during the first quarter of the current year. Could anything more vividly portray the serious menace to the Brooklyn water system at this point? In my report to your Board of April 2, above referred to, I set forth at length the dangerous conditions prevailing there. The loss of the Hempstead supply would be a calamity to the people of Brooklyn, and steps for the construction of Filtration Plants should be immediately taken.

3. Additional driven wells, stations, etc. \$308,000 00
Additional lands for pipe conduit and stations. 50,000 00
Test wells 10,000 00

Under the recent opinion of the Corporation Counsel that the "Burr" Law is unconstitutional and inapplicable to Suffolk County, this Department is prepared to enter that county for the purpose of seeking an additional water supply, just as soon as funds shall have been appropriated.

4. Boroughs of Manhattan, The Bronx and Queens.
New water mains, Manhattan and The Bronx. \$500,000 00
New water mains, Brooklyn. 350,000 00
New water mains, Queens. 115,000 00

In the records of this Department there is an enormous accumulation of demands for water main extensions from Local Boards and property owners, and this is particularly true as regards the boroughs of The Bronx, Brooklyn and Queens, but this Department is unable to take any action upon any of these demands until funds shall have been appropriated by your Board. The necessity of these water main extensions has been repeatedly pointed out and was dwelt upon in my report. It certainly seems a remarkable thing that the people of the city who pay large sums of money into the City's exchequer in the shape of water revenues are unable to obtain the necessary pipes and mains to supply them with water. They might well soon begin to inquire whether the City, on its part, was fulfilling its obligations to furnish water and whether a corresponding duty existed upon their part to pay for a supply which is not furnished.

In presenting the just demands of the people of the City for water main extensions, I beg to remind you that the water system of the City is profitably conducted. It is an injustice not only to the people at large on the ground adverted to, but also because enterprising owners who wish to improve their holdings are barred from doing so because of the lack of mains; and people are crowded and congested in districts of the City for the reason that suburban localities are not developed as they would be if a wiser policy prevailed. Failure to furnish proper water mains and to develop the City's water system also entails a loss to the City by preventing such enhancement of the taxable valuations as would be sure to result from the improvements which I advocate.

Nearly five months of the present year have elapsed, and after the requisite funds shall have been granted, if they should be promptly conceded, another month will be consumed in the legal preliminaries to the making of contracts, before any real work can be commenced. The list of most necessary enterprises for which the head of this Department is responsible to the people of this city might readily be increased. It depends upon your Board whether anything, and if so what, shall be done during the residue of this year to meet the most pressing necessities of the water service, and I again appeal to you for prompt action.

To the Board of Education:

The Committee on Finance respectfully reports that a claim has been presented by Karr, Poole & Lum for professional services as Architects in connection with the completion of the building for Public School 26, in the Borough of Queens, said claim amounting to one hundred and two dollars and twenty-eight cents (\$102.28). It appears that the claimants were employed by the former authorities of late School District No. 4, Town of Flushing, the arrangement having been made prior to consolidation. The Superintendent of School Buildings has approved the bill.

The funds turned over to the City by the school authorities of late School District No. 4, Town of Flushing, are exhausted, and in order to pay the before-mentioned claim it will be necessary to request the Board of Estimate and Apportionment to make an appropriation for the purpose.

The following resolution is submitted for adoption:

Resolved, That, subject to the approval of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, the sum of one hundred and two dollars and twenty-eight cents (\$102.28) be and the same is hereby appropriated from premiums derived from the sale of Corporate Stock of The City of New York, heretofore issued by the Comptroller, pursuant to section 48 of the Greater New York Charter; said sum to be applied in payment of the claim of Karr, Poole & Lum for professional services as Architects in connection with the completion of Public School 26, Borough of Queens; requisition for said sum being hereby made upon the Comptroller.

SIR—There have been referred to me since I assumed the duties of Chief Engineer of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment 248 different matters for investigation and report. I have made reports upon just half of this number, or 124. I am prepared to report upon a number of the others, but am unable to obtain the necessary clerical assistance. There are two Stenographers and Typewriters attached to the office of the Assistant Secretary of the Board in charge of improvement work, but their time has of late been fully occupied in the routine work of the office, the preparation of calendars and minutes, etc. The calendars now include an abstract of the papers and reports on each subject, and I have been instructed to send copies of all my reports to each member of the Board.

I had thought that such stenographic and clerical work as might be required in connection with my work could be managed by the force of the Assistant Secretary, but their time seems to be fully occupied, and I am obliged to spend considerable of my own time, which could be more profitably employed, in arranging and indexing the papers sent me and my reports thereon. I therefore beg to ask if the Board can not furnish a Stenographer and Typewriter for the Engineer's office who can also do such clerical work as is required. If you are disposed to approve this request, I presume it will be necessary to create a new position, the salary for which will have to be fixed by the Board of Aldermen.

I regret that I did not make this recommendation before the Budget was finally determined, but I did not at that time appreciate the amount of work to be done in the office of the Assistant Secretary. I believe that the appropriation for the expenses of the Board is sufficient to cover this addition to the staff for seven months.

I am sending a similar letter to the Mayor.

Spitting upon the sidewalk of any public street, avenue, park, public square, or place, in The City of New York, or upon the floor of any hall in any tenement house which is used in common by the tenants thereof, or upon the floor of any hall or office in any hotel or lodging house which is used in common by the guests thereof, or upon the floor of any theatre, or of any building in which there is a public assemblage of people, or upon the floor of any ferry boat, railroad car or other public conveyance, or upon the floor of any ferry house, depot, station platform or stairs of any elevated railroad or other common carrier, is hereby forbidden.

The corporations or persons owning or having the management or control of any such building, ferry boat, railroad car or other public conveyance, ferry house, depot, station platform or stairs of any elevated railroad or other common carrier are hereby required to keep permanently posted in each of said places a sufficient number of notices forbidding spitting upon the floors and calling attention to the provisions of this section.

The corporations or persons owning or having the management or control of the buildings, ferryboats, ferry houses, depots, station platforms of any elevated railroad or other common carrier are hereby required to provide sufficient and proper receptacles for expectoration, and also to provide for the cleansing and disinfection of said receptacles at least every twenty-four hours; and spitting into the street from the cars, stairs, platforms of the elevated railroads, or any public conveyance, is hereby forbidden.

It is hereby made the duty of every corporation or person engaged in the manufacture of cigars, cigarettes or tobacco, or conducting the business of printing, in The City of New York, when ten or more persons are employed on the premises, to provide proper receptacles for expectoration. Such receptacles are to be in proportion of one for every two persons so employed, and they are to be cleansed and disinfected at least once every twenty-four hours.

A copy of the last paragraph of this section must be kept posted in a conspicuous place in every factory or printing office, mentioned in the preceding paragraph.

That the word "Physician" shall include dentists, and every other person who practices about the cure of the sick or injured, or who has the charge of, or professionally prescribes for, any person sick, injured, or diseased, and any person who pursues the business of or acts as midwife; that the phrase "contagious disease" shall be held to include all persons sick, affected, or attacked by or of a disease of an infectious, contagious, or pestilential nature (more especially, however, referring to cholera, yellow fever, small-pox, chicken-pox, diphtheria [including membranous group], ship or typhus, typhoid, spotted, relapsing and scarlet fevers, and measles, acute and chronic ophthalmia [trachoma] and also including any new disease of an infectious, contagious, or pestilential nature), and also any other disease publicly declared by this Board dangerous to the public health; and every physician in said city shall at all times cause his or her name, office and residence, and also his or her kind and class of practice, to be registered within the Bureau of Records and in a manner according to the regulations prescribed by this Board.

The person or persons making a bid or estimate for any services, work, materials or supplies for The City of New York, or for any of its departments, bureaus or offices, shall furnish the same in a sealed envelope indorsed with the title of the supplies, materials, work or services for which the bid or estimate is made, with his or their name or names and the date of presentation to the President or Board or to the head of the department at his or its office, on or before the date and hour named in the advertisement for the same, at which time and place the estimates received will be publicly opened by the President or Board or head of said department, and read, and the award of the contract made according to law as soon thereafter as practicable.

Each bid or estimate shall contain the name and place of residence of the person making the same, the names of all persons interested with him therein, and, if no other person be so interested, it shall distinctly state that fact; also, that it is made without any connection with any other person making an estimate for the same purpose, and is in all respects fair and without collusion or fraud, and that no member of the board of aldermen, head of a department, chief of a bureau, deputy thereof, or clerk therein, or other officer of The City of New York is, shall be or become interested, directly or indirectly, as contracting party, partner, stockholder, surety or otherwise in or in the performance of the contract, or in the supplies, work or business to which it relates, or in any portion of the profits thereof. The bid or estimate must be verified by the contractor in writing, of the party or parties making the estimate, that the several matters stated herein are in all respects true.

Each bid or estimate shall be accompanied by the consent, in writing, of two householders or freeholders in The City of New York, or of a guaranty or surety company duly authorized by law to act as surety, and shall contain the names set forth in the blank forms mentioned below.
